(Special to the Star). BERLIN, Ont. Aug. 12. — Schator Samuel Merner died here today after being unconscious over a week as a result of an attack of paralysis. He had been unwell some months previous. The juneral will be held Thursday afternoon and will be private. day afternoon and will be private. The late Senator was born in Switzerland 86 years ago. His parents came to Canada in 1837. He had been at the head of large manufacturing and agricultural interests, having owned foundries in Hamburg and Wateroo, and a furniture factory in Berlin. He was elected Conservative member for South Waterloo in 1878 and was appointed Senator in 1882 by John A. MacDonald. Of a family of fourteen, four sons and four daughters survive.

It is said Hon. James Young, of Galt, will be appointed to the vacant seat.



CROP ESTIMATE

(Special to The Sun.)

OTTAWA, Aug. 11.—An estimate of the yield of Canadian crops has been issued by the Dominion census bureau. It gives the probable yield from the condition of the fields on the last day of July. The estimates are compiled from reports received from agents of the census bureau stationed all over the Dominion and thoroughly covering the whole field. The report states:

The heat and drought of July have lowered the condition of field crops all over Canada, but less in Ontario and Alberta than elsewhere, because the ripening season in those provinces has been earlier. Measured on the basis of 100 for a standard condition being a full crop of good quality, wheat fell during the month from 86 to 76, oats from 90 to 81, barley from 82 to 78, press from 82 to 78, mixed grains from 84 to 81 and hay and clover from 87 to 82. Beans alone have not deteriorated, their condition at the end of June. Other crops show conditions for the end of July of 78 for potatoes, 74 for turnips, 78 for eyear beets, 75 for other roots, 77 for husking corn and 83 for fodder corn. It was too early at the end of July to give estimates of production for the lower provinces and British Columbia, but from the reports of correspondents.
