London, Aug. 18.— August 15, 1925, is the date finally agreed upon for the evacuation

of the Ruhr. The French and Belgians also agree to evacuate all other towns and points outside of the Ruhr which are not in the district they are occupying under the Treaty

The programme for launching the Dawes reparation plan, initialed by the delegates to the international conference which closed here Saturday, now goes before the French Parliament and the German Reichstag for ratification. Prospects are favorable for its adoption by both bodies, according to despatches from the two capitals.

Nationalists Oppose. The Nationalists in Germany, as was expected, are leading the opposition to the programme, but it is declared they will scarcely go so far as to adopt a parliamentary attitude which would result in a defeat of the government,

Ras Taffari Will be Placed on the Carpet Next

Geneva, Aug. 18—(United Press)—
The fifth assembly of the League of Nations which has been summoned for Sept. 1, will be called upon to endeavor to settle the problem of slavery in virtually the only rémaining civilized country in which it is known to exist.

The problem is all the more ticklish for the League, owing to the fact that Abyssinia is not only a member of the League, but she was admitted upon condition that she end at once the traffic of human beings in her territory.

As a matter of fact, France, England and Italy are all maintaining, at their own expense, topedo boats off the coast of Abyssinia for the purpose of running down the boats on the Red Sea that endeavor to smuggle the slaves from Abyssinia across to Asia Minor where they are sold into the service of wealthy patrons.

While the League has addressed inquiries to virtually every government in the world on the subject.




