





British M. P. Thinks Georgian

Bay Canal Will Be Built-Will Benefit Toronto Because it Will Aid Canada's Pros-

(Toronto News.)

R. W. Perks, M. P., of London, Eng., is at present in town, and is still deeply interested in the project of the Georgian Bay Canal via the French River and the Ottawa Valley. He is of the opinion that the prospects for the carrying out of the projects are very bright, and in order to ascertain the proper depth necessary for such a canal Mr. Perks visited Fort William, Port Arthur, Duluth and Chicago to interview the principal shippers and steambhip interests with regard to both freight and passenger traffic. The depth will probably be 22 feet.

"The building of the canal would undoubtedly benefit Toronto," said Mr. Perks. "This city, in my opinion, is now, and will be in the future, the financial centre of the Dominion, and although its shipping does not equal that of Montreal, owing to its not being a sesport, ttill anything which tends to the prosperity of the Dominion will help Toronto as Canada's banking centre. Even if some of its trade were diverted, it would still gain in many indirect ways.

"In England we have several times had a similar instance of one city being afraid that the building of a canal would divert its trade, notably in the case of the Manchester Nould stell as it was feared that Manchester would steal as a watter of fact the reverse has been the case, and it has benefited both places.





THE TREATY WITH JAPAN

"The subjects of each of the two high contracting parties shall have full liberty to enter, travel, or reside in any part of the dominions or possessions of the other contracting party, and shall enjoy full and perfect protection for their persons and property."

Previous to the ratification by Canada of the Anglo-Japanese Treaty of 1890, the arrangement between this country and Japan was that the Mikado's government would allow only four Japanese from each province of the kingdom to emigrate to the Dominion in any one year. 


