THE SCHOOL BUILDING

is large, well situated in the midst of ample grounds, and is arranged and furnished in the most convenient manner. The utmost care has been taken to provide for due warmth in winter and abundant ventilation at all times. The highest medical authorities testify to the excellence of the arrangements, and their judgment has been confirmed by the general good health of teachers and pupils.

THE COURSE OF INSTRUCTION

A Preparatory Department extending through two years.

A Junior Department extending through three years.

A Senior Department extending through three years.

Advanced Classes providing for two years' work.

The Preparatory Department is open to girls who are not qualified to enter the Junior Department. Instruction in it is designed to qualify pupils for admission to the Junior Department.

Admission to all classes is by examination in accordance with the subjoined Limit Tables.

¹ Candidates for admission to these classes in the middle of a year must satisfy the Head Mistress, by the result of such examinations as she may institute, that they are prepared to enter with advantage to themselves.

The course of study in the Junior Department, will be understood from the subjoined schedules of subjects, time devoted to each, text-books and minimum proficiency expected. Instrumental Music and Latin are the only subjects not imperative.

The subjects of study in the Senior Department are divided into ordinary, honour and optional. Every pupil must follow the ordinary course, except that exemption may be granted from any branch in which thorough proficiency is proved by examination. In addition every pupil must follow at least two honour courses in each year, one of which shall be a language, and one some other branch of study.

Optional subjects, as their name implies, may be taken or declined.

The subjoined schedules give classified lists of the subjects, the time devoted to each, and the text-books used.

Provision for advanced classes, leading up to the higher examinations of women in the McGill University, will be made with special reference to the wishes of the pupils entering, to the optional subjects announced in the College Calendar, and to the courses provided by the Ladies' Educational Association, some of which, it is understood, will be accepted in the examinations as equivalent to certain optional subjects. Detailed arrangements will be made at the commencement of the School year, September 3rd, 1884.

PREPARATORY DEPARTMENT .- From 9 a.m. to 11/2 p.m., with one intermisson of ten minutes, and one of half an hour.

JUNIOR DEPARTMENT.—From 9 a.m. to 2 p.m., with intermissions as above.

SENIOR DEPARTMENT AND ADVANCED CLASSES.—The time of attendance of senior and advanced pupils depends upon the courses chosen, but all ordinary and honour work in the School is comprised between the hours of 9 a.m. and 2½ p.m., daily.

MEDALS AND PRIZES.

A silver medal, given by the Commissioners at the close of each session, is the First General Proficiency Prize of the Third Senior Class. Bronze medals are similarly given in the remaining classes of the school higher than Preparatory. In all the classes, prizes in books and prize certificates are awarded annually by the Board for excellence in special subjects, and for superiority in general proficiency.

By special arrangement with the McGill University, all pupils of the Third Senior Class will be examined at the University School Examinations in all subjects common to these and to the school course, and prizes in such subjects will be awarded on the report of the examiners. The cost of the examination will be defrayed by the Commissioners, and the candidates who are successful will receive their certificates on the payment of \$r to the Registrar of the University.

TUITION FEES.

All tuition fees are payable quarterly in advance, no pupil being permitted to remain in the School without due payment.
