





MAY BE STARVED TO DEATH.

SINGAPORE, Oct. 15.—Marooned on a small island in the China Sea, with provisions for only ten days,. are 2,260 coolies and four Europeans.

The steamship Swanley arrived her today badly damaged, and reported that she was bound from Hong Kong for South Africa, with 2,260 coolies and four European passengers aboard, and that on Oct. 3 she grounded on Serala Island, about seventy miles south of

the Natuna Islands.

When the steamer floated three days her bottom and she was obliged to land all her passengers on Serala Island, where they were left with provisions for ten days. The vessel was just able to make Singapore, as she was leaking badly, and will not be ble to proceed for some time.





copal Convention Adopt

An Amendment,

BOSTON, Oct. 17.-The house of bishops, one of the legislative bodies of the Episcopal general convention, today adopted an amendment to the canon on marriage and divorce, fo bidding the re-marriage of any divorce ed person. The amendment was sub stantially the same as that which was rejected by the house of deputies on Friday last. The action of the bishops was not unexpected, as the senti-ment of that body was well known. A conference of committees represent-ing the bishops and the deputies will be held to consider the disagreement, but leading clergymen do not anticipate that the deputies will recede from

In the house of deputies today proposed canon providing a court of review, to which appeals may be taken from diocesan courts, was re-ported, and the main body of it was adopted, but several provisions over until tomorrow.
