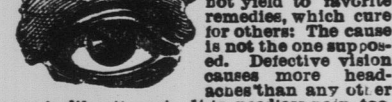

THE DUNKHOBORS ARRIVE.

Greeted With a Hearty Welcome at Sand Point.

Many People Throng the Wharves to See the Immigrants Who Have Come to Found Homes in Canada—They Chanted Praises to God for Carrying Them Safely Thus Far on Their Journey.

The much talked of Dunkhobors have arrived and by this morning will have nearly all departed for their new homes in the west.

The report of the Beaver liner Lake Huron leaving Halifax at 8 o'clock Sunday morning, with her cargo of human freight, was the cause of a large crowd of citizens of both sexes swarming to Sand Point...

As was before stated in THE TELEGRAPH it was found necessary to furnish passes to the press representatives and others who had departed business with the Dunkhobors...

At 9 o'clock Monday morning there were some hundreds of persons at Sand Point, and all were looking anxiously to see the steamer...

Many persons wended their way home for their noon day meal, while a large number whose residence was far from Sand Point...

To keep the large crowd of citizens from going on the C. P. R. wharves, Chief of Police Clark was on hand...

After dinner the people once more flocked to the wharves and at about 2 o'clock the Lake Huron was signalled at the custom house...

The Huron, with Pilot John Thomas in charge, steamed slowly around the island and at 3:30 was heading in the east channel.

The C. P. R. train crews for five trains, with locomotives and coaches, were at Sand Point and vicinity from early morning...

All of the cars have been thoroughly overhauled and cleaned. The floors have been painted and the windows, seats, etc., varnished...

In the centre of each train of eight passenger coaches is a large baggage car, which is used for the provisions. In these provisions cars, which are very clean, were rows of cases for coffee and tea, piles of new tin plates, knives, forks, spoons, cups, etc.

Recent Deaths.

Mr. Samuel A. Pierey, an old resident of this city, died Sunday morning at his residence, Leinster street, in his 80th year. Mr. Pierey was a native of Liverpool, Eng., but lived in St. John nearly all his life. He was for 30 years connected with the fire department, and only retired from it a few years ago in consequence of the infirmities of age. His widow, two sons, and four daughters survive him.

Sunday afternoon there occurred the death of an old and respected citizen, William Pattison, who for the last 25 years has been messenger of the Bank of New Brunswick. He was born in Bentry, Ireland, in 1828, being 71 years of age at the time of his death. He came to St. John from Ireland about 50 years ago, and was for a number of years on the police force. He had been a sufferer from heart disease during his later years, and about two years ago was superannuated by the bank. It was an attack of this disease which finally carried him off. Mr. Pattison leaves a wife and six children to mourn their loss. They are Mrs. W. H. Smith and Mrs. Thos. Evans, Mr. W. A. Richard, A. S., and J. H. Pattison, all living in this city.

Saturday evening Joseph O'Grady, aged 26 years, son of the late Thomas O'Grady, died at his residence 124 Pond street, after a short illness of pneumonia, leaving three sisters and two brothers. Mr. O'Grady was an upright young man and was highly esteemed by a large circle of friends. He was employed in Waring & White's as an iron moulder. The funeral will take place Tuesday afternoon from his late residence. Service will be held at the cathedral.

SUNDAY MORNING'S FIRE.

The Bank of Montreal Building Considerably Damaged.

Fire and water did a good deal of damage early Sunday morning in the Bank of Montreal building at the corner of King and Prince William streets. The fire was discovered about 3:40 o'clock by Sergt. Campbell and Officer Killen. The latter sent in an alarm from box 6, while Sergt. Campbell roused the man who sleeps in the bank and also informed the night telegraphic staff in the C. P. E. general office, which are in the upper portion of the building. The fire, when first seen, was showing in the top story, at the end of the building farthest up King street. When the flames began work it was seen that there was trouble ahead and a second alarm was sent in. In all, four engines were soon at work and doing good work, though there was a handicap on account of the lack of an extension ladder. It took until 5 o'clock to fully subdue the fire. The roof and upper story were mostly damaged by the blaze and fire for nearly the whole area of the building. This portion was used for storage, General Superintendent Timmerman's office below was rendered uninhabitable. When the fire was out, the floors were swept of the great quantities of water and thus some of the lower rooms were saved from damage. As it was much water got through and damaged the rooms from top to bottom on the upper King street end.

The Bank of Montreal owns the building and is insured from the head office. The bank's quarters were splendidly fitted out, and there will be considerable damage by water to frescoed ceilings, etc. The C. P. E. loss will be in office furnishings. Some of these were saved by being covered by the salvage corps. Messrs Munro and Means will begin today to appraise the damage for the bank.
