By this remarkable apparatus he can render sensible the heat of a candle up to the distance of a mile and three-quarters, and by directing the minute disk of the instruments the moon he has shown that the warmth received from its reflected light is equal to that given out by a candle at 21 feet distant. Observation seems to show that, although the moon's face is under the blaze of an unclouded sun for fourteen days, it remains comparatively cool, and that whatever heating it does ultimately receive is rapidly gained and as rapidly lost.

The abandonment of Iceland by its inabitants is one of the most in episodes in the shifting of population that the world has ever known. BERLIN, May 17 .- In the debate on the army Bill in the Reichstag, Herr Liebknecht declared that the nation would soon knecht declared that the nation would soon be ruined by the heavy burden of militar-ism. Count Von Moltke had warned them that if war broke out it might last seven or 30 years. Could such immense masses of troops as would be engaged in future wars be maintained for a single year? Germany had enough men ready for any contingency. Prince Bismarck, he said, could have avert-ed the last Russo-Turkish war. Instead of that he supported in general ways. that he supported in every way Russia's

aggression.

Herr Karboff defended Prince Bismarck's policy. The burden of taxation was balanced by twenty years of peace and prosperity, obtained through success in

The British Fleet in Chinese Waters LONDON, May 17 .- A court of inquiry is sitting at Hong Kong to ascertain the causes of the accidents which attended causes of the accidents which attended the maneuvers of the British fleet in Chinese waters. In one instance a torpedo boat went full speed ahead instead of astern, owing to some blunder in the engine room. The consequence was that another boat was almost sunk in collision. Several other boats had narrow escapes from being driven on rocks. The Alacrity, a dispatch boat, ran ashore in a fog, with the admiral on board, receiving great damage. Altogether the maneuvers were more disastrous than some battles. The Government is preparing to establish extensive fortifications in Western Australia, the Australian Government to stand the cost of the works and the Imperial Government to furnish the armament. This is following out the policy of placing the colonies in a defensive condition, which prompted the fortifying of Vancouver's Island, British Columbia, and is to be pursued generally wherever Great Vancouver's Island, Drivin Columbia, and is to be pursued generally wherever Great Britain has valuable possessions. ## THE PIT OF DEATH

Carelessness the Cause of the Ashley Mine Horror.

The Exact Number of Victims Still Uncertain

Searching for the Bodies--Scenes of Horror-A Brave Man.

other Disaster-750 Men's Lives Deadly Peril, But They All Escape.

WILKESBARRE, May 16.—Fire Boss Allen, who was rescued from the mine alive last night, died this morning. A large party of rescuers to-day entered the slope and commenced working upon the cave beyond where three men were found last night. They soon broke through and rushed into the chamber beyond, where a close search revealed six blackened corpses near the opening, none of them recognizable. close search revealed six blackened corpses near the opening, none of them recognizable. Further along at various places were found thirteen other bodies, all more or less burned, but most of them could be recognized. The sight was so horrible that two or three rescuers fainted. When the news of the finding of the bodies became noised about a scene ensued around the mouth of the slope which will never be forgotten. A strong guard held back the women, who pressed forward madly to enter the mine. Half an hour later four men appeared bearing a body on the stretcher. pressed the mine. Half an hour later four men appeared bearing a body on the stretcher. The woman tore away the blanket, but saw only the blackened and charred remains. Other bodies were brought out as fast as possible, and at noon all but six of those who were in the mine when the cave-in occurred had been found. At 1 o'clock two more bodies had been brought out. Anthony Froyne and R. W. Roberts, who were rescued last night, are in a critical condition. It is believed they will die.

THE CAUSE.

General Superintendent Phillips to-day said: "The men lost their lives through the negligence of Assistant Mine Boss Allen, who insisted on relighting his lamp in the presence of large volumes of gas. Had he not done so the men now dead could all have been rescued alive, as there was a good current of air going through the chamber where the men had taken refuge after the cave-in had occurred."

The cave-in is believed to be due to the excessive amount of coal removed, not sufficient being left to carry the superincumbent rock. The roof was specially dangerous. Only a week ago two fire bosses were convicted of criminal carelessness and fined \$50 cach, and another is now awaiting trial, while several others have lost their lives along with several fellowworkmen. INSPECTOR WILLIAMS' BRAVERY.

It is now learned that it was through the daring efforts of Mine Inspector Williams that the fate of the imprisoned miners was learned this morning. After numerous attempts to enter the mine through the newly-made opening, the officials concluded the air current must be changed, and left with their workmen for this purpose. A CHAMBER OF HORRORS.

By the faint glow of their lamps the two men discovered on every side corpses blackened, burned and mangled. The Mine Inspector counted the bodies, nineteen in all. Here lay a man with his head missing, there a boy stripped of every shred of clothing and covered with wounds. Another lay near by with one arm and one boot blown off. 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





J. O'Donoghue, of Coronto, and that seven years ago he held out hopes of many offices and good things

I have also borne in mind that the meeting of the council was called without your knowledge: that your advice as to the resolutions presented had not been asked, and that you as they were presented to the council.

address asserts as well as by what it omits that it was prepared with the evident pur-pose of injuring Mr. Mowat, whereas the purpose of the association's existence was to protest against ultramontane influence at Ottawa and in the Province of Quebec. On three other leading features of the manifesto, also, Mr. Charlton is very clearly in opposition to the members of the committee resto, also, Mr. Charton is very clearly in opposition to the members of the committee who prepared that document. He says:

That portion of the address relating to French schools in Ontario indicates as destrable a course of action which, it strikes me, has been as fully compiled with by the regulation of the Department of Education, in force since the 10th of February last, as present circumstances render possible. The address says that the council halls these regulations with satisfaction, but the expression immediately after contained, that further legislation or departmental regulations will be required "to eradicate the evil"—implying that the Government has not yet done its duty fully in the premises—is hardly warranted by the facts of the case, so far as I am able to judge.

I can hardly acquiesce in the assertion that the principle that every person must be considered to be a public school supporter unless, being a Roman Catholic, he had by proper notice declared hinself a supporter of separate schools, had, at least prior to the legislation of last session, been violated by the School Law. In 1886 the Attorney-General of Ontario emphatically denied that such was the case. The question was subsequently referred to the Chancery Division of the High Court of Justice for Omario, and the decision of the court was held to sustain the opinion of the Attorney-General.

The friends of the Mowat Government have every reason for aiding in securing the return of an honorable, upright, able gepresentative, who can be relied upon to the formulation of the Attorney. I cannot give my assent. The statement implies a doubt when, in my belief, unqualified approval is fully deserved, and I am prepared to express a positive opinion that the act to amend the Public and Separate Schools Act, which received the royal assent on the 7th of Atlant, does remove all ambiguity and doubt as to the question.

Tate schools are guaranteed by the British North America Act, and that this provision has been declared against by the council of the association. While I am, upon principle, opposed to separate denominational schools receiving State aid, and while I consider the separate school system of Ontario an evil, it would I think be proper, for the full information of the Ontario elector, to state in any address upon the subject that the same guarantee which secures Catholic separate schools in Ontario secures valued educational rights and separate public schools to the Protestant minority of Quebec, and that the constitutional guarantee and settlement if withdrawn from one is also withdrawn from the other, as it applies jointly to both Provinces. This being the status of the case in both Ontario and Quebec, the question is a very deletate one, and it is a matter worthy of serious consideration as to what extent action should be taken in the premises without the interests of the Protestants of Quebec being considered, and their approval and cooperation secured.

But of course it will be replied in his case that his name was attached to the address. This is true, and in view of the statements of his letter some curiosity is felt as to the manner in which he was prevailed upon to sign against his better judgment. No doubt he was strongly pressed by the two lawyers, whose pro fessional skill would readily find reasons, foremost of which would be the specious one that it is the duty of the chairman of a council or committee to put his name to any document which may be approved by a majority of the members. It would be said that a reeve or mayor is bound to attach his name officially to any eport or minute carried by a majority of the councilors, and that in so doing he does not necessarily give his personal concur ence, and that the rule which applies in this way to a reeve or mayor applies also to a chairman. We can readily understand how an argument of this sort, cunningly arged, might impress a guileless man like Dr. Caven, especially if, as is not unlikely, t was also pressed by some of his more imoulsive brethren in the ministry. However that may be, his letter shows conclusively that he was not upon all points in agreenent with the terms of the address.

But there are many other signs of strong and healthy action against the dishonest tactics of Mr. Mcredith and Mr. McCarthy. The withdrawal of Rev. 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
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
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

And now remember June 5, 1890, when the staunch upholder of Ontario's rights and of a policy just to every class and creed in the Province will again be returned by a large majority, or indications and the private confessions of candid Conservatives mean nothing.

Yes, brethren, let us keep on remember ing. The memories of the past are happy auguries for the future. The Province is safe, and will be kept so.

EAST MIDDLESEX.

Mr. T. H. Purdom, the Liberal candidate for East Middlesex, has met with a very warm reception from the electors of the ridwarm reception from the electors of the rid-ing. The meetings addressed by him and his friends have been well attended, and the convincing arguments in favor of the Ontario Government and against the course pursued by its opponents have been listened to with apparently much interest. Mr. Tooley and his friends have been on the stump, too, but it is painfully apparent that they have a poor case, as their stock-intrade seems to be misrepresentation of the Liberal platform and the fomenting of religious discord. Fortunately, the men chosen as representatives of Protestantism, which has never been menaced by Hon. Oliver Mowat, and never will be menaced by a Government of which he is the onored head, are well known in the constituency. They have not been known as paragons of excellence any more than the candidate whose cause they advo-cate. That, in itself, would make most thinking people suspicious of their protestations, even were it not

be in a condition to look after their inter ests either in the Legislature or outside of it. They will not have to apologize for his conduct either in or outside the House. Besides, he will be on the Government side of the House, and therefore in the confidence of those in authority, which Mr. Tooley can never hope to be. This will be a distinct gain to East Middlesex, which no doubt the majority of the electors will bear in mind when they come to vote.

CAMPAIGN FUNDS.

The London ADVERTISER admits that Mr. Mowat has asked civil service employes to contribute to his campaign funds, and can see no harm attached to it. There would be no harm providing the salestee of these officers were ttached to it. There would be no harm ing the salaries of these officers were ade compensatory to the amount sub-it—[Exeter Times. We have never admitted that Mr. Mowat

asked civil servants to contribute to his campaign funds. We believe that he has so. What we have admitted, however, is that the Liberal party is like every other kindred organization under the sun. It needs money for legitimate campaign purposes, such as hiring halls, conveyances, secretaries, and for printing necessary documents. And we have never had any fault to find with the civil servant or ordinary citizen who has been moved to make a contribution to a campaign fund in any constituency, we care not whether he is Liberal or Tory. But the Advertiser has objected, and will continue to object to the utterly indefensible method of raising campaign funds pursued by Sir John Macdonald. The subscriptions

to his campaign fund are not, like those to the Liberal fund, of a purely voluntary character. They are collected from men who have been granted monopolies in trade, for whose benefit the people have been highly taxed, and who have before now been called together, and told by Sir John Macdonald, in that suggestive phrase of his—"the hogs should remember who shakes the nuts from the tree for them"—that if they want continued favors they must provide the necessary ampaign funds. If any Liberal leader colected a campaign fund in that "stand and deliver" manner, we would just as readily condemn him as we do the Tory leader.

MR. MOWAT'S COMING VICTORY The tide is steadily, surely and strongly etting in against Mr. William Ralph Meredith and his supporters, and the present outlook is that he will have fewer followers in the coming Legislature than he had in the last one. His "No Popery" crusade and ultra-Protestant appeals might have produced some effect had he been so fortunate as to have made no political record. But when it is remembered that fifteen years ago he made a bid for Roman Catholic support by the promise of taking two nembers of that faith into the Cabinet should his friends succeed in upsetting the Government of Mr. Mowat, as declared pon the affidavit of D. J. O'Donoghue, of coronto, and that seven years ago he held out hopes of many offices and good things o Roman Catholics in the sheet of 'Facts for the Irish electors," no one can pelieve in his sincerity or honesty in now Protestant rights and the uncompromising

And added to the new departure of Mr Meredith is the changed attitude of the Equal Rights Association, as indicated in ne recent manifesto of the council of that body. As long as Dr. Caven was the trusted leader of that organization a middle course between the two parties was fairly steered; but when Dalton McCarthy and Douglas Armour took the management into their own hands, and called a meeting of the council and prepared beforehand a set of resolutions for adoption without consulting Dr. Caven, the association was fated to go upon the rocks. I have also borne in mind that the meeting of the council was called without your knowledge: that your advice as to the resolutions presented had not been asked, and that you as well as myself only knew what they were as they were presented to the council.

However that may be, his letter shows conclusively that he was not upon all points in agreeent with the terms of the address. But there are many other signs of strong

### HOUSEHOLD RECIPES.

Crust for two Pies.—Ingredients: One cup of lard, three cups of flour, three-quarter cup of ice water. Salt.

Peppermint Balls.—Two pounds of yellow sugar, one teacup of water, one dessert spoon vinegar; boil without stirring till a little dropped in cold water gets pretty hard; add as much essence of peppermint as you wish to flavor, pour it out on a 'grated tin and mark it in small squares; when cool enough cut it and roll it in balls.

Cocoanut Tablet. - Two pounds white Cocoanut Tablet. — Two pounds white sugar, one teacup water, one small cocoanut grated; peel the brown skin from the cocoanut and grate it finely; put the sugar and water on to boil for about five minutes, stirring all the time; then add the grated cocoanut and boil for a few minutes longer, until some dropped in cold water becomes a little firm when taken in the fingers; stir it a few minutes off the fire and pour it out on a greased tin. It will be hard in a short time.

Sprinkle places invested by ants with borax and you will soon be rid of them.

A little borax put in the water before washing red or red bordered tablecloths and napkins will prevent their fading.

Ringworms will yield to borax treatment. Apply a strong solution of borax three times a day, also dust on the fine dry powder very often.

Silver spoons and forks, in daily use, may be kept bright by leaving them in strong borax water several hours. The water should be boiling when they are put in.

Put a teaspoonful of borax in your rinsing water. It will whiten the clothes, and also remove the yellow cast on garments that have been laid aside for two or three years.

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

### About Boiling Food.

About Boiling Food.

There is in boiling and frying foods a very simple problem in physics, which most people ignore, viz., that of latent heat. When a piece of meat, a vegetable, or other article of food, which is at the ordinary temperature, 60 degs. to 75 degs. F., is placed in boiling water or fat, the temperature of the solution is lowered proportionately to the mass and temperature of perature of the solution is lowered propor-tionately to the mass and temperature of the article introduced; and it is not until the mass has absorbed more heat from the fire that the solution again comes to the

If care is taken, either by introducing If care is taken, either by introducing the food in small quantities at a time into the boiling solution, so that very little lowering of the temperature takes place, or by a preliminary heating of the food before adding it to the solution, and in every case allowing the solution to boil before introducing any fresh material, the soddenness of improperly holled or fried food. lenness of improperly boiled or fried foods will be avoided.—Science.



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
