### BATHURST AND THE IRON INDUSTRY

The meeting at Bathurst on Friday, at which the Minister of Public Works and Messrs. Turgeon, Lacombe, and Drummond spoke, attracted attention to the prospect that the development of the Gloucester deposits will give a great impetus to that country, and indeed, to the whole province.

"The people of Gloucester county are naturally anxious that the great mass of ore of which they are the fortunate possessors shall be the basis of a big industry and that their rail and harbor facilities shall be so improved as to permit of the freight being handled cheaply and expeditiously. Having an active and influential representative in Mr. Turgeon they turn naturally to him in such a situation. Mr. Turgeon has persuaded the Minister of Public Works to go personally to look into the question, and the inspection and the speeches which followed have greatly increased the confidence with which the people of Bathurst, and of the province generally, await the exploitation of the great body of ore which has so long lain useless."

Hon. Mr. Pugsley evidently believes that all reasonable assistance should be given by the Federal Government in the matter of making Bathurst ready to handle the ore shipments. Mr. Drummond's speech indicates a determination to push the mining industry along rapidly in future. The has reason to be pleased—Telegraph.

### WITHOUT THE HEADACHE

A correspondent in an American exchange, having read of the discovery of a method of removing the poisonous and intoxicating element from whiskey, without removing its exhilarating power, writes to know if the blessed thing has come to pass which will cause the friends of poor, weak humanity to clap their hands, for joy.

The discovery is doubtful. Science could hardly extract the poisonous element from whiskey without extracting alcohol, which is the exhilarating element. We shall probably have to wait some time for a whiskey which does not contain the product of fermentation.

If such a thing could be, the anti-alcoholists of this one correspondent and thousands of other people would be justified. A liquor that would serve the end of elevating the spirits of men, without afterwards dashing them down to a brutish level, would be a boon to mankind. But since we haven't it now, would it do for mankind to try the absent treatment? Why not imagine the whiskey imagine in drink, and then have the joy of it without the headache? It has often been noticed that a man who refrains from drinking in a crowd that is drinking, often looks the victim of imagination and limitation. He does not need any fuel, the stimulus to playfulness than the spectacle of foolishness about him.

Very likely this process of getting the good without the bad out of a spree will not prove generally popular since few men have the kind and amount of imagination, to say nothing of common sense, to make a success out of it.

### LOWER TAXES

Forests owned and managed by municipalities or companies are no uncommon thing in Europe. Of late in this aspect of the forest industry in this country. An evidence of this fact was given by a meeting lately held in Cobourg, Ont. and attended by representatives of the counties of Northumberland and Durham, Ont.

The municipal forests of Europe frequently make a material reduction in the taxes of the municipality—in fact, sometimes wipe the taxes out altogether—by the revenue derived from these forests.

The object of the meeting referred to was to consider the matter of the increase of the taxes on the land within their borders. This tract is some 15,000 acres in extent and forms the watershed between the streams flowing into Lake Ontario directly and those running into the Trent river. The soil is almost pure sand. A fine crop of pine originally covered the area and after it was taken off the land was for some years farmed with great success. But the fertility of the soil has rapidly diminished and today not many farmers are left on the ridge. Many farms have been deserted and areas of "blow" sand have been formed, sand from which in some cases drifting on, and covering up good soil on adjoining farms. The streams throughout the area, too are torrents in spring time, but in late summer and autumn their beds are almost dry—the usual result of cutting away the forests at the headwaters of streams.

Though almost useless for farming now, the land will grow fine timber. Originally it was covered with a fine growth of pine, and large stumps still remain to show the size the timber attained. Fine young timber may be seen at various places in the area. At one place in Durham County, moreover, a plantation of young white pine was made some four years ago and this has developed into a thrifty young crop of timber.

The land can, it is thought, be

bought at an average price of five dollars per acre. If the land is bought at this figure and planted with pine at a cost for plants and planting of ten dollars per acre, the cost per acre of the planted area would, at the end of sixty years, amount to about a hundred and sixty dollars (\$160). The figure given for plants and planting is a liberal one, and the final cost given, i. e. \$160, would include adequate charges for management and protection, as well as an allowance to be worth three and a half per cent. per annum.

The pine timber standing on the acre of ground would be worth, even at prices now prevailing, six hundred dollars. In other words, not only would the investment repay the interest at three and a half per cent. per annum, but in addition it would yield an amount equivalent to a yearly payment of about two and a quarter throughout the sixty years. This yearly revenue would be almost half the amount paid in the first instance for the land.

Considerable work in the planting of such land has been done in France and Germany and much interest was shown at the meeting in the address of Dr. B. E. Fernow, dean of the faculty of forestry of the University of Toronto, who gave some interesting figures showing the profitable results that had been obtained from similar plantations in those countries.

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In the article of Pennsylvania, it may be noted, the legislature, as its last session, passed a bill empowering municipalities to acquire land for the purpose of forming such municipal forest reserves.

In time of peace we should, perhaps, be wiser.

A hopeful estimate of the western crop by the Bank of Commerce would further strengthen the buoyant tone of business.
