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In the above statement of expenditure an apparent discrepancy requires explanation. The special collections disbursed in 1871 amounted to \$595 93, whereas the total amount collected from these sources during that year amounted only to \$553 90. The difference arose from the fact that the sum of \$42 03, raised in 1870, was held over until the following year, and appeared in the expenditure of 1871 instead of in that of 1870. The same discrepancy appears in the expenditure for 1872. The sum of \$628 97 having been paid out while only \$577 62 was collected. The difference is caused by the collection in aid of French Evangelization in 1871, amounting to \$51 35 having been held over and disbursed during the current year.

The fact of a balance, however small, appearing in the hands of the Treasurer after all the expenses of the year have been liquidated, is satisfactory, and shews that the ordinary financial affairs of the Church are in a sound and healthy condition; and when it is remembered that, while year after year there has been a steady increase in the expenditure, there has at the same time been a proportionate increase of the revenue—there is, indeed, room for hearty congratulation and encouragement; conveying the assurance that where a legitimate end is striven for, the means for attaining it will not be found wanting.

The subject of arrears is one to which your Committee have again and again had occasion to refer. According to last year's Report, the arrears to the Church Fund for the year 1871, amounted to \$288 31, of which only the insignificant sum of \$89 95 has been received. For the current year we were promised the sum of \$2,205, of which only \$1,849 has been paid, leaving a deficiency of \$356 still to be collected. It is with extreme reluctance that your Committee feel themselves compelled year after year to allude to this matter; but in justice both to themselves and the Congregation cannot avoid doing so. The agreement on the part of the Congregation to supply a stipulated amount annually, for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the Church, is a business obligation, and something more, and as such ought to be carried out fully and honorably to the utmost. Unless your Committee can confidently rely upon this being done, they must necessarily feel reluctant in undertaking pecuniary obligations on your account, which they may not be supplied with the means of fulfilling.

In the Report of last year, considerable prominence was given to the work of Church extension, to which the Congregation was then pledged. A site had then been secured for the erection of a new church; subscription lists had been opened and a considerable amount subscribed. Plans were being pre-

pared, and it was confidently expected that the opening of the spring of 1872 would see the work fully entered upon. Your Committee were sanguine that the beginning of the present year would find the building approaching completion, and their labors connected therewith drawing to a close. In these expectations they have been disappointed, and it now remains for them to lay before you a statement of the progress attained, and the causes which have led to the present unfortunate state of affairs. To this end they herewith submit the Report of the Building Committee which contains full information upon the whole subject. From it it will be seen that the prospects of an early completion of the new church are by no means promising. Your Committee would fain hope, however, that the hostility displayed by the Mason's Union will not be maintained, but that on the opening of the spring the work will be re-let, and pushed on to speedy completion.

With regard to the financial state of affairs, connected with the new church, your Committee would refer you for information to the statement and accounts of the Finance Committee, which are herewith also submitted. From these it is evident that the work before the Congregation is by no means light, and will require resolute and sustained action in order to place matters in a satisfactory condition, and meet the annually recurring liabilities incurred in the prosecution of the present movement.

An examination of the above statement of accounts shews three sources from which the means are derived for carrying on operations. These are as follows:—

1st. *From direct Subscriptions.*—Those amount now to \$17,030; but your Committee trust and believe that this sum will yet be considerably increased, as several of the Church Districts have only been imperfectly canvassed, and the names of very many of our Church members are still absent from our lists.

2nd. *From advances from Bank.*—This source is only a temporary one, used merely for the purpose of forestalling the receipt of subscriptions; and when these have been all paid up, will then be fully discharged.

3rd. *From Loan from Building Society.*—This amounts to the sum of \$15,000 (of which \$8,000 has been already received.) It is secured by mortgage upon the new Church Property, as well as by the Personal Bond of several Members of your Committee, and is payable in semi-annual instalments, covering both principal and interest, extending over twenty years. The first instalment, amounting to \$720.90, falls due in November

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next, and a like amount every six months thereafter until the whole \$15,000 is repaid. To meet these payments, your Committee must rely upon the Congregation, as they will have to be met out of ordinary Revenue. To do this, the Revenue must be increased by the sum of \$1,441.80 per annum, equal to an addition of 80 per cent. to the income of the Congregation. Your Committee believe that it is not necessary to do more than state these facts,—enabling every one thoroughly to understand the condition of affairs,—to insure a liberal increase of subscriptions to the ordinary Church Fund when your Collectors make their usual annual canvass.

One more point remains to be notified. In dealing with the Real Estate belonging to the Congregation, your Committee were met with many serious difficulties, arising from the present mode of tenure. In order to avoid these in future, your Committee, acting under the advice of Mr. J. B. Lewis, resolved to apply for an Act of Incorporation of the Temporal Committee. This Act is now being prepared by Mr. Lewis, and will be applied for at the next meeting of the Legislature of Ontario.

In conclusion, your Committee hope that a way may be opened up to their successors in office to a happy conclusion of the serious difficulties at present surrounding the temporal affairs of the Congregation; and although prospects may appear somewhat discouraging, they are confident that all will yet be well, and our present trials and reverses will be wrought out by Providence in such a way as to redound to His glory and the prosperity of His cause.

REPORT OF BUILDING COMMITTEE TO THE TEMPORAL
COMMITTEE, KNOX CHURCH.

OTTAWA, December 26th, 1872.

In accordance with instructions from the Temporal Committee, we beg to present you with the following brief synopsis of the operations of the Building Committee for the year now closing.

In reply to an advertisement, which we caused to be inserted in the local papers, asking for tenders for the erection of the new Church, we received the following offers, which we give in detail for the information of the Committee.

After due consideration of these tenders, and after having had the benefit of the experience of the Architect, who analyzed the same,

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we selected the tenders of the following parties to execute the work in their several departments, as herinafter named :

At a meeting held on the 26th of February last, Mr. Hodgson was appointed Clerk of Works. On the 12th of March the Committee resolved that all the Contractors for the erection of the new Church, before proceeding further with their respective portions of the work, be requestad to sign the specifications, plans and contracts in accordance with the amounts specified in their tenders, and subject to all the detailed furnished or to be furnished by the Architect, declaring that in case of any difference of interpretation arising upon said contracts, plans and specifications, the matter in dispute shall be referred to Mr. Langley, whose decision shall be binding upon all parties.

Mr. W. A. Ross, who has throughout acted acted as Solicitor for the Building Committee, was authorized to draw out contracts in accordance with the terms of the above resolution.

The contracts having been prepared, we met with Mr. Ross, who explained the meaning and bearing of each clause of the contract, when it was resolved that the contract as thus explained be signed.

From this time the work was advancing favourably, until a dispute arose between the contractor for the stone work and the Clerk of Works, as to the nature of some of the work to be put on the building, and also in reference to the amount to which up to date the Contractor was entitled for work actually done. It was deemed wise, in the circumstances of the case, to fall back upon the clause in the contract already alluded to, giving the Architect, in case of dispute, a final and binding decision. Mr. Langley was accordingly sent for, and after investigation into the case, consulting with both Contractor and Clerk of Works, he submitted a written report, by the decisions and suggestions contained in which we were guided in the matter. By this report it appears that the interpretation put upon the style of the work under dispute by the Clerk of Works was correct, but that the Contractor had not received up to that time all the money to which, in the estimation of the Architect, Mr. Langley, he was entitled. Although the difference between the amount granted by the Clerk of Works to Mr. Bray, and that to which, according to Mr. Langley's estimate, he was entitled, is not large, yet the Committee were assured by our Solicitor that we had violated the contract, and that in the event of any legal proceedings, a jury's decision would undoubtedly be given against us.

On the 17th of June, the committee received a communication from the Clerk of Works, in which he stated, "that owing to the unsatisfactory progress of the work on the Church, he deemed it his duty to inform the Committee that unless some immediate steps were taken in the matter by them, he would stop the works altogether."

Matters were still more complicated on the 26th of June, for on that date, work having actually ceased on the building, the Contractor informed the Committee by letter, that he was prepared either to give up possession of the building, provided he was paid according to his own valuation of the work already done, or he would proceed with the work on terms to be settled between the Committee and himself. A Sub-Committee was appointed with power to make the best arrangements they could under the circumstance, and in any case to act under advice from the Solicitor; the Building Committee however, expressing its opinion that it would be advisable in the Sub-Committee to accept Mr. Bray's proposal to give up possession of the works. After lengthened deliberation, and having obtained legal advice, this Sub-Committee entered into a new contract, giving power to the Clerk of works to take immediate possession of the Church at any time, when in his estimation the building was not pushed on to completion, and promising the Contractor a bonus of \$2,750, to be paid on the completion of the building. By this agreement, which was entered upon with the double purpose of urging on the building to be ready for the carpenters on the 13th of September, and also of securing to the Committee more ample powers of dealing immediately with any stoppage that might occur, the Committee cherished the hope that all further difficulties might be avoided and the Building rapidly pushed on to completion. In this expectation we were bitterly disappointed, for when the Committee met on the 7th of October, we found that more money had, up to that date, been paid the Contractor than he could legitimately have claimed under the contract. The Clerk of Works was therefore requested to furnish a statement of the amounts granted on his certificates and the date of such certificates. From this statement it appears that the Clerk of Works granted Mr. Bray the following certificates:—

In addition to the \$12,000 on certificates of the Clerk of Works, Mr. Bray had also received \$407 on the order of the Chairman of the Building Committee, and also \$200 for orders for material, making the sum of \$12,607. Besides the above mentioned amount the sum of \$2,530 45 was paid over to him by a member of the Committee; so that before the building was taken out of his hands, Mr. Bray had received in all the sum of \$15,137 45. During the following week, further progress on the Church was stopped, the men refusing to work because the Contractor owed them two weeks wages. Mr. Hodgson was immediately authorized to demand possession of the Church Building, inasmuch as the work was not progressing in accordance with agreement and in terms of contract. As the result of the negotiations then entered on, the building came into our possession;

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and the Committee still hoped to be able to roof in the building before winter set in. With this end in view an effort was made to secure the services of masons to complete that portion of the stone work necessary before the roof could be put on. In this they were frustrated by the unrighteous demand of the Trades Union, that the Committee should pay the wages of the men before the masons would be allowed to work on the building. The Building Committee were strongly of opinion that under no circumstances would they be warranted in assuming any of the debts of the Contractor, and they accordingly persistently refused to recognize the claims made upon them by the workmen as to be entertained for a moment. This action on the part of the Unions completely paralyzed all the efforts made by us to render the building fit for the roof this fall. We have, however, secured the building against damage from winter frost by having it banked all around the foundation, and the upper surface of the walls also carefully protected.

The amounts paid by us to the carpenters, on the certificates of the Clerk of Works are as follows:

According to contract, we were bound to give the building into the hands of the carpenters ready for the roof on the 13th of September. The carpenters have, owing to this, made a demand upon the Committee, for a sum in indemnification of the loss they consider themselves to have sustained by not having the building at the time agreed upon by contract. They make the two following propositions to the Committee: *First*, they ask for the sum of \$3,500, and require the Committee to guarantee that the building be ready for roofing on or before the 12th day of May, 1873; and they are then prepared to carry on the contract. *Secondly*, they ask for \$2,600, in addition to the amounts they have already received, and they will acquit the Committee of all further obligations to them. These propositions were only laid before the Committee at the last meeting, on the 2nd of December, and a sub-Committee was appointed to obtain legal advice on the subject and report to the Committee. The Committee are still hopeful that they may be able to have the building furnished almost at the time fixed upon in the several contracts.

THE LIBRARY.

A considerable addition was made to it during the year; and it is with extreme regret that we again refer to the evident want of care, and, indeed, reckless destruction of many valuable books on the part of the scholars. This is a matter which must immediately engage the earnest attention of the teachers.

A new and pleasing feature in connection with the work of the school has been the introduction of a systematic examination of the pupils in the shorter catechism.
