A New Dodge. Not satisfied with destroying the gas-pneux fishing industry of the Miramichi, the Inspector of Fisheries appears to have determined upon obliging the net fishermen to go to unnecessary trouble and expense. He has, it is said, conceived the idea that the nets used are too small in the mesh. To justify a regulation obliging the fishermen to use nets with larger meshes he must obtain evidence to show that "small and unmarketable" fish are found in the nets used in use. With this object in view his *Fides Actus*, Overseer Wye, in his capacity of fish dealer, has offered to some of the fishermen *four dollars a barrel* for gas-pneux of a large size. Of course, the fishermen will not see that the offer is but the bait of a trap set for them by the Inspector. It is not difficult to imagine that officer, a year or two hence, reporting to the Department that the price of gas-pneux on the Miramichi is so low as to render the fishery unprofitable and that this is owing to the fact that the nets used are too small in the mesh, and that the Inspector has decided to replace those rendered "illegal" by his "4 a barrel" dodge; 2nd—the discovery of the "waste" of small gas-pneux will be a feather in this same gentleman's cap as a fishery overseer. It is quite certain that the present regulation will be placed where he can no longer plot against our fishermen, while his pot Overseer will be relieved of duties which may now take their attention to a small extent from their ordinary business.
