Canadians Reported To Be Now In The Fighting on The Somme

Terrible Losses Have Led to Bringing up New Formations on Both Sides; Soldiers From Canada Said to Have Been in Friday's Attack

London, Aug. 18-(Toronto Mail and Empire))-The terrible losses incurred in the Somme fighting have led both sides to bring ap new formations, according to despatches reaching here today. It is reported that the Canadians, recently transferred from the Ypres front, took a large part in today's attack, together with the Australians and New Zealand corps.

The Berlin statement today reports the arrival of several new British divisions, while a semi-official communication issued in Paris that the Germans have been obliged to call up twenty-two new Rivisions to the Somme. These troops, it is said, have been with-Brawn from other parts of the western front. Three of the German livisions on the Somme have been badly smashed up, it is asserted. and withdrawn, while six others, after a rest, have been recruited to strength and sent to hold weak sections of the line.



Italian Steamship Sunk

The humble lemon pip, of which great quantities are every year accumulated by Australian lemon-squash manufacturers, appears likely to earn respect as an article of commercial value. The Federal Analyst has recently furnished a report to the effect that the dried pips contain a large proportion of oil. 



THE LUMBER MARKET

(Halifax Chronicle) Since our last report there has been a decided decline in prices on the British market. The price now quoted is £19.10 per standard, whereas it was before from £20 to £22 for spruce. Local lumber dealers say that stocks are not very heavy on the other side. It is simply a question of supply and demand. One shipper tells us that of late the British government has been importing a large quantity of timber on its own account and, instead of using it all immediately, as heretofore, has been selling quantities to munitions factories, thus breaking into the channels of trade of the ordinary individual timber dealers. The government also has departed from its custom and stored large quantities of lumber, this being the first time the government has done so since the war began.

Freights have further declined and, as shipments are still going from this province at the high freight rates contracted for before the recent slurry in the freight market, local shippers are not always over-pleased with the situation. One explanation of the decline in freights is that after the battle of Horn Reef, when the German high sea fleet was sent yelping back to Kiel for repairs, nearly two hundred stemers which had been held up in the Baltic for a long time made a safe getaway, being light and coasting along within the three mile limit. The latest quotation on freights from Halifax to England for lumber is 200 shillings a standard.

The American market for Nova Scotian laths is weak but for lumber is better. Freight rates still rule high so that the net rate for our shippers is not any fancy price.

The West Indies and Cuba markets are keeping very active for spruce and pine and pine boards. Freights are ruling very high. One shipper paid as high as \$15.15 a thousanc for a charter to Trinidad.



One of the physicians who writes expert dietary information for the newspapers announces that raisins are real food and not a luxury. So we shall have to readjust all our notions of this commodity. The conception of the raisin as a luxury is one of the earliest intellectual ideas we absorb, and apparently Mother Goose is responsible for this widespread error.

Even an adult mind would be led astray by the episode of Little Jack Horner. The description of his quiet encounter in a corner with a Christmas pic, and how he put in his thumb and pulled out a plum, is rich with a psychological effect of luxury. Everyone understands, of course, that the "plum" referred to is more commonly known as a raisin. It is the luxurious trimmings of any edible article that a child picks off or pulls out with fastidious discrimination and devours first.

Jack pulled out the plum, or raisin, just as he would have picked the frosting off a bit of cake, as the average child invariably does when left to himself, and always with gratification to his sense of luxury. The notion acquired in infancy is likely to persist in later years so far as raisins are concerned. Persons who are especially fond of raisms undoubtedly think of them as a luxury, and the thought of them as a luxury would seem important "food" merely would seem important "

wanted. Apply Moral seem important "food" merely would seem important "food" merely to deprive them of much of the real distinction that has always been attached to them. If this change in the common mental attitude is possible it may reduce raising to the level of prunes in popular esteem. No-body thinks of prunca sa a luxury, and what most people do think of prunes is really unjust. They are among the things that are "good for us" and these things are seldom regarded with genuine affection. And the advantage of the sugar in the raisin is that it is almost immediately digested, assimilated and transformed into energy.



Cards for All Foodstuffs

Another letter, dated April 60, written by a resident of Stuttgart, told of the high cost of food in that city and the scarcity of meat. It read in part:

"Everything with us here is so horribly dear. So your food has been reduced, too? Ours is getting less every day. Now we have cards for bread, cards for flour scarcely sufficient, butter cards allowing three-quarters of a pound per head per month, meat cards, 160 ig rams per day. It is impossible to obtain a gram of meat or sausage without a card, not even in the inns; besides that every week there are two meatless days when bne can procure nothing; all the butcher shops are closed on these days.

"For sugar and all other foods there is a special book to be procured from the municipality; every tradesman is bound to write in it what you buy in order that you may not procure more than you have a legal right to. The best coffee is three marks the pound, chocolate is five and six marks, eggs are thirty pfennigs apiece, and from what they say they will be dearer still."

BRITISH AND FRENCH

Assaults by British and French forces against the German posi-tions north of the Somme in France tions north of the Somme in France have resulted in the gaining of additional ground by the attackers.

The French advance was in and around Maurepas, the scene of much hard fighting during the past few weeks, and the British gåin was in the direction of Ginchy and Guillemont, near the southern end of their section of the Somme front. The Anglo-French attacks, London says, took place along the whole line from Pozieres to the Somme.

The gains reported by Paris and London were in the center of the German positions on the Somme front, and mark another step in the Anglo-French advance toward Combles. French troops gained more ground in the village of Maurepas, following the stopping of

the Somme, but says all of them were repulsed, except one, by the British in the section of Martinpuich. A French gain around Fleury, in the Verdun is admitted.

There is little activity on the eastern front, according to the official reports. Most of the fighting has been in the Carpathian mountain region, where both the Russians and Austro-Germans claim to have made some slight advances. Petrograd says the Austro-Germans are attacking in Galicia, but with no success.

The Teutonic Allies have taken the offensive on the Greco-Serbian frontier, north of Saloniki and Berlin reports the capture of the Greek town of Florina from Serbian troops, according to Berlin. This movement probably is in answer to the recent Entente Allied activity on the same front.

Artillery bombardments are taking place on the Austro-Italian front around Gorizia. Rome claims an advance for the Italians in the Trentino.
