The nominations for Mayor and Aldermen for the Town of Campbellton passed off very quietly on Tuesday. The much talked of opposition ticket failed to materialize and at the last moment it was found necessary to get candidates for Ward I, as Coun. McLean would not again act, and Coun. Evans did not wish to offer. However, Coun. Evans at the request of a number of ratepayers, allowed himself to be placed in nomination along with Mr. John Harquail.

In Ward III three names were placed in nomination, Chas. Goss, Thos. Ellsworth and J. O. Pichette. An election will be held in this Ward on Tuesday.

### TOWN COUNCIL HOLDS LAST MEETING

Little Business Before Board—Returning Officers Appointed For Ward III Election

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Council Chamber Tuesday evening, His Worship Mayor Andrew presiding.

There were present Couns. Quinn, Patterson, McLean, Ellsworth, Goss, Evans, Miller and Alexander.  
An application from S. A. Perry for position on police force was read and referred to the Police and License Committee.

A letter from Col. P. A. Gouthrie, enclosing a resolution in respect to the employment of returned soldiers was read and laid on the table.  
A petition from a number of ratepayers of Ward III was read. This petition asked that the petitioners names be added to the list of electors for the said ward.

The clerk explained that in making out the list of electors, he was guided by an official list procured from the Sec. Treasurer of the County. This list contained names of electors residing outside the Ward, but in the parish of Addington. He had gone over the list very carefully and put all names on which he thought were entitled to vote. Some of the names of petitioners were on the official list.

As the act gave the Council no alternative in the matter, the petition was received and placed on file.

### CAMPBELLTON-GASPE STEAMSHIP SERVICE

Offer Made Owner of City of Ghent for a Service for Present Season

The Campbellton Board of Trade has had a strenuous time in endeavoring to arrange for an adequate steamship service between Campbellton and Gaspe.

It seems impossible to procure a boat capable of performing the usual service, so it was necessary to endeavor to provide the best service possible. The only steamer available was the S. S. City of Genth. This is a small coasting steamer, which last season plied between Pictou, Summerside and St. John's, Nfld. Unfortunately she is only a 9 knot boat and her captain would not undertake to make two round trips weekly, Campbellton and Gaspe, and the department would not give more than \$10,000 for a weekly service.

The Board of Trade then put forward the proposition that three round trips to Gaspe be made in two weeks, or one round trip to Gaspe and one round trip to Paspébiac each week.

The department at Ottawa has consented to pay \$15,000 for either of the above services, and Capt. Beattie, owner of the City of Genth, has been communicated with and it is likely he will accept this.

In order to arrange this matter, D. A. Stewart, M. L. A., went to Ottawa Saturday evening and met the Minister of Trade and Commerce Monday with W. S. Montgomery of Dalhousie.

### BATHURST BAPTIST MINISTER ORDAINED

A service of more than usual interest was held at Bathurst on April 11th inst.

In the afternoon a Council met composed of ministers and laymen to consider the advisability of setting apart to the Gospel ministry, Mr. Earle A. Kinly, who has been preaching for the Baptists here for nearly a year. The following ministers were present:

The statements were clear and most impressive. A rigid examination then followed. After the doctrine of the Church had been carefully canvassed and Mr. Kinly had retired, a Resolution was introduced by Rev. M. S. Richardson expressing great pleasure with the results of the examination and recommending Mr. Kinly's ordination. This was unanimously adopted by a standing vote.

SAYS DRINK FATHER OF ALL CRIMES

(Boston Post) In a forcible sermon on the evils of intemperance before 3000 men at the Cathedral of the Holy Cross last night, the third night of their week's mission, the Rev. Father Angelo, C. P. declared: "This degrading evil is the feeder of vice, the generator of poverty, the parent of luxury, the fomentor of dissension, the propagator of enmity, the instigator of lust, the suggester of sensuality, but you are still a man, but the demon of drunkenness lays hold of you and deprives you of your manhood, degrading and depraving your whole being. The almighty created man to his own image and likeness. This image of God in the nature of his soul is in an especial manner constituted by the intellect to be sublime and lofty, and by the will so divine and God-like in its operations. The dignity of man lies in this, his intellectual nature, which distinguishes him from the brute. Take it away, and he is like a brute, no longer has he that quality which makes him like an angel. Injects Venom in Mind. "Now, when man drinks to excess, he robs himself of his intellectual nature, and thus deprives himself of that noble prerogative that distinguishes him from the brute. Alcohol injects its venom into his mind, disturbing and suspending its power of action. It rushes the blood to the brain and causes a whirl of thought. In his frenzy he gulps down another cup, which creates confusion, and another, which completes total suspension of reason, destroying the vital operations, both of soul and body. "Oh, glow no trees near the tomb of the drunkard, for the hideous and eternal gloom that settles there is shade enough; plant no roses, no jessamines, no forget-me-nots on his grave, for flowers were not made to bloom on such a desecrated spot. Visit it not in the light of day, for that would be mockery, but in the dismal midnight hour, when no stars are out, and the moon is darkened, when the thunder rolls and the lightning flashes, and the spirits of darkness are shrieking and howling in the winds. Then, and only then, visit the grave of the drunkard. A Curse on the Home "Once the drunkard has a magnificent home. He had a happy family by the fireside, where blossomed the flowers of domestic happiness. He was the sturdy oak, she the clinging vine, the little children the fragrant flowers blooming beneath. That home in which the husband loves the wife and the wife loves the husband, and the loving arms of the little ones are around the necks of both, is a heaven in this world. Now that oak is blasted, that vine is withered, those flowers are drooping. That once happy home is wrecked and desolate. The demon of drink came to the door and opened it, and stood on the threshold, and in hellish laughter exclaimed, I curse that home into wretchedness, I curse the bread on the table, I curse that home with an eternal curse. Alas! Alas! that curse has fallen upon it. The husband is a confirmed drunkard."

NOVA SCOTIA DANCERS AND ALCOHOL

Men Who Know Tell Its Evil Effect Upon the System. The following resolution, passed at the meeting of the Medical Society of Nova Scotia held recently at Amherst will be read with interest: "That since it has been established that alcohol is not a food, in that none of its elements is incorporated into the tissues, and since the heat it produces by oxidation is over-compensated for through heat lost from the blood vessels of the skin, and since alcohol is not required to aid any physiological process, and since by its excessive use all systems of the body are injured and the moral nature so altered as to lead to crime, this meeting desires to impress the community with the benefits to be obtained by abstinence from alcohol as a beverage, and recommends its use only under medical advice. This meeting would warn the public that many patent medicines containing large amounts of alcohol are neither foods nor stimulants as advertised." This resolution was prepared by a committee of the Medical Society of Nova Scotia, composed of Dr. D. MacIntosh, Prof. J. Fraser Harris and Prof. A. G. Nicholls.







### THE MURDER PRINCIPLE.

The strong literary propaganda of the liquor interests just now is plainly indicative of a lost cause. History has unmistakably shown that when a cause, for any reason, found itself about to be buried it made a great effort to show the public that it still had the seeds of life within it. When Germany discovered that she was desperately wrong, she flooded the whole world with literature in a determined effort to prove that she was right. So it is today with the liquor propagandists. They see clearly the "Mene, Mene, Tekel Upharsin" written on the wall and are using their last breath to try to make it evident that they are not wanting. One man of every thousand in the United States is a drunkard. So says a contemporary writer and upon this basis he would recommend high license for those who fulfill certain conditions. Now, the argument from analogy has always proved an effective logical instrument. It will prove useful here. By parity of reasoning, murder should be licensed because one man says out of every 500,000 is a murderer. Since this is approximately the case, following out the argument of the writer, the Government ought to license certain men who pay a certain fee to commit murder. This should be done because it was discovered that one out of every 500,000 was a murderer in his heart. That is, since there are a few men with murderous purposes, a free hand should be given to all to become external murderers.

Referring to the drunkard, the writer in question goes on to say: "On him and on him alone, falls the burden for his excesses." What kind of an ethic is this? Even Cain in the dim beginnings of the race was corrected by the Divine voice when he questioned whether he was his brother's keeper or no. Every man is tied in with the rest of the race. No man is a bare item without a link in this world. The crass individualism of the writer is a characteristic of all who have engaged in this damnable traffic in moderate times. They flaunt fearful temptation in the face of the weak and when the crime of drinking the degrading and paralyzing stuff is committed, the poor victim is pushed out into the cold with the reminder: "You have yourself entirely to blame." Similar individualism subconsciously simmering in the German mind for many years caused Germany to throw over every national obligation and outrage the world by a barbarous war.

The illustration of the Shepherd after losing one sheep not hindering the others from grazing because he lost one, displays a perversity of mind almost unbelievable. The point is that the Shepherd cares so much for each individual sheep that it tears his heart to lose one and thus he would take extra precaution, after the loss, to guard the others not from necessary food but from getting into dangerous places. The region into which the sheep stray was dangerous by nature and if the Shepherd could have barred the way to the wilderness, he would certainly have done so. Freedom does not mean the absence of law but the voluntary submitting to the best law. The freedom of the Feeje Islands is not craved by any of us.

The case of Norway and its attitude towards prohibition is highly exceptional. Norway is but a little speck when you have in view the number of its population. Russia with sixty times the population of Norway has introduced and is successfully carrying out absolute prohibition. England has cut down unsparringly the number of licenses to sell intoxicating liquors and France is using strenuous efforts to bring her people under prohibition, which is evidenced by the fact that recently 222,000 French women affixed their signatures to a petition to be presented to the Chamber of Deputies requesting severe restrictions for the traffic. Canada has most of its Provinces under prohibition. For instance, Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, Ontario, Manitoba, Alberta and Saskatchewan have it, and only Quebec, British Columbia and New Brunswick remain with licenses the last two of which, with great certainty as to the outcome, will vote on the question very soon. At the beginning of 1917 the only place in the whole Dominion where liquor will be manufactured and sold will be Quebec. If we deduct the population of Quebec we will have approximately 5,000,000 people in the Dominion under prohibition.

Now the depth of the despair of the liquor men may be judged by the fact that, having allowed their wine-inflamed imagination to roam over the face of the world, they have found one small country that records quite a large majority against prohibition. This is only the ghost of an argument and indicates that the liquor men are now defending the last line of trenches, for the prohibitionists have broken through.



While Europe is in the throes of the greatest conflict the world has ever witnessed, Canada is waging a war against King Alcohol. While the first is killing its thousands, the last is slaying its tens of thousands and sad to say, not only the body but the soul of its victim.

The battle with the bar-room in Canada is making remarkable progress, more notably in the year that is past. Let us consider some of the onward march of prohibition.

Prince Edward Island has full provincial prohibition.

New Brunswick has prohibition in 10 of its 15 counties and in 2 of its three cities.

In Quebec, two thirds of the province is dry, 906 municipalities are dry; 237 wet.

Manitoba went dry in March and in June, 1915, all licenses are to be cut off. The vote for prohibition was two to one.

Saskatchewan closed up all her bar-rooms on June 30th, 1915. Other sale greatly restricted by a vote of 58,295 to 37,509; almost a two to one vote for complete prohibition in that splendid western province.

British Columbia is engaged now in a great agitation for prohibition. The business men are organized separate,



There is a bright prospect of Western Canada from the Great Lakes to the Pacific going dry in the immediate future and the West will be sending its Temperance missionaries down East to help out Old Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia to finish up the work of King Alcohol.

Every right thinking man and woman should ask themselves the question, Am I doing as much as I ought to do, Am I making sacrifice in order to win in the battle with the bar-room in my beloved Canada?

We find among the bar-rooms most powerful allies the following Pleas: 1, Person Liberty. 2nd, Prohibition does not prohibit. 3rd, Business will suffer.

Look at Plea No. 1. The greatest good to the greatest number is the touchstone of what is to be permitted and marks the limit of personal liberty. Sanitary Laws limit liberty and the community says to us "Thou shalt" and "Thou shalt not."

Plea No. 2. If prohibition does not prohibit, why do the liquor people fight against it. No law absolutely prohibits. This is true of the law against murder, theft and every other crime, but no one uses this face as an argument against those laws.

Plea No. 3. The liquor business suffers, commercialized vice suffers, the grave digger has less to do. The doctor has less bones to set and less typhoid and tuberculosis to fight.

But the bulk of the money spent over the bar comes to be spent over the counter for dry goods, groceries, meat, clothing, real estate home building, banking.

What answer does Russia make to Plea No. 3?

On Tuesday, April 18th, the citizens of Campbellton will have an opportunity to declare themselves as to what side they are on in this great battle. Ward I has been dry and will remain so, but the battle will be fought in Wards II and III. Ward II is dry at present, while Ward III is under the stigma of license.
