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THE CITY OF HALIFAX.

PRELIMINARY.

FROM the date of the Treaty of Utrecht, 17- to 1748, by one of the stipulations of which ACADIA was ceded to England, little or no progress had been made in the settlement of that part of it now known as Nova-Scotia. Indeed, from the unaccountable neglect and ind.fference manifested by the Government of England towards the Colony, a very natural inference drawn by the French was, that England must be ignorant of the real value of her newly-acquired possession, and that it might be regained viet armis, or by the frequently superior force of clever diplomacy. Accordingly, as a first move in the game, they boldly asserted that Acadia was the name of the Peninsula only, and that the residue of the territory lying between New England and the Bay of Fundy was still a possession of the Crown of France. The people of Massachusetts, naturally regarding this unexpected claim with great alarm, at once invited the prompt attention of the British Government to the disastrous results which its admission must produce, alike to the safety and tranquility of the North American Colonies.

This earnest remonstrance had the desired effect. A plan for "confirming and extending the dominion of the Crown of England in Acadia, by constituting communities, diffusing the benefits of population, and improving the fisheries on the coast," was submitted to the Earl of Halifax, then President of the "Board of Trade and Plantations," and, being at once approved of by that sagacious statesman, was adopted with ardour by the Government, who resolved to carry the scheme into immediate operation. Commissioners were appointed

with instructions to advertise that "encouragement would be given to all officers and private soldiers of the army (several thousand men of which had been then but recently disbanded,) to settle in Nova Scotia,"—which invitation was at once responded to and accepted by 3,760 persons, who with their families were entered for embarkation, Parliament having previously provided the munificent sum of £40,000 stg. to defray the expenses of their removal.

THE EXPEDITION.

The fleet set sail early in May, and cast anchor in Chebucto Harbor in the latter part of June, 1749. To the eye of one, thus suddenly transported from a land populous and highly cultivated,—the very centre of advanced civilization,—the scene which presented itself, as the fleet moved slowly before a gentle summer breeze, must have been truly delightful as well as novel. On either side of a magnificent sheet of water, unruffled as the bosom of an expansive lake, the primeval forest clothed the gently sloping hills to the very water's-edge, with the dark, rich verdure of the spruce and the fir, interspersed with the lighter and more brilliant greens of the larch, the maple and the beech, whose umbrageous limbs concealed the huge masses of granite scattered over the soil, and doomed to disappoint the hopes and defeat the labours of the inexperienced immigrant.

A SITE SELECTED.

The spot at first selected for the foundation of the Town being deemed on closer inspection not suitable, the Governor,—the Hon. Edward Cornwallis,—ultimately gave the preference to that upon which the City—Halifax, (so named in honor of the nobleman who had the greatest share in founding the Colony)—now stands. Immediate preparations were made for the disembarkation of the settlers and troops; but previously to their being landed, the Governor proceeded to organize a Civil Government, nominating and appointing under the authority of his Instructions six Members of His Majesty's Council for the Province of Nova Scotia.

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HALIFAX IN THE AUTUMN OF 1749.

In the Autumn of the year,—early in October,—the settlers found themselves housed rather snugly, having used great exertion to complete a sufficient number of wooden huts and houses, capable of protecting them from the inclement weather of approaching winter,—together with capacious warehouses for the reception of the mass of stores and provisions upon which they depended for subsistence for at least three-fourths of a year. At this time there were assembled within the palisade enclosing the settlement, inclusive of soldiers, nearly five thousand souls.

CHEBUCTO, OR HALIFAX, HARBOR.

CHEBUCTO HARBOR lies about midway between the Eastern and Western extremes of the Atlantic sea-board of Nova-Scotia proper, viz., between Cape Canseau and Cape Sable, and appears to have been selected as a seat for the new colony in preference to several other ports nearly as capacious, and in the neighborhood of which the soil is infinitely superior, for the reasons of its supposed nearer proximity to the great fishing-grounds, and the facilities afforded by the configuration of the surrounding country for the erection of strong fortifications. Halifax Harbor, admitted to be one of the finest in the world, is entered from the South, and, reckoning from Sambro Island, upon which stands a light-house, extends northward nearly sixteen miles, terminating in a magnificent sheet of water-Bedford basin, (known to the French as the inner harbor,) upon whose bosom,-sheltered from all winds, and navigable throughout, a thousand vessels might ride in perfect security, be the weather ever so tempestuous .-Strictly speaking, the harbor has two entrances, formed by McNab's Island, and known respectively as the Eastern and Western passage. The former, narrow and obstructed by a sand-bar, is open to small vessels only. The latter is broad, with water, in the main channel, sufficiently deep to float vessels of the largest size. (The Leviathan might venture through it without risk.) Opposite the southern entrance of the City is George's Island, which, being regularly portified,

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forms one of the chief defences of the place. On the summit of a hill over two hundred and fifty feet above the level of the sea stands the citadel, a fortress of great strength, overlooking the harbor and City, and commanding the country for many miles around. Experienced Engineers say that its elevation is too great to admit of ships' guns, of calibre however large, making any serious impression upon its massive walls.

MELVILLE ISLAND, ETC.

In the centre of a little cove, on the Western side of the Northwest Arm by which the Southern and Southwestern suburbs of the City are bounded, is Melville Island. During the continuance of the long war with France, and the more brief struggle with the United States in 1812, this little islet was selected and appropriated by the British Government as the gloomy abode of unfortunate prisoners of war. On a somewhat elevated slope to the Southward we trace the burial ground attached to the establishment, at the present shrouded in a thick growth of stunted trees. Among the very few natural curiosities,—freaks of nature,—visible in the neighborhood of the Peninsula, about five miles from the head of the Arm, is a huge piece of granite, resting upon a strata of the same, that rises to the surface of the ground, and moveable upon a pivot of 12 × 6 in., and undulating from E.N.E. to W.S.W. Its estimated weight is one hundred and sixty-two tons.

THE CITY AND SUBURBS.

THE CITY and its suburbs, north and south, extend ever two miles, but in width barely reach, at any point, an half-mile. On the original plan there were eight streets, of which two only reach the Southern, and three the Northern extremity of the town. These were intersected by fifteen others. From time to time within the last twenty years many more have been opened by private enterprise, in the division, sub-division and sale of lands lying outside the town. The system, if we may so properly term it, progresses not rapidly but

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steadily, nor is the time very far removed when one looking down from the Citadel over the plain and slopes to the West and North, will find his eye resting not, as now, upon broad green fields, dotted here and there sparsely with cottages and farm-houses, but upon the most beautiful sections of a compactly-built City, which, from the geographical position assigned to it by nature, and the concurrence of inevitable events in the march of commerce, will have then grown to be great, populous, and wealthy. The growth of Halifax has been so far slow. We read that so early as 1760, eleven years after the first tree was felled upon the hill-side to open a spot for the habitation of civilized man, "the three towns, Halifax, Irish-town (South suburbs) and Dutch-town, or Gottingen (North suburbs), contained about one thousand houses." At first this statement reads something very like exaggeration, and would be wholly incredible; and can only be reconciled with probability on the supposition that in the number so stated were included many huts to serve as temporary barracks for the soldiers, and quarters for the officers of the army and employees of the Government. In point of fact, such must have been the case, seeing that the "settlers" did not exceed three thousand souls in Haliburton, in his History of Nova Scotia, quotes from a letter addressed at that time by an inhabitant of Halifax to a friend in Boston, the following curious passage: "Halifax is now divided into three towns, Haiifax, Irish-town (South suburbs), and Dutchtown (North suburbs). The whole may contain about 1000 houses, great and small. * * * The inhabitants may be about 3000, one third of which are Irish, and many of them Roman Catholics, about one fourth Germans and Dutch, the most industrious and useful settlers amongst us, and the rest English, with a very small number of Scotch. We have upwards of 100 licensed houses, and perhaps as many more which retail spirituous liquors without license, so that the business of one-half of the town is to sell rum, and the other half to drink it." In 1790, the population did not exceed 4,000, twentyseven years later it had increased over 14,000, from which date (1817) in an interval of forty-two years, up to the present time, it is very

problematical whether it has reached a sedentary population of twenty-five thousand souls.

PUBLIC BUILDINGS.

Government House.—This edifice, constructed of dark brown free-stone, not too highly polished, occupies a site towards the South end of the City. Its exterior, calculated to impress one with a notion of solidity, and, what an Englishman usually values more, of comfort, conveys no impression of architectural beauty; nevertheless, taking into account the small pecuniary means of the Province at the time its erection was undertaken, the wonder of the stranger is that a building so commodious and every way so respectable, should have been ventured upon at all. The handsome furniture with which its halls and chambers are well filled, is supplied at the public expense.

The Province Building,—one of the handsomest edifices in British North America,—is composed of the same material as Government House. It stands on a square (the larger part of the area of which it covers,) in the very heart of the City, enclosed by a handsome railing of iron, and nearly embosomed in the luxuriant foliage of lofty spreading trees; and having a tastefully, though elaborately, ornamented frontage on two of the principal streets of the City. Its dimensions are as follow: Length, 140 ft.; width, 70 ft.; height, 42 ft. Within its walls are all the various Provincial Offices, the Halls of the Legislative Council and Assembly, and apartments for the temporary accommodation of the Supreme Court of Judicature.

Dalhousie College, constructed of free-stone, occupies the entire Northern extremity of the Grand Parade, the Eastern end of the basement story being appropriated to the use of the Post Office Department. Viewed from the North, it is a dingy, unsightly edifice—its face towards the South is rather handsome. With a liberality worthy of all praise, the Governors of the College have long permitted the Halifax Mechanic's Institute to use a portion of the second story of the building for the purposes of that valuable Institution,—or, rather, Institution which might be made valuable were it

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as generally patronized as it is calculated to be extensively useful. Connected with the Institute is a small but valuable Museum, in which is deposited a tooth and one of the thigh-bones of a Mastodon, found, we believe, by an Indian in a small shallow stream emptying into the waters of the Bras d'Or Lake, in the Island of Cape Breton.

BRIDEWELL.—This ricketty old wooden building barely calls for a passing notice. It has long since failed to be a place of confinement within which to incarcerate, even for a week, a criminal convicted of the most venial crime. Consequently, the City authorities have recently made provision for the erection of a CITY PRISON, upon a rather bleak, but on the whole judiciously selected plot of ground, the property of the City.

County and City Court House.—It might puzzle one, rather, to fancy the reason why the forefathers of the City chose the spot upon which stands this substantially-built and certainly not very uncomely structure, as a site for a public building. The Court House is built of brick, the material of which must have been superior, seeing that the wear and tear of many winter-storms have made but little impression upon its originally smooth and clear-faced exterior. Within are accommodations for the County Court, Offices for the Mayor, also for the City Clerk, City Marshal, and others, subordinates of the City Government. Close by, only a biscuit's throw to the South, is

THE CITY MARKET, a brick building, as some say, not very well planned (having due regard to the convenience of the public), but so arranged in other respects as to meet expectations indulged in by the City fathers as to the revenue likely to accrue from the venture. Some folk think that it would be an improvement were provision made for protecting the mass of market-women and their "wares" from the nuisance of filthy quadrupeds, and not very unfrequent visitations by pelting storms.

TEMPERANCE HALL is a handsome wooden structure: (we are not in a position to supply its measurements with any exactitude). Its

erection has proved a great accommodation to the public. It is to be regretted that a building which, elsewhere located, is calculated to be an ornament to the City, should be retired into a dark corner of an obscure lane.

Sothern's Lyceum is quite a gem in its way, built entirely of wood, but very nicely ornamented both inside and out. It is situate near the corner of Queen-street and Spring Garden Road, and although at some distance from the chief part of the City, is rendered quite a place of resort in the Summer and Winter evenings by the very excellent theatrical performances that without regard to expense, Mr. Sothern produces.

COMMERCIAL.

The very geographical position of Halifax, apart from other considerations, sufficiently indicates it as destined, in the short future, to become the great commercial mart of British North America. We have not, just now, very much to boast of in this respect; but then, the Halifax merchant has been, ever, proverbially "slow but sure." So surely does he ordinarily move, that a failure,—a bankruptcy,—of any magnitude, has so far been an event of very rare occurrence. Amid a crash which, but as yesterday, reduced to powder many a colossal firm on both sides the wide sea, the commercial fabric of our little city,—comparatively small and, as might be fancied, feeble,—stood the shock bravely, only vibrating upon its broad foundations.

MERCHANT'S EXCHANGE READING ROOM.—The conveniences accruing to the Commercial community from the foundation and present judicious management of this Institution, we have some fear, are not sufficiently appreciated by the class of citizens most interested. The very comfortable "lounge" which, in a Reading Room, is here provided for gentlemen who would "kill time" and ennui, might insure the institution a more lucrative patronage; but the true value of this establishment lies in this,—it forms a common centre, towards which all the rays of commercial intelligence, foreign and home, shed upon our City will naturally tend. It is a place where

"Merchants most should congregate"

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Halifax has no connection with the interior of the country, East or West, by means of a navigable river, considering which, its hitherto tardy growth ought not to excite astonishment. The opening to the Americans of the carrying trade to the British West Indies, previous to which impolitic arrangement fish and lumber, the two staple exports of the Province, were admissible for entry at the Ports in these Colonies only when transported thither in British bottoms:-the creation of a number of Free Ports within the Province, together with the "Reciprocity Treaty" with the United States, are among the chief causes which have operated adversely to the expansion of Halifax, considered as a commercial City. Whether the Provincial Railway, now open for traffic forty-five miles Westward, and which will shortly be extended some greater distance towards the East, will serve to counteract these influences remains to be seen. four years ago a company, organized for the purpose, with the approval of the Local Government, and supported by a grant of Public money voted by the Legislature, to the extent of £15,000, commenced operations upon a canal, by which it was proposed to connect the Harbor of Halifax with the waters of the Bay of Minas. Unfortunately for all parties connected in this work but a very small part of it was completed, or rather approaching completion, when a sum exceeding in amount the estimated cost of the whole operation having been expended, (the Company being still in debt to the Province and to capitalists, both at home and abroad,) the undertaking was abandoned, as was thought at the time, finally. Within the past few years operations have been renewed by another Company, upon a scale less imposing, but, competent Engineers say, infinitely more practicable; and the hope is that before the close of the season in 1858 the canal will be open for traffic, without fear of opposing mudbanks, and other unforseen obstacles. The Stock of the Company, at the present time, is not a favorite with City capitalists.

THE LUNATIC ASYLUM.

The above-named building stands upon a beautifully situated and judiciously selected spot of ground on the Eastern side of the harbor, very nearly facing the centre of the City. It is built of brick, and, we may infer from the very handsome exterior of the centre and one wing now completed, will, when finished, present a rather imposing exterior. The grounds attached to it are extensive. The opening of this establishment for the reception of patients will be truly a blessing to the Province at large. The number of Lunatics at present confined in the cells of the Poor Asylum, is yearly on the increase. It is understood that the treatment to which they are subjected is as humane as the circumstances will permit, but that is all.

PROVINCIAL PENITENTIARY.

This pile of rough ashlar, only remarkable for its ugliness, is situated on the borders of the Northwest Arm. The surrounding grounds are being fast brought into a state of high cultivation by means of convict labor, and will, in a few years be a source of considerable revenue for the support of the institution.

Opposite to Halifax, on the Eastern shore of the harbor, is the town of Dartmouth,—if we mistake not, covering the spot first pitched upon by Colone. Cornwallis as a site for the Capital of the Province. It was "laid out" and first settled in the Spring of 1750. Six years afterwards, a body of Indians from the Basin of Minas surprised the infant settlement by night, and carried away captive the few inhabitants whose lives they had spared. From this date up to so late as 1784 the settlement was abandoned, or nearly so; but in that year a number of families were, at the invitation of the then Governor of the Province, induced to remove thither from Nantucket, their object being to carry on the whale-fishery in the South Seas. The plan of the town was then somewhat altered, and the inhabitants

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were assisted in the erection of buildings by a grant of £1500, appropriated by the Government for that purpose. Eight years afterward, owing to the failure of a mercantile firm in Halifax, the flattering expectations entertained as to the success of the whale-fishery were wholly blighted, and an agent employed by merchants in Milford in England having invited the Nantucket whalers to remove thither, the offer was accepted, and the Province lost a body of industrious and orderly people.

The town is prettily situated on a slope, and is connected with the City by two Ferry-boats, which run continually. There is quite a number of Factories, &c., in Dartmouth, a list of which will be found in another part of the Directory.

HACKNEY CARRIAGES.

[EXTRACT FROM AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY, PASSED JULY 7, 1851.]

12. Any person or persons having a license in full force, who shall stand his carriage in any other than its appointed place or manner,or not have it properly numbered,-or any driver, or person in charge of a licensed carriage, who shall not produce the tables of fares and distances when thereto required, or who being upon his stand disengaged, shall refuse to convey any person seeking to employ him,-or who shall in any way violate this Ordinance, shall for each offence, beside being liable to have his license revoked, forfeit and pay such a fine as under and by virtue of this Ordinance may be adjudged against him. And the owner or driver of any such carriage who shall demand or extort from any person or persons a sum beyond the rate of fare herein established, or hereafter to be established, may be so fined, and shall forthwith forfeit the license for such carriage, and be liable to refund to the party grieved the sum so extorted, with costs of prosecution.—Livery stable keepers, not occupying the stands of said City, are exempt from this Ordinance; further than that they are hereby required to obtain a license for each carriage they shall use to convey persons for hire, within the limits of the City; which license shall continue in force and be renewed as aforesaid, and the carriage shall be numbered and have the letter L, besides its number, painted or

TRUCKMEN'S REGULATIONS.

[EXTRACT FROM AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY, PASSED JULY 7, 1851.]

8. If any Licensed Truckman, being on his stand, shall refuse or neglect to cart, truck, or employ his horse and cart, truck or sled, within the said City of Halifax, for any person when requested, he shall for each offence, forfeit and pay the sum of ten shillings.

POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT.

RATES, AND TIMES OF CLOSING MAILS, &c.

The Mails for the United Kingdom are closed finally at Halifax every alternate Thursday evening at 8 o'clock. Letters, &c., for England, which may be dropped into the box after the hour of closing and up to to the arrival of the Packet, will be forwarded in a bag, loose—but such letters cannot be prepaid, either in money or stamps. The Royal Mail Steamers leave Boston for Halifax and Liverpool, G. B., every alternate Wednesday; arrive at Halifax on Thursday evening or very early the succeeding morning, leaving Halifax immediately after receiving the Mails. Letters to or from England 7½d., prepayment optional; can be prepaid by using a 6d. or two 3d. Stamps, together with half of a threepenny stamp cut diagonally. Newspa-

pers free.

The charge on all books posted in Nova-Scotia for Great Britain, or vice-versa, is as follows: For a packet not exceeding 4 oz., 4d.; 4 oz., and not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ lb, $7\frac{1}{2}$ d.; $\frac{1}{2}$ lb, and not exceeding 1 lb, 1s. 3d.; 1 lb, and not exceeding $1\frac{1}{2}$ lb, 1s. $10\frac{1}{2}$ d.; $1\frac{1}{2}$ lb, and not exceeding 2 lb, 2s. 6d.; and so on, increasing 74d. for every additional 1 lb, or fraction of a 1 lb. Printed or lithographed letters addressed to any part of the United Kingdom, can be sent like other printed matter as follows: For a single letter or packet of letters, open at the sides or ends, not exceeding 4 oz., 4d., and so on, according to the scale above for charging books. One book package may contain separate Books, Publications, Almanacks, and Maps and Paper, Parchment or Vellum; the latter three materials may be written or printed on—the package may contain the name and address of the sender. Rollers may accompany prints and maps, and markers may be sent No letter must be sent with or written on a book package, and no such package must exceed two feet in length, width or The postage must in all cases be prepaid by stamps.

Closed Mails for the United Kingdom via United States are made up at Halifax to meet the Steamers leaving New York for Liverpool. Letters to be specially addressed, "via New York." Letters 10d.:

Newspapers 1d. each.

The Mails for the United States via Boston, per Royal Mail Steamers are made up on Tuesday evening of the week in which the Packet from England is due, at 8 o'clock. Should the Steamer not arrive by 6 o'clock the following morning, supplementary Mails will be made up. Should the Steamer from Liverpool arrive previous to Tuesday night—the Mails as heretofore will close immediately on her arrival.

The Mails for Bermuda and the West Indies are made up finally at Halifax on the Thursday evening of the week in which the Royal Mail Steamer is expected to arrive from Boston, at 8 o'clock. Letters 5d.—when posted in the interior, 3d. additional, which must be prepaid. Newspapers 1½d. each, which must be paid by stamp.

Letters are forwarded via Bermuda for Chagres and the Pacific, Chili and Peru, Havana, Honduras, Laguyra, Mexico, Venezuela, and the British and Foreign West India Islands. Postage to Foreign West Indies, 5d. when posted at Halifax; 3d. additional when posted in the interior—must be prepaid. Newspapers 1½d. each, to be pre-

paid by stamp at the time of Posting.

The Mails for Newfoundland (and Cape Breton, during the Summer months,) are made up at Halifax once a month during the months of December, January, February and March; and once a fortnight during the months of April, May, June, July, August, September, October and November, closing finally on the Thursday evening of the week in which the R.M. Steamer is expected to arrive from Boston. Postage 5d.; when posted in the interior 3d. additional. Newspapers 11d. each, which must be paid by stamp at the time of posting.

The Mails for St. Pierre and Miquelon are forwarded to Sydney, C.B., from whence they are despatched by the French packet during the Summer months, and from Halifax direct in the winter months. Letters 5d. packet rate, and 3d. inland,—prepayment optional.

All letters are charged by weight, and a uniform rate of postage of 3d on a letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight has been established throughout British North America. To any part of the United States 6d.; to Oregon and California 9d.—prepayment optional.

Letters posted in any town within the Province for delivery in the same town are liable to a rate of one penny for every half ounce.

Newspapers pass free to any part of the Province, British North America and the United States when sent by land Mail—to be put up in covers open at the ends,

Printed Circulars, Prices Current, Handbills, and other printed matter of a like description, put up in covers open at the ends, and without any written communication, may be sent from any part of the Province to any place within the same, as well as through Nova Scotia, at the rate of 1d. per oz.—prepayment optional, except when ad-

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dressed to the United States, in which case the postage must be prepaid. Pamphlets, Magazines, Periodicals, or Books, bound or unbound, done up in covers open at the ends, unaccompanied by any written communication, may be transmitted as above mentioned through the Mail in this Province: not exceeding 2 oz., in weight-free; 2 oz., and not 3, 1d.; 3 oz., and not 4, 11.; 4 oz., and not 5, 2d.; adding and for every additional oz. up to 48 oz., beyond which weight they cannot be sent by Mail.

The Steamer Eastern State leaves Brown's wharf every other Tuesday for Boston, and touches at Yarmouth on the way. Messrs. Young & Hart have two Packets running continually to Boston, viz., the Barque Halifax and the Brig Boston;—the latter is commanded by Capt. O'Brien.

A Packet runs between Halifax and Liverpool, Queen's Cy., leaving Cronan's wharf occasionally through the month.

The Lunenburg Packet generally sails from Black's wharf.

The Guysboro' Packet from the Long wharf.
The Sydney Sailing Packet generally leaves Caldwell's wharf.

It is quite a novelty for strangers, and other persons who have never seen Steam Printing Presses, to witness the operation; and Mr. Kirk is always obliging in shewing the manner in which it is done. They have three presses, viz: a small Cylinder fast Printing Press, an Adams' Press for Bookwork, and a small Job Press. The enterprising Publisher of the Provincial Wesleyan has now in active operation a Guernsey Printing Press which is capable of doing very nice work-it is also driven by Steam.

The Messrs. Bowes & Sons have several beautiful Job Printing Machines, but driven by hand or foot. So that although a few years ago to print by Machinery in Halifax was considered by some to be impracticable, we now have three or four Machines going by Steam,

and several others by hand power.

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
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
