### AN ACT

To incorporate sundry persons by the name of the St. Andrews Water Company.

BE IT ENACTED, by the Lieutenant Governor, Legislative Council, and Assembly, as follows:

1. That Benjamin F. Milliken, John Aymer, Wm. Whitlock, Benjamin H. Stevenson, James W. Chandler, and their associates, successors and assigns, be and they are hereby constituted and declared to be a body corporate by the name of "The St. Andrews Water Company" and shall have all the powers and privileges made incident to a Corporation by Act of Assembly of this Province, for the purpose of supplying the inhabitants of the said Town of St. Andrews with Water, and for carrying on and managing the necessary works therewith connected.

2. The capital stock of the said Corporation, shall consist of Four thousand dollars current money of this Province, to be divided into four hundred shares of ten dollars each, to be paid as may be required by the President and Directors of the said Company, for the use thereof, they giving one month's notice in a newspaper published in St. Andrews, that any part thereof will be required: Provided that the said Corporation shall have power to increase the said capital stock to a sum not exceeding ten thousand dollars.

3. When over one hundred shares have been subscribed, a general meeting of the members and stockholders, or a major part of them, shall take place by notice in a newspaper published in the town of St. Andrews, for the purpose of choosing five directors, being stockholders in the Corporation, under and in pursuance of the rules and regulations hereinafter provided, which directors so chosen shall continue in office until others are chosen in their room, and shall have full power and authority to manage the affairs of the said Corporation.

4. There shall be a general meeting of the stockholders of the said Corporation to be annually held at St. Andrews on the first Tuesday in May, in each and every year, at which annual meeting there shall be chosen by a majority of three of Five Directors, who shall continue in office for one year or until others are chosen in their stead and the Directors when chosen shall at their first meeting after their election, choose out of their number a President.

5. Not less than three Directors shall constitute a board for the transaction of business, of which the President shall always be one, except in cases of sickness or necessary absence, in which case the Directors present may choose a chairman in his stead. The President or Chairman shall vote as the Board as a director, and in case of an equal number of votes for or against any question before them, the president or chairman shall have a casting vote.

6. The number of votes which each stockholder shall be entitled to give, on every occasion when in conformity with the provisions of this Act, the votes of the stockholders are to be given, shall be given in the following proportion: for one share and not more than four shares, one vote; for every four shares above four and not exceeding twenty, one vote; and for every eight shares above twenty and not exceeding sixty, one vote; and nine votes shall be the greatest number that any stockholder shall be entitled to.

7. All stockholders may vote by proxy, provided such proxy be a stockholder, and produce sufficient authority in writing so to act.

8. The shares of the capital or stock shall be assignable and transferable according to the rules and regulations that may be established in that behalf. But no assignment or transfer shall be valid or effectual unless the same shall be entered as a registered in a book kept by the directors for that purpose: nor until such person or persons so making the same shall previously discharge all debts actually due and payable to the said Corporation, and all calls that may have been made for payment of stocks: but in no case shall any fractional part of a share be assignable.

9. It shall and may be lawful for the said Corporation, at a proper and convenient depth under the surface of each and every of the roads and streets through or on which it may be necessary to make reservoirs, or lay down, set, and place such and so many pipes, leaders, and conduits for the said water as they shall find it necessary for carrying it to any or every building, dug well house, or ore, in the said town of St. Andrews, and from time to time as often as the said Company shall think necessary and proper to lay down such pipes, leaders, and conduits or shall have occasion to alter, amend, or repair the same. It shall also be lawful for the said Company to break up and open any part whatsoever of the said roads or streets or of the side walks thereof, and the same to keep open and uncovered during the time necessary for the said purposes. Provided always that the said Company shall and do at their own costs and charges, and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of the said roads or streets, not without unnecessary delay, repair and amend the said roads and streets in every part where they shall be broken up and opened as aforesaid, to the condition in which they were before breaking up or opening the same.

10.
