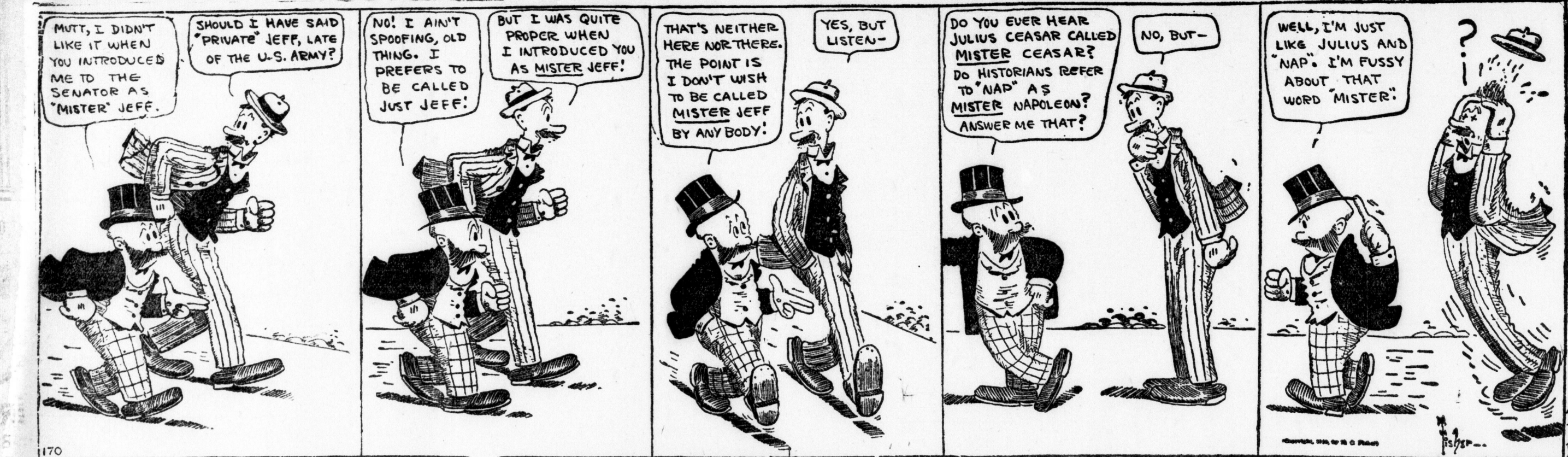

RICH AREAS TAPPED IN WEST BY GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC RY.

W. P. Hinton, Vice-President and General Manager, Tells of Progress.

OPEN NEW DISTRICTS Remarkable Development in Territory Served by the Company's Lines.

London, March 4.—The development that is taking place in the territory served by the Grand Trunk Pacific is most gratifying, said Mr. W. P. Hinton, vice-president and general manager of that railway, when interviewed here yesterday.

“Perhaps the most notable progress,” continues Mr. Hinton, “is being made in British Columbia. In agriculture, mining and lumbering the line promises to make very striking records. The Government of that province is now about to throw open five new land settlements adjacent to the Grand Trunk Pacific. Each of these areas will be approximately 50,000 acres and they are situated in the Nechako and Bulkley valleys. As soon as the settlers go in an active policy will be out for the creation of schools, roads, etc. It would be reasonable to estimate that these districts will receive 20,000 new settlers during the present year. Other Dock Facilities. The Grand Trunk Pacific is carrying out large improvements in its dockage facilities at Prince Rupert. The new dock, 1,000 feet long with shed capacity of 12,000 tons. Extensions have been made to the wharves for handling fish, and this plant, the largest of its kind in the world, now has a capacity of 14,000 tons. Apart from the wealth of sea fish handled at the port, Prince Rupert is taking an increasingly important part in the salmon canning industry. HIGHER RATES MUST BE PAID FOR GAS

Natural Gas Officials Declare They Are Losing Money at Present.

Windsor, March 3.—F. W. James, the general manager of the Union Gas and Oil Company, which controls part of the gas fields at Tilbury, today said this city obtains its supply of natural gas, stated at the inquiry being conducted here by Provincial Gas Commissioner Edwin, that the city would have to discontinue its use of natural gas unless higher rates were paid. The gas is sold at a price which the large manufacturers have been paying, but in spite of this fact the amount of gas used in this city has declined, a fact which Mr. James said would be felt more in the future than at the present time.

Operating at Loss. E. C. Steele, superintendent of operations of the Union Company, deplored the loss of the gas wells. He said that at a time when the gas was most needed by the public, he was operating at a loss.

ITALIANS GROWING BITTER BECAUSE OF WILSON'S ATTITUDE

Discussion Producing Painful Impression, Says Rome Newspaper.

NIITTI SEES SOLUTION Says Hard Work and Moderation Are His Country's Slogans.

Rome, March 4.—The Giorno d'Italia, commenting today on the exchange of communications between President Wilson and the allied premiers with regard to the Adriatic controversy, says the discussion produced a painful impression on the Italian mind, owing to the opposition of the American president to Italy's aspirations, which are founded both on right and on justice.

“He does not take into account,” the newspaper continues, “the help given by Italy to the cause of freedom. He depicts Italy as desirous of dominion and greedy for territory, insisting on the failure of imperialism, while the Jugo-Slavs have annexed Bulgarians, Rumanians, Magyars, Austrians, Albanians, Montenegrins, more numerous than the 400,000 Slavs whom we would annex to obtain a safe condition.”

PREMIER NIITTI SEES DANGER OF EUROPE LOSING POSITION. London, March 4.—Europe is in danger of permanently losing the position she held in the world before the outbreak of the world war, says Premier Nitti of Italy, in an interview printed by the Manchester Guardian today. He points out that Europe is no longer a creditor, but is on the debit side of the ledger.

MOTHERS WATCH CHILDREN STARVE

Lack of Clothing Adds to the Suffering Among Jewish Residents of Poland.

Warsaw, March 4.—The patient resignation with which a mother in Poland looks on as her children starve for lack of food and clothing, is a sight which has become too common in the Jewish quarters of the city. The mother, who has just returned from abroad, where she had turned to the relief committee, which disbursed funds raised by the American Jewish relief committee, and other bodies, said that food is distributed to the children in Lodz on a ration basis, and that where the small folk were unable to appear in person on one occasion a little woman with great hunger-appealing eyes, asked for four rations. The following day she appeared again and asked for only two.

Ontario Threshermen Will Make Application To Join U. S. National Brotherhood

Important Decision Is Made At Convention Here—Jos. Cushman of London Elected President of Provincial Brotherhood.

Joseph Cushman of this city was elected president of the Ontario Brotherhood of Threshermen, at a convention of the sixth annual meeting of the association, which was held in this city, W. Jarrott of Hagersville was elected president, and Joseph Cushman was elected secretary-treasurer. The executive committee consisting of S. Burke, E. S. Down and W. Chapman and legislative committee of J. Hueston, R. J. Ebdin and S. O. Hueston were appointed. The installation of the officers took place last night instead of this morning as was originally planned, owing to the fact that some of the officers had to leave shortly after they were given by the new president and secretary-treasurer.

The Ontario Brotherhood will make application to become a member of the National Brotherhood of Threshermen's Association, which is held in Chicago. A resolution to that effect was passed last night. According to the executive committee the Brotherhood this was probably the most important decision of the convention, for it would change the National Brotherhood into an international one, and it would give the time it had been a purely American institution to improve and strengthen all over the world.

An address on the National Brotherhood Association was given by J. D. Hueston of Brookville, Ohio. He covered every phase of its work fully. He said that the association was formed in 1913 in Chicago after the movement had been endorsed by every state or territory. Little was done until 1919, when the constitution and bylaws were drafted. The purpose of the association was to improve and strengthen all state or provincial brotherhoods.

Funds for carrying on the work of the National Brotherhood were raised by assessing each state or province organization according to its membership. The money was used to order assistance to state or provincial brotherhoods during their organization period. Funds were also given to assist in putting through legislation to benefit the threshers in any state or province.

W. Colby of Chatham spoke on the difference between a threshing machine and a custom thresher.
