The nominations for Mayor and Aldermen for the Town of Campbellton passed off very quietly on Tuesday. The much talked of opposition ticket failed to materialize and at the last moment it was found necessary to get candidates for Ward I, as Coun. McLean would not again act, and Coun. Evans did not wish to offer. However, Coun. Evans at the request of a number of ratepayers, allowed himself to be placed in nomination along with Mr. John Harquail.

## TOWN COUNCIL HOLDS LAST MEETING

Little Business Before Board—Returning Officers Appointed For Ward III Election

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Council Chamber Tuesday evening, His Worship Mayor Andrew presiding.

There were present Couns. Quinn, Patterson, McLean, Ellsworth, Goss, Evans, Miller and Alexander.

An application from S. A. Perry for position on police force was read and referred to the Police and License Committee.

A letter from Col. P. A. Gauthier, enclosing a resolution in respect to the employment of returned soldiers was read and laid on the table.

A petition from a number of ratepayers of Ward III was read. This petition asked that the petitioners names be added to the list of electors for the said ward.

The clerk explained that in making out the list of electors, he was guided by an official list procured from the Sec. Treasurer of the County. This list contained names of electors residing outside the Ward, but in the parish of Addington. He had gone over the list very carefully and put all names on which he thought were entitled to vote. Some of the names of petitioners were on the official list.

As the act gave the Council no alternative in the matter, the petition was received and placed on file.

## CAMPBELLTON-GASPE STEAMSHIP SERVICE

Offer Made Owner of City of Ghent for a Service for Present Season

The Campbellton Board of Trade has had a strenuous time in endeavoring to arrange for an adequate steamship service between Campbellton and Gaspé.

It seems impossible to procure a boat capable of performing the usual service, so it was necessary to endeavor to provide the best service possible. The only steamer available was the S. S. City of Ghent. This is a small coasting steamer, which last season plied between Pictou, Summerside and St. John's, Nfld. Unfortunately she is only a 9 knot boat and her captain would not undertake to make two round trips weekly, Campbellton and Gaspé, and the department would not give more than \$10,000 for a weekly service.

The Board of Trade then put forward the proposition that three round trips to Gaspé be made in two weeks, or one round trip to Gaspé and one round trip to Paspébiac each week.

The department at Ottawa has consented to pay \$15,000 for either of the above services, and Capt. Beattie, owner of the City of Ghent, has been communicated with and it is likely he will accept this.

In order to arrange this matter, D. A. Stewart, M. L. A., went to Ottawa Saturday evening and met the Minister of Trade and Commerce Monday with W. S. Montgomery of Dalhousie.

BATHURST BAPTIST MINISTER ORDAINED

A service of more than usual interest was held at Bathurst on April 11th inst.

In the afternoon a Council met composed of ministers and laymen to consider the advisability of setting apart to the Gospel ministry, Mr. Earle A. Kinly, who has been preaching for the Baptist here for nearly a year. The following ministers were present:

The Council was organized by appointing Rev. W. Camp, Moderator and Mr. McLean, Secretary. Rev. M. S. Richardson was chosen to ask the candidate some questions. All the members of the Council favored the candidate with questioning. Mr. Kinly read a statement of his conversion and call to the ministry and views of Christian doctrine. The statements were clear and most impressive. A rigid examination then followed. After the doctrine of the Church had been carefully canvassed and Mr. Kinly had retired, a Resolution was introduced by Rev. M. S. Richardson expressing great pleasure with the results of the examination and recommending Mr. Kinly's ordination. This was unanimously adopted by a standing vote.

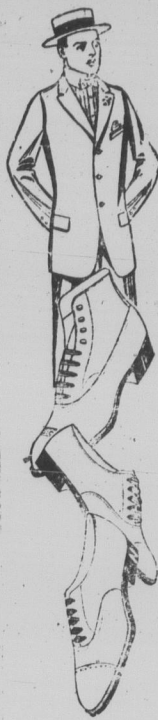

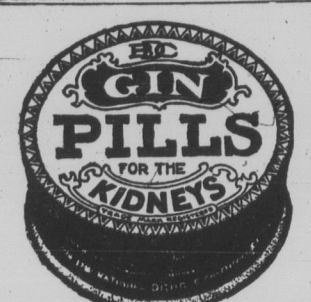

NO IMPROVEMENT The blocking of the Andrew, Cedar and Prince William street crossings continues and the matter should receive immediate attention or loss of life will result.

Every day we expect to have a tragedy to report from one of these crossings, and it will continue until there seems only one way to remedy this. Extend Central street to Water and build another subway. If the matter is taken in hand now, before the vacant lot from Union to Water is built upon this extension could be made at a very reasonable figure.

The Board of Trade and Town Council should act in this matter at once.

DO YOUR DUTY. England expects every man to do his duty.

At a time of great crisis in the affairs of the world, a hero of England used this phrase to thrill and animate his men. The men under Admiral Lord Nelson nobly answered to the devotion of their dearly loved leader. These memorable words have gone down in history to the present time and will last as long as the British Empire lasts and will serve as optimistic words to invigorate every true man in the path of duty.

We, as citizens of the Town of Campbellton are at a critical period in our civic life. Ward III, tired of the incubus of a so-called legalized traffic in the sale of a commodity designed for the ruin of men's bodies and worse, infinitely worse—the ruin of men's souls—has asked for a remedy to free themselves from this nightmare. The citizens have asked for the privilege of expressing by vote their opinion of a traffic that asks for a license to sell intoxicants—And why forsooth!—a license. Those who frequent these licensed places where intoxicants are sold, lose the confidence of their fellows, they—but why prolong the discussion. Men and women of Campbellton, inhabitants of Ward II, as well as Ward III, what about the immortal words of the hero of ancient days. Let us make this grand old watchword our watchword. Campbellton expects every man to do his duty! And what is your duty—Take the question home with you. Before this paper goes to press again, your opportunity will have been passed by. Your right as citizens to express your conviction in favour of a clear chance for your sons' and daughters' welfare, will have been used.

"Once to every man and nation, Comes the moment to decide!" Decide, citizens! decide to give your boys freedom from the incubus of a licensed place of business. Don't give the liquor business a license. Reserve to yourselves the right and privilege to shut up a liquor-selling place at once and at any time that it violates the law; the same as you would a grocery store that harassed the customers or an establishment of any kind that was a menace to the body politic.

Napoleon in his day was a menace to the peace of Europe and to the success and happiness of the British Isles. Nelson, in answer to the call of his country, gave at first his services and at last, his life to the suppression of this monster. He called upon his followers and the lovers of true freedom to do their duty. This paper calls upon the citizens of Campbellton in the spirit of that noble patriot, to rise up on the 18th inst., and in the might of a noble energy, do that duty which is taught to us by a magnificent history of a magnificent people who will not, cannot be enslaved either by a living enemy or by a licensed traffic.

Men of Campbellton, in the light of our glorious history, the history of civilization, that highest civilization taught by God's Son, that civilization that builds up, that civilization that gives our brother man the same chance, at least, as ourselves, that civilization that makes the path easier for a brother man in the dark, groping for a new foothold to enable him to reach higher solid ground, we ask you,—just this. Do your duty.

Your sons have gone to Europe in response to a sense of duty to fight and die for truth and an equal chance for all and in memory of their noble example of self-sacrifice, can we, dare we, go to the poll and vote to perpetuate a menace for the untimely feet of our noble, self-sacrificing sons.

And remember, it may be too late, if we do not accept this, our opportunity to do our duty.

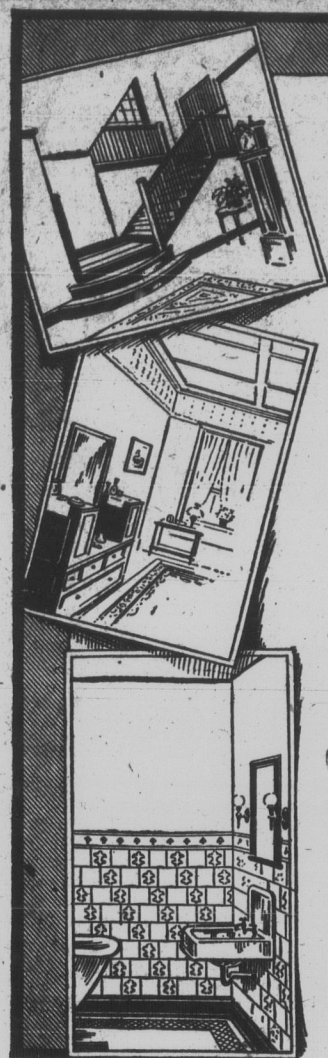

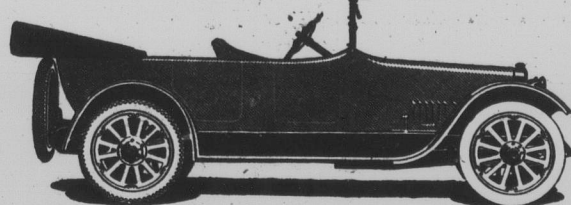

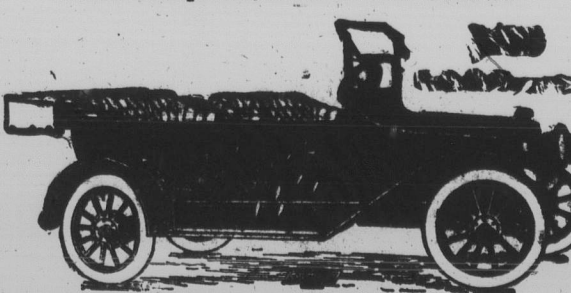

## THE MURDER PRINCIPLE.

The strong literary propaganda of the liquor interests just now is plainly indicative of a lost cause. History has unmistakably shown that when a cause, for any reason, found itself about to be buried it made a great effort to show the public that it still had the seeds of life within it. When Germany discovered that she was desperately wrong, she flooded the whole world with literature in a determined effort to prove that she was right. So it is today with the liquor propagandists. They see clearly the "Mene, Mene, Tekel Upharsin" written on the wall and are using their last breath to try to make it evident that they are not wanting.

One man of every thousand in the United States is a drunkard. So says a contemporary writer and upon this basis he would recommend high license for those who fulfil certain conditions. Now, the argument from analogy has always proved an effective logical instrument. It will prove useful here. By parity of reasoning, murder should be licensed because one man out of every 500,000 is a murderer. Since this is approximately the case, following out the argument of the writer, the Government ought to license certain men who pay a certain fee to commit murder. This should be done because it was discovered that one out of every 500,000 was a murderer in his heart. That is, since there are a few men with murderous purposes a free hand should be given to all to become external murderers.

Referring to the drunkard, the writer in question goes on to say: "On him and on him alone, falls the burden for his excesses." What kind of an ethic is this? Even Cain in the dim beginnings of the race was corrected by the Divine voice when he questioned whether he was his brother's keeper or no. Every man is tied in with the rest of the race. No man is a hare item without a link in this world. The crass individualism of the writer is a characteristic of all who have engaged in this damnable traffic in moderate times. They flaunt fearful temptation in the face of the weak and when the crime of drinking the degrading and paralyzing stuff is committed, the poor victim is pushed into the cold with the reminder: "You have yourself entirely to blame." Similar individualism subconsciously simmering in the German mind for many years caused Germany to throw over every national obligation and outrage the world by a barbarous war.

The illustration of the Shepherd after losing one sheep not hindering the others from grazing because he lost one, displays a perversity of mind almost unbelievable. The point is that the Shepherd cares so much for each individual sheep that it tears his heart to lose one and thus he would take extra precaution, after the loss, to guard the others not from necessary food but from getting into dangerous places. The region into which the sheep strayed was dangerous by nature and if the Shepherd could have barred the way to the wilderness, he would certainly have done so. Freedom does not mean the absence of law but the voluntary submitting to the best law. The freedom of the Fee Islands is not craved by any of us.

The case of Norway and its attitude towards prohibition is highly exceptional. Norway is but a little speck when you have in view the number of its population. Russia with sixty times the population of Norway has introduced and is successfully carrying out absolute prohibition. England has cut down unparagonably the number of licenses to sell intoxicating liquors and France is using strenuous efforts to bring her people under prohibition, which is evidenced by the fact that recently 222,000 French women affixed their signatures to a petition to be presented to the Chamber of Deputies requesting severe restrictions for the traffic. Canada has most of its Provinces under prohibition. For instance, Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, Ontario, Manitoba, Alberta and Saskatchewan have it, and only Quebec, British Columbia and New Brunswick remain with licenses the last two of which, with great certainty as to the outcome, will vote on the question very soon. At the beginning of 1917 the only place in the whole Dominion where liquor will be manufactured and sold will be Quebec. If we deduct the population of Quebec we will have approximately 5,000,000 people in the Dominion under prohibition.

Now the depth of the despair of the liquor men may be judged by the fact that, having allowed their wine-inflamed imagination to roam over the face of the world, they have found one small country that records quite a large majority against prohibition. This is only the ghost of an argument and indicates that the liquor men are now defending the last line of trenches, for the prohibitionists have broken through.

ugh the wire entanglements and are about to give license its death blow. It is nothing but the wall of a lost soul when Norway with its two and a quarter millions is cited as an example to support the liquor cause in the face of the 130,000,000 of dry Russia and the millions under prohibition in Canada. Why, Norway has only about the population of Ontario and the sweeping victory for prohibition as a legislative measure in the latter Province more than balances the alleged stand taken by Norway against prohibition.

The fact that the "American people spend \$300,000,000 annually for patent medicine" with a large percentage of alcohol, is no argument that Canada should license the bar. It is a glaring non sequitur. If America spends \$500,000,000 annually on patent medicine, she also spends \$2,000,000,000 on strong drink which would give \$400.00 per year to 5,000,000 families. The above argument would indicate that the cure for poison is more poison; the cure for sin is more sin; the cure for evil is more evil. The fallacy is evident to all. Evil cannot be cured by giving it a license just as malaria cannot be cured by more malaria or by allowing everyone to expose himself in the malarial zone.

Not there is no way of dealing successfully with strong drink except by spiritual or physical prohibition. Cato ended every public utterance with: "Delenda est Carthago—Carthage must be destroyed." So every man who thinks deeply enough and feels strongly enough and lives earnestly enough will say: "Liquor must be prohibited; license must be destroyed!" Let every voter present himself at the polls on the 18th of the month and do his part in bringing about local prohibition.

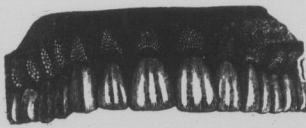

While Europe is in the throes of the greatest conflict the world has ever witnessed, Canada is waging a war against King Alcohol. While the last is killing its thousands, the last is slaying its tens of thousands and sad so sad, not only the body but the soul of its victim.

The battle with the bar-room in Canada is making remarkable progress, more notably in the year that is past. Let us consider some of the onward march of prohibition.

Prince Edward Island has full provincial prohibition.

New Brunswick has prohibition in 10 of its 15 counties and in 2 of its three cities.

In Quebec, two thirds of the province is dry, 906 municipalities are dry; 237 wet.

Manitoba went dry in March and in June, 1915, all licenses are to be cut off. The vote for prohibition was two to one.

Saskatchewan closed up all her bar-rooms on June 30th, 1915. Other sale greatly restricted by a vote of 58,295 to 37,509, almost a two to one vote for complete prohibition in that splendid western province.

British Columbia is engaged now in a great agitation for prohibition. The business men are organized separate,
