While these investigations have been chiefly in Ontario, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces, it is known that there are peat bogs in Manitoba and other western provinces; but the plan is to first bring the bogs in the more opulated parts of the country into e. If it is found possible to make peat cheaper than coal can be bought for, in. say, Winnipeg, it will have demonstrated to the people there that it is to their interest to utilize the peat bogs that are not very far from that city.

#### Employer of Man Found Dead Was Poisoned and Deceased Was Suspected.

Niagara Falls, May 4.—By taking carbolic acid, John Baldwin, a farm laborer employed by Benj. Thompson, a Stamford farmer, committed suicide today. Baldwin left his employer's house, saying he was going to milk the cows. When he did not put in an appearance within several hours, Mrs. Baldwin became alarmed and went to the barn. There she found Baldwin dead. Carbolic acid burns are apparent about the dead man's mouth, but no bottle was found. A mysterious turn was added to the suicide when Detectives McNamara and Kelley reported tonight that Benjamin Thompson was poisoned by paris green on Saturday. Thompson s now in a serious condition, but will likely recover. Shortly after drinking a glass of cider on Saturday night Thompson was taken ill. Dr. Trendle, of Queenston, was summoned. The physician pronounced the case one of poisoning. The matter was kept quiet until the body of Baldwin was found in the barn today. It is believed Baldwin attempted to murder his employer, and failing, and fearing exosure, preferred death.

Neighbors say Thompson and Baldwin have quarrelled much, but do not snow the cause of the trouble.





## **COOKING RECIPES**

Creamed Cauliflower.

Cauliflower should be placed head down in well salted water for a while to remove insects; trim off outside leaves and boil in salted water for 30 or 40 minutes. Serve with butter or pour a cream sauce over it.

Cabbage Salad.

Two large raw eggs well beaten, six ablespoonfuls of cream, one-half teaspoonful salt, six tablespoonfuls of inegar and a small piece of butter. Put on the fire and cook, stirring constantly until quite thick. Have a halfhead of cabbage chopped fine, sprinkled with salt. Add to the dressing when cold two tablespoonfuls of cream and our over the cabbage.

Wheat Pop-Overs.

One and one-half cups entire-wheat flour, one-half cup white flour, one tablespoonful sugar, one teaspoonful salt, one tablespoonful melted butter, three eggs, beaten separately. Beat batter well and bake in buttered stoneware cups for 20 minutes in hot oven. then reduce the heat and bake 20 minites more. They will rise to three or four times their height.

Asparagus Soup.

Wash a bunch of asparagus and put on to boil gently three-quarters of an hour. Take out and cut off the ips and set aside. Press the stalks through a colander, and add one pint of rich milk or cream, one pint of the water in which the asparagus boiled, salt to taste, and one tablepoonful butter rubbed smooth in two of flour. Stir until it boils: add the tips and serve with squares of toast.





Paralysis, of one classification at least, and, for all anyone knows, par-alysis generally, is due to a micro-organism so small that it is invisible inder the most powerful microscope, and can pass with unimpaired deadliness through stone filter. Just now the doctors are feeling around for a way to kill it, and they say they will not have to seek much longer. Two scientists from the Rockefeller

Institute of Medical Research in New York appeared today at the session of the American Philosophical Society and administered what looked like the most effective backslap vivisectionists have received. Dr. Simon Flexner, head of the institute, told how he had located the organism of infantile paralysis through experiments on monkeys. Dr. Alexis Carrell, one of the assistants, described experiments in which he severed the arteries of a dog's heart, kept the animal alive by pumping air into its lungs, put in new arteries or patched the old ones, restoring the heart's suspended action, brought the dog back to consciousness,

In a word, this feat foreshadows operations for valvular disease of the heart in which the surgeon's knife will cure within a few days a disease that, down to the present, has been regarded as hopeless.





#### SENATE REGULARS RALLY FORCES

Aldrich Sends Out a Frantic Appeal to Save Tait Policies.

Washington, May 4.-Through the formation today of an organization, which its leaders assert, represents a clear majority of the entire Senate, and to be made up wholly of Republicans of the "regular" wing, a movement was started with intent to setle the question whether the Senate shall remain conservative, become radical, or be thrown into political chaos so far as concerns any coherent policy in regard to the administration's legislative programme.

Senator Aldrich called the "regular" Republican senators together and confronted them with a grim description of the possible political effect of their apparent defeat at the hands of the nsurgent Republicans and Democrats in their fight over the traffic agreement section railroad bill. of the Administration He asked his associates whether

they were ready to submit to domination by such a combination. Any such surrender, he warned them, meant the failure of the Taft policies and the downfall of conservative control, not only in Congress, but in the Republican party generally.
Some one reminded Mr. Aldrich

that senators then and there gathered ogether were not in agreement on all points. Whereupon he replied that they must get together and agree to stand together and let the details be secondary. Otherwise, he said, Congress would adjourn without a single item of the Taft programme accomplished.


