TELL TRAVELERS OF

Points to Large Influx at Border in Advocating Plan.

A proposal to open a bureau at St. Stephen to provide information concerning the Maritime Provinces to tourists coming from the United States is made by E. G. Beer, of St. Stephen, who is touring the provinces in an effort to have public bodies and the Governments of the three provinces interested in the scheme.

In view of the heavy travel of

In view of the heavy travel of United States tourists in the three provinces, Mr. Beer believes that there should be some means of providing them with information concerning the places of interest. He sugests that premises in St. Stephen just inside the Canadian boundary be secured and opened so that literature could be distributed and tourists informed of roads, hotels and other objects of interest.

NUMBERS INCREASE.

The numbers of tourists entering Canada through St. Stephen have increased steadily. The number of tourist cars entering through the Customs there in several years was as follows: 1918, 343; 1922, 2,044; 1923, 3,363; 1924, 5,128. With the increase continuing at this rate the cars to come from the United States during 1925 would number 7,000.

During the last year literature concerning Prince Edward Island was distributed from the Customs House in St. Stephen, but so many requests have been received this year that the NUMBERS INCREASE. have been received this year that the Customs officials find they cannot handle the work suggested and they are supporting the scheme to open a proper information bureau a proper information bureau.
