The deceased was 76 years of age and was born in Ireland. He came to this country in 1880, and with Tom Brown built the Queen's Hotel, at that time and for many years the finest

hostelry in the west. The Queen's was the scene of many interesting events during the boom days of '81 and '82, and the names of the proprietors were known far and wide by the good words that were spoken of them by the travelrs from all parts of the world.

The deceased was a prominent member of the Masonic Order, and at the time of coming to Winnipeg was the highest in the order in that part of Canada.

The Queen's Hotel passed into other hands in 1890, and Mr. O'Connor, whose partner had in the meantime died, entered into the development of natural gas near the city. The proposition was never a great success, and had no important results. During his later years, the deceased





There are two views as to the financ-In fine of the waterworks system. Some hold that it is no business of the department to accumulate a surplus, to be applied to the reduction of the tax rate, but that the water consumers should be required to pay no more than is sufficient for waterworks maintenance. In other words, water should be supplied at cost price. There is much to be said in favor of this, in the interest of cleanliness and comfort, but pulling the wool over my eyes for so in this city the remission of the surplus time. would effect only a slight reduction in the water rates of the average householder. It represents, however, a reduction of from one-third to one-half a mill on the dollar in the tax rate, and this is of incalculable advantage. because a high rate of taxation is a very bad advertisement for a municipality which is desirous of attracting industries and population. In the British cities, where municipal ownership has seen its greatest development, public utilities are managed with the object of producing a profit, to be turned into the civic coffers, although this policy has gone hand in hand, if reports are to be believed, with cheaper services than under private owner-

sided, and among those present were Mr. J. Irving Courtenay. Mr. Churchill, in the course of his response to the toast of his health, which was proposed by the enairman, said that his appointment as Under-Secretary of State for the Colonies was a small post, a small, humble post. ("No.") But it had for him this powerful attraction, that it would enable him to keep in touch with Mr. Chamberlain in the special subjects of his more recent activities. (Cheers,) Mr. clared him to be, but he must say this, that against the services which he had rendered to the Empire-and he did not deny that they were large and real services-must be set the great disservice which he had rendered. He had repeatedly tried to drag the Colonial Empire into the vortex of British party politics. Again and again he had seen him willing to use the opinions of dis-"Mr. Spoonall, have I ever given you him willing to use the opinions of dis-reason to think I looked upon you as a tinguished colonial statesmen and the sentiments of great and powerful states and dependencies as mere pawns in a not very elevated party game. If the Colonies were not much too sensible to be led away by that wild talk, if colonial statesmen had not always observed the most exemplary propriety in refusing to allow themselves to be dragged into new and party discussions here at home, it was quite possible that some real and serious injury might have been done. 


