University of Trinity College.

THE UNIVERSITY OF TRINITY COLLEGE was constituted by a Royal Charter, bearing date 16th July 1852, and empowered to confer Degrees in Divinity, Arts, Law, and Medicine.

THE CONVOCATION of the University consists of the Chancellor, the Provost and Professors of Trinity College, and all persons admitted to the Degree of Master of Arts, or to any Degree in Divinity, Law, or Medicine, in the University.

No Degree can be granted by the University unless a Supplicat for that Degree shall have passed the Convocation, having been previously approved by the Caput.

THE CAPUT will consist of the Vice Chancellor; the Deans of the Faculties of Law and Medicine; and Two Masters of Arts, to be elected annually by Convocation at the first meeting in the Michaelmas Term.

The University confers no Degree whatever unless the Candidate has previously taken the oath of allegiance and supremacy and subscribed the following declaration :

“I A. B. do willingly and heartily declare that I am truly and sincerely a member of the United Church of England and Ireland.”*

* For any Degree in Divinity, subscription to the Three Articles of the XXXVIth. Canon is also required.

PROCEEDINGS IN ARTS.

All Candidates for the Degree of B. A. must have kept nine complete Terms. They will be required by the University to pass two Examinations—

I. THE PREVIOUS EXAMINATION, which will take place at the end of the Lent Term in the second year. The subjects of Examination will be fixed at the beginning of the Lent Term in the year preceding. The names of those who pass this Examination will be arranged in two classes, in alphabetical order—the first class consisting of those who shall pass with credit; the second of those to whom the Examiners shall only not refuse their certificate of approval.

Any one who shall absent himself from the proper Examination of his year, without the written approval of the Vice-Chancellor, will not be allowed the Lent Term of that year.

Those who fail to satisfy the Examiners must present themselves at the Examination in the following year.

II. THE EXAMINATION FOR THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF ARTS, which will take place at the beginning of the tenth Term from Matriculation.

The subjects for this examination will be fixed before the end of the Easter Term of the second year.

Those who shall have been approved at this Examination may present themselves for further Examination for Honors in Classics or Mathematics.

The Honor Examinations will take place immediately after the Degrees are conferred. The result of each Honor Examination will be published in three classes, in order of Merit.

PROCEEDINGS IN MEDICINE.

Students intending to proceed to a Degree in Medicine are required—

1. To Matriculate.
2. To pass their first year in College under the same regulations as Students in Arts.

N.B.—During this year they must attend, besides the Arts Lectures, one Lecture daily on Materia Medica, and one on Chemistry.

3. They will be required to pass the PREVIOUS EXAMINATION at the end of the Lent Term in their second year.

4. The three remaining years of their course will be devoted to Medical Studies exclusively; during which time they will be subjected to two Examinations—the first in the April of their third year, and the second at the end of the course. Before each of these Examinations a Fee of £3 must be paid.

5. On completing the course of four years, and passing the requisite Examinations, the Student receives from the University a License "*ad practicandum in Medicina.*"

6. He may proceed to the Degree of M. B. after the expiration of two years from the completion of his Medical course, without further Examination.

NOTE.—The Declaration required of Candidates for any Degree in Arts will be required of Candidates either for a License or a Degree in Medicine.

Further information as to the course of study may be obtained by application to the Dean of the Faculty.

TRINITY COLLEGE.

TRINITY COLLEGE was, by an Act of the Legislature of the Province of Canada, passed in the year of Our Lord 1851, constituted a body corporate, consisting of the Lord Bishop of Toronto (or, in case of the division of the Diocese of Toronto, of the Bishops of the several Dioceses into which the Diocese of Toronto shall be divided), the Trustees of the College, and the College Council.

The following SCHOLARSHIPS are in the gift of the College:

Two SCHOLARSHIPS founded by the late Duke of WEL-
LINGTON, of the annual value of £50 currency, tenable
for two years. One of these Scholarships is awarded
yearly, according to the result of the Annual Examination
in June, to the most deserving Student in Arts, of
the first year: provided that he has matriculated in the
previous October, and has kept three complete terms.

Two SCHOLARSHIPS founded by the Society for the
Propagation of the Gospel, from the Jubilee Fund of the
year 1851, of the annual value of £40 currency, tenable
for two years. One of these Scholarships will be
awarded yearly, commencing from October 1854, to the
most deserving Bachelor of the year, who shall have
expressed his intention of studying for Holy Orders.

The following Scholarships will also be open to com-
petition at the commencement of the Michaelmas Term
1853:

Five DIVINITY SCHOLARSHIPS, tenable for four years—
one of £30 currency per annum, two of £25 currency,
and two of £20 currency. The holders of these
Scholarships will be required to reside for four years,
during the first two of which they must attend the
lectures in the Arts course.

One LAW SCHOLARSHIP, given by the Professors in
the Faculty of Law, of the value of £30 currency per
annum, tenable for three years, by a student in Arts,
either before or after the Degree of B. A.

Candidates for Scholarships must have entered upon
their seventeenth year, and must produce testimonials
of good conduct.

Any person offering himself as a CANDIDATE FOR AD-
MISSION is required to pass a Matriculation Examination
in certain fixed subjects, which may be known on appli-
cation to the Provost. Every Candidate for admission
must have entered upon his sixteenth year.

The annual EXPENSES for a Student resident in College are £50 currency, including £12 10s. as College Fees.

Students residing with their parents in Toronto make an annual payment of £15 10s. currency.

ANNUAL PRIZES—1852.

THE KENT TESTIMONIAL.—Two Prizes of £5 and £4 for Divinity Essays—one on some subject relating to the doctrine and discipline of the Church of England; the other of a more general character. The former of these was awarded to JOSEPH C. GIBSON.

THE LORD BISHOP OF TORONTO gave this year the sum of £5, awarded in equal parts to the best Classic and Mathematician of the year.

First Classic—C. E. THOMPSON.

First Mathematician—T. D. PHILLIPPS.

THE VENERABLE THE ARCHDEACON OF YORK gave this year the sum of £3 15s., of which £2 10s. was to be given for the best copy of Latin Verse, and £1 5s. for the best copy of English Verse.

Latin Verse—not awarded.

English Verse—HENRY HAYWARD.

For the future the following annual Prizes will be given in addition to the Kent Testimonial Prizes:

For Divinity Students, one Prize of Five Pounds, open to Students of both years.

For Students in Arts of the first year, one Prize £2 10s.

For Students in Arts of the second and third years, two prizes in each year of £2 10s.; one for Classics, the other for Mathematics.

Chemistry—One Prize yearly of £2 10s.

An annual prize of £10 will be given by the Chancellor, of the regulations respecting which due notice will be given.
