POWERS HAVE AT LAST AGREED

On the Note Proposed by the Envoys at Peking.

Waiting Now the Decision of Great Britain—Another Anti-Foreign Rising Planned.

London, Dec. 10.—A Peking dispatch, dated Dec. 9, says: "All the foreign envoys except Sir Ernest Mason Satow, the British minister, have received instructions from their governments, agreeing to the joint note proposed at the last meeting."

INTERNATIONAL CLUB. The International Club has been opened, its object being to bring together in a spirit of social harmony, the officers and diplomats of the various nations.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—The text of the agreement reached between the envoys at Peking has been received at the state department, and a great process of translation from the cipher code.

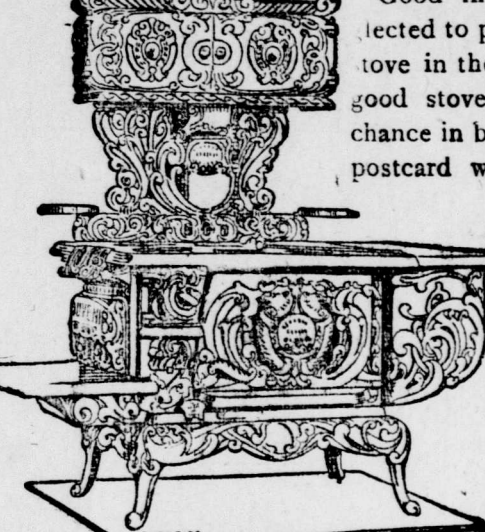

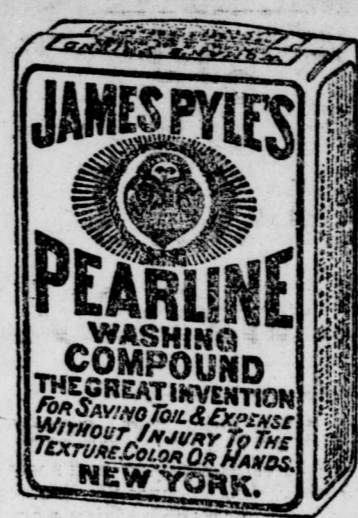
