Let them know this profound error. Russia is a youthful. valiant organism." Plehve added: "If we find that the anti-Government movement among the Jews does not shall not hesitate to adopt the extremest measures. We shall be obliged your emigration, exclude all Jews from the schools, and render their lives in Russia impossible."

Canada's Trade for Last Year Over \$467,637,000.

THE EXPORTS AND THE IMPORTS

Also Show Large Increases-Exports Per Capita Show \$37 Per Head-Significant Statistics.

Ottawa, July 21. - The unrevised figures of foreign trade for the fiscal year ended June 30 were today made public by the department of customs, and they show an enormous expansion in the trade and commerce of the country. The showing is one which should be a matter of pride and inspiration to the whole community, and it bears eloquent testimony to the wisdom of the fiscal policy of the Government. The aggregate foreign trade for the year, which embraces the total imports and total exports of domestic and foreign produce, amounted to no less than \$467,637,049, which is an increase of \$43,750,000 over the trade of the fiscal year 1902. 



## BRITAIN'S WOMEN OUTNUMBER MEN

They Are in a Majority of Over a Million.

INTERESTING FACTS OF CENSUS

Nearly All Occupations Open to th Females—Great Advance of the Educated Women.

London, July 22. - The newly issued immary tables of the census of 1901 are full of interesting details about the prospects and conditions of women's life.

Marriage, treated statistically, reveals some strange facts. It is scarcely credible, for instance, that there are 30 girls of 15 years and 162 of 16 years married in England, Roughly, to every six married persons throughout the whole country there are more than two widows for every wid-

Very young husbands prefer wives older than themselves. One husband of 15 has married a wife of 17, and a lad of 17 has married a wife of 35. A lad of 18 has a wife of 50 and one of 20 has a wife of 63. But by the time they reach 20 they prefer as a whole to have wives about their own age. Thus we find that over 800,000 husbands and wives between the ages of 21 and 30 are practically of the same age, or come in the same age groups.

one wife out of every fourteen was away from her husband. This, howver, in many cases, means no more than that the husband was absent from home on business or other reasons. There are no fewer than six wives and eight widows who are centenarians, while ten husbands and thirty-two widowers have also passed their hundred years.

There are over 1,000,000 more women than men in England today, ignoring young children altogether, and reckoning only those old enough to earn their own living. This makes female years old who do no work outside their own homes, 32 earn their living. Among married women, one out of
