TO BE DISSOLVED

English General Elections to Take Place in March—Balfour With Chamberlain.

London, July 22.—The Times announces that it is anticipated in official circles that Parliament will be dissolved early in the next session and that a general election will occur in March.

In connection with this announcement rumors were current yesterday that Premier Balfour intended in October to make a strong speech in support of Colonial Secretary Chamberlain's fiscal policy and that thereupon Chamberlain of the Exchequer Ritchie and the other ministers would resign, which, of course, would virtually compel Mr. Balfour to resign also and recommend a dissolution of Parliament.

CZAR MOBILIZES TROOPS IN EAST

And Dispatches a Flotilla of Torpedo Boats to Strengthen Pacific Fleet.

London, July 22.—The Standard's Odessa correspondent says that 123,000 troops are being mobilized from central and northern garrisons in Russia for the immediate dispatch to the Far East in case of necessity. He also reports that on the report of Gen. Kurapatkin, the Russian War Minister, an extraordinary meeting of the Imperial Council of States, which will be attended by the czar, will discuss Manchurian and cognate questions.

St. Petersburg, July 22.—Twelve torpedo boats will leave Kronstadt on the 28th inst. to reinforce the Russian Pacific squadron.

Pekin, July 22.—According to the representations of Prince Ching, the president of the foreign office, Russia, is not informed of the energetic attitude towards Russia. Japan is persistent in urging that additional ports be opened. Japan has notified the foreign office here that they consider the conditions which she presented some time ago, and which Russia denied submitting. If the ports are opened in compliance with the Japanese proposals Manchuria will be honeycombed with trade routes. The Manchurian ports suggested by Japan are Fulinhan, Tagustian, Siu Yan, Lio Yar, Seminehln and Tunrua.

AFFAIRS OF THE "SOO" COMPANY

Mr. Clergue Retires From the Management and New Bonds Are Offered Subscribers.

Montreal, July 22.—Mr. F. H. Clergue, originator of the Clergue syndicate at the Soo, has retired from all active part in the management of the Consolidated Lake Superior Company.

The official announcement was made yesterday. Mr. Clergue has given up his office at the Soo and will devote his entire time to the Canada Central Railway.

This line is not in any way controlled by the Consolidated Company, but a traffic arrangement and running rights will be present between it and the Manitowlin and North Shore Railway, which is one of the properties of the Consolidated Company. Mr. Clergue still retains his place on the board of directors of the company.

New York, July 22.—Shareholders yesterday received formal notice of an offering of \$12,500,000 new 30-year 4 per cent collateral trust bonds by Consolidated Lake Superior Company. The bonds are offered to subscribers at 60, this low price representing a good illustration of the present condition of the bond market. The bonds will net investors 7 per cent.

Subscriptions will be received at the rate of \$1,000 bonds for each 0 shares of common or preferred stock. The proceeds will be used in connection with the payment of the loan of \$5,050,000 negotiated with Speyer & Co., and \$2,450,000 for discharge of current indebtedness, chiefly on construction accounts and for working capital.

CUNARDS AS CRUISERS

British Government Completes Important Agreement With Co.

London, July 22.—It is announced that the Government has completed the agreement with the Cunard Steamship Company, and that it will be shortly submitted to Parliament and the shareholders. It is understood that the Government will contribute over \$5,000,000 for the construction of two additional steamers, and that the whole fleet of vessels will be at the Government's disposal as cruisers. The agreement provides for an improved Atlantic mail service.

NO LOT FEARED

Berlin Police Do Not Expect Attempt on Kaiser's Life.

Berlin, July 22.—The news that the Chicago police have discovered a plot against the Emperor was a surprise to the Berlin police, who express great appreciation at Chicago's vigilance and prompt communication.

Christiania, Norway, July 22.—It is authoritatively stated that the police have received no intimation from abroad of an attempt to assassinate the Emperor. It has been reported that a prominent American anarchist was staying in Christiania for the benefit of his health. There was no intimation that her presence has anything to do with a plot against the German Emperor.

GIGANTIC DEFALCATION

Buffalo Plan Thought to Have Cleaned Out \$300,000.

Buffalo, N. Y., July 22.—A defalcation, already aggregating \$300,000, and likely to be increased to a larger amount when all the assets have been valued, has been uncovered in this city. The alleged defaulter is a confidential clerk and trusted bookkeeper at the office of one of the wealthiest law firms in this city. They handle estates valued at several millions. The alleged defaulter is under 20 years of age. He was born in this city, and every detail of his life was supposed to be known to his employers. Shrewd real estate men, bankers and lawyers unhesitatingly helped him out with schemes. One of these transactions alone was on a stupendous scale. It involved the buying up of a tract of land 2,000 feet long in the Elmwood district, one of the finest sections of the city and converting it into a parkway. The clerk's employers have known of his operations for some time. It is said that he was confronted, but was willing to make restitution. A desire to straighten out the firm's affairs led to the defaulter for a large sum brought the matter to light. None of the firm's money was squandered. It is alleged, was financed with the firm's money by the clerk, who hoped to realize quick profits and return the money.

CRAZED BY LIQUOR

A Man Kills His Wife, Himself and Wounds Son.

Newark, N. J., July 22.—Herman Gaudinger, a patternmaker, shot and killed his wife, shot his 2-year-old son and then killed himself last night. The tragedy ended a spree which had lasted for weeks. Gaudinger had repeatedly abused his wife, who finally had him summoned to appear in court today. In his rage on learning this he committed the crime. The boy climbed out of a window and hung down by his finger tips until he was rescued by neighbors. He will recover.

POKER AND PISTOLS

A Kentucky Game of "Draw" That May Cause Death.

Jackson, Ky., July 22.—In a pistol fight yesterday at Cave Run schoolhouse, three miles east of Jackson, between James and William Barrett on one side, and Mack Howard and his 14-year-old son on the other, Mack Barrett was shot in the head, James Barrett was shot in the chest, and Howard was shot in the arm. The fight followed a dispute over a poker game played on Monday night. The civic authorities declined to take action, and two details of soldiers from here went into the country and arrested the Howards and Barretts. Barrett is a light colored man. He admitted having shot thirteen persons, fatally and wounding nine.

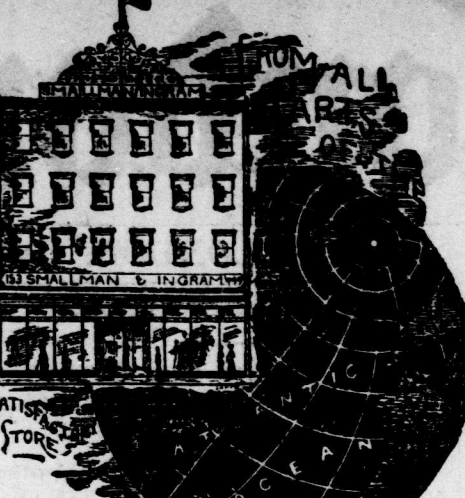

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CASTRO CAPTURES CIUDAD BOLIVAR

Has Revolutionists Hemmed In on All Sides.

THEY MUST SURRENDER OR DIE

Sanguinary Conflicts in the Streets of the City—Many Hundreds Are Killed.

Soleidad, Venezuela, July 20.—Since the last dispatch was sent to the Associated Press at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon the battle between the revolutionary forces at Ciudad Bolivar and the Venezuelan Government army, commanded by Gen. Gomez, has raged madly.

At 8 o'clock this morning the Government forces, which were advancing from all directions, arrived near the center of Ciudad Bolivar. Firing was renewed with more vigor at 10 o'clock at night and illuminated the sky.

At 4 p.m. Monday the advance of the Government troops reached the market place. The old custom house and waterworks on the property of the United States consul, where all the leading German and French firms reside, was then being attacked.

All the defeated revolutionists have concentrated at the jail, where the fighting continues. It is estimated that more than 200 men have been killed in that vicinity.

The artillery of the revolutionists is fiercely replying to the attack of the fleet. The fleet shelled La Soleidad, which has suffered terribly. The capital is still in possession of the revolutionists, but the complete success of the Government forces is assured.

A messenger who has arrived at Caracas by steamer and train from Ciudad Bolivar reports that the city was captured by the Government troops at 8 o'clock this morning.

The fight between Government forces and revolutionists from 1 o'clock this afternoon has been horrible, and at this hour the only places which still resist the onset of the Government troops are the jail and the capitol.

Early in the afternoon the Government troops, numbering 5,300 men, were ordered to make a general attack upon all positions still held by the rebels. At 5 o'clock this afternoon the Zamora, called the Sebastopol of Ciudad Bolivar, was stormed and captured. Ninety-four dead rebels were found inside, among them being Gen. Azanza, one of the revolutionary leaders, whose head had been blown off by a shell.

Constantinople, July 22.—Dispatches from Salonica say that a battalion of troops has been sent to Doiran to reinforce the Turkish troops. There are 1,100 troops at Doiran, and severe fighting is reported.

Miranda Plaza, the key to the capitol, where all the survivors of the revolution were concentrated. All the roads and streets running into the capitol are guarded by Government troops and the escape of the revolutionists after the capture of the capitol, which is inevitable, seems impossible.

Back to Scotland

Montreal, July 22.—A committee of ten, representing the Scotch iron molders, who were brought to this country to work for the Canada Foundry Company at Toronto, is in the city, making arrangements to have the whole party of 100 men taken back to the old country.

A Tuberculosis Hospital

Montreal, July 22.—The civic authorities are to be asked to fund a hospital in the city or near it for the treatment of tuberculosis. The move comes from the provincial board of health and a number of leading physicians interested in combating the disease.

A BAD BATTLE IS THREATENED

United States Troops and Wyoming Cattle Men Are Likely to Clash.

Cheyenne, Wyo., July 22.—A battle between troops and armed cattlemen is believed to be imminent in the Big Horn county, Sheriff Fenton and deputies left Thermopolis for Basin at 8 o'clock yesterday morning with his prisoner, Jim McCloud, charged with the murder of Ben Minnick, a flock master. The party is escorted by the Basin light battery of 40 men under Capt. Prince.

It is reported that a large force of cattlemen have fixed an ambush on Cottonwood Creek, 25 miles from Thermopolis, and will endeavor to deliver McCloud and assist him out of the country. The State troops at Lander, Buffalo, Sheridan and other nearby points have been ordered to hold themselves in readiness to take the field at a moment's notice.

DRUGGED AND KIDNAPED

The Strange Tale Told by a Young Detroit Girl.

Cleveland, O., July 22.—A strange case of kidnaping came to light yesterday. Mrs. Gertrude Wheeler, of Buffalo, came to Chief Kohler's office and inquired about her daughter, Ella, who mysteriously disappeared two months ago from Detroit. Inquiry was made, and it was learned that a girl corresponding to the description given by Mrs. Wheeler was staying at the rescue home of the Salvation Army. An officer accompanied the woman to the home and found the missing girl.

INSANE AND DRUNK

A Wild Telephone Message That Proved a Canard.

Fall River, Mass., July 22.—A telephone message from W. K. Hathaway, who resides in a lonely section on the outskirts of the city, was received at the police station here at 2 o'clock this morning stating that Mrs. Reid, an aged woman, who lived alone in an adjoining house, had been murdered, and that two men who had committed the crime were still in the house.

SICKROOM FOR SHOPPERS

New York, July 22.—A sickroom for the convenience of shoppers has become a feature in every well organized department store in New York, although the management do not advertise the fact.

CREW DRIVEN MAD BY FUSEL OIL

They Sing, Dance, Laugh, Cry and Fight Each Other and the Police—Now in Hospital.

New York, July 22.—Crazed by the fumes of fusel oil, which permeated the hold on the steamer Toronto of the Wilson Line from Hull, half a dozen sailors and longshoremen, who were unloading her cargo, fought each other and their would-be rescuers, the police and ambulance surgeons, and tried to jump overboard at pier 50, North River, last night. After an hour's struggle, six men were taken to a hospital in ambulances. Twenty men were working in the hold when two casks of fusel oil being hoisted to the main deck fell and burst. Soon the fumes began to affect the sailors and longshoremen, and they all hurried to the deck.

A WORLD'S FAIR FIGHT

St. Louis, July 22.—Upon orders of striking delegates, about 150 men, structural iron workers and roofers on the machinery building at the World's Fair grounds, are on strike, their claims being that workmen building the elevated track are not union men.

London, July 22.—The body of James McNeill Whistler, the American artist, who died July 17, was interred this morning in the family burial plot in the old church at Chiswick. The funeral services were held at Chelsea, in the old church where he often went with his mother when she was alive.
