Moved by Rev. J. BORLAND; Seconded by Rev. J. BROCK;

1. That the Report now read be received and published; and that this Meeting offers its grateful acknowledgments to Almighty God for the encouraging measure of success which He continues to vouchsafe to the Wesleyan Missionary Society, in common with other similar Protestant Institutions.

2. That, while rejoicing in the successful foreign exertions of the Parent Society, this Meeting regrets to learn that the Income of this Institution has for several preceding years, though annually augmenting, been materially insufficient to meet the regularly increased demands which have been inevitably created even by that *very success*, and pledges itself to renewed effort to promote in every possible way, its important and benevolent objects.

REPORT.

MISSIONARY meetings announce by their very name, the object for which they were first organized; and at the same time furnish us with reasons why they should be perpetuated. They wear an aspect and possess a character which make them essentially differ from all kindred institutions; and that invest them with claims of more than paramount importance.

Those who devote their time and their substance to the support and extension of Sabbath Schools, are rearing up tender plants that shall ultimately flourish as "*trees of righteousness*" in the "*courts of the Lord's House*." All that are engaged in promoting the interests of "*The Bible Society*" are truly employed in acts of beneficence and mercy. They are distributing "*the Bread of Life*" to the hungry: They are sending water drawn from "*the well of Bethlehem*," to them who are fainting and ready to perish: and into "*the dark places of the earth*" that are filled with "*the habitations of cruelty*:" they are sending "*the Lamp of Life*," filled with the unction of the Holy Spirit, and radiant with the glory of God. But in the support of a Missionary Ministry, men are more immediately "*workers together with God*;" since it is His own appointment that "*the Gospel*" should be preached to "*every creature*." Here, Heaven and Earth are specially united—The "*throne*" and the "*foot-stool*" of "*the King of kings*" are united—and from this extraordinary conjunction results the enlargement of "*Sion*" and the repairing of "*her waste places*"—the diffusion of the truth—and the exaltation of the cross—the conversion of souls and the formation of churches—the fulfilment of prophecy, and the approach of that long-expected day, when the seventh angel shall sound his trumpet, and an innumerable multitude of voices declare "*the Kingdoms of this world are become the Kingdoms of our Lord, and his Christ; and he shall reign for ever and ever*."

David, when surveying the attestations of the divine greatness by which he was surrounded, exclaimed "*Twice have I heard this; that power belongeth unto God*." But to see the fullest displays of the over-ruling, and all-subduing power of God, we must direct our thoughts to the agents employed for the propagation of Christianity; and to the mighty effects which that agency produces. The Almighty, by his manner of working, unites the greatest effects with the simplest causes; and produces results of almost infinite magnitude, by apparently despicable means. The pride of Pharaoh and

the pomp of Egypt were overthrown by the rod of Moses—the walls of Jericho were beaten down by the sounding of rams' horns; and the Amalekitish forces, headed by the renowned Sisera, were routed by Deborah, a mother in Israel.

Your Committee devoutly recognise our Missionary Institution but as one of the divisions of the grand evangelical army employed beneath the banner of the Divine "*Captain of our salvation*," and humbly acknowledge the hand of the Lord in the success which has uniformly attended the labours, not only of this Auxiliary, but also those of the venerable Parent Society. And, although the embarrassed state of our funds renders it absolutely necessary that rigid economy should pervade our expenditure, and great liberality characterize our contributions; the Great Head of the Church has, during the past year, laid us under many obligations, and we are glad most gratefully to record them; he has furnished us with fresh motives to spend and be spent in his service, and we are determined to respond to them. He has been our help in every time of need, so that we have often been constrained to say "*GOD IS IN THE MIDST OF US, WE SHALL NOT BE MOVED; GOD DOETH HELP US, AND THAT RIGHT EARLY.*"

The Parent Society in England, with which this Auxiliary is affiliated, continues to expand in all its various departments; so that each succeeding year beholds it filling a larger space in the horizon of Christian Missions. The field of its operations is the world. Its path is as the shining light. And as it goes onward, exploring every latitude, and visiting every clime, it scatters the choicest blessings upon all that come within the sphere of its influence. These blessings are numerous and diversified—important and essential; and they issue in bringing "*Glory to God*," and salvation to men. Idols have been plucked down from their high places; temples in which the disgusting rites of idolatry were performed have been demolished; lying Oracles that mimicked the wisdom of inspiration have been struck dumb: "*Feet that were swift to shed blood*" have been turned into the paths of peace; and tens of thousands of precious souls have been "*translated from the kingdom of darkness into the kingdom of God's dear Son*;"—In a word—

"The little cloud increases still,
The heavens are big with rain;
We haste to catch the teeming shower,
And all its moisture drain.
A rill, a stream, a torrent flows,
But pour the mighty flood;
O, shake the nations; sweep the earth;
'Till all proclaim thee God.

Agreeably to our usual custom, Your Committee will now endeavour to lay before you a brief and hasty sketch of the principal Stations occupied by this Society. These indeed, are dispersed through all the important divisions of the globe; but the limits of this report will not admit of more than a glance over the most prominent among them. We shall commence with those in—

EUROPE.

IRELAND.—In this country “darkness” still covers “the earth, and gross darkness the people.” The instruction of the great body of the inhabitants is impeded by men who rigorously oppose the spread of evangelical light; and thus render almost inaccessible, the majority of those who need our aid. The cry is constantly ascending “*Come over and help us—come over and help us;*” but the repeated collisions of party strife and similar occurrences, prevent us from answering it as promptly or as effectually as we wish. Yet, under these disadvantages, some new chapels have been erected—missions of a very promising character have been opened—and many souls have been brought from the thralldom of superstition into the liberty of the gospel.

SWEDEN.—The mission at *Stockholm* increases in interest. The opening services of the large and commodious chapel were conducted by two very distinguished clergymen of the Established Lutheran Church; and the beneficial effect of the Rev. Mr. Scott’s subsequent ministry upon the large congregations which have attended it, has been fully testified upon the National Diet. The labours of the Parent Society, in this peculiar sphere of its operations, abundantly prove that they are animated by a catholic spirit, and that they are endeavoring to introduce into the Swedish Church a little leaven, which shall in due time leaven the whole lump.

WIRTEMBERG.—WINNENDEN, in this kingdom, is the favoured place which still continues to engage the sympathy, and partake of the munificence of the Society. Here have they lifted up a standard for the truth, and many have flocked to it. The missionary, assisted by some of his truly converted countrymen continues to labour with diligence and success.

FRANCE AND SWITZERLAND.—In France the caprices of fashion—the proverbial volatility of the people—papal influence—and the prevalence of infidelity—all these seriously obstruct the spread of true religion. But blessed be God, “*the little one*” is intimating that she will ere long, “*become a thousand;*” and “*the small one*” is affording presages that she will become “*a great nation.*” The state of our missions in *Paris, Bourdeaux, Lyons* and other places, is very encouraging. The country which gave birth to the sainted *Fletcher of Madely*, is included within the comprehensive embrace of the revered Parent Society; and thus in *Nismes; La Vauange; Lausanne*, and other parts of the *Helvetic* mountains, is Wesleyan Methodism beginning to pay the debt that it owes, to the unflinching friend of its Founder, and the invincible champion of its doctrines.

SPAIN.—The missionaries, the Rev. Messrs. *Rule* and *Lyon*, have been driven away from *Cadiz*. The hand of popish persecution was turned against them. But from this untoward event much good is likely to result; for *Gibraltar* now enjoys their undivided labours, and these have already been crowned with great success.

CEYLON AND CONTINENTAL INDIA.—The missions in the Island of *Ceylon* are divided into two districts. The Southern district—

embraces that large division of the Island, in which the Singhalese language is the vernacular tongue of the inhabitants. The acquisition of the native languages, and the unfavourable influence of the climate are not the principal obstacles to be surmounted. The chief hinderance is the patronage afforded by Her Majesty's Government to the system of Idol-worship, from the mistaken policy of deference to the idolatrous prejudices of the majority of the Ceylonese people; and which is greatly to be deplored. Your Committee are persuaded that the abolition of this unholy connection, would be the removal of a great obstacle to the spread of Christianity in Ceylon. The advancing prosperity of these missions is, notwithstanding these impediments, very apparent. A necessity for additional places of worship exists, and a supply of that necessity is earnestly solicited.

The labours of the Missionaries in North Ceylon are chiefly among the *Hindoos* or *Tamul* people; and although the progress of vital religion among the natives is very slow; yet the past year has exhibited many instances of real conversion, and spiritual improvement. The educational department in both districts is in a highly flourishing condition. Upwards of four thousand children of both sexes are receiving a religious and moral instruction; and to these the Missionaries look, as unto the streams which shall "*make glad the city of God*" in Ceylon.

CONTINENTAL INDIA.—Letters of a recent date, and very encouraging, have been received from the Rev. Mr. *Crowther*, the General Superintendent of our "India Missions." The latest intelligence from *Madras*, states that in that place we have peace in our borders—and in some instances prosperity. Information of a similar character has been lately obtained from *Porto Novo*, and *Chil-lumbrum*. In *Negapatam* the gospel is achieving its appropriate triumphs—and setting at liberty both Mahomedans and Heathens. The missionary at *Manaargoddy* is encouraged to go on in his "*work and labour of love*,"—and the state of the Schools on the various stations is an abundant recompense for all the anxiety and care bestowed upon them.

AUSTRALIA AND POLYNESIA.

The missions among the British settlers in the several colonies of *Australia* and *Van Dieman's Land*, are rising in importance. The itinerant system is admirably adapted to meet the spiritual wants of that scattered population; and the missionaries are receiving from various quarters, pressing applications to enlarge the sphere of their operations.

NEW SOUTH WALES.—The progress of the mission in this country is highly encouraging; and some additional missionaries have recently been sent out, to enter upon the new fields of labour that have recently presented themselves.

AUSTRALIA FELIX.—The missionaries continue to labour with unabated diligence in behalf of the Aborigines: and although they have to meet formidable discouragements, they continue their patient toil; and are enabled to trust in Him who has said "*All the ends of the Earth shall see the salvation of our God.*" Remembering that JESUS CHRIST has said "*Go ye forth and preach the gospel to every creature,*" they are determined "to labour on at God's command; and offer all their works to Him."

VAN DIEMAN'S LAND.—The Mission in this Colony comprises five principal stations; and with these are connected several rising settlements. In the penal station of *Port Arthur*—the *Coal Mines*—*Hunter's River*—and other places—are the ordinances of religion afforded to a dispersed population, which could not be supplied by any other than an itinerant ministry. The gospel exercises a very salutary influence upon the military. Many of the convicts, too, have felt it to be "*the power of God unto their salvation.*" And a recent examination of the Schools afforded, to all who were present, a convincing evidence of their great utility.

NEW ZEALAND.—In this Island we have to contend with Romish emissaries; and the difficulties arising out of the colonization-movements which are every where taking place. The state and the prospects of the work at the several stations are decidedly encouraging. Religious knowledge is increasing; the gospel has "*free course,*" and is "*glorified;*" the public ministry of the word is well attended; and both congregations and societies have been augmented.

THE FRIENDLY ISLANDS.—The principal Mission Stations here are *Tonga*, *Habai*, and *Vavou*. These, however, are but central points from which the Missionaries diverge in various directions. These abundant labours have been greatly blessed by Him that giveth the increase; so that urgent demands for more help has met with prompt attention, and three additional Missionaries have been already sent. The *Tonga* Mission, which was unavoidably suspended, has been resumed, and the prospect, at present, is very encouraging.

FEEJEE.—This is the name by which a number of islands is designated; and the aspect which they now present encourages us to hope that they will, at no very distant period, be included in the territories of Him, who shall have "*The heathen for his inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth for his possession.*" In the *Lakemba* Circuit, which embraces all the windward islands, "*the truth as it is in Jesus*" is making rapid progress, going forth "*conquering and to conquer.*" In one island, the heralds of salvation are triumphantly waving the banner of the cross; in another the hostile powers of heathenism are falling under an out-pouring of the Holy Spirit. In the Island of *Vatou*, the worship of false gods is almost totally abolished. In different parts of the *Ban* Circuit the Gospel of peace has triumphed over chiefs and warriors; and even in *Somosomo*, where the natives had been particularly vicious and depraved, "*the fields*" are whitening "*to the harvest?*" and the Missionaries are cheered with the hope that even here they will gather "*sheaves with rejoicing.*"

AFRICA.

SOUTH.—Under the blessing of Almighty God, the instrumentality employed in this field of labour has been rendered eminently successful. The societies at the several stations continue to increase in number, and in piety. The word of the Lord has free course, and is glorified; and the Schools, which contain upwards of 1300 scholars of both sexes, are in efficient operation.

SOUTH EASTERN AFRICA.—The Society's Missions in this part of Africa are rapidly growing in importance. The principal ones exhibit a truly cheering aspect. The people are in many instances, a clear and convincing proof, that "*the gospel*" has been to them "*Good tidings of great joy.*" The white and native members of the church dwell together in love, for "*God dwelleth in them;*" and they meet together as brethren, at the table of their common Lord and Saviour. The Sabbath Schools and printing establishments in these two districts, are in a very efficient state; and the fruits of their operation are discernible in the improved condition of the children; and in the diffusion of translations of the Sacred Scriptures and useful elementary books, even in languages never previously written.

WESTERN AFRICA.—Your Committee indulge an allusion to this department of the Missionary field with mingled emotions. During the past year it has excited more than usual attention. At *Sierra Leone*, the number of members in Society has been considerably increased, some substantial chapels have been built, and the Schools have become very efficient under the management of Mr. CHARLES KNIGHT, a pious native. The Cause of our adorable Redeemer is prospering on the *Gambia*, at *McCarthy's Island*, and at other places; and the goodness of Almighty God, in crowning the labours of his servants with so large a measure of success, diffuses joy through the regret occasioned by the loss of so many valuable labourers, who have fallen under the baneful influence of that insalubrious climate.

THE GOLD COAST.—The word of God in this benighted part of the earth has acquired a new and very remarkable feature in the recent introduction of the gospel into the kingdom of *Ashantee*. The liberality of the Christian public has enabled the Society to send six additional Missionaries for the purpose of strengthening the existing Missions of the *Gold Coast*; and of attempting, at least, the establishment of a Mission and schools in the populous, but degraded kingdom of *Ashantee*. The organization of "The Society for the extinction of the Slave Trade," &c.; and the results of the *Niger Expedition*, will, it is hoped, eminently subserve the interests of religion, in whatever places may become the theatres of their philanthropic and scientific operations. The number in Society at the *Gold Coast* exceeds seven hundred—and the Schools afford instruction to nearly three hundred scholars.

AMERICA.

WEST INDIES.—The origin, progress, and present condition of the Society's operations, in this interesting section of the vast field

they are striving to cultivate, are most cheering. They are a sufficient warrant for saying, that the long night of intolerance and oppression that brooded over the West India Missions has passed away, and that a morning irradiated by "*The Sun of righteousness*" has dawned upon them. The parched ground has indeed become a pool, and the thirsty land springs of water; instead of the thorn has come up the fir-tree, and instead of the brier has come up the myrtle-tree. The West India Negro is now free! The justice and philanthropy, and CHRISTIANITY of the British Nation have risen up in his behalf. And, by God's blessing, they have removed the yoke from his neck, and broken to pieces the fetters that bound him!

While glancing at the opulent picture which the present state of our West India Missions exhibit, we perceive several features in that picture, which deserve to be particularly noticed. So strong is the desire of the emancipated negroes and others, for additional opportunities of spiritual instruction, that eight out of the twelve Missionaries who have been requested, are to receive their entire support from the Stations to which they shall be appointed. Touching the preparedness of the people generally, to receive the gospel, and the adequate ministerial supply, which our limited means enable us to furnish, it may be said, "*The harvest truly is great, but the labourers are few.*" The Missionaries, compared to the population among whom they have to labour, are what the "*five barley loaves, and few small fishes,*" would have been to "*the multitudes*" in the wilderness, if Jesus had not augmented them by his benediction. The number of members in Society in the various Stations is about 50,000; nearly the half of which are in Jamaica. The Schools, comprehending several thousands of scholars, are in a highly flourishing condition. To God be all the praise!

BRITISH NORTH AMERICA.—Over this immense field, which comprises in its area, *more square miles* than the entire territory of "The United States," are distributed about Ninety Missionaries; and these are laboriously engaged in their high and holy vocation. As HUSBANDMEN, they are sowing the seed of "*The Kingdom*"—and looking up to "*The Lord of the Harvest*" for an increase. As AMBASSADORS OF CHRIST, they are endeavouring to effect a reconciliation between God and man. As SPIRITUAL LUMINARIES, they are shedding the light of evangelical truth upon some of the darkest places of the earth. And as HERALDS OF THE CROSS, they are proclaiming the everlasting gospel, in Chapels and in barns; in log huts and in wigwams; and frequently beneath the open sky.

In the WESTERN District of this UNITED PROVINCE OF CANADA, we have interesting Missions among the *Aboriginal Indians*; whose present circumstances, as compared with their former pagan condition, exhibit a most gratifying demonstration of the truth and power of the Gospel. During the past year there have been also most decided tokens of the Divine blessing on the other Stations in that District, and a most animating spirit of liberality in aid of the funds of our Parent Society.

On many Stations in our own District of EASTERN CANADA, the Congregations and Societies have been encouragingly increased,

At Montreal, Quebec, Odell-Town, Russeltown, St. Armands, Dunham, and other places, it has pleased God to pour a gracious "rain" upon "his inheritance," and greatly to "revive" his "work." In consequence of this, the Societies within the bounds of this District, have been greatly enlarged. We are enabled not only to rejoice in an accession of numbers, but likewise, we hope, in some augmentation of piety. "*Through the tender mercy of our God—"the day spring from on high has visited us,"* and it has "*given light*" to many that "*sat in darkness and in the shadow of death*"—and it has guided many who were running in the way of transgression, "*into the way of peace*" and righteousness. "*Not unto us, not unto us, O Lord, but unto Thy Name be all the glory!*" Amen, and Amen!

SUMMARY.

The principal Missionary Stations occupied by the Society in various parts of the world, are about 260. The Missionaries exceed 370. Of Salaried Catechists, Local Preachers, School Masters, &c., there are 330: and about 4,000 afford their services gratuitously. The Communicants under the spiritual care of the Missionaries are about 85,000; being an increase of some thousands over the number reported last year. The total number attending their ministry may be reckoned at more than 200,000; and in the Schools there are nearly 60,000 adults and children. The gospel is preached by the Missionaries, in upwards of 20 different languages. Seven printing establishments are made subservient to the diffusion of a moral and religious education. The contributions to the Funds of the Parent Society during the past year amount to nearly £103,000 sterling; but the heavy debt which has been already reported, and the increased expenditure which has been unavoidably incurred, leave a balance of £30,000 due to the Treasurer!!!

To the valued Missionary Collectors and Subscribers throughout the District, your Committee wish to make a public expression of cordial thanks for their persevering exertions in support of the sublime and Scriptural enterprise in which we are engaged. They would particularly notice the gratifying increase in the amount contributed by the friends of Missions in QUEBEC and MONTREAL; and which has been in some instances occasioned by the generous determination of respected individuals to double at least, their former subscriptions. A noble example which they hope may be universally imitated!
