CANCER IN BUTTERCUP NO POLES NEEDED SAYS THE PHYSICIAN FOR WIRELESS NOW

He Urges That Buttercups be Entombed as Safeguard.

[SOME EXPERIMENT

ANSWERED QUERIES

PHILADELPHIA, Monday.—Dr. W. W. Chaffant, whose declaration that many cases of measles are due to a poison contained in the common field buttercups, attracted considerable attention, is out with another statement in arraignment of the flower.

He now accuses it of being the cause of cancer. "The active poisons in the buttercup," says Dr. Chaffant, "are substances which produce inflammation at contact, and when taken internally may cause inflammation of the stomach and convulsions, and frequently death. The poison is transferred also in milk and meat."

The familiar and to many persons disagreeable smell of mutton, he asserts, is distinctly cancerous. He states that he has produced conditions similar to those of cancer by rubbing healthy flesh with buttercups, and declares that, in all probability the disease has its origin in the meat or milk of animals which eat the flowers. He urges the destruction of the bloom.

Messages Caught by Home Made Instruments in Basement.

RICHMOND, Mo., Monday.—D. C. Elliott, professor of science in the Richmond High School, heard a strange clicking in the basement of the school yesterday. Investigating, he traced the noise to a wireless telegraph instrument he had made to instruct his pupils. It had been stored in the basement while not in use.

Prof. Elliott sent for a telegraph operator and by means of the basement apparatus he says, he read messages going from wireless stations at Santa Cruz, Cal., and Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. He also responded to the queries made by the wireless operators when they found the new station on the line, and told them the Richmond station had no noisy poles or wires and was home made.

CONCRETE HOUSES

Considerable progress has been made in the design and construction of concrete houses. Twelve months ago there were many concrete block houses a few months ago, of moderate cost, with here and there a costly mansion of solid concrete. Today there are countless block houses and a vast number of multiple houses ranging in cost from three or four thousand dollars to hundreds of thousands. Architects everywhere are thoroughly interested in concrete and its possibilities and the result is in the recent improvements in design, which has included the block house as well as the more costly and pretentious monolithic structure. One noticeable feature is the increasing use of cement plaster. There is promise that this process will eventually be applied to cheaper houses with great success. Another noteworthy feature is the discovery of the fact that in a number of instances concrete houses which at first admitted moisture freely have become waterproof with time. This is a more important consideration than would appear at first thought, for dampness in concrete walls has been the chief objection cited by the opponents of concrete. With the use of a reliable waterproofing compound to start with, we are likely to hear less and less of damp walls. Another pleasing feature of recent progress is the distinct advance made in the use of concrete blocks. Some of the finest residences in the country have been built of blocks, and not blocks produced in fantastic or intricate shapes, but an honest and severely plain unit that has answered every purpose when treated frankly. And in the matter of monolithic walls there has been a return to common sense opposed to strained or bizarre treatment. To sum up the situation, architects and builders are going right ahead with concrete house construction producing admirable results in every sense of the word, and matters have now reached the point where some insist that even the first coat of concrete may be brought down below that of wood, brick or stone.

Fishing Schooner Fame of Boston Was Run Into And Cut In Two By D. A. R. Steamer Boston.

ONLY TWO SURVIVORS

YARMOUTH, Wednesday.—The Boston fishing schooner Fame, of about ninety tons, commanded by Captain Thomas Fay, a native of Newfoundland, was run into and sunk on Chesapeake Bank at 2 o'clock last evening by D. A. R. liner Boston, Captain MacKenzie, which arrived here at 2 o'clock this morning from Boston. The Fame was proceeding at slow speed at the time of the accident, and her whistle was kept blowing. The fog was very dense and the schooner could not be seen or heard until she was struck. The Boston went right through her just aft of the main rigging and the Fame sank within three minutes. The steamer was immediately stopped and boats lowered. One boat was lost overboard by mishap, but two more were in the water immediately. The cook, Pitts, was found with a life-buoy around him, while Clarke was swimming about. All the rest of the crew had gone down. According to survivors who were seen this morning, the Fame left Boston four weeks ago Monday on a smelt fishing trip. She then had twenty three men on board. One of the crew became sick and was landed at Booth Bay and on Monday a boy containing two men whose names are unknown strayed from the vessel and were not seen again. It was the captain's intention to have started for home today. He had a fare of 100.000 lbs. &
