PNEUMONIA'S HARVEST

Disease Is Epidemie in New York-Cold Increases Deaths. New York, Feb. 18. - The World toay says: The intense cold has been ollowed by a steady increase in the number of deaths from pneumonia in New York. Influenza is prevalent: The records of the health department show a steady increase for the month in deaths from pneumonia, and the returns up to yesterday show that the present week may be a record-breaker. There were 351 deaths last week from pneumonia as compared with 317 deaths for the preceding seven days. Dr. Guilfoy, registrar of the health department, says this shows there are approximately 1,700 cases of pneunonia in the city weekly, and umber is increasing. The city hospitals are taxed to their utmost. There

were 1,395 deaths in this city from pneumonia in January, and up to last Saturday there had been 688 deaths

The desperadoes, who came to grie on Tuesday started on the downward path in early youth, at the critical period of life, when the passions and instincts are strongest for evil or good. "Texas," the one who escaped with his life, is an old country waif, who may have had an inherited tendency An outcast of society from his birth, he looked on society as his enemy. The moral responsibility of society for its Ishmaelites is a quesis engaging the attention of many earnest men and women, Both "Texas" and "Shorty Billy" were jailbirds. It is known that Texas had spent several terms in prison. This is only an other illustration of the melancholy fact that the law punishes, but seldon: reforms. The criminal law is rooted in the idea of vengeance, inherited from primitive times, when each man With the growth of civilization, vengeance was taken out of the hand of the individual by organized society, but until comparatively recent times the principle of vengeance has continued to animate our treatment of the criminal classes. The reformatory aspect of punishment is now being considered the world over, and many of the best hearts and minds are devoted to a study of penology in the hope of evolving a system which will make the prison not only punitive, but redemptive In this country the authorities are experimenting on these lines by introducing the ticket-of-leave system in the penitentiary.

While society is engaged this work of amelioration it canno afford to relax its vigilance against crime. The law must continue to be terror to evildoers. The community was in danger so long as "Texas" and "Shorty Billy" were at large, and it was the plain duty of the police to run them to earth. The men were desperate characters. They had loaded weapons, and were ready to take human life without the least compunction if it stood in the way of the successful prosecution of their crimes. Detectives Nickle and Egelton deserve the greatest credit for the cool and courageous performance of their duty. It was not their fault if this cost a human life. They acted in self-defense, and were justified in being fully prepared for such an emergency. It is to the moral effect of such acts as theirs, to the bravery and alertness of our police, that we owe our comparative immunity from crimes of violence.

Mr. Chamberlain has a tremendous amount of missionary work ahead of him. His present prospects do not seem so bright as in the fist flash of his propaganda, when he for a time, appeared to be taking the public by storm. "The tumult and the shouting dies" and the campaign is getting down to hard pan. The Liberals have pulled themselves together, and the free trade Conservatives have boldly and definitely arrayed themselves against him. The Government is plainly frightened, and it is impossible that Mr. Balfour can keep up his balancing act much longer. The bye-elections indicate a strong drift of opinion against the ministry. The general election which cannot be averted for many months, will probably wipe out the majority of 50 which it is now able to command on the fiscal question. It is unlikely, however, that the Liberats and the dissident Unionists combined will in any event have a majority in dependent of the Irish party. The Nationalists will act with no party not

pledged to home rule, and the Liberals are now hopelessly divided on that question. No doubt the specter of Irish domination is keeping many Unionists loyal to the ministry, who are not in sympathy with its policy of retalia-






