Compared to the year 1895, the working expenses were 91.33 per cent against 96.45 per cent. Passenger earnings during the period covered by the report decreased \$47,124, or about 5 per cent, the decrease being whenever attributed to the falling off in suburbar business out of Chicago, and being occasioned by the competition of the electric surface lines. Freight earnings, however, increased \$402,388.
