Forty Deaths From Sunstroke in One
Day in New York.

New York, Aug. 11.—During the 24
hours ending at midnight there have been
40 cases of heat prostration in this city, all
of which have proved fatal. Hector has proved a veritable bombshell in political circles. He was not aware that his son Laforce Langevin had received a cent either directly or indirectly. He contended that his administration of the public works was perfectly henorable. the public works was perfectly honorable and that there had been no manipulation

of contracts.

In support of each assertion he quoted In support of each assertion he quoted documents and papers which he considered irrefutable of his innocence. With regard to Mr. Peters, who said he gave Sir Hector \$10,000 in 1887, the Minister said he had no recollection of the transaction.

Even if the payment was made for election purposes as Mr. Peters had declared under oath, it must be remembered, pointed out Sir Hector, that this alleged occurrence took place six years after Mr. Peters had ceased to perform work for the Public Works To

AN INSOLENT ATTACK ON ME

The London Free Press has for weeks been pretending that the recent address on the trade question by Mr. Hyman, M.P., was of no account whatever, but it appears of the International Hotel, happy and that the broad and patriotic discussion of the question of reciprocity by the member for London is giving our contemporary a great deal of trouble. It can never pardon the people of London for setting aside the pocket-patriot, and putting in his place a man who believes in an intelligent trade policy, who is not prepared to declare that reciprocity in trade between the States and Canada would be injurious to the people of this country unless confined to oranges, bananas and peanuts.

In lecturing Mr. Hyman, the Free Press tells him "that the citizens of London look for a little more in their Parliament man than good fellowship and social qualities. We do not object to that estimate of what a public man should be. The leaders of the ple-the Government of the land should be honest and respectable—but that does not prevent a Langevin, a Haggart, or a Dewdney from receiving the unqualified indorsation of the Free Press. Our con-temporary has one kind of bushel to

Under a policy which has restricted has curtailed the buying powers of the people, many factories London and elsewhere throughout the Dominion have been standing idle for several years past, or have been kept on short time. These factories were pros-perous in the cld days of reciprocity and iow taxation. The Liberals believe in working for the lowering of the taxes and for finding new and profitable markets for what our people produce, whether in the factory or on the farm. Notwithstanding these facts, the Free Press has the assurance to lay to Mr. Hyman's charge the the factories. It knows very well that Mr. Hyman was powerless to protect the factories from the results of the gross mismanagement of public affairs at Ottawa-was powerless to put in the pockets of the consuming public the money filched from them by unnecessary taxation, with which they would willingly have purchased manufactured goods. But our contemporary goes a step further. Mr. Hyman is a nanufacturer of leather. He conducts a arge tannery. He employes and pays for the best class of labor available. He is subjected to the changes and fluctuations of the trade. He has to meet these changes in the manner that business tact dictates. Unfortunately, he does not rnar his business as the tanner editor of the Free Press believes it should be run, ergo he is a poor stick of a business man, anfit to represent London, and should be replaced by-well, probably a brewer! There seems to be no limit to the vindictveness of the organ, when it must needs ssail private interests in order, if possible, o damage a successful political antagonist. It is satisfactory to know that the respectable Conservatives of the city refuse to be aeld responsible for the organ's attack. They say the tu quoque argument could be used by Mr. Hyman, were he so minded. The attack fortunately is self-answered.

Years ago Sir Joseph Hickson resolved make Stratford the headquarters of she G. T. R. in the west. He resolved to concentrate the shops there. No in-fluences of the local authorities in London duences of the local authorities in London or elsewhere could move him. As a consequence the shops here, which were burned down, were not rebuilt. The Free Pressfalsely charges that Mr. Hyman was responsible for this policy. It faisely asserts

that Sir Joseph Hickson, in refusing to re build the shops, was then actuated by spite against London, because of a difference of opinion he had with Mr. Hyman while mayor of the city. Our contemporary should be above imputing, even by insinuation, such petty malignity to Sir Joseph or any other railway man. Railway managers are governed by what they believe to be best for the interest of their employers. The accusation, therefore, is as flat as those that precede it. This is further proved by the disposition of the present manager under changed conditions, to make London the center of its car building industry.

Our contemporary further falls foul of Mr. Hyman because he corrected the gross misstatements regarding the oil business nade by Mr. Moncrieff. Mr. Hyman's views have not changed on this matter since ne general election. They were well-known then but it is a notable fact that the Free same oil business. Until it is prepared to do so, it cannot expect the public to pay much attention to its attacks on Mr. Hyman, which, by the way, are not warranted by his published utterances.

Let us once more place this oil question in its true light. The Conservative leaders have pledged themselves to secure reci-procity in natural products. Oil is a natural product, It is included in the reciprocity scheme of the party whose views the Free Press generally expounds. Does the Free Press mean to teil us that its party is dishonest when it puts in its platform reciprocity in natural products? Three or four visits, some wavering, a visit to the properties for sale, and mutual confidences would in the course of a week or ten days establish outle an intimacy. The same policy would be pursued with one or two other real estate agents in widely different localities, so as to avoid any complications, and when the acquaintance was ripe and the dealer eager to sell, the farmer gentleman would begin to talk of purchase. "I've gota draft here on the — National Bank," he would say. "Now, I'll take this piece of property; pay yeu \$200 cash, and the balance in 30 days." The dealer agrees, the 30 days being in his eyes as good as cash, since the deeds remain in his hands until payment of the full amount of the purchase money. Then they go to the real estate dealer's bank and present the draft. It purports to be made out by a well-known firm of bankers; the dealer—a good bank customer—introduces his friend, the purchaser; the paying teller is satisfied; asks the purchaser how he would like payment; the latter prefers currency, counts his money carefully, pays over the \$200 stipulated to the real estate dealer, pockets the rest and disappears. A week or ten days later the draft is returned to them from New York—a clear forgery. Sarnia Tunnel Inspected.


