FIRST EDITION. HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

Dr. Pugsley's Bill to Incorporate the Harvey Short Line Railway Company.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley committed a bill amending the Act incorporating the Moncton and Harvey Short Line Railway Company.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley explained the objects of the bill, the chief one being to give the company power to build a line of railway from a point at or near the head of Grand Lake to Edmundville via the Grand Falls.

Mr. Hetherington was opposed to the bill. In the first place it would interfere with an existing charter and in the second place it was proposed to build a railway through the best timber lands of the province.

Mr. Ketchum thought the bill would interfere with the rights of the St. John Valley and Woodstock and Centreville companies.

Mr. Atkinson opposed the bill on the ground that it would interfere with existing charters.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley said the route proposed in this bill would all probably be adopted by the Grand Trunk Railway Company in which case St. John would become the main terminus of the line.

Hon. Mr. Mitchell favored the bill. The line would be a great benefit to the province and would give the Grand Trunk Railway Company a route to the west.

Mr. Atkinson said the bill was of immense importance to St. John and the whole Province, as the proposed line would, no doubt, be used by the Grand Trunk Railway.
