ANNUAL MEETING.

THE Twentieth Annual Meeting of the Society met in St. Paul's church, Peterborough, on the afternoon of Tuesday, April 21st, and remained in session during the 22nd and 23rd. The church was prettily decorated with flowers, and everything possible was done for the comfort of the delegates, of whom about 300 had assembled from the various branches. The President, Mrs. Ewart, presided at all the sessions. During the first hour on Tuesday a devotional meeting was held, when a helpful address was given by Mrs. Thorburn, Ottawa, the President being assisted by Mrs. Macauley, Mrs. McMurrich, Mrs. Sinclair and several other ladies who voluntarily led in short and earnest prayers. A devotional meeting was also held on Thursday morning, presided over by Mrs. Dennistoun, Peterborough, in which Mrs. Sinclair, Miss Sinclair and others took part.

On Wednesday afternoon the Society enjoyed the pleasure of listening for an hour to an address from Miss Sinclair, our missionary from Indore at present home on furlough. Her words were an inspiration to all present, and we feel left an impression that in many cases will never be forgotten.

On Thursday morning a practical paper on Mission Bands; organization, preparation for meetings, and the manner of conducting them was ably given by Mrs. MacNachtan, Cobourg, also a paper on Missionary Literature by Mrs. Steele, Dundas. Both were excellent, giving much valuable information and suggestions. A discussion followed, in which a number of those present took part. The Question Drawer was in charge of Mrs. Watt, Guelph, and the closing words of the meeting were given by Mrs. R. Grant, Toronto.

Conference.

On Tuesday evening the Board, comprising the thirty-six managers, and presidents of Presbyterials, Auxiliaries and Mission Bands, with Presbyterian secretaries and treasurers (or their substitutes) met in conference over a number of important matters to

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be brought before the General Society. The proposed change in the work of the Foreign and Supply Secretaries; a Mission Band Secretary; matter for the *Letter Leaflet*; banking the money, with other matters were considered and discussed.

Greetings.

A telegram of greeting (Phil. iv., 19) from Winnipeg Presbyterian was presented by Mrs. Grant, who also read greetings from Brandon Presbyterian; the Women's Foreign Missionary Society, Presbyterian Church in Canada (E. D.); the Montreal Woman's Missionary Society; the Congregational Woman's Board of Missions; the Woman's Auxiliary to the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada; the Woman's Presbyterian Foreign Missionary Society, Northern New York; the Woman's Presbyterian Board of Missions of the North-West; the Woman's Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions of the South-West; the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian Church, Fifth Avenue, New York; The Queensland Presbyterian Woman's Missionary Union; and the Woman's Occidental Board, San Francisco, and from the Woman's Missionary Society, Dunedin, Otago, New Zealand.

Mrs. Hunter of the Baptist Church and Mrs. Ross, representing the McAll Mission, expressed the pleasure it gave them to be present, and spoke words of hearty interest in the Society.

Reception and Tea.

The delegates with their hostesses and friends were most pleasantly entertained at tea on Wednesday afternoon in the school-room of the church, when all enjoyed thoroughly the hour of social intercourse.

Public Meeting.

The public meeting on Wednesday evening was also held in St. Paul's church. Mr. Hamilton Cassels, Convener of General Assembly's Foreign Mission Committee, presided. The gathering was a large one, the spacious church being well filled. The Rev. Dr. Torrance extended a hearty welcome to delegates and friends. A report of the work of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society was presented by the Rev. R. P. Mackay, and the Rev. Dr. Wherry, Chicago, for many years a missionary in India, gave a most interesting address.

Kingston Resolution.

The resolution from Kingston, in a changed form, was brought up by Mrs. Mowat, and after discussion was put to the meeting, and lost, the vote being unanimous that no change should be made.

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Presbyterial Reports.

The action of the Board in arranging to have the Presbyterial Reports submitted on Tuesday afternoon was approved, and it was on motion resolved that in future they be read at that time.

Extension of the Work.

The support of the Society was assured, and permission given the Board to accede to the request of the Foreign Mission Committee if they desire to extend the work.

Work of Secretaries.

Authority was also given to the Board to rearrange the work of the Foreign and Supply Secretaries.

Training Home.

The following resolution of the Executive of the Foreign Mission Committee in reference to a training school for missionaries was read :—

1. That the Executive feels the great importance of a careful training in Biblical and theological knowledge for all the young women who are sent to foreign fields. 2. That the Executive does not see its way at present to recommend the establishment of such a school under the care of the Committee. 3. That the Toronto Bible Training School, which is non-denominational in its management to some extent covers the ground, and appears to be doing excellent work, and the Executive think that while the Committee should not commit themselves to any definite responsibility for an institution which is in no way under the control of the Church, they might in the meantime avail themselves of its services for the training of young women who are looking forward to the foreign work of our Church, provided arrangements were made to supplement the training given by courses of lectures in Knox College or by courses of lectures given by the professors and others. 4. That a Sub-Committee be appointed to confer with the Professors of Knox College with a view of making suitable arrangements for such lectures.

Resolution of Regret.

The following resolution of regret at the retirement, after long continued service, of Mrs. Harvie, the Foreign Secretary was unanimously passed with a standing vote.

To the Board of W. F. M. S.

In view of the enforced resignation of our beloved Foreign Secretary which comes to us at the close of our second decade, we desire to express our deep sense of the grave loss we sustain in the removal of one whose duties were performed with consummate skill and efficiency, and our abiding appreciation of the services which have been so unsparingly rendered to the cause of Woman's Work for Women during the past existence of our Society. Her name is a loved household word in hundreds of homes throughout our land, and her firm stand for loyalty to our constitution may well remain with us a fragrant memory which shall strengthen our own devotion to the cause we love so well. So we who learn with deep sorrow, be it said, of this separation desire to witness for the many in our own land who have learned to love and honor her, for the Indians of our North-West, whose admiration and confidence she won; for our representatives in the foreign field whose hands have been strengthened by her unfailing sympathy and goodwill, ever tenderly accorded; and for the dear departed who cherished her kind words among the last received from the homeland before exchanging the cross for the crown, and at the same time we desire to note something of our own gratitude for all that the Holy Spirit has enabled her to do for us. Words are but a poor medium to convey our feelings, under such circumstances, and we yield ourselves to silence which is the truest, holiest expression of the full heart, breathing the prayer, "God bless her, and keep her, and make His face to shine upon her in all the time to come."

Notice of Motion.

From Toronto Presbyterial, presented by Mrs. Mutch, "Any member or Auxiliary of this Society desiring to bring up matters for discussion at the Annual Meeting is requested to present the same at the annual meeting of the Presbyterial Society for transmission with or without approval. Notice to be given to the Board of Management in writing one month before the time of meeting of the General Society—or, when such notice is not given, the matter will be referred to a committee named at the time."

Proposed Amendment.

From Mrs. Campbell, "Any member or Auxiliary of this Society desiring to bring up matters for discussion at the Annual Meeting is requested, first, to present the same in writing to the Executive Committee of their Presbyterial Society at least one month before its annual meeting, in order that the Executive

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Committee may have time to consult the Board of Management, if necessary, and after their annual meeting transmit the same with or without approval to the Board of Management, in writing, one month before the time of the Annual Meeting of the General Society; or, when such notice is not given, the matter will be referred to a committee named at the time."

Allocation of the Money.

1st. Moved by Mrs. MacLennan, Toronto, seconded by Mrs. Macdonald, St. Thomas, and agreed to: "That the sum of \$21,035.48, being the amount of estimate for the year 1895-96 of \$43,179, less \$22,143.52 already paid to the Foreign Mission Committee, be paid to them now."

2nd. Moved by Mrs. Thorburn, Ottawa; seconded by Mrs. Mowat, Kingston, and agreed to: "That \$1,200.00 be transmitted through Dr. Warden to the Foreign Mission Committee (E. D.) half of it to be applied by them to Woman's Work in Trinidad, and the other half of it to Woman's Work in the New Hebrides."

3rd. Moved by MacNachtan, Cobourg, seconded by Mrs. Steele, Dundas, and agreed to: "That the Treasurer of the W. F. M. S. be empowered to pay to the Foreign Mission Committee, early in May, the further sum of \$19,500.00 to be applied by them towards the expenses of the W. F. M. S. for the current year."

Next Place of Meeting.

A most cordial invitation to hold the next Annual Meeting in Hamilton was extended and unaminously accepted.

Votes of Thanks.

Hearty votes of thanks were passed to the friends in Peterborough for their kindness and hospitality; to the organist and choir, to the trustees and managers of St. Paul's church; to the Rev. Dr. Warden for auditing the treasurer's books; and to the railway companies for reduced fares.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

DEAR FRIENDS AND CO-WORKERS:—Once more through the gracious and loving care of our Heavenly Father I am privileged to preside at the annual meeting of our "Woman's Foreign Missionary Society." And it is no small joy to me look into the faces of so many earnest Christian women, and to bid you a very hearty welcome. We have tested the kindness and hospitality of our Peterboro' friends in past years, and know that they will meet us in the most friendly and affectionate manner; and that everything will be done for our comfort and enjoyment.

Looking back over the past year, surely dear friends we must realize how very gracious our Lord has been to us, and how mindful of the work He has given us, and still gives us to do for Him. This calls for our most fervent gratitude. And though He has, from among the members of our Society, called many greatly prized and loved ones, He has also called others to fill their places; and still blesses the efforts put forth to enlarge and extend the sphere of our missionary work, giving health and strength, vigor of mind and earnestness of purpose to each and all, so that that for which we were organized twenty years ago may be carried on successfully, till the kingdoms of this world have become the kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ.

From reports received from the various branches it is evident that interest in this work for our Master is not waning but growing, and proof of this is found, in the fact that, in a time of great business depression much liberality and self-denial has been exercised by the members of our Society, they realizing that the essence of Christianity is loving obedience to our Lord's commands, and faithfulness in all that He has given us to do. It is said any organization shows it possesses the life-force necessary to its continuance, when it can perpetuate itself by producing others of its kind, and can lay hold of its dead or uninterested surroundings and impart to them some of its own living force. Testing our Woman's Foreign Missionary Society by these results we may surely say we are decidedly alive. But being so, are we doing as much as we might? While I dare not answer yes I am rejoiced to know that our Society has been able to meet all the demands of the Foreign Mission Committee on its funds, and we are not suffering as our sister societies in the States from large deficits which, in several cases, have obliged them to close mission schools and send back to heathen homes children who were eager to learn. Sending to their Board a picture of a large number of boys and girls in a school, a lady mis-

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sionary asks, "Do you see how bright, eager and intelligent many of them are? But a great sorrow must come to them; for a sad, sad puzzle stands before their teachers. Some of these boys and girls must be sent back to their wretched heathen homes, which of them are we to sacrifice?" And this necessity all because there is not money enough in the treasury to care for all, and yet some of them long for better things, long for the new life and blessing of the Word which was never given to their parents. How sad we would feel to have such a letter sent to us. Do you not think a heavy responsibility attaches to the Church and individuals who suffer such to be the state in their missions? Dear friends let not such a condition be ours. Hitherto we have by God's blessing been able to meet all our indebtedness, but that we will continue to do so, will require increased self-denial and devoted prayerful hearts, more especially as extension of our work in India, China and the North-West is being called for. Our motto, "*The world for Christ*" calls us to go forward, we must not go back. As individuals let us test ourselves. If we have in ourselves the love of Christ it will thoroughly take possession of all our activities and powers, and our property be it little or much. No Christian, says one, can keep an unconverted purse or bank-book. There are no two classes of missionaries, one who has been sent by the Lord and one has not. All Christians are sent by God to win souls to Christ. "Ye are my witnesses" said Christ. Every Christian is under obligation to be a missionary, either to go or to see that some one is at work as his or her representative. Let us keep this thought, for the coming year, constantly before us and prove ourselves to be Christians alive indeed, with hearts full of love to Christ and to those for whom He died. The advance made in our mission fields of India, China and the North-West is very encouraging, and calls for our heart-felt thanksgiving, and should serve as an incentive to further earnest prayerful effort. There are, according to the latest statistics, 186,000 members in our Presbyterian church, say about half are women. How comparatively few of these take any interest in this part of the Lord's vineyard, or do anything to advance the cause of missions either at home or abroad. Being a living society, these are surroundings, you should lay hold of and stimulate into life and usefulness.

I must now ask your indulgence while I draw your attention to some matters of business. This afternoon, as "business, from last year," there will be presented to you for your approval or disapproval a motion, "re salaries of married missionaries" coming from St. Andrew's Auxiliary, Kingston. I earnestly ask you to give it your prayerful consideration, so that this matter, which has been the cause of considerable trouble, misunderstanding and discussion, in former years, may be settled once for all. In connection with

the presentation of this motion to the Kingston Presbyterian Annual Meeting we were told of certain statements being made which, if not refuted, would tend to injure our Society very seriously. The Board has consequently issued replies in printed leaflet form which will be distributed along with the Secretaries' Annual Reports. We ask you to give these explanations a most careful consideration. The Board, in fulfilling to the best of its ability, the heavy responsibility put upon it of carrying on the work of this Society from year to year has nothing to conceal, and will gladly answer any questions as to why or wherefore such things were done, to which some may have objected.

There is also a notice of motion to be brought up on Thursday afternoon as, "New Business" from the Toronto Presbyterian Society, dealing with the presentation of motions for discussion at the Annual Meeting. The idea being that all such motions, whether emanating from individuals, Auxiliary or Mission Band, be sent first to the Presbyterian Society, to be sent on by it to the Board of Management for transmission to the Annual Meeting. There will be also an amendment to it, presented, occasioned by more light being subsequently thrown on the matter, suggestions made, and the feeling in some minds that the motion as it stood was incomplete. These being only notices of motion will not be decided till next Annual Meeting, and will be printed in the *Leaflet*, giving a whole year for studying them. If the amendment finds favor with the Presbyterian Societies further steps might be taken to have it accepted as a by-law of the Presbyterian constitution. This is a matter for the Branches to consider very carefully. You will notice that *the motion* is to amend note one of the by-laws. There will, of course, be no change in the usual way of proceeding with motions this year.

I have purposely made my address to you short, for the secretaries have a large amount of encouraging matter to lay before you, and I did not want to weary you. But before sitting down let me very warmly thank both you who are present and others who are absent, for the many kind expressions of affectionate regard I have received during the fifteen years you have honored me with your confidence as President of our much loved and prosperous Society. You all know something of what it has been to us, the women of our Church, in stimulating us to lead holier lives, and enabling us to realize that only as we follow in the footsteps of our loving Saviour, striving humbly but earnestly to obey His last command can we attain to real and abiding happiness. So let us strive with ever-increasing faith in Him to whom "All power in heaven and earth is given, and who has promised to be with us always."

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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

YOUR Board would respectfully submit the Twentieth Annual Report of the Board of Management of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, and in doing so can, as in other years, report a very faithful attendance of the members at the weekly meetings held regularly throughout the year, with the exception of the summer months of June, July and August, when only a monthly meeting was held. The average attendance at each of the forty-two Board meetings was, of the Managers twenty-five, and of the whole Board thirty two, and at the thirteen Executive meetings, twelve, thus showing a deep interest in the work, and a realizing sense of the responsibility that has been entrusted to them by the Society. Owing to illness Mrs. Adams was unable to attend during the latter part of the year, and Mrs. Grant was appointed to act as corresponding member in her place.

During the year some correspondence has been carried on regarding the notices of motion from St. Andrew's Church Auxiliary, Kingston, and St. John's Auxiliary, Brockville. The latter has been withdrawn by special request of the Auxiliary, but the former will be brought up for your consideration at this meeting.

The Hamilton Presbyterian Society, have, with the sanction of the Board, withdrawn their former suggestion "That the Presbyterian Reports be taken as read at the Annual Meeting of the General Society," and have substituted for it the following: "That the Devotional meeting of Tuesday, preceding the business sessions of the Annual Meeting commence at 2.30 p.m., instead of Three o'clock, and that the Presbyterian Reports be read on that afternoon; thus leaving more time for the discussion of the various topics to be brought before the Society." Your Board asked for an expression of opinion from the different Presbyterials, so, that if favorably considered, the suggestion could be acted upon at this meeting. As the approval was very general, it was decided that this year the reports be read on Tuesday. If not meeting with the sanction of the Society, other arrangements can be made for the future.

Your Board have found much of their time occupied with the now voluminous correspondence conducted with the Missionaries at the various foreign fields, and though the enlargement of the Letter Leaflet has been carried out as agreed upon a year ago, the increased space has been taken up to a great extent with these letters.

Owing to the tabulated statements and re-arrangement of matter reducing the size of the Annual Report, the Board is glad to announce a very considerable reduction in the cost of printing the same, which is satisfactory, as the price has hitherto increased from year to year.

No further action has been taken in regard to the establishment of a Training Home.

In response to an invitation from Mrs. Mathews on behalf of the meeting in June of the Pan-Presbyterian Council, two members of the Board intending to visit Glasgow, were appointed to act as delegates and convey our greetings to the International Union Missionary Meeting of Women. In addition to these several other ladies from branches outside of Toronto also going, will as delegates represent our Society and one of whom will bring back a report of the meeting.

As we are now connected with the Pan-Presbyterian Council it was considered advisable that as a society we withdraw from connection with the "World's Committee of Christian Women."

An invitation to send a delegate to the annual meeting of the "National Council of Women" was extended to us, but declined, as we are not affiliated with the Council and have not heretofore sent delegates to any but Missionary Societies.

In consideration of the health of our returned Missionaries, it was felt by the Board that the year of furlough should be to a great extent, a time of rest. To avoid overtaxing their strength by too numerous addresses, also to prevent loss of time and unnecessary expenditure of money, it was unanimously agreed that the Foreign Secretary receive all invitations for visits and addresses from Miss Sinclair, and facilitate any plan for a series of meetings which might be arranged.

In the early part of October, the Board had the privilege of receiving and saying farewell to Mrs. Goforth and Miss McIntosh who were returning to their field of labor in China. The other outgoing Missionaries, Dr. Dow, the Misses Ptolemy and Chase, were also present at different times, and received words of kindly counsel and encouragement. At many of our weekly meetings it has been a pleasure to welcome friends and fellow workers from many of our branches.

The annual meeting for Special Prayer for Foreign Missions, was arranged and held on Thursday January 9th, the day set apart for that purpose by the Evangelical Alliance. The gathering was a large one and we feel was a season of blessing to all who attended, and will aid in quickening an interest in mission work in many hearts. The programme for the meeting was printed in the Letter Leaflet in the hope that it would be of use to Societies holding a similar service.

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We have been called upon to mourn the loss of a tried and faithful friend in the removal by death of the late Rev. Dr. Reid, who from the first organization of our Society had been ever our ready adviser and counsellor. A resolution expressing our sense of loss, and sympathy with the bereaved family, was placed in the minute book.

And now in closing our report, we desire as a Board, unitedly to record our sense of the loving kindness and continued mercy of our Heavenly Father in sparing our lives this past year and permitting us in caring for the business affairs of our Society to contribute something towards the advancement of His cause and kingdom in the world, and in entering on the coming year we feel that we have abundant reason to thank God for the past and take courage for the future.

FOREIGN SECRETARY'S REPORT.

"Then Samuel took a stone, and set it up, between Mizpeh and Shen, and called the name of the place Ebenezer, (the stone of help), saying, Hitherto hath the Lord helped us." *1. Sam. 7: 12.*

"Thy God hath commanded thy strength; strengthen O God, that, which Thou hast wrought for us." *Ps. 68: 28.*

IN reporting the Foreign work of our Society, the progress, as noted, between one year, and that immediately preceding it, is often scarcely perceptible. Possibly a new station opened, an additional missionary sent forth, or a new building erected, and sometimes, not even these hopeful results of a year of faithful labor and earnest prayer can be chronicled. But, in taking a wider view, at this important epoch in our history, and contrasting the work of the *twentieth* year with that of the *first*, the *advancement* of the intervening years will be a matter of deep amazement and grateful thanksgiving to every worker in the Society.

Twenty years ago, at our first Annual Meeting, the Society decided to pay the salary of one lady missionary in India, and to assist in the support of a second. We were unable to aid the Foreign Mission Committee, by assuming the responsibility of work among *women and children, in any other Field.*

To-day, at our twentieth Anniversary, the Society is supporting sixteen lady missionaries, of whom five are medical missionaries in Central India, and the Woman's Hospital, the Girls' Boarding School, and other buildings, stand as monuments, of our labor of love, in this land.

At Tamsui, the Girls' Boarding School building, is a witness to our interest in the girls of North Formosa, and in this Field, also, the salaries of a number of native Bible women, who labor in the homes of the people are contributed. Woman's work in Honan has opened up encouragingly, and the Society is responsible for one lady missionary, and has assisted in sending forth others.

In Western Canada and British Columbia, numerous buildings have been erected for educational work, and the Society contributes the salaries of all who are engaged in the training of the young, on the Indian Reserves.

This is but the merest outline of what has been done, and yet in looking at it we are filled with wonder, and can only say with humility, "It is the Lord's doing, and it is marvellous in our eyes."

The Mission Field of the Church in India covers a tract of 75,079 square miles, contains 70 native states, and a population of 10,139,570. The division of Central India, in which are found the Canadian Presbyterian Missions, is known as Malwa.

The most important States in Malwa are, Gwalior, Indore, Bhopal, Jaora, Rutlam, Dhar, Sailana, Seetamao, all of which are under British protection.

If we remember that, as yet, our Church has but two stations in Gwalior, two in Indore, one in Rutlam, and one in Dhar, we will have some conception of the magnitude of the Field still untouched. Besides the states already mentioned, four others in Southern Rajputana, viz.: Banswara, Dungarpur, Partabgarh, Jhalawar, have been left by the U.P. missionaries, laboring in Rajputana, to the Canadian Mission in Central India.

This year has been one of marked progress in our missions in India. Mr. and Mrs. Campbell, Mr. and Mrs. Jamieson and Miss Jamieson, have all returned to their labors, from furlough, in good health. The new missionaries sent out are Mr. and Mrs. Ledingham, Dr. Thompson, Miss Ptolemy and Miss Chase.

A new station was opened eight months ago, with very encouraging prospects, at Dhar; and the new Canadian Mission College, which has given Mr. Wilkie so much prayerful thought and hard labor, has been completed, and dedicated to the Christian education of young men. Earnest requests are coming to our missionaries for the establishment of new stations in heathen towns and cities; but the need is for consecrated women as physicians, teachers and native workers, to enter these open doors. The harvest truly is plenteous; but the laborers are few.

It will be understood that it is impossible, in the space at our disposal, to give the reports in full of our missionaries. The merest outline only, can be presented.

Indore.

Canadian Woman's Hospital.

Dr. Marion Oliver and Dr. Margaret McKellar have conjointly had charge of the hospital and dispensary work. They have enjoyed good health all the year, and like true yoke-fellows, they have carried on their united labors with happy and hearty co-operation. During the first six months Dr. Oliver had in charge the city dispensary, house to house visitation, Mohulla and night work; Dr. MacKellar, the hospital, in and out patients, and patient practice; while together they performed operations and consulted in grave cases. The latter half of the year this arrangement was reversed, so that, truly, they have shared all their labors, and all their experiences.

Hospital.—Patients admitted, 297, including 33 children under 10 years of age. These came from all parts of Malwa, and even from the "regions beyond." The register shows 39 from Ujjain district, 34 from Mhow district, 14 from Rutlam district, 10 from Jaora, 6 from Dewas, 3 from Mandesur, 2 from Sirdarpur, 1 from Dhar, and from outside Malwa 5, of these 26 were Christians, 116 Mahomedans, and 155 Hindoos. The Gospel service is held regularly, and daily opportunities for religious conversations with the patients are embraced. Four deaths are reported during the year; one, a friendless woman, died in the faith of the Lord Jesus. another, a Brahmin widow, gave her only child, a bright little boy, to our missionaries. He is now a happy inmate of the college home.

Dispensary Work.—The hospital dispensary, for out-patients, and the city dispensary, (the former without a break) have been open throughout the year. The morning services held are interesting and profitable to many.

House to House Visiting.—1,049 visits have been paid to 251 houses. In this way opportunities for speaking of Jesus, the great soul Healer, have been many.

Village Work.—In the cool season 26 villages were visited with considerable regularity. Services were always held, often in the deep shade of a banyan or pepal tree, sometimes at the side of a mud hut, and again in a field beside the busy workers. While absent on these tours 992 sick ones were treated, and the Gospel proclaimed to about 1,500 persons.

Sunday School Work.—Every Lord's Day in the year the class of Mang Christian women and in-patients has met. This class con-

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sists of young and old, mothers, grandmothers and children, many of them being either maimed, halt or blind. For the past five months the average attendance has been 30. One of the members has professed conversion and united with the Christian congregation.

Scripture Study.—On week day mornings all the workers, medical assistants, Bible women, etc., assemble in the hospital, with the lady doctors, for the study of the Scriptures and devotional exercises.

Workers.—Annabai Khan Singh, a graduate of the Agra School of Medicine, has been added to the staff, and is a great assistance, both in the medical and the religious work. Hettebai is still at her post, though far from strong; Gowbai acts as dispenser, and two Mang women assist in the general work of the household.

Receipts.—Sales of medicine, R341-11a-6p.; fees and donations from grateful patients, R845-0-0; total, R1186-11-6. Donation from a lady in Canada, R1252-1-6.

Summary.—Number of patients, 297; treatments, 22,457; out-patients, 8,744; major operations, 36; minor operations, 235.

Girl's Boarding School.

Miss White reports a year of steady advance and speaks of the prospects as cheering. Thirty-seven resident pupils have been enrolled through the year; two were married to native Christians, one of whom is now engaged in mission work with Miss Calder at Mhow. The Bible is studied daily. Miss White was encouraged by the report of the Government inspector, which was highly commendatory.

Sabbath School Work.—This service is conducted by Dr. Oliver and Miss Chase. Four of the young girls have united with the Church this year, which brings up the number to 10, in all, who are now in full communion in the Christian congregation.

Y.W.C.A. Work.—The branch of this organization established by Miss Sinclair, some eighteen months ago, has been very successful. Many ably take part in the meeting, and it has been a means of training the girls to help others. In their spare moments the members make lace, etc., and dispose of it to help the industrial home girls under the care of Mrs. Johory. The health of the school girls has been fairly good.

Receipts.—The amount received in the year, as fees, was R651-4-3.

Mang Women's Sewing Class.—Mrs. Wilkie still continues this interesting meeting, and as opportunity has offered, Miss White has assisted. Suitable religious instruction is given to the women. The morning class of English speaking lads, in the S.S., held in

the college, is still in the care of Miss White, who is hopeful that two or three of these boys are secret followers of Jesus.

Hindi and Marathi Girl's School.

Miss Grier reports her staff of workers as four in number in the Hindi School, viz.: two Christian teachers and two calling women. There are 50 names enrolled, the average attendance being from 40 to 50. The teachers are doing faithful work, and the improvement, specially in Scripture knowledge and the art of sewing, is very marked.

Marathi School.—Since December, last, Miss Grier has also had charge of this school. Names on the roll, 100; average attendance, 75.—On account of the many child marriages celebrated during the past three months, the daily attendance has fallen off. In this school there are two Christian teachers, two Hindoo women and three calling women.

Zenana Work.—In June, Miss Grier was able to engage a Bible woman, who visits in the homes and is very graciously received, particularly in the houses from which the Marathi children come. In two months 280 visits were paid to 70 families, and the Gospel explained to 446 women.

New Missionaries.

Though our new missionaries, Miss Ptolemy and Miss Chase, are very closely occupied with the study of the language, they find opportunity to assist in the class work of the College, or fill vacancies occurring through the absence of members of the staff. They are also engaged in Sunday school work on the Lord's Day.

Miss Sinclair.

This year we welcomed, with very great pleasure, our missionary, Miss J. V. Sinclair, who returned on furlough. Miss Sinclair is well in health, and was both able and willing to devote time and strength to the visitation of Auxiliaries, attendance at Presbyterial meetings, etc.; Miss Sinclair has been received with great delight wherever she has gone, and the results of her labors, in giving inspiration and encouragement to our branches, can never be estimated.

Mhow.

Medical Work.

With sincere sorrow, and deep sympathy, we learn that Dr. Minnie Grant Fraser is obliged to abandon her work at Mhow on account of broken down health, and is now on her way to England. Physicians agree in stating that this "break down" is the result of

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the small-pox, with which disease Miss Fraser was prostrated some months ago, and the strain of continuous labor on a weakened system. Miss Fraser is an unflagging and successful medical missionary, and she keenly feels this enforced retirement from duty before her time for furlough next December.

The medical work under her care has steadily advanced since it was established in 1892, and during the past months, though carried on in much weakness and suffering, is in excess of any previous year. Number of treatments reported, 16,893; visits, 517. On account of the want of a suitable Bible woman, village work has not been prosecuted as vigorously as formerly.

Sunday School Work.—This department has been more than usually successful, the boys and girls having been taught separately. By this arrangement a larger number of little girls are induced to attend, and they are more easily managed.

Dr. Fraser speaks gratefully of the very happy relationship existing between herself and Miss Ross, and of the special kindness and sympathy accorded her by the staff at Indore.

The Bazaar Girl's School.

Miss Ross writes that the average attendance at this school since 1st July, last, is 90. The work of the school was reported upon favorably by the Government inspector at his usual yearly visit.

The Kishnapura School has suffered through the lack of a suitable teacher, but fair progress has been made. Poverty, indifference, superstition and fear prevent the number from increasing rapidly, the average attendance was 18.

At Garibpoora (the village of the poor), in the Mhow cantonment, a new school has been established, also an opening for a new school at Barwaha, has offered, through the request of a little girl who had been in the Bazaar School at Mhow, and who was visiting friends in Barwaha, and the school is an established fact. Miss Ross has several weekly afternoon meetings for women, but the work is greatly crippled by the want of native Christian workers.

Zenana visitation has been engaged in, as opportunity afforded. Since July, Miss Ross has made 280 visits, and in ten months the Mhow Bible woman made 834 visits, and in five months the Barwaha Bible woman paid 327 visits. One of the native women is reported as growing in grace and studying with earnestness the word of God.

Woman's and Children's Work.

Miss Calder reports that, on the whole, she has had an encouraging year.

In the Pensionpoora school the children have improved in conduct, and are steadily advancing in their knowledge of the Scrip-

tures. The women attend regularly the afternoon meetings and seem more interested. The work is hindered by the lack of a suitable school building, owing to the difficulty of securing land in the Mhow Cantonment.

The open air meetings held at Old Mhow and Kakapoorra villages are very encouraging, and visits in the homes are heartily welcomed. There is also a marked improvement visible in the children, in these village schools, who now behave well, and sing a number of hymns very sweetly.

A new school has been opened at Naka, which is doing nicely, with an average attendance of 50. Meetings are held in other villages when ever practicable, and many invitations are received which cannot be responded to by our missionaries.

Neemuch.

Medical Work.

The following passage from Dr. Agnes Turnbull's report reveals, to some extent, the dangers to which our missionaries are constantly exposed. "The cholera was a perfect scourge here during the rains, but though numbers were dying daily, both in the native city and British camp, and we were constantly exposed to danger, no harm came to us; small-pox has been most prevalent, but so far we have been mercifully preserved."

The two dispensaries, one in the city, the other in the camp, have been kept open daily through the year, and the house to house visitation connected with both continued. At each of these dispensaries daily services are held by trained Bible women. In connection with the city dispensary two small rooms are used as wards for in-patients, of whom there have been several from distant villages. Caste is a great hindrance, as medicine must be dispensed at the door, and the service held there for the lowest or sweeper caste.

With the approval of the council, Dr. Turnbull opened a dispensary in Jawad, a large town 12 miles from Neemuch, placing Mrs. James, her medical assistant, in charge. Dr. Turnbull spends a day here weekly, and already, in the short space of two months, over 400 new patients have been treated. The average daily attendance is 40.

Village Work.—All the large villages within a radius of 12 miles have been visited in company with Miss Duncan and a Bible woman. A service is always held in some quiet spot, often under the shade of a tree, and these simple village folk listen with eagerness to the story of the Gospel. More workers are sorely needed.

Statistical Report.—Dispensary patients, 3,000; dispensary treatments, 10,600; patients treated in their homes, 115; house treatments, 678; fees, R258-0-0; donations, R29-0-0; sale of medicines, R58-12-6; other sources, R7-5-6; total, R353-2-0.

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Camp and City Schools.

Miss Duncan writes that there are many interruptions to the school work, such as the early marriages of the little girls, holidays, epidemics of cholera, small-pox, etc.

The Camp schools are 3 in number, 1 of which has been under the supervision of Miss Campbell since the November Council meeting. During the year Miss Duncan has opened the other two Camp schools, 1 in the heart of the Camp Bazaar amongst the low caste Hindus, the other in a locality where very little mission work had ever been done.

City Schools.—The Chamar school building was completed and opened on October 1st, and the work since has been carried on with comfort and success. One of the city schools had to be closed on account of the cholera scourge and the building disinfected. In December last Miss Duncan opened a very promising school in the town of Jawad, with Caroline, a native worker in charge.

Zenana visiting.—In the Camp Bazaar some 40 families are visited regularly, a native Bible woman and an aged Eurasian lady assisting, over 1,600 visits have been paid. In the native city Miss Duncan and a Bible woman have made over 2,000 visits to homes.

Village Work.—On account of interruptions to the work in the camp and city considerable attention was given to this department, and in all 30 of the larger villages were visited and the Gospel story told.

Miss Campbell's Work.

This year, Miss Campbell writes, has been to her a year of study and observation, nevertheless from her report we find, that she has been able to render good service to the cause of missions. In June she was called to educate the daughter of a Mohammedan High Priest, and her young pupil has advanced rapidly not only in secular but in Christian knowledge. The Camp school has prospered under her care, the marriages of the little girls at 7 and 8 years of age, is however, a great obstacle to progress. One bright little Christian girl in this school, of 8 years of age, is reading the third book in Urdu and has made some progress in English.

Miss Campbell says she "cannot report any conversions, but the attendance, especially on the Sabbath, the interest in the Bible lessons, the evident joy with which the hymns are sung, and the choice of hymns, all point to the springing blade that one day we hope may be the fruitful harvest."

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School and Zenana Work.

On her return from Canada last November, Miss Jamieson was appointed to the old sacred city of Ujjain. Her first work was to secure a larger building for the two girls schools which were in operation. The attendance increased and the progress made was satisfactory. Recently the marriages of the girls, holidays, etc., have been hindrances. Two of the pupils are interesting boys about 10 years of age, both totally blind, and both having the ability to memorize long passages of Scripture in a short space of time. The older girls are unusually earnest in applying the lessons taught from the Bible, to their conduct in their daily life, so much so, that the parents have complained that they were being made Christians. The Bible women visit the homes of the children in the various Mohullas.

Zenana Work.—Only two invitations as yet have been received by Miss Jamieson to visit in Zenanas, but the time for this work has been fully occupied in the Mohullas.

Sabbath School has been held regularly with a good average attendance of the day scholars. A Bible class for Christian women is held on Saturday afternoon, Mrs. Jamieson taking charge of the Christian children at the same time. These classes have been a source of much profit to both teachers and taught.

Dhar.

Medical Work.

The opening up of the work at Dhar, Dr. Margaret O'Hara writes:—"has been wonderfully blessed, and we cannot but exclaim 'what hath God wrought.' The granting of the Dak Bungalow as a temporary residence by the Government of India; the kindness of the Political Agent in giving his hearty sanction to our request for land, the promptness with which His Highness the Maharajah gave us the sites on which to build two Bungalows and a Woman's Hospital, and the practical response of the W. F. M. S. which enabled us to begin the erection of the ladies' bungalow,—all show that this was God's own time for establishing a mission centre in Dhar."

The medical work as will be seen by the following statistics has opened up encouragingly. It is accompanied by Zenana work in which two Bible women are employed, each of them being able to speak Hindi and Marathi, one takes charge of the Gospel service at the dispensary, the other visits the homes. In connection with the medical work 133 houses were visited; 385 visits made; number of treatments in dispensary 9,377; number of patients 4,361

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villages visited 10 ; visits paid 23 ; patients treated in villages 499
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Number of houses visited in the Zenana work 23 ; visits paid
262 ; persons present 2,895 ; persons at services in villages 1,539.
This is the record of 8 months.

Miss O'Hara says, "the medical, the zenana, and the village
work is interesting, but perhaps the most hopeful is that done in
the Sabbath School." An average of about 100 low-caste children
who cannot read, and who know little but evil learned on the
streets, gather every Sunday, sing our sweet hymns and recite with
evident pleasure the Golden Text for the day. The first hour of
every day is spent in the study of the Scripture, the Shorter Cate-
chism and other religious books. Medical assistants and Bible
women are all required to be present. Miss O'Hara speaks with
deep gratitude of the kind sympathy and practical co-operation of
Mr. and Mrs. Russell in her own and Miss Dougan's work.

School Work.

The training of the children under the supervision of Miss
Dougan, who was appointed to Dhar at the November meeting of
Council, is a most hopeful department of service. Miss Dougan
reached Dhar at Christmas, and immediately opened a school for
Marathi speaking girls in a room over the dispensary. An attend-
ance of 14 soon increased to 25, with a number of wild little
Mussalman children who came irregularly. Miss Dougan is assisted
by Dhoudabai, the medical Bible woman. On account of the
small-pox the school was closed in February.

During the earlier part of the year, after her recovery in some
measure from the small-pox, Miss Dougan had charge of the Mar-
athi girls school at Indore. The work of the Christian teachers in
this school is noted as very faithful and successful. Zenana work
to some extent was undertaken especially in connection with the
school.

For this field, the Foreign Mission Committee asks our Society

Bible women employed at the various stations. We are thankful
to know that the agitation, the result of the Eastern war, and the

formal handing over of the island of Formosa to the Japanese Government, have not materially interfered with Rev. Dr. Mackay's work.

This year is marked by the return of Mr. and Mrs. Goforth, Dr. and Mrs. McClure, and Miss McIntosh from furlough to their labors in Honan; and the sending forth of two ordained missionaries, Rev. Dr. J. Menzies and Rev. R. A. Mitchell, also Miss J. Dow, a medical lady, who will be supported in the Field by the Montreal Woman's Missionary Society.

Three stations are now occupied by our missionaries in Honan, namely: Chu Wang, Hsin Chen and Chang Te Fu, the latter being by far the most important of the three. This city is situated north of the Yellow river, and is the most northerly of the three *fu* cities of Honan. It is on the direct line between Peking and Hankow, and is the centre officially and commercially of seven cities of *hsien* rank. It is famous for its trade, its prosperity, and the excellence of its buildings.

The tidings from all these stations are encouraging. Mr. Goforth speaks of an outpouring of the Holy Spirit at Chang Te, evidenced by the great desire of the people to hear the preaching of the truth, and from all the stations we learn of hundreds of inquirers seeking to be taught the "Jesus doctrine," as they term the Gospel. 27 men are now being trained in classes at Chu Wang.

Mission work among women and children is opening up in a wonderful way, Mrs. Goforth and Miss McKenzie speak of receiving thousands of heathen women, to many of whom Mrs. Goforth has spoken of Jesus, since they settled in Chang Te last November. Miss McIntosh writes of visiting a village in the vicinity of Chu Wang, where there were several Christians as well as sincere inquirers after the truth. The women who were anxious to learn more about the Gospel were invited to Chu Wang to remain for some time and receive instruction.

An appeal comes to our Society, from the Presbytery in Honan, asking us to send out, before the close of this year, a second medical lady and a teacher for children's work.

Mistawasis.—Mr. Moore writes, he finds the work here, interesting and encouraging, many of the heads of families are Christians. The Sunday services one in English, the other in Cree are well attended. There is a Wednesday evening Prayer meeting or Bible class, and a good Sunday School. At the examination at Christmas, several of the children recited perfectly, the Golden Texts, for the entire year. The venerable Chief Mistawasis, always a staunch supporter of the Mission, has been called to his reward during the year, also, more recently, Mrs. Dreever a devoted worker. The mission will keenly feel the loss of these faithful helpers.

Miss McIntosh, reports, Jan. 1st, the number of names on the day school roll as 21, average attendance 12. The religious exercises

are singing, reading a portion of Scripture daily, memorizing Bible texts, and the repeating of the Lord's Prayer. The industries taught are knitting and lace making.

Makoce Waste Reserve.—This is the name of the new reserve, upon which the band of wandering Sioux, dwelling in the vicinity of Prince Albert, has recently been settled. The Government has put up a school building, and our Society, with some assistance from the Indians has, this year, erected a comfortable dwelling house for Miss Baker and Miss Cameron, who continue to take charge of the day school, established some years ago, and visit in the homes of the people.

Number of names on the roll 9, average attendance 7. The attendance is smaller than usual, owing to the fact, that, several families moved in for the winter nearer Prince Albert, in order to secure employment. Regular Bible teaching is given in the school, and there is a good Sunday School, which some of the mothers attend. The industries taught are sewing, dress-making, knitting, crocheting, etc. Our missionaries are very much isolated, as the reserve is 9 miles from Prince Albert. We are very glad to report that Miss Baker is in better health.

Regina.—The Government Industrial School here, continues, steadily to advance, number of pupils on the roll is 142, average attendance 120. What is called the half-day system is in use here, that is, pupils who are learning industries, attend school half the day, and are occupied in the industrial departments the other half. The hearts of Mr. McLeod and the staff have been discouraged, especially this winter, by the sickness of pupils and the loss through death of several of the young people. Writing of these trials, Mr. McLeod says, "No report can show the *weariness and anxiety*, sickness causes in an Indian school." The daily religious exercises, besides family devotions, evening and morning, are, forty minutes study of the Bible, a new memory verse each day, and the study of the Shorter Catechism. The most important industrial work done is farming, shoemaking, harness making, baking and carpentering by the boys, with cooking, nursing, sewing, tailoring and laundry work by the girls. Interesting religious meetings with literary and educational talks, are held on week evenings, all of which, are thoroughly enjoyed by the young people. Last quarter 6,893 verses of Scripture were memorized, and one boy has undertaken to commit to memory the whole of the Gospel of St. Matthew.

Hurricane Hills Mission.—About 18 miles south-east of Indian Head is a large reserve, upon which is settled a band of the Assinaboine Indians. Some years ago the Foreign Mission Committee opened a school for the benefit of these Indians, but it was thought advisable after a time to close it. The Indians on this reserve number about 200 and are Pagans. In habits, customs

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and language, the Assinaboines resemble the Sioux. Mr. Neil Gilmour, formerly Principal of the Birtle school, has been appointed to this mission, and has already entered upon his work.

Lakesend.—The reserves here are Pasquah's, Muscowpetung's and Piapot's. Rev. Geo. Arthur, the missionary in charge, reports the attendance at the Sabbath services as slightly on the increase. The Boarding school here has been re-opened this year, with Miss McWilliams formerly missionary in Central India as teacher, and Mrs. Leckie, who has been engaged in the Indian work at Regina and Birtle, as matron. The number on the roll is 22, the average attendance is good and conduct very satisfactory. The pupils receive a daily Bible lesson, are taught to sing hymns, memorize Scripture and join in devotional exercises. The industries taught are knitting, plain sewing, sweeping, dusting, cooking and washing.

File Hills.—The children are reported as steadily improving, are more interested in school work and attend better to outside duties. Number of pupils on the roll 14, average attendance 14. This speaks well for the health, punctuality, order, etc., of the school life. Daily religious exercises are held and considerable time is given to the study of the Bible. The boys assist in caring for the stock, planting of vegetables, getting out wood, and attending to the dairy work; the girls take up the household duties, sewing, knitting, etc.

Round Lake.—These reserves are extensive, and the missionary Rev. Hugh McKay, has a number of preaching places. Many of the Indians are poor, but Mr. McKay reports less suffering this winter than formerly. There is still bitter opposition in many of the bands, to the Gospel, while others are gradually becoming more favorably inclined to its teachings. Number of children attending school is 26, one boy has been sent to the Regina Industrial School. An interesting Sunday School is held, also a meeting on Wednesday evening when the International lessons are studied. The principal industrial work engaged in is farming and house-work. Eight of the young people attending the school have been received into the Church upon confession of their faith. They sat down at the Lord's table at the Communion service held in the autumn at Mr. Gaddies. This is a source of strength and encouragement to the staff at Round Lake.

The Crowstand.—The names of 43 children are enrolled here, several who have never attended school previously, having been admitted through the year. The school is opened with religious exercises, and the children are expected to commit verses of Scripture to memory. Five children have been sent this year to Regina. The industries taught are farming, carpentry, mat-making, knitting, sewing, cooking, house and dairy work. Mrs. Lochart the capable instructress in sewing, etc., has been obliged to resign on account of ill-health.

Birtle.—The number on the roll is 41. Five have been sent to Regina during the year. The Government has increased the grant for maintenance from 25 to 40 children. One of the little girls after a tedious sickness gently fell asleep in Jesus, and 2 of the young people transferred to Regina were suddenly called to the Heavenly Home. It is a comfort to know that the hearts of these children were prepared by the Christian training and influence of the school for the Master's call. Religious teaching includes prayer and Bible study. The children attend the Birtle Sunday School. "The boys and girls are trained as well as possible like others in a well regulated family." Mr. W. J. Small has recently accepted the appointment of Principal in the place of Mr. Gilmour.

Lizard Point or Rosburn Reserve.—In the earlier years occasional visits were made to this reserve, which is about 20 miles from Birtle, by Mr. Flett. Last year Mr. Gilmour held frequent services with the Indians. These were encouraging, and this year Mr. John Black, an Indian, formerly interpreter for Mr. Wright at Rolling River, has been placed in charge of the mission work.

Bird Tail Reserve.—Mr. McArthur speaks and writes encouragingly of the work among the Indians here. Several marriages have been celebrated according to the Christian form, and a number have been baptized and united with the Church on confession of their faith. We sympathize with our sisters of the Indian Women's Auxiliary of the W. F. M. S., many of them having suffered through bereavement and sickness in their families during the past months.

Okanase.—We announce the retirement from the work on this reserve of the entire staff, viz., the veteran missionary, Rev. G. W. Flett, Miss M. S. McIntosh and Miss Jackson. Miss McIntosh and Miss Jackson, had gained a warm place in the affections of their pupils, and will be greatly missed in the work of instruction. Mr. R. C. McPherson has been appointed to take charge of both the evangelistic and educational departments of the mission. Number of pupils on the roll 20, average attendance $12\frac{1}{2}$. This is a day school and the attendance is affected by sickness and the weather very materially. The Indians come out well to the two Sunday services and to the Prayer meeting on Wednesday evening. Mrs. McPherson assists in the school and industrial work, which includes spinning and embroidery.

Rolling River.—There are marked evidences of improvement on this reserve. Quite a number come out regularly to the Sunday services. Several whose opposition was most bitter are now friendly. A few have made good progress in the study of the syllabic. A goodly number of new houses have been erected and new cooking stoves purchased, while good work at farming has

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been done. Five children have been sent to Regina school and five to Birtle within the past few weeks.

Portage la Prairie.—The principal event here was the opening of the new school residence erected by our Society, January 10th. About 40 children can be comfortably accommodated in this building, at the beginning of the year 33 were enrolled. Sickness has to some extent interfered with the work, but the teachers speak with gratitude of the facilities the new house affords, not only for the care of the sick but for the prosecution of the work in all its departments. The children attend public worship and Sunday School in the town. They study the Bible daily, both in the home and in the school, repeat texts of Scripture, and write essays or papers on Bible subjects. The boys provide wood and attend to all necessary outside work, the girls look after the house work, and assist with the sewing and knitting. They have a helpful Christian Endeavor Society in which the young people take part.

The services at the new church in the vicinity of the Teepees grow in interest, from 50 to 100 attend. Mr. Edward Brown continues to give his faithful and valuable aid in connection with this important service. There is an improvement in the appearance, the industry, the home life, and the conduct of the Indians, which is very gratifying.

The Pipestone.—Mr. Peter Hunter, the native missionary settled here, suddenly, after a few days' illness, on the 22nd May, 1895, departed this life. We cannot always understand Providences of this kind, but, we can comfort one another with the blessed assurance that the Lord, who hath us all in his tender keeping doeth all things well, and that what we know not now we shall know hereafter. The reserve, which was without a missionary for sometime, was under the care of Rev. W. Beattie of Virden. Recently Mr. John Thunder, an Indian, has been appointed missionary. He writes, that from 18 to 20 came out to the Sunday services, that he visits the homes regularly and has daily opportunities for religious conversations with the young people.

Notes.

The Woman's Foreign Missionary Society does not contribute to the salaries of ordained missionaries to the Indians in Manitoba and the North-West Territories; but the Society aids the educational work for boys and girls by the maintenance of non-treaty children attending the various schools, and paying the salaries of teachers, matrons, helpers, etc., and erecting school buildings.

The schools aided are 9 in number, 6 Boarding schools and 3 Day schools, namely, Portage la Prairie, Birtle, Crowstand, Round Lake, File Hills and Lakesend Boarding schools, and the Day schools at Mistawasis, Makoce Waste (Prince Albert) and Okanase.

Schools have not yet been opened at Hurricane Hills and the Pipestone ; but it is understood that special attention is to be given by the missionary to children's work.

Alberni.—The most important feature of the work here was the formal opening of the new school building erected by our Society last autumn. From a photo, recently sent by Miss Johnston, we notice that the children are bright and intelligent in appearance. The number in regular attendance is about 26. The Bible is taught in the school, and scripture texts committed to memory. When the Indians are at home, Sunday-school and Sunday services are held. During the year, Miss Minnes, who was much beloved by her Indian pupils, was obliged by circumstances to resign. Miss Armstrong, for several years engaged in the Indian work at Crowstand, has been appointed to the vacancy.

Uclulhat.—The day school under the care of the Indian missionary in B.C., Mr. M. Swartout, is succeeding well ; a new school house has been put up, and the Government grant for a day school secured. There are over 22 interesting children in attendance. The Indians are so scattered, and move about so frequently, that it is difficult to maintain regular services on the Lord's Day. In a letter written last September, Mr. Swartout reports the conversion of a promising young man. The people are inclining more to agricultural pursuits. Mrs. Swartout visits in the homes and cares for the sick.

Ahousaht.—In November, last, work was opened up at this new station, which is about thirty miles up the coast from Uclulhat, and Mr. Russell was sent to take charge of a school as soon as the arrangements could be made. The Indians living in this vicinity are numerous, and include the Kilsomahts as well as the Ahousahts. The people are greatly pleased at the idea of a school, and preparations for it were begun in good earnest, with the result that Mr. Russell was in a position to open in 10 days. From 20 to 25, chiefly boys, attend, and are making wonderful progress. The want of a building is the principal difficulty. Mrs. Russell assists in the work.

To aid the missions in B.C. our Society contributes to the maintenance of the children at the Alberni Boarding School, to the salaries of the teachers, and we are also responsible for the salary of Mr. Russell, teacher at Ahousaht.

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V. Trinidad and the New Hebrides.

We have had the privilege this year not only of contributing to the educational work in these fields, but through kindness of the Eastern W. F. M. S. and the missionaries, both in Trinidad and the New Hebrides, of receiving mission news with considerable regularity.

We are glad to note the fact that Mrs. Morton has returned to the mission field in a measure strengthened by her travels abroad; also that the College in Santo, under the care of Mr. and Mrs. Amand is prospering.

Applications.

A number of earnest, educated and spiritually minded women are now offering for service in the Foreign Field where they are greatly needed. The sending forth of more laborers will mean increased effort on the part of the W.F.M.S. in the coming year.

Grateful Thanks.

This year the presentation of our review of work at the various mission stations has been greatly facilitated by statistical reports of the Indian schools, forwarded very kindly by Rev. Prof. Baird and the Rev. Prof. Hart, of the North-West Committee, Winnipeg, also by a large amount of information courteously given by Rev. R. P. Mackay, Secretary of the Foreign Mission Committee, (W.D.)

Inspiration for the Future.

In closing this brief sketch we again draw attention to the contrast between the history of this *twentieth* year, in the loving labors of our Society for Heathen women and children, and that of the *first*. Surely the comparison will call forth from all hearts, not only a song of praise, but a resolution formed in entire dependance upon God, to aim after purer motives and a nobler service than ever before.

Jesus speaks to us to-day, by His command, as He did so long ago in the garden on the resurrection morning, to Mary with His own voice. May we respond as quickly, and go and tell others that we have seen the Lord.

HOME SECRETARY'S REPORT.

ANOTHER year in the history of our Society closes and it is now our privilege to present the Twentieth Annual Report of the Home Work. Joy and gratitude fill our hearts as we note the growth and influence of our organization since it was formed twenty years ago. From a small off-shoot of the missionary vine it has grown to be a noble tree with wide spreading branches, covering twenty-five Presbyteries. Connected with these branches are numerous smaller ones from which most of the fruit of the past years has been gathered, and in addition, isolated branchlets have taken root in remote parts of our fair Dominion, east and west, and one in far off India. But the growth has not been confined to outward extension. This work for Christ has become deeply rooted in the hearts of thousands of the women of our Church, spiritual life has been developed, intellectual powers improved, and mental vision quickened to recognize the world as the Lord's vineyard and the heathen as neighbors. It would be difficult to overestimate the enlargement that has come to the women of our Society through this work. We rejoice in what has been accomplished and humbly ascribe all the praise and honor to the Lord our God, who so graciously called us to this service and who has so wondrously guided us through all the perplexities of the past years.

A feeling of disappointment comes to us, as we report the fact that the twentieth year of our existence as a Society marks the first appearance of decrease in our ordinary contributions. Continued depression in commercial affairs may have had some slight effect in bringing about this result, but judging from the reports we believe that it can be accounted for in other ways. Our members, on the whole, have not given less, but sympathy with our supply department has led some of them to divert part of their ordinary funds to aid it. All that is possible should be done for that department, but care must be exercised not to strengthen it at the expense of any other part of our work. Another cause of the apparent decrease is, that a few of our branches were tardy in sending their funds to the Presbyterial Treasurers and their contributions do not appear in the total for the past year.

This has been a disappointment to the Board of Management and will, we are sure, be such to the members of those branches when they find that their contributions do not appear in our Annual Report. We would earnestly urge our Treasurers to be more prompt in future.

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Presbyterial Societies.

We have been pleased to note the growing interest in the annual meetings of these Societies. Most interesting programmes have been prepared, in some cases extending over two days, comprehensive, practical papers have been read and discussed, interest has been deepened, and loyalty to the work more firmly cemented. The reporting of these meetings in our *Letter Leaflet* has been a step in the right direction. It has brought the Societies into closer touch with each other and has added the charm of home interest to our little publication. A few of the Presbyterial Societies have reported advance in almost every department; eleven show increase in funds, London heading the list with over two hundred dollars of an advance. Ottawa's funds were enlarged by a bequest of three hundred dollars, one Society sent the same amount as in the previous year, and thirteen show a decrease. Several of the Presbyterial Societies show a falling off in membership, but this may be more fancied than real, as the Auxiliary and Mission Band Secretaries do not always report their membership fully, and this leads us to again emphasize the importance of using the tabulated forms provided for our Auxiliaries and Bands. If they were used, as they are intended to be, there need be no mistake regarding the membership. Each Presbyterial Secretary should see that every Secretary in her Society, has a tabulated form at the beginning of her Auxiliary or Mission Band year, in order that the several items should be entered in it at the close of each meeting, from the beginning of the year. This form, properly filled, should give a true and clear outline of the year's work, and should be forwarded to the Presbyterial Secretary in *good time* for her to prepare her annual report. There is one point where many of our Secretaries fall short and that is in not sending *promptly, full* reports. Not infrequently they have to be written to twice, and when the tardy reports arrive they are often wanting in some important points. This, as has been stated before, adds very materially to the already heavy work of the Presbyterial Secretary. Appreciation of small things is a very necessary qualification of a good secretary. No part of our work is so small that it does not call for the close attention of the one to whom it is entrusted. We must remember the little things as well as the larger in our service of love if we would hear the Master say, when it is ended, "Well done thou good and faithful servant, thou hast been faithful in a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

Many of our Presbyterial Societies and Auxiliaries were privileged in hearing Miss Sinclair speak of Missionary life and work

in India, and of the crying need of the heathen in that land. Frequent reference is made in the reports to the pleasure and benefit derived from her addresses. Hearts have been stirred by the facts she presented, to grateful recognition of God's goodness in permitting them to share in this great work.

Auxiliary.

Meetings grow more interesting each successive year. This has been attributed to the fact that more time is devoted to systematic study of the Scriptures and of the mission fields. The reports indicate readiness on the part of the members to assist in every possible way. In not a few instances, the members have taken turn in preparing the programme and in conducting the meetings. Several Auxiliaries appointed a visiting committee, and through this agency kept the interests of the Society before the women of the congregations. Another method adopted for the same purpose, was to print the topic for the month and the names of the ladies who were responsible for each month's programme. These were distributed throughout the congregation and were found to be a means of arousing interest. One Auxiliary held a meeting for special prayer every two weeks, and reports, "that they were greatly encouraged by the interest taken in spiritual matters and by the liberality of their members." The difficulty of holding meetings in country districts in the winter season was touched upon in many of the reports. From one Secretary we learn that "it was always possible to have a meeting even on the most stormy days." In most cases, however, "it was found impossible to meet and the work was in abeyance for some months of the year." Could not the members so circumstanced, constitute themselves Scattered Helpers for the winter, and so keep alive their own interest and still aid the work by their prayers and regular giving? A few of the reports from our weaker Auxiliaries were truly pathetic as they expressed their struggles to overcome discouragement. "Have tried to keep up our meetings," "Do not wish to give up," are the conclusions to some of these records of trial. One Auxiliary reports its President as nearly ninety years old and the members all intensely interested in the work. Another states that they held twelve meetings, with an average of five out of six members. These and similar incidents serve to show that difficulties, advanced age and small numbers, cannot hinder true interest from manifesting itself.

Scattered Helpers.

Have been more fully reported than ever before, but there is still room for improvement in that direction. Now that columns are provided for them in the tabulated forms there should be no

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Expense Fund.

A few of the Auxiliaries report that they established an expense fund, so that no encroachment should be made upon the ordinary contributions. In one, the members gave from two to five cents each month for that purpose; in another, the mite box was placed on the table and each one put in the amount she felt able to give, in addition to her regular contribution. Such reports convince us, that most of our members fully understand the importance of keeping their regular offerings intact, for the work which they were organized to aid.

We note with pleasure the place the thank-offering meeting continues to hold in most of our Auxiliaries and Bands. From these meetings there seems to flow an inspiration that gives fresh courage and hope in the work. We are told, that "the greatest interest of the year centered in the Thank-offering meeting, the effect of which will long be felt by all the members," also, "the amount enclosed in the envelopes surprised the most hopeful." We trust that before long the meeting for special prayer, in January of each year, will be as universally observed throughout our Society as the Thank-offering meeting now is. The reports do not indicate that it has, as yet, received due attention.

Mission Bands.

A pleasing feature, developing from year to year, is the prominence given in many of the Presbyterial annual meetings, to the work of the Mission Bands. In the past year they were more largely represented than ever before, conferences were held in the interests of their work, most excellent papers were read by members of the Bands and time was given for discussion. In this way the youthful representatives gave and received valuable suggestions which will, we trust, be helpful to the juvenile department of our work. At the annual meetings of the Auxiliaries, the juniors had their representatives and presented their own reports, thereby adding not a little to the interest of that meeting. Most of the Auxiliaries and Juvenile Bands have found the tie which binds them a pleasing one. The Auxiliaries have an additional interest in caring for the Bands, and the young folk have received encouragement and help that have been of great advantage to them. A few instances of lack of sympathy between the Auxiliaries and Juvenile Bands have been reported. We have heard of these with deep regret, for "if a kingdom be divided against itself it cannot stand," neither can our work truly prosper in congregations where the Auxiliaries and Bands are not working together in unison.

A large number of new Bands were reported during the year ; yet, at the close, we can show only a very small gain ; several have not reported ; some have reported, but have not contributed, and we know that a few have ceased to exist. Most of these failures were caused through lack of officers to lead in the work. Some esteemed leaders were called from earthly service, some were laid aside through ill health, and others were lost to their particular Bands through removal to distant localities ; whatever the cause, the effect, in most cases was the same—the dissolution of the Band. This matter has been referred to in former years, yet we find that Bands have ceased to exist in the past year because their Auxiliaries failed to give them the proper oversight. This duty, of watching and caring for the interests of our work in connection with the children, has a strong claim upon our Auxiliaries, and we trust, that in the coming year greater vigilance will be exercised in the performance of it. A number of Bands were reported, but not credited with any contributions ; on enquiry we found that their funds had been included in that of their Auxiliary. In a few cases we were able to correct the mistake, but it is feared that there may be others that have not received the credit due them. When the Auxiliaries send their reports they should be very careful to separate the funds of the Juvenile Bands from those of the Auxiliary. It can easily be seen that it must be a disappointment and discouragement to the young folk to find a blank space in our Blue Book where their contribution should appear. The majority of our Bands, and a large number of Auxiliaries, appear in the tabulated statements as having no members of General Society. According to the Constitution of our organization these are not in a position to be represented at the Annual Meeting of the General Society. We have reason to believe, however, that in this particular a number of the Bands have been made to appear in a false position. Their President was a member of the General Society and eligible to represent the Band, but she had made herself a member through the Auxiliary, and was so reported. The President of the Mission Band should pay the General Society fee into the funds of the Mission Band and be reported through the Band. We hope there will be an improvement in this respect, in the future. Many of the Mission Band reports evidence deep interest and activity in the work. One states, that its “members walk four or five miles to attend the meeting,” another, that “every meeting is made the medium of gaining useful information.” The talent system and voluntary giving seem to have been the more common methods of raising the funds. We noticed a change in the names of a few of our Auxiliaries and Bands. Unless there be strong reasons for such a change we would urge that the original one be retained as it is liable to be misleading when we make up our lists at the close of

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the year ; in every case, notice of such change should be sent at once to the Presbyterian Secretary.

In examining the reports we found Auxiliaries and Bands which had not been previously reported through the *Letter Leaflet*, and of which we had no knowledge. In other cases, the notice had been sent to the Home Secretary and reported in the *Letter Leaflet*, but the Presbyterian Secretary had not been notified of it. There was irregularity in both cases. As soon as an Auxiliary or Band is organized, the new secretary should acquaint the Presbyterian Secretary with the fact, giving her the names of the officers and other items of information regarding the new organization. It is then the duty of the Presbyterian Secretary to send the official notice to the Home Secretary.

Two other suggestions we wish to make ; first, that all new branches send to the Presbyterian Treasurer the funds they may have on hand at the close of the Presbyterian year, even though the amount be very small. The entry of it opposite their names in the contribution column will show that they have really commenced work. Second : that branches do not disband without first writing to their Presbyterian Secretary to inform her of their intention ; and further, before finally disbanding, if there is no other course open for them, call a meeting of the members and present reports of what has been done up to that time. These reports, with whatever funds may be on hand, should be forwarded to the Presbyterian Secretary and Treasurer without delay. We believe this course would often prevent disbandment, and, in any case, would be the correct one to follow.

In this review of the home work we have sought to present the successes and failures of the past year as they appeared in the reports, through the former we have received encouragement, and the lessons, that have been presented in the latter, will, we trust, prove to us stepping stones to better things in the future. Let our watchword for the coming year be "Whatsoever ye do, do it heartily as to the Lord and not unto men, knowing that of the Lord ye shall receive the reward of the inheritance : for ye serve the Lord Christ."

For convenience in reference summaries of the first and tenth year's Home Work, are given in addition to that of our twentieth year.

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REPORT OF SUPPLIES TO MISSIONS.

It is with gratitude and thankfulness to our Heavenly Father that we are able to report the success that has attended this branch of our work during the past year.

Over 33,000 lbs. of strong, warm clothing, quilts, blankets, etc., have been sent to the different reserves, and we are glad to learn from some of the Presbyterial reports, that the preparation of this clothing has been a means of blessing, not only to the poor Indians, but also to some of our Societies. Many who have hitherto taken little interest in missions, have through helping to clothe the naked, been brought into sympathy with the whole work of our Society, and have aided materially in lightening the burdens of our devoted missionaries.

The following extract, referring to the supplies sent by our Society, from a pamphlet on the Indians of Western Canada, by the Rev. Prof. Baird, Joint Convener of the North-West F. M. C., will be interesting to our members :

“Mention has already been made of the very considerable extension of these missions since the North-West rebellion in 1885. The most conspicuous way in which this deepened interest manifested itself was among the members of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, who, for several years, have borne the entire cost of that part of the work which is especially directed to women and children, and this, since it includes the building and maintenance of schools, the payment of the salaries of matrons and teachers, and similar expenses, has amounted to about two-thirds of the Committee's whole revenue. In addition to these gifts of money, liberal as they are, the ladies have gathered, year by year, and packed with loving and provident care, bales of clothing and other good things for use in the schools and on the reserves. These bales amounted, last year, to more than 11 tons, and have been simply invaluable in covering the shivering and half-naked savages from the rigors of a northern winter, in clothing the school-children, and so reducing the cost of school maintenance, and in commending to otherwise un-receptive hearts the gospel which accompanies the gifts. Indeed, in a way, these gifts of clothing, etc., do what money cannot do. Money is impersonal ; the Indian never sees nor handles the money which pays the missionary's salary or builds the mission house ; the benefit he gets from it is indirect and as being spiritual it is of a character which he does not at first appreciate. Not so with the gifts of clothing. These

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are things the Indian can appreciate ; they appeal to a side of his nature which is not dormant ; the proof they bring of a thoughtful and intelligent sympathy comes home to him in a most convincing way and the soil is prepared for the sowing of the gospel seed."

It is the hope of our Society that as these Indians become Christianized, they will be able gradually to dispense with these gifts, and be no longer children, the "Wards of the Nation," but men and women, able to provide for themselves and their families, but in the meantime it is our duty and also our privilege to help in this work, for this mass of Paganism existing in the centre of our Dominion, is a menace to its peace and prosperity.

The number of quilts sent last year was very large, in some cases more than was required, but the supply of clothing for boys, and also for old women was very deficient. Could the members of our Societies see some of these poor old creatures, blind and feeble, their sympathies would be aroused in their behalf.

We would again appeal to our mission bands for help in providing gifts and prizes for the children in the schools, both in the North-West and Central India. Surely out of their abundance they could spare something for those less fortunate than themselves.

Our missionaries speak very gratefully of the Christmas presents sent during the past year, and of the great pleasure they have given to the Indian children.

The Scripture picture rolls, used in many of our Sabbath schools, are frequently asked for by our missionaries in India and the North-West.

We have again to report that the money paid for freight, amounting to \$783.30, has been refunded by the Indian Department. Our thanks are due to Mr. Hayter Reed, Deputy Superintendent General of Indian Affairs, for his uniform kindness and courtesy.

We cannot too heartily thank all our Societies for their loyalty, to the allotment made by the Board, and for their endeavors as far as possible to meet the requirements of each station.

Our friends in Montreal have helped us very materially in this work. The Rev. Hugh McKay writes that the clothing sent by the Society in Erskine Church, Montreal, was the very best he received. St. Andrews, P.Q., also sent clothing to Mr. McKay, and St. Agnes de Dundee sent a box to Miss Baker, Prince Albert.

The Societies in St. Stephen, N.B.; Baillie, N.B.; Stanley Bridge, P.E.I., Cavendish, P.E.I.; and Salt Springs, N.S., have again assisted us very liberally, and even at the risk of repeating what has been said so often, in previous reports, the contents of the box from Salt Springs, with its ready made home spun, and gingham dresses and shirts, as well as home spun flannels, is worthy of special mention.

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The gifts and prizes sent by the Hamilton Presbyterian Society, the Mission Bands in Peterboro' and Whitby Presbyterian Societies to Central India, gave great pleasure to the children in the schools there, and were highly appreciated by the missionaries.

In addition to the supplies of clothing, the Stratford Presbyterian Society sent a sewing machine to the Rolling River Reserve, and the Toronto Presbyterian Society sent one to the school at Portage-la-Prairie.

The Mission Band of Knox church, Woodstock, sent a melodion for use in the church on Okanase Reserve, and a lady belonging to the Auxiliary of East church, Toronto, sent one to the school at Round Lake.

We trust that in the new year, upon which we are entering, there may be increased success in every branch of our work. This will certainly be the case if our members realize how much they owe to the Gospel for the blessings which they enjoy, and will show their gratitude to God for his goodness to them by doing all in their power to bring the same blessings to those who "sit in darkness and the shadow of death."

PUBLICATIONS.

Letter Leaflet.

THE work of this past year in the Publication Department has had its difficulties as well as its encouragements to meet.

Great responsibility rests on the Publication Committee and on the Editor of the *Letter Leaflet* in preparing and placing before the Society month by month material that will interest and instruct, as well as keep alive the flame of missionary zeal that has ever been a characteristic of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. To this work a large amount of time and of judgment requires to be devoted. Those who quietly sit down to read our *Leaflet*, as it reaches them in their homes, seldom think or are aware of the work and attention it has involved before it could be placed in their hands. This Committee needs your sympathy and prayers as much if not more than any department of the Board. The circulation of the *Letter Leaflet* has steadily increased till at the close of this year its issue is 14,365 per month. We know from the many kind messages we have received, as well as from the yearly reports of our Auxiliaries and Mission Bands that our *Leaflet* has gained for itself a very near and dear place in the hearts of our members. God has blessed it in helping forward His work. It binds together our missionaries and the workers at home. If we carefully read our missionary letters we cannot but get a deeper insight into the difficulties with which they are daily surrounded, while going out and in among the Christless homes of other lands carrying the "Bread of Life" to those who hunger not for it.

One Presbyterial Society "fears the Leaflets are no read and studied in some parts of our Society." It states:—"That they are appreciated highly in the country districts, but fears that many in our cities and towns pass them lightly over." We hesitated to make this statement, though, fearing it was too true from the very many questions that come to us concerning certain instructions issued by the Board, showing that had they read their *Leaflet* no such enquiry was needful.

The enlargement of the *Leaflet* has given great satisfaction; it is said to be the "cheapest periodical that goes out from the printer." We think this is part of its success; it is within the reach of all our members. The price need be no obstacle, and, if it is not in your home we feel we must assign the cause not to the Board—for it has done its utmost to have it in the hands of every one—but to indifference on the part of the individual members.

We feel we must allude to the payment of the *Leaflet*. The rules of the Board are that all Leaflets must be prepaid. These

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instructions, we are sorry to say, have not been carried out, as many as seventy-eight Auxiliaries and Mission Bands sent in their orders last May without remitting any payment. If all were to follow this example where would we get the funds to carry on our work? Our accounts are paid monthly, and we must have the means with which to do this. It also entails expense and trouble to the Presbyterian Secretary to gather in her accounts, and has given to your Publication Secretary much extra labor this past year. The Board would urge that its orders be carried out in the coming year, and that payment accompany all orders.

From one Presbyterian Secretary we have received a most cheering report of work done; through the kindness of a donor (outside the Presbyterian church) they have been enabled to send the *Letter Leaflet* to a number of their small stations free of charge. This is a pleasing feature of their work and worthy of imitation.

We have received from sales of *Letter Leaflets*, \$1,654.46; this with interest of \$23.83 makes a total of \$1,678.29. We have disbursed \$1,403.78; of this disbursement \$237.45 was paid by order of the Board towards the expenses of Miss McKenzie who went out at the earnest request of Mrs. Goforth as her assistant. We have a surplus, after meeting all expenses of \$274.51, this along with the \$237.45 paid by order of the Board makes a total of \$511.96 as the surplus from the *Letter Leaflet* for the year. The cost of printing the *Letter Leaflet* in its increased form has been \$201.29 over former years.

To the many young ladies who have so faithfully done their part in helping to mail the *Leaflet* we express our gratitude.

We have had during the year visits from a number of our Secretaries who were in the city on a visit. We were pleased to let them see our ladies at work; each one expressed herself as surprised at the amount of labor, and was sure no member of her Auxiliary had any idea of the work done. Mistakes will arise, if our friends would only consider what is meant by every month counting out 14,000 *Leaflets*; with orders ranging from one to 142 they might wonder so few mistakes are made.

Literature.

The literature department in some of its work has not been so successful as in other years. Fewer *Leaflets* have been sold, this is in a measure due to the number of pamphlets we have had on our list. Our Thanking-offering *Leaflet* did not reach the issue of other years. About 2,000 fewer were sent out, while the Thank-offering Envelopes were 1,700 in advance. Many sent for the *Leaflet* as a sample who did not consider an order needful. We cannot see the benefit our *Leaflet* will do, read simply at the Thank-offering Meeting. The offering has been made before its influence has been

felt. If this is the use to be made of it we would recommend that it be read at a previous meeting.

We are sorry to record a large falling off in our Contribution Envelopes; they are 792 short of last year. This means something to our Society. We had hoped last year that we were entering on an era of more systematic giving, but this year would indicate that we were, perhaps, too sanguine. We would like again to recommend this mode of giving, for we have always felt that where the Sabbath evening hour of prayer was enjoyed and felt to be a privilege, the offering however small would not be forgotten. What the Women's Foreign Missionary Society has always wished to impress on its many givers is a conscientious setting apart of God's portion, and where this is done we have no fear but a corner will readily be given for the work of telling our less favoured sisters of that love which has done so much in uplifting women, and placing her in her proper sphere.

We have not been able to secure maps, except the more expensive ones, hence the reduction in the number sent out. Will no young lady come forward and help with this work? It surely is a gift which some of our young lady friends must be endowed with. The training given in our schools, if followed up, should make this not a difficult matter. We would like some of our Mission Band workers, either in town or country, to consider this hint.

We have received from sales of literature \$410.27. We consider the free distribution of literature constitutes the largest part of profit made from this department of the work. We have disbursed \$383.57, leaving a balance of \$26.70. This added to the \$274.51, from the *Letter Leaflet* Fund, makes a total of \$301.21, which we have handed to the General Treasurer.

We have printed for sale four New Leaflets: "Celeste's Mission," "Conversion of Aunt Polly's Pocket-Book," "Dollars for Self and Cents for Christ," "Little Corners;" along with these we reprint four, and add to the free list, "Duties of Officers of Auxiliaries and Mission Bands, and Hints to Mission Band Workers."

In closing the year we would ask Auxiliaries and Mission Bands to consider if in the coming year more could not be done to arouse the indifferent by a freer distribution of our literature. Many of our Auxiliaries use our Leaflets as reading material at their meetings, but don't give to outsiders. What the Society aims at is to have them distributed in your district in order that the indifferent may be aroused and drawn unto the work.

Our small share of the work of the Society is closed for another year. We gladly lay it on the Master's Altar, trusting it may be used by Him in helping forward His cause, and hastening the day when all our sisters the world over shall know Him, "Whom to know is life eternal."

REPORTS OF PRESBYTERIAL SECRETARIES.

BARRIE.

Mrs. Needham.

THE ninth report of our Presbyterian Society is encouraging. The banner of "Progress" has floated over every department. We have now forty-three branches, five were added during the year, viz.:—Auxiliaries: Allandale, First Essa, Nottasawaga and Severn Bridge; and one Mission Band, "Palm Leaf," Churchill. The work in Auxiliaries has been of a very high order; excellently prepared papers, Bible readings, with study of foreign fields, and much prayer have regularly formed part of the exercises. One Auxiliary is highly honored in having one of its members called to the Foreign Field, in the person of Miss Rachael Chase, Orillia. Our Mission Bands still continue to do faithful work. More open meetings have been held than ever before, in the Young Woman's and Juvenile Bands. The Foreign Mission catechism prepared by Rev. R. P. McKay, has been used in many. One Life Member added during the year. 583 *Monthly Letter Leaflets* are subscribed for, against 470 last year. A number of branches have appointed a *Leaflet* Secretary, whose sole office is oversight of this pamphlet in all its interests. Seven dollars was realized from our table of literature, etc. In the clothing department for the North-West, 1,250 pounds of excellent clothing, valued at \$541, was forwarded from this Presbytery; eighteen Auxiliaries and fourteen Mission Bands contributed. Miss McIntosh, of Honan, Rev. R. P. McKay, Rev. Dr. McTavish and others have kindly visited and addressed a number of Thank-offering and open meetings. Though the difficulties and trials of other years have, in a measure, been repeated, the way at times seemed to have been "rough," but it was the Lord's way and the "right" way. The prospects for our next year's work are very bright.

BRANDON.

Mrs. J. Murray.

In presenting the Ninth Annual Report of the Brandon Presbyterian Society, we are glad to note an increase in contributions from nearly all the Auxiliaries, and a more hopeful tone in many of the reports.

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As usual, the loss of members through removal from the district is very discouraging, especially in the country Auxiliaries. In one case the Society is reduced to three members, and these, owing to long distances apart, have not been able to hold any meetings during the year, yet their interest in the work is not lessened, and the amount sent in, to the Presbyterian Treasurer, would put to shame some of our larger Societies.

Three of our Mission Bands report no meetings during the winter, but we trust that they may again take up the work with renewed zeal and energy.

Two new and promising Bands have been formed, one at Burnside and one at Glenboro.

The thank-offering meeting is now an established feature in most of the Auxiliaries, and has proved of great value, not only as a source of revenue, but as a means of enlisting the interest and sympathy of many who are not actively engaged with us in the work.

Two Life Members have been added during the year, one from Portage la Prairie, and one from Cypress River.

Twenty-five Scattered Helpers are reported, and we trust that the number may be largely increased and that in every department of our work we may go forward and attain to a greater degree of prosperity and blessing in the coming year.

BROCKVILLE.

Mrs. Greenhill.

The reports of the secretaries, on the whole, are almost uniformly good and encouraging, and tell of a growing interest and of results.

The amount contributed by some of the Juvenile Bands is not large, but the reports of the young secretaries show careful training, and the formation of right principles which is fitting the children for future usefulness.

As the result of a tour amongst the Auxiliaries by the President and her assistants, two new Auxiliaries and four Juvenile Bands are reported and give good promise for the future.

An increasing number of Societies report the observance of the day of special prayer, while the circulation of the *Letter Leaflet* shows an advance of fifty-five per month over last year, 511 copies being distributed.

The thank-offering meeting is reported by most as being the one public meeting of the year, and the one at which the grace of liberality is being more and more cultivated.

Fourteen Auxiliaries and four Bands assisted in sending the clothing for the North-West. The whole amount sent was 800 lbs. valued at about \$400.

We have again to record the loss of two valuable officers, the late Mrs. J. Grant Cameron, President of St. John's Auxiliary, Brockville; and the late Mrs. J. K. Porteous, Secretary of Osgoode Line. The most affectionate testimony is borne to their Christian character and to the loss which these Societies feel in their removal.

The Annual Meeting, which was held at Winchester in February, was one of the best in the history of this Presbyterial. About seventy delegates were present, and the sessions were interesting and harmonious throughout.

After this necessary review of the year's work, let us not dwell much on our small share in it, but with increased love to our Master and to one another, put away from among us whatever is unworthy and speed the day when His will shall be done on earth even as it is done in Heaven.

BRUCE.

Mrs. Ferguson.

The reports for the year are on the whole encouraging, the membership has increased, also the average attendance. One Life Member has been added. Meetings are regularly held and well attended, in some cases, however, when members are scattered, during the stormy season, meetings could not be held.

Interest seems well sustained and increasing; a number of addresses have been delivered during the year by returned missionaries and others, which have aroused interest, and we believe, have been the means of enlightening some, who were greatly in need of it, on the subject of missions and missionaries.

The sewing meetings, preparing clothing for the Indians in the North-West, are noted as a means of interesting those who are not members as well as those who are, and a number have contributed and taken part in this work who do not attend the regular meetings or help in the general work. Our contributions have increased this year also, and the value of the clothing sent to the North-West is in excess of last year.

Thank-offering meetings have become a regular institution in nearly all our Auxiliaries. They are not only the means of stimulating our members to greater zeal, but add largely to the contributions.

The circulation of the *Letter Leaflet* has increased during the past year.

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Our Mission Bands all report, and are striving to do their part, in some cases under not very favorable circumstances. May they merit the "Well done."

Our President has endeavored to organize either an Auxiliary or Mission Band in congregations where there are neither, but with little success—only one Auxiliary being organized; still some are hopeful of uniting with us by and bye. Faithful work shall not go unrewarded. "He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him." We are working for a Master, who "shall have dominion also from sea to sea, and from the river unto the ends of the earth. Yea all kings shall fall down before Him, all nations shall serve Him. All nations shall call Him blessed."

Let us then be up and doing
With a heart for any fate.
Still achieving, still pursuing,
Learn to labor and to wait.

CHATHAM.

Miss L. McNaughton.

An auxiliary in Knox church, Leamington, is the only new society that we have to report this year, but our earnest prayer is that ere long there will not be a single station within the bounds of the Chatham Presbytery without a branch of the W. F.M.S.

The reports from the different societies are most encouraging; there is a greater readiness on the part of members to do their share towards making the meetings interesting and helpful—a deeper tone of spirituality seems to pervade the meetings, and there is also a more systematic study of missionary topics. 328 copies of the *Letter Leaflet* are circulated. We feel sure that in reading our *Leaflets* a deepening interest will be excited.

The liberal response to the call for clothing for Okanase reserve shows that great interest is taken in this department of the work.

Our Mission Bands report increased membership and a larger offering than in any previous year. One new Band has been organized during the year. One juvenile Band has not reported at all. We also regret the loss of one Young Woman's Band. The congregation was crowded with Societies, so the Mission Band was dropped, with the earnest hope on the part of the officers that all the members would join the Auxiliary. Nearly all the reports show an increase in membership, but with one exception all give a falling off in average attendance.

On the whole the reports are encouraging; many of them speak of interesting meetings, earnest work and steady progress.

We enter upon another year with the prayer that the same Blessed Spirit which leads men and women to go forth as missionaries, may stir up the hearts of his people to supply the silver and gold.

GLENGARRY.

Miss A. M. Cline.

A season of reckoning is profitable for Societies as well as for individuals and as with individuals, so with Societies, results rarely give full satisfaction. Glengarry has not fallen off in contribution, but the increase is small compared with the greater needs this year. Of the older Auxiliaries and Mission Bands, eighteen show an increase, while fifteen have decreased, and in some cases so much so that if it were not for our new Auxiliaries we would be short of last year. One Auxiliary has been reorganized and two new ones have been added to our list, but we have lost Glen Sandfield and East Hawkesbury, a united Auxiliary which has worked together for nearly ten years, and considering its few members, has done nobly in the past. We have still nine Mission Bands and it gives us great pleasure to record such an improvement in every way among our young people. We have more Scattered Helpers and a larger contribution from them. Not half our members attend meetings. This should not be the case, especially in settled districts, for it is very hard to interest people who do not attend meetings, and it is so easy to forget even a good cause if not constantly reminded of it. There is every excuse in country places, when so many months in the year the roads are impassable, and the wonder is that our Auxiliaries hold together as they do when the greater number are thus situated. So many Secretaries report—"Interest well sustained by the few who attend meetings"—that it forces from us the remark, that until we get a better attendance at our monthly meetings, results will not be quite satisfactory. 342 *Letter Leaflets* taken, almost 100 more than last year.

GUELPH.

Miss Kerr.

The progress of our Society has not been so marked, perhaps, in the year which has now closed as in former years. Indeed in the matter of membership and in that of pecuniary giving we confess to a slight decrease in comparison with former years. This may be accounted for by hard times and shortened hours of labor in our manufacturing towns. I believe, however, that

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there has been an advance in intelligent interest in mission work, whether our own mission fields are referred to or to missionary work throughout the world. The Societies, as a rule, report progress or else that they are holding their own in spite of difficulties. Four Auxiliaries and two Mission Bands have been organized, while none that were in existence at the beginning of the year have been disbanded. Clothing, the best as to quality and quantity that our Society has ever sent away, was shipped to File Hills for the Indians. Nearly all our Auxiliaries and Mission Bands contributed clothing and other necessary articles with a readiness and heartiness which I was pleased to note. Thank-offering meetings are becoming the rule. A number of our Societies observed the day of prayer set apart for missions. "Scattered Helpers" seem to be few as yet, only three Societies reporting them. I hope additional efforts will be made to interest the "shut-ins."

Miss Sinclair, of Indore, addressed meetings in Guelph, Elora and Galt. May the Lord bless her words to the deepening of our faith and the increase of zeal in the Master's work.

The *Leaflet* Secretary reports that 1,027 *Leaflets* were subscribed for.

It has pleased God to remove from us last year one of our Auxiliary Presidents, Miss Argo, of Eden Mills. She worked faithfully for the Master and has doubtless received the welcome: "Well done thou good and faithful servant. Enter into the joy of thy Lord." A number of our members our dear friends have as must always be, been laid to rest "till He come."

HAMILTON.

Miss Findlay.

The fourteenth annual meeting of this Society was held in the schoolroom of Central Church on Jan. 21st. There was a large attendance of city members, and thirty Auxiliaries and eighteen Mission Bands were represented. From most of these the reports were very encouraging. A most interesting and delightful address was given by Miss Sinclair.

We have one great cause for regret in the removal of our President, who left Hamilton in July. We will miss her very much, and find it difficult to fill the place of one who knew the Presbytery thoroughly, and was so well posted in the work of the Society. Her absence opens the question "How many are able or willing to come forward to take such a position?" We should have *many*, but in reality have very *few*. Are the members of the Society growing as they should, in order to fit themselves for positions such as this when they become vacant?

We have now forty Auxiliaries, and twenty-four Mission Bands. Many of the country Auxiliaries speak of drawbacks in the way of bad roads, long distances, etc., but say that the interest is well kept up notwithstanding these difficulties.

The increase in Auxiliaries amounts to three, viz:—North Pelham Abingdon and Smithville, and in Juvenile Mission Bands also three, viz:—Blackheath, Smithville and Knox Church, Hamilton.

The Secretary of Literature reports that thirteen Auxiliaries have ordered the *Letter Leaflet* for the first time this year.

We are glad to report that another of our members—Miss Bella Ptolemy—has entered upon active service in the Foreign Field. May her example lead others to consider their duty in this matter, that when the question is asked "Who will go?" many may gladly respond "Here am I; send me."

HURON.

Miss H. I. Graham.

Perhaps I cannot begin a record of the work accomplished by the Huron Presbyterial Society during the past year in a more fitting way than by taking up the notes of that glad, trustful hymn of thanksgiving which fell, so long ago, from the lips of the sweet singer of Israel: "The Lord has been mindful of us; he will bless us." The year 1895, which has rolled with its golden opportunities, improved or neglected, into the abyss of time, has been one of uneventful yet steady progression financially, and we trust and believe also spiritually. At no period in the history of our Society have we had greater reason to thank God and take courage.

Through the indefatigable efforts of our gifted President, Mrs. Colin Fletcher, one Auxiliary, in Blake, and three Mission Bands have been added to the roll, viz: the Willing Workers, Exeter; and the Lou Graham Mission Band, Bayfield, named in remembrance of Miss Lucinda Graham, M.D., who passed to higher service while striving to establish the Kingdom of Christ in far distant Honan; and the Gauld Mission Band, Kippen, designated in honor of Mrs. Gauld, of Formosa, who formerly belonged to that village.

Our Presbyterial now comprises fourteen Auxiliaries and nine Mission Bands.

With one exception every congregation within the bounds of the Presbytery is represented by either an Auxiliary or a Mission Band. Our work henceforward will be more in the line of increasing the membership and encouraging the interest and liberality of the existing organizations.

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Larger sums have been raised at the thank-offering meetings this year than ever before, showing that the women of our Church are gradually rising to a higher sense of the privilege and joy of giving.

The different reports are most hopeful and encouraging, indicating a deeper and truer interest in the fulfilment of our Saviour's last command. Everyone who has had any experience knows what a difficult matter it is to bring the ranks and contributions of a Society "up to the standard." In some cases the membership has decreased from various causes, yet the brave few who remain are looking forward in faith and confidence to greater activity in the coming year. One Secretary says, "Our meetings have been a source of religious quickening; we have found it profitable to wait upon God and often have we realized the truth of his promise, 'There am I in the midst of you.'"

The supply of clothing shipped to the North-West exceeded in quantity and quality that of any previous year. Several boxes of toys and presents valued at \$106 were sent by the MacGillvray Mission Band to Regina Industrial school, India and Honan.

The *Letter Leaflet* is widely read and circulated among our members, and much appreciated. Our Presbyterial expense fund is liberally sustained. Six life members have been added.

All nations are making preparations to extend and defend their own dominions. We hope and pray that the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society may advance in like manner to conquer and possess new lands for Christ, assured, though the heathen rage and the rulers take counsel together, that the everlasting kingdom of Him who sits upon the throne will yet, as prophecy predicts, extend "from sea to sea and from the river to the ends of the earth."

KINGSTON.

Miss Fowler.

The officers of this Society, in presenting their ninth annual report, feel very grateful that such an interest has been taken by the members in their work during the year. Although the reports may not show any increase either in members or contributions, yet there are evidences of a fuller consecration and a deeper zeal among the individual workers.

Addresses given by Mrs. Fraser Campbell, Miss Sinclair and Rev. Mr. McTavish are spoken of as being specially interesting and helpful in those Societies which were favored by visits from these earnest workers. The distribution of literature has also been productive of much good, in spreading a more general

knowledge of the needs of the work throughout the Presbytery. Quite a number of our Auxiliaries and Mission Bands report the loss of earnest workers and useful members by death or removal. To all of these we extend our sincerest sympathy.

Two new Mission Bands were formed during the year and we add to our list two new life members: Mrs. S. W. Rathbun, Deseronto, and Mrs. M. McGillivray, Kingston. 1,200 lbs of clothing, valued at \$633.33, was sent to Rev. Hugh MacKay, Round and Crooked Lake Reserve, Whitehead, N.W.T.

Thank-offering meetings have become a prominent feature of our work and are always spoken of as being most enjoyable and profitable.

The Scattered Helpers' Scheme has been used successfully in a few Societies. We have in all seventeen Scattered Helpers who contributed this year to the funds of the Society \$23.20.

LANARK AND RENFREW.

Miss B. Sinclair.

Our Society has no great progress to report for the past year, but at the same time we do feel that there has been no retrogression.

It is with feelings of deep thankfulness to our Heavenly Father that we present our thirteenth annual report. The object of our Society is not only to form an Auxiliary or Band in all possible congregations throughout the Presbytery, and to nourish and strengthen those already existing, but also to interest all our women in this great work and to increase the desire for missionary intelligence.

Wisdom does not show itself so much in precept as in life—in a firmness of mind and mastery of appetite. It teaches us to do, as well as to talk; and to make our actions and words all of a color.

He who learns the rules of wisdom without conforming to them in his life is like a man who labored in his fields but did not sow.

The field in which the W.F.M.S. labor is the *World*, but labor and energy expended in this field without sowing the word of truth fails of its desired end. We as a Presbyterial Society have had golden opportunities to sow the seed of the Word beside all waters and we ask the question now, what has been the fruitage? We have organized three new Auxiliaries, namely: Scotland, Oliver's Ferry and Eau Claire. We are sorry to state that Stafford Auxiliary has been dropped out from our list this year, partly owing to removals from that part of the country. Though all our Societies did not contribute this year, twenty-one bales of clothing, weighing 1,100 pounds, and valued at \$643.65, were sent to Round and

Crooked Lake were visited by Mrs. Mitchell, very interesting in our Society. Winnoch Band than our town.

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Crooked Lakes Reserves. Seven Auxiliaries and one Mission Band were visited by our President, Mrs. Stewart; and two Auxiliaries by Mrs. Mitchell. They found the work progressing favorably and very interested hearers at each place. We have one Mission Band in our Society that deserves special encouragement, that is Loch Winnoch Band. It is only a country place, yet contributes more than our towns or villages.

LINDSAY.

Miss L. H. MacIennan.

The work of this Society has been very much as in former years. Two or three of the recently organized Auxiliaries have almost doubled their subscriptions, while Lindsay and Uxbridge, the two largest and two of the first organized, have fallen considerably behind. We feel that, on the whole, interest in the work is not decreasing, and although our totals show a falling off, both in membership and contributions, we trust that this may only be the means of stirring us all to greater activity in the future.

The Mission Bands have not done as good work as in former years. Two have been disorganized. As we have appointed a Mission Band Secretary, who will have under her special care all the Bands, we are hoping for better things from our younger members in the near future. During the year the Auxiliary at Cambray was reorganized, and a Mission Band organized at Wick.

The contributions to the North-West were almost double what was sent the previous year, owing greatly to Mrs. Harvie's stirring address at our Presbyterial a year ago.

We have a Secretary of Literature to whom all interesting papers written by members of the larger Auxiliaries are sent, to be circulated among the country Auxiliaries who have not access to much reading matter. The Auxiliaries who have received these papers report that they have been a great help to them in their work.

The *Letter Leaflet* has a wide circulation. About 400 copies have been subscribed for by our members.

We have had the privilege, during this year, of sending a baby organ to Miss Calder who went out to India from our own Presbyterial.

We had the pleasure of having Miss McWilliams spend two weeks in our Presbyterial, in March. Each Auxiliary has been visited as far as possible by either the Presbyterial President or one of the Vice-Presidents.

In October our first semi-annual meeting was held at Fenelon Falls, at which Miss Drummond, of Newcastle, gave a very helpful address. Our annual meeting was held in Uxbridge, February 18th and 19th, with about sixty-five delegates present.

Our Heavenly Father alone knows who of our number have been faithful and who unfaithful. Our prayer is that we may all be so filled with the Holy Spirit that any work coming from our Father's hand may be done faithfully and willingly.

LONDON.

Miss L. M. Fraser.

Another year has closed, and again the reports of our Auxiliaries and Mission Bands have been gathered together and bound, as though in one sheaf, to present at this our twelfth annual meeting.

We can report advancement in every department of our Society's work. A steadily growing enthusiasm and delight in the work is evinced in every report, not only of the Auxiliaries, but also of the Mission Bands.

The smaller Societies, whose members have often great difficulties to contend with, such as long distance to place of meeting, over bad roads and inclement weather, seem to have grown stronger as these difficulties have been bravely met and conquered. Meetings have been held regularly in every Society, and not in any report for the past year does the, to us, meaningless word "discouragement" appear, but in every one there is the cheering assurance that better reports will be presented at our thirteenth annual meeting.

The President of one Auxiliary, which in past years had, perhaps, more to discourage its members than any other, writes that "We have had a pleasant year's work, and hope to organize a Mission Band next year." Another says, "We hope to do much better next year, as we have now a Church to hold our meetings in." Thus the icebergs have melted all around us, and we have a clear, bright pathway of hopefulness before us for 1896.

One or two Secretaries, who were obliged to report a decrease in membership and contributions, say that the cause is not lack of interest, but that on the contrary intelligent interest and enthusiasm are growing.

So, with clearer knowledge of the needs of our heathen sisters, as we contrast their unhappy lot with our own, surrounded as we are by every privilege in this Christian land, with every luxury of Gospel ordinance, do our hearts not only acknowledge that their claim upon us is just and great, but our hearts and consciences upbraid us because we have delayed so long in stretching out our hands to help them, and already many have perished ignorant of a Saviour's love. Then the awful questions will come into our own hearts, Whose fault? Are we to blame?

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We are thankful that we may forget the things that are behind and press forward to better things, and now we hope that the love of Christ constraineth us to do all we can to send the good news of One who is able and willing to save, to those who, through ignorance of Him, are hopeless and degraded. And every earnest worker feels that while giving of her means to send the Gospel to them, and while praying that the Holy Spirit may open their hearts to receive it, that her own heart and life is enriched "a hundred fold."

We have two new Mission Bands to welcome into our Society this year, both in St. Andrew's church, London. Both begin with large memberships and already enjoy their meetings, and look forward with pleasure to the work.

The goods sent to the Industrial School and Crowsland Reserve in October, was the largest and best assortment ever sent by our Society to the North-West.

600 *Letter Leaflets* have been subscribed for, so that every month we have fresh news from our mission fields, and our hearts go out in sympathy to our faithful missionaries, as we study more of their work, and learn of their difficulties, trials and successes. If we continue to pray earnestly and constantly for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon our missionaries and their work, and upon ourselves and all home work, with His guidance and aid, who can anticipate the glad reports that will flow in from every branch of our Society, and from the far off lands during the year we have entered upon. God has great things in store for us, we know, but for all these things will He be intreated of us. If we ask of Him, He will give the heathen for an inheritance unto His Son, and the uttermost parts of the earth for His possession; and then the motto of our Society will be fulfilled, "The World for Christ" will be won.

MAITLAND.

Mrs. MacNabb.

Another year's work is ended, and although our service has been faulty and imperfect, we are glad to report progress in some directions.

From the reports sent in it is evident that the interest in our work has not only been maintained but increased, and that earnestness and spirituality have characterized the work throughout the year.

We are pleased to note the continued improvement in the method of conducting Auxiliary meetings, many of which are made profitable and instructive by the study of the different fields of

missionary labor, lives of missionaries, Bible study, etc. One Auxiliary reports having prepared a catechism on Formosa. Others report an increasing number who are willing to take part in the meetings. From only one Auxiliary is there a note of discouragement, and this we hope is only temporary.

We would look forward hopefully to another year, and as we grow in knowledge and grace, we would desire that the fruit may be seen in our lives, and that the grace of liberality may not be the least prominent. The desire of many is "Thy Kingdom come," and to this end we would pray "O Lord revive Thy work."

ORANGEVILLE.

Mrs. Myers.

The tenth annual meeting of this Presbyterial Society was held in St. Andrew's church, Orangeville, on Tuesday, January 7th. Delegates were present from sixteen Auxiliaries and seven Mission Bands. The reports of the Auxiliary and Mission Band Secretaries are very encouraging. One or two report a falling off financially, but think they will prosper better in the coming year. Several Auxiliaries on the other hand report an increase of members and money. There was apprehension that on account of the great depression prevailing over the country, our finances would suffer and our progress be hindered, but it has not affected this Presbyterial to the extent that was feared.

One Auxiliary received benefit from an address by Mr. Tibb of Streetsville; another from Mr. Goforth, a third from Dr. Wanless, medical missionary from India; while several speak gratefully of the encouragement they received from visits from our Presbyterial President, Mrs. Campbell.

298 copies of the *Letter Leaflet* have been subscribed for in this Society. Everyone speaks highly of its value in distributing missionary news.

Ventay Auxiliary reports the organization of a Mission Band—King's Messengers—in July last.

The ladies of the Hillsbury Auxiliary most hospitably entertained the delegates to the semi-annual meeting in June, when they heard with much pleasure the papers on the "New Hebrides," by Mrs. Thornton; Mrs. Watt's address on "The Model Auxiliary," and Mrs. Horne on "A Plea for Mission Bands;" also the Rev. Fraser Campbell, in the evening, on his experiences in India.

The Secretary of Supplies has much pleasure in reporting a great increase in the quantity of goods sent to the North-West. Every Auxiliary and most of the Mission Bands contributed.

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1,100 pounds of clothing, valued at \$539.52, were sent to Mr. Arthur, at Lake's End. This great increase may be attributed to Mrs. Harvie's address at our last annual meeting.

OTTAWA.

Motto:—"With good will, doing service for Love's sake."

Miss H. E. Durie.

Interest in the work continues, and the general tone of the reports received from Auxiliaries and Mission Bands is encouraging.

In November an Auxiliary was organized in Stewarton church, Ottawa, by Mrs. Thorburn, making a total of twenty-two Auxiliaries and five Mission Bands in this Society.

The Auxiliary at Campbell's Bay has held no meetings during the year, owing to continued sickness amongst members.

Nineteen Auxiliaries and four Mission Bands contributed generously to the supplies for the North-West. Twelve bales were sent to the Regina School this year.

We regret to notice a decrease in the membership of a number of Auxiliaries. This is surely to be deplored. Our membership ought to be much larger, especially in the city Societies.

The number of "Scattered Helpers" also falls short of last year. Thirty-six are reported, contributing \$26.28. We hope that in the future this scheme may be used more generally for enlisting members who cannot, in the usual way, become interested in this work.

We are encouraged to find that in thirteen Auxiliaries and three Bands contributions are in advance of last year. The Auxiliary at Bristol deserves honorable mention in this connection, having nearly doubled its offering this year. We are pleased to report the first bequest to our Society, \$300, from the late Mrs. George Bryson of Fort Coulonge.

Appreciation of the visits of our President is clearly shown in the reports and letters received.

The circulation of the *Letter Leaflet* remains about the same as last year. The *Leaflet* is found most useful and instructive.

Thank-offering Meetings are held regularly in almost every Auxiliary.

It is with deep sorrow that we have to record the death of one who took an active interest in the work of our Society, Mrs. Isaac Campbell, the much loved President of Erskine Church Auxiliary.

Our ninth annual meeting was held in Bank street church, Ottawa, on Tuesday, February 4th. In the afternoon Miss Ben

Oliel gave an interesting account of work among the Jews in Jerusalem. At the evening meeting addresses were given by the Rev. W. T. Herridge and the Rev. Orr Bennet.

OWEN SOUND.

Mrs. W. H. Jenkins.

Reports have been received from sixteen Auxiliaries and five Mission Bands. While there seems to be an increasing interest in the work we regret that this increased interest has not found expression in increased contributions. The various reports show that this has been due to a variety of causes: the prevailing commercial depression, the difficulty of maintaining interest in the work in Auxiliaries whose members are scattered over a large area, special contributions for the removal of Church debt, providing for local poor, removal of energetic workers.

A number of reports refer to stimulating addresses from returned missionaries, and also from enthusiastic members of our own Presbytery.

The usual bale of clothing, valued at \$371.74, was prepared for the Indians of our North-West.

The usefulness of the little *Leaflet* is appreciated by all the Auxiliaries, 333 copies are circulated.

Many Auxiliaries speak of the delight and profit resulting from devoting one meeting to a special thank-offering. It is always well attended, and flagging zeal is stimulated.

Two Auxiliaries report having tried the method of choosing different members to conduct the exercises of each meeting. One to conduct the devotional exercises, and two others to prepare something on the topic for the month. The results have been most satisfactory.

One new Mission Band has been organized during the year, and sent a substantial contribution to the funds.

Altogether the year's work presents many features for which we have good reason to feel thankful. All are working, all are trying to extend the interest in the work, and success must come. The need is greater than ever before. Increased, not decreased effort must be put forth to overtake these necessities. Let us not weary in well-doing, but let us go on from good to best, and not be satisfied until we have earned the "well done," and reap the blessing which comes to the cheerful giver and the faithful worker.

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PARIS.

Mrs. McWhirter.

The annual meeting was held in Ingersoll, February 13th, at which there was a very good attendance of delegates.

Extracts of reports from all the Auxiliaries and Mission Bands were read, and whilst much aggressive work cannot be shown; only two Mission Bands having been added, and although there is a decrease in some of the contributions there is no evidence of decline in the spirit of devotion to the cause of Missions, nor lack of perseverance amid discouragements, but a feeling of greater consecration; and an aim after higher and better things seem uniformly to prevail. All seem to be working well. The chief discouragement is that so few comparatively are interested in the work, and hence a large proportion of our Presbyterian women neither attend the meetings nor become members of the Society.

There are still a few congregations not represented in our Society. Auxiliaries in these would be a means of mutual strength and blessing.

There are nineteen Auxiliaries and fourteen Mission Bands, thirty-three in all, with a membership of 717.

The Scattered Helpers' report does not show any growth, but rather decrease.

500 copies of the *Letter Leaflet* were circulated. The enlarged form is much appreciated, it is found to be helpful in stimulating to work; and also furnishing much fitted to encourage.

The supply of clothing sent to Regina School was in every way worthy of the Presbyterial, 2,750 pounds were sent, valued at \$1,166.83; as this represents a large outlay of money the wish was expressed that it could appear in some way in the tabulated form.

The President referred to the number of missionaries in the foreign field in whom we should have a special interest, as having been at some time connected with the Presbytery.

Mrs. Harvie touched the hearts of all, when speaking of the work in the North-West, in telling of the degradation and suffering of the Indian women, and of the inestimable good the quilts and clothing were to them.

The necessity of furnishing missionary intelligence in order to create and preserve interest was emphasized. During the year some of our active, earnest workers were called to cease from their labors, thus reminding us of the necessity of working whilst opportunity is given, and as we go forward to another year's possibilities, relying on the promise of grace and strength for each day's and year's requirements.

PETERBOROUGH.

Mrs. W. M. Graham.

There has been no tropical growth, nor aeronautical enthusiasm manifested in our Society during the past year; but what is of more account, there has been an earnest persistence of service, and an unswerving devotion to the cause of "Woman's work for woman."

Our Society now covers so much ground that infant Branches are sufficient of a novelty to be regarded as family darlings, and this year we recognize such in an Auxiliary organized in Havelock in April, 1895. At present we number thirty-one Branches, twenty-three being Auxiliaries, six young Women's Bands, and three Juvenile Bands of great promise. Our young Women's Bands bear the stamp of unflinching perseverance in the face of grave discouragements, which are now, we trust more than half-conquered; all our Branches seem to realize a deep sense of individual responsibility in our work, and of an abiding need of the agency of the Holy Spirit to ensure fruitful results.

Twenty-three Thank-offering meetings were held by our Branches, six of the number being in connection with the Mission Bands; and we believe that much of the steadfastness of growth and purpose, which characterizes our work, is due to these annual events in Branches, which are learning more and more, that it is not a cherished pastime we are indulging, but a solemn, sacred duty, successfully performed only when directed by the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

An interesting semi-annual meeting was held in Bobycaygeon in June, when it was our privilege to have with us Miss McIntosh of the Honan Mission.

The average attendance at monthly meetings has increased, as have also our financial returns which are almost entirely voluntary, a fact we regard as telling more than anything else the nature of our conception of the missionary spirit.

A generous consignment of excellent clothing, including fifty-two warm quilts, was sent to Miss Baker, Prince Albert, whose acknowledgement in the *Letter Leaflet* proved very gratifying to the numerous contributors. There were about 1,200 pounds sent, the estimated value being \$651.46, which included \$119.00 worth of new material.

There are 545 copies of the *Letter Leaflet* in circulation in our midst, and we are justly proud of our official organ, from whose silent influence much good must accrue.

So far, only seven Branches have instituted the Association of "Scattered Helpers," whose numbers are gradually increasing. We think this department of boundless possibilities.

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SARNIA.

Miss Jessie D. Brebner.

It is with feelings of gratitude to our Heavenly Father that we present our eighth annual report, which shows progress and increase in almost all ways.

We are pleased to welcome one new Auxiliary and five Mission Bands, most of which were organized in the Fall. At the same time we are sorry that one Auxiliary has evidently disbanded, as they send no report. Our total now is fifteen Auxiliaries and eleven Mission Bands. Most of our Auxiliaries were visited by our President, Mrs. Mactavish, and the various hints given by her helped many in their work. We had the pleasure of three meetings with Miss Sinclair, and all who heard her enjoyed it so much, we were sorry more could not have the same privilege. There are 256 copies of the *Letter Leaflet* taken, and are so much enjoyed we wish all would subscribe for it, as it seems so necessary to Auxiliary and Band work. Eleven bales of clothing, much of it new, were sent to Pipestone Reserve, valued at about \$700. Most of our Auxiliaries have thank-offering meetings which are very helpful. Our motto for the year was given us by Mrs. Ball at our Annual Meeting "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness and all other things will be added unto you."

SAUGEEN.

Mrs. Bowie.

This Society numbers sixteen Auxiliaries and six Mission Bands. The reports for the year are on the whole very encouraging. One Auxiliary has doubled its membership. Another rejoices that every member is now willing to take some part in the meeting. While another mourns the loss by death of a devoted Secretary, and the removal of an earnest and most active member.

The meetings have been interesting, the subject given in the *Leaflet* carefully studied, and valuable papers read. The average attendance has been good. The thank-offering meeting is a settled and prominent feature in our work, and is looked forward to by all our members, and also by many who are unable to attend the meetings of the Auxiliary, but are glad to join us on this occasion, bringing an "offering of thankfulness" also. The amount realized has been entirely by voluntary offering. Preparing the bale for North-West has been a privilege and pleasure. Many Auxiliaries have held sewing meetings every fortnight. The children of our Mission Bands have been very industrious;

patching many warm quilts; dressing dolls, etc. One Band celebrated the date of organization by a "Birthday Party," each member bringing a present for the North-West bale. The *Letter Leaflet* is invaluable, and many are taken by members of our congregations who enjoy the letters and other information it contains. We note that while some of our Auxiliaries in their contributions are in advance of last year; others have fallen off. The former fact is indeed cheering, and the latter not unexpected in view of the great financial depression particularly felt in this section.

It will be observed that the amount sent to the Treasurer is considerably less than the sum contributed. This arises from the following:—That several accounts for the year 1894 were unavoidably left over, and were paid this year; also that as our year closed with December, the freight paid on North-West bale had to be deducted, but is now in the hands of our Treasurer, and is much larger than formerly. We look forward with expectations of better things in the year upon which we are now entering; earnestly praying the Giver of all good to send us a bountiful harvest, so that our work may be a more fitting index of our love, and of our desire to obey His Command.

STRATFORD.

Miss Hamilton.

The work of 1895 has been steady, faithful and encouraging on the whole; no advance in some departments of the work, but in others a steady gain. We are sorry to note that the contributions are less and the members fewer than last year in many of the Auxiliaries, but the Mission Bands have been doing better work, and all are hopeful that another year will bring new strength and added interest to each.

The average attendance at meetings is larger than ever in many Auxiliaries and Mission Bands, and the interest in the work is deepening. Special study of the Bible, also of the Mission fields with which our Church is connected; reading of missionary letters, papers, etc., form the chief features of the meetings; this and the distribution of missionary literature among the people will in time bear fruit. 367 copies of the *Letter Leaflet* were taken by Auxiliaries and Mission Bands this year. Thanks-giving meeting are held by nearly all Auxiliaries.

Voluntary giving is almost universal. There are several Scattered Helpers, who, not able to attend the meetings, take considerable interest in the work.

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Clothing, new and old was liberally supplied for the Indians on Rolling River Reserve, 1,200 lbs. Also a sewing machine for the wife of the missionary. The Mission Bands did a good deal of work for the North-West this year, making quilts, dressing dolls, etc. We missed, through ill health, the cheerful and encouraging ministrations of our President, Mrs. Hossack, but hope soon to have her among us again. Our Father's loving hand has guided and strengthened us during the year, we will take fresh courage and face the duties and responsibilities of another year, our hearts filled with thankfulness for His mercies and gladness for the privilege we have in doing this work.

TORONTO.

Miss George.

The Toronto Presbyterial Society formed in 1885, now completes its eleventh year. It includes eighty-eight Societies, fifty-seven Auxiliaries, and thirty-two Mission Bands.

Four Auxiliaries and four Mission Bands have been organized during the year.

Two Mission Bands have disbanded, but with the exception of one Auxiliary, and a few of the Bands, all the Societies appear to be in good working order.

Most of the reports received are very encouraging, and two mention the past year as the best they have yet experienced.

Loss of officers and members by death and removal, and in some cases the difficulty of getting anyone to fill the vacant places, are given as reasons for the falling behind in membership and offerings.

There is a slight increase in average attendance, and about 100 in membership. We note, that eight Auxiliaries and twenty-four Bands do not report any members in the General Society.

According to the constitution, the President of either a Young Woman's or a Juvenile Band must be a member of the General Society, and it thus appears that twenty-four Bands in the Toronto Presbyterial Society have no right to send a representative to vote at the Annual Meeting of the Board. Twenty-five of the Bands are Juvenile Bands. We are sorry to report a falling behind in our offerings, which are about \$200 short of last year.

The contributions for the North-West have been most generous, larger and better than ever before. The Supply Committee received 3,600 pounds of clothing, and \$185.46. Two additional Scattered Helpers are reported.

The "Mutual Help," an organization belong to Central Church, Toronto, gave (as they have done for several years), a

valuable donation for the North-West ; and the Juvenile Band of St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, which works for Home and Foreign, sent an offering through the Auxiliary of their Church.

The subscribers to the *Letter Leaflet* now number 2,192, an increase of 117 over last year.

Miss Sinclair gave three addresses in the Toronto Presbytery, all of which were felt to be most helpful and stimulating ; and it is to be hoped the earnest words she spoke will be remembered, and bear fruit in increased devotion to the work, for which as a Society we are banded together.

WHITBY.

Miss C. Thomson.

The record of our work throughout the Presbytery during the past year is on the whole encouraging. Though the statistics received are very imperfect, there is reason to believe that our Auxiliary membership is about the same as for 1894, while the Mission Band membership is slightly increased.

Many of the Societies report much interest in the meetings, and in the missionary intelligence received.

332 copies of the *Letter Leaflet* are subscribed for and are instrumental in sustaining interest in the work, which was greatly increased by able addresses from Miss McWilliams and Mrs. McAuley, the former of whom visited thirteen Auxiliaries and Mission Bands, and the latter two—as well as by the untiring energy and devoted work of our Presbyterial President, who, to our deep regret, is now, for the time, laid aside by illness.

To this large increase in our clothing contribution is probably to be attributed the slight decrease in the money sent to our General Treasurer.

One Mission Band, the "Busy Bees," of Ashburn, has been re-organized, which is especially gratifying from its being connected with one of the few Auxiliaries which, from local causes, report discouragement.

From one Auxiliary we have no report, and in answer to enquiries its Secretary states circumstances which are very discouraging. In the hope that these may improve, its standing as an Auxiliary is continued and the old officers are reported. We trust that the close of the present year may find it more favorably situated.

We would also remember that while outward and visible success is very desirable, the *one thing* for which the Master will

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hold us accountable is our personal faithfulness. This He has a right to expect from each of us, and will accept, whether there are visible results or not. If, however, during the coming year, we will in each Society do our work and make our offerings as unto the Master himself, we may confidently anticipate that at the next annual meeting our Treasurer's book will show—not even a *small* decrease for 1896.

WINNIPEG.

Mrs. A. D. Mackay.

We are sorry not to be able to report a greater degree of progress. We have now fourteen Auxiliaries and six Mission Bands, a decrease of one Auxiliary and an increase of two Mission Bands. The membership shows a slight increase, the contribution is also larger than that of last year. Some Auxiliaries have lost highly prized officers through sickness and removals, but in most cases are finding others to take their places. Only one death was reported during the year, that of the faithful Treasurer of Sunnyside Auxiliary, Mrs. Smith. The reports from most of the Auxiliaries and Mission Bands are very encouraging, manifesting deeper interest than ever before. Bible study is a prominent feature in Auxiliary and Mission Band meetings. All report the reading of original papers and selected articles bearing on missionary topics. Several Auxiliaries have sent to the Literature Secretary, copies of papers prepared by the members, to be passed on to other Auxiliaries. One or two Auxiliaries take charge of the weekly prayer meeting of the congregation, once a quarter, and provide a missionary programme. The *Letter Leaflet* is received by all Auxiliaries, the total number received and distributed throughout this Presbyterial is 438. Two of our Auxiliaries are in deep waters at present and find it difficult to hold on their way, but we trust brighter days will come to both, and that speedily.

One very encouraging feature in connection with our Mission Band workers, is the interest they take in the Indians of our own Province and the Territories, all working to provide quilts and other useful articles for these poor people. One Band sent a magic lantern to be used amongst the schools in the North-West. Last summer we had the pleasure of an address from Rev. J. Frazer Campbell, who told of the work the W.F.M.S. is doing among the women of India and the beneficent results. In October Miss McWilliams passed through Winnipeg, but unfortunately the date of her arrival was not known in time to

arrange a general meeting ; however, a goodly number gathered and were greatly benefited by her address.

May the Holy Spirit show us our responsibility and enable us to attempt greater things for His name's sake.

AUXILIARIES AND BANDS NOT IN PRESBYTERIAL ORDER.

Home Secretary.

Our isolated branches number the same as in the previous year, ten Auxiliaries and two Mission Bands. Their reports are full and most of them very encouraging. In a few instances difficulties were met with which were almost insurmountable, but not one branch has failed to give some tangible evidence of interest in the work of our Society. One Auxiliary reports its meetings as having been "more interesting and profitable than ever before and more real interest exhibited by its members." Lethbridge Auxiliary started a Sabbath school class for Chinese. Seven members were in regular attendance during the year and they gave collections to the amount of \$65. This sum was forwarded to our Treasurer with the request that it be devoted to mission work in China.

The Purab ka Tara Auxiliary reports a change. In former years it was a union of our lady missionaries in Indore and native Christian women. In the past year the latter have carried on the meetings by themselves. They held eleven meetings which are reported to have been full of interest. After the usual opening exercises and reading of reports, each member repeated a Bible verse, items of missionary intelligence were given and each month two members gave short papers on different mission fields. For the past few months a short time was taken up at each meeting with a lesson on China, one of the members, Annabai, having translated into Hindi the leaflets prepared by the Secretary of the F.M.C. Their contribution is less than in former years, but the Secretary explained that "it was not that their hearts had grown careless or their love cold, but that in former years Mem Sahib and the Miss Sahibs had given much more than the native members." It is most cheering to note the progress made by these native Christian women in Indore, and by the Indian women of the Beulah Auxiliary in our own North-West. The latter have reported through the Brandon Presbyterial Society, but we feel that it is in place in this connection to cite a few facts concerning them. Their work in the past year has been very encouraging. They report increased membership, faithful work and their contribution nearly

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double that of the previous year. Christian life is manifested by them in their homes and in their dealings with those about them. In addition to their giving to the funds of our Society they have contributed to the support and comfort of a sick orphan boy, and in other ways have shown that the love of Christ was constraining them to loving service. Such fruit in the lives of those who a few years ago were in heathen darkness is surely encouragement to us all to press on still more earnestly in our endeavor to spread the precious Gospel that can so transform the lives of those who receive it.
