

There was Hand-to-Hand Fighting There Which on Saturday Last.

London, May 16.—A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Lorenzo Marquez, dated Tuesday, says:—"There is now no doubt that there was desperate fighting at Mafeking Saturday, but it is believed to have gone in favor of the garrison. All that can be ascertained of a reliable character follows:

Lorenzo Marquez, dated king.

The Boers Saturday occupied the Kaffir iocation at Mafeking. They were in turn attacked during the night of Saturday, and on Sunday found themselves surrounded. The Boers lost seven killed and seventeen wounded. The British loss is reported to have been heavy.

"The Boers, using artillery, attacked the town Saturday. Very soon the Kaffir location was in flames, some say as the result of shell fire, and others as the result of treachery. Fighting at close quarters became general, and, in the midst of the contusion, the Boers gained possession of the Kafir location, from which point of vantage they brought guns to bear on the town at close

range.

By an adroit move the garrison, despite its attenuated numbers, succeed in actually surrounding the party of Boers who had captured the Kaffir location. Severe fighting followed, but, according to the latest reports, the Boers still hold the location, in which they are probably surrounded.

The truth is, I believe, that the Pretoria authorities knowing of the progress of the relief column, gave orders to Gen. Snyman to storm the place. As soon as the location was in flames the Boer bulletins of victory were flying about everywhere to encourage the weak-kneed burghers. Boers who came down yesterday from Pretoria produced for the edification of incredulous Britishers two telegrams by officials, one of Britishers two telegrams by officials, one of which was signed by Snyman and said: 'I was lucky enough to capture Baden-Powell with 900 of his men.'

"There is no doubt about the heavy "There is no doubt about the heavy fighting. A telegram from the Portuguese consul to the governor-general here confirms this, and there is little doubt of the occupation of the Kaffir stadt. But similar things were published at Pretoria about Ladysmith, and quite recently about Wepener, just before Col. Dalgetty was relieved." CONTRADICTORY REPORTS.

Certain commentators affiliated to the war office say that Gen. Buller's orders to keep the Boers employed have been supplemented by an order to drive them completely out of Natal and then to move on Harrismith.

Gen. Rundle and Gen. Brahant are taking possession of the wide regions around Ladybrand almost without opposition. They find the country plentifully supplied with cattle, horse feed and flour. Gen. Rundle is reducing his transport and feeding his men and animals largely off the country. The Boers in that quarter surrendered and it is the expectation of the correspondents on the spot that the eastern section of Free State will soon be as tranquil as the western. Gen. Rundle's front is 30 miles long, but his forces are disposed so that if any point be attacked the troops there could be quickly reinforced.

RELIEF NOW DUE London, May 16.—"Food will last until about June 10," is the latest official word from Col. Baden-Powell, the British Commander at Mafeking, sent to Lord Roberts under date of May 7. Five days later the Boers attempted to storm the town, and it is possible that they succeeded, although nothing is known of the attack or its results except through Pretoria sources which have no countenance here.

The British relief column is due there now. Ten days ago Gen. Sayman was having difficulty in keeping the burghers together owing to the approach of the British, and when the last Associate Press despatch left Mafeking, on May 7, the Boers had killed, on the previous day, one of the horse guards and had captured several of Col. Baden-Powell's few remaining horses.

ABOUT KID GLOVES,

Economy in small things is often verlooked, and if only more considration were given to this subject quite considerable sum of money might be saved annually. The careless manner in which a very large number of ladies treat their gloves is an instance in

point, and perhaps the following hints may serve to show how the reasonable care of kid gloves would result in a reduction of expenditure:-In the first place, it may be pointed out that rough handling is especially disastrous to kid gloves, and it very often happens that a new pair are split and ruined by jerking them on in a

careless fashion. Always put on a new pair of kid gloves for the first time long enough before they are worn to allow of due deliberation in the task. When a pair of fine gloves are bought the purchaser should insist that they be fitted on in the shop; then if there are any flaws they will be detected before the gloves are paid for and

taken away. Cheap gloves are generally risky investments, but some of the best shops keep a fairly good line of gloves at low prices, which are worth buying for common wear. If strong and well made they will serve for shopping and morning walks, or for bad weather.

In putting on a glove be careful to get each finger straight Coax each one on by rubbbing gently with the thumb and first finger until the fingers are down to the very ends.

In taking the gloves off turn the wrist over the fingers and take hold of the ends of the fingers through the wrist. It wears a glove out badly to pull it off by catching hold of the finger tips. Pull the glove into shape and lay it aside carefully. Silk should be kept to match each shade and gloves should be mended as soon as a break appears, for the old proverb, "A stitch propriate to these articles of attire. Glove mending is delicate work, which requires both skill and dexterity, and when well done pays admirably for the pains taken. Glove powder should form one of the adjuncts to every toilet table, and a pretty glove stretcher an-

other. French women set a good example, and have made quite an art of putting on gloves, and this is why a Parisiepne's gloves last her four times as long as anybody else's.

Buttoning gloves should never be done in a hurry. The wrist should be carefully and gently pulled straight, and the buttons insinuated gently into the holes. Use a glove buttoner always; it ruins both the button hole and the finger tips to button them without. After purchasing a new pair of gloves always sew the buttons on before wearing them. The annoyance of having the buttons drop off will then be avoided .- Woman's Life.

Austria's Women Barbers. Australians take no chances with their barbers. They must be good, and the Barbers and Wigmakers' union of Vienna sees to it that they are. Provision is also made in their code for women barbers who desire to carry on the business of their husbands in case of

the latter's death or illness. In order to do this, the wife must have been enrolled in the union as an apprentice for three years Apprentices must appear in Vienna in the presence of judges of the union and how their skill before they are allowed to open shops of their own. A properly certified barber must have a knowledge of and pass an examination in shaving, hair cutting, hair curling and wigmaking. Poor relations and others who are frugal serve as sub-

jects for experiment. Not only must the barber be well versed in the practical side of the subject, but questions are asked relating to the keeping clean of razors, brushes, etc., and the elementary rules of antiseptics are thoroughly gone into.

At the practical examination the young barbers have their razors dulled by four strokes on a pine plank, and they must then sharpen them. A subject is assigned to each barber, who must be tonsorially perfect, in the opinion of the judges, before the apprentice releases him. After this a certificate is issued, and the apprentice serves two years as a journeyman before he may open a shop as an employer. In the case of widows who desire to carry on the business of their husbands, only the three years' ap-

prenticeship is required. In spite of the number of years that an Austrian barber has to devote to his business before he is perfect, one can get a high class hair cut for a sum equal to five cents, or a first class shave for something like three cents u any part of the country.

A MURDEROUS SOCIETY

Depredations Committed by the Chinese Boxers.

MURDER OF MISSIONARY BROOKS

000 - Foreign Troops May Have to Sup-

Chinese officials who are in a pos ition to secure accurate data estimate that 11,000,000 Chinamen belong to the society of boxers, or, as this same organized band of ruffians was once known, the "Society of the

For the last quarter of a century this society has terrorized the great central provinces of the flowery king-dom, and wrought death and destruction in the homes of the Christian missionaries. It was their latest atrocity, the murder of a young Church of England missionary named Brooks, that called for the collective note of the ambassadors and minis-ters of the powers. In response to that note the Chinese government has sent an armed force against the Boxers, but it is said of this force of soldiers that more than one-half belong to the society, and consequentbut little good is expected from

Of all the atrocities of which this society of ruffians has been accused none are more terrible than the torture and death of this young Church of England-missionary. At the time of his death he was on his way to join a brother missionary at Shan-Tung. On this journey he passed through a village where a number of the members of this society were attending a native feast, and the cry of devil," started by a little Chinese girl, announced his presence to the blood-thirsty villains.

Almost before he had time to real-

ize what was happening they had surrounded him and began the torture that ended in his death. They pushed him about from one to another, called him all the vile names of which they could think, beat him with clubs, and finally one of the villains brought a hook to which he had attached a long, stout cord, and this he fastened in the poor victim's nose, and in this manner he was pulled about the streets. When he attempted to escape he was literally cut to

pieces with swords. This is but one in a long list of crimes for which this society should be called upon to answer. Several years ago they attacked and destroyed an American mission at Shan-Tung. The head of this mission at that time was Rev. J. H. Laughlin, now of New York city. Other members of the mission were Rev. R. H.

Bent, and Dr. J. L. Van Schoick. Of this case Rev. Mr. Laughlin says; "We lived in three houses all surrounded by a high wall. The first evidence of trouble was a gunshot n the gate keeper poked out his head to see what was the matter. Instantly a pistol was shot off in his face so that the powder blinded him, although he received no other wound. .
"The man fell shriking to the

ground, and 25 bandits rushed over body and into the courtyard. Mr. Bent saw them coming and re-treated into his cottage, but the robbers smashed in the door and shot him in the thigh. The missionary seized a piece of the splintered door and ran out, striking right and left. One of the bandits slashed at him with a sword and cut his head, another wounded him on the arm, but he at last escaped with his life.

"I was romping with my little girl in our dining-room and ran out to investigate. I found Mr. Bent's quarters surrounded by a mob of bandits, and heard them shouting 'Kill!

I ran' back to my quarters, got my wife and children over the fence and helped them to a place of safety. Mr. Van Schoick did likewise. When we returned the bandits were gone, the mission safe lay literally smashed to bits on the ground. The bandits had slettered it with im-mense stones and then pried it apart with crowbars. The amount of money secured was small. Sometimes when the plunder does not equal their expectations they seize the per-son of one of their victims, blindson of one of their victims, billion fold him, lead him about in a circle and at last carry him off to the mountains, from where they send

messages demanding a ransom. Another attack on Christian mis-sionaries which called forth a protest from Germany, and which lost to China the valuable port of Tsin-Tau, which was seized by that govern-ment in default of the prompt pay-ment of an indemnity, was that ment of an indemnity, was that which resulted in the murder of some German priests and the looting of a

German mission at Shan-Tung.


The trouble which led up to this murder started in May, 1891, when two nuns who belonged to this mission were maltreated by a mob of Boxers, who charged them with be-witching children. The nuns escaped with slight injuries, but the depredations were continued, and the mission stations throughout the province were plundered, and then came

the murder of the priests. As the Chinese government took no toward punishing the leaders became bolder than ever, and many native Christians were put to death by terrible means. This coned until the government at Pek-was forced to act if it was to save itself the indignity of having foreign troops landed for the purpose of suppressing the lawlessness and bringing to justice the leaders of

It was only last fall that this attempt was made to put a stop to the atrochies of the society, and the futile attempts at that time promise to be repeated now. ROUGH ON CROKER

An English Paper Scorches the Tammany Boss

London, May 15.-The Express advocates the ostracism of Richard Croker in England in revenge for Tammany's attitude on the Anglo-Boer war. It says: "It has not escaped notice in this country that American welcome to the Boer delegates has been inspired by Tammany Hall, controlled by the notorious Richard Croker.. The records of Tammany are already black enough without the addition of this new infamy. But what makes the action of Tammany peculiarly infamous is the fact that Croker claims the asspitality of an English domicile, passes as an English country gentieman and runs race horses on the English turf ,yetcis aiding and encouraging the wor England's enemies. Croker's pos is practically on all fours with that of the Duke of Orleans, except that perhaps he does not carry that taint of personal uncleanliness which made his highness of Orleans unfit to assowith his respectable fellowcreatures.

"Croker apparently desires to quali-"Croker apparently desires to qualify as an English land-owner by encouraging the voters whom he controls in New York to express sympathies with men who are engaged in shooting the sons and brothers of other English land owners. This may be American politics, but it may be doubted whether it will comment itself to the members of those glubs which Croker has hitherto frequented or Englishmen who live in the quented or Englishmen who live in the district where he bought himself a home. If Croker finds that the brac-ing air of the United States does not invariably suit his constitution, he should secure the calm seclusion of an Italian villa."

"Gen. Bothe, addressing the burghers, said: 'At this same Zand river Great Britain in 1852 signed a treaty acknowledging the full sovereignty of the Transvani, Now, half a century later, Great Britain has for the second time represed to wrest from the

the fransvan, town in the second time proposed to wrest from the Transvaal by force the rights then fully recognized, merely to gratify her land and gold lust.

"A report was received last night that the British had crossed one of the lower drifts, At 6 this morning the first cannon shot proclaimed the opening of the battle. The British hosts could be seen advancing in solid masses. Their cavalry hung on our flanks. Their infantry were less easily discernible in the grass. The sky was clouded with smoke from the burning yelds.

clouded with smoke from the burning veids.

"The fighting began at Philip Bothas' position above the railway bridge. A British field battery pushed across the river and bombarded the kopjes Philip Botha was holding so heavily that they appeared to be cloud-capped from the bursting shrapnel. Under cover of this cannonade, the British infantry advanced, but they met with so hole a reception that they had to retire.

"In the meantime the British cavalry had crossed the river, moving straight north. Gen. Botha threw the Standerton burghers, with a battery of cannon to head them off. The

burghers got the advantage and captured 14 of the British. Unfortunately just at this time, about 11, o'clock, the centre of the burghers gave way with-out cause. Upon this Philip Botha and all the others gave way. The Standerton and Bethel commandos, with the Irish brigade, covered the re-

treat to Kroonstadt.
"Otherwise than in the retreat from Brandfort and the Vet river, the British pressed hard on the retreating burghers. All our cannon and commissariat were brought out, and so far as is known, our casualties were confined to a dozen wounded.



Gatacre, sends has paper an account of how the Boers received the news of Cronje's surrender. Some who had escaped from Cronje's lagger brought in the fatal render. Some who had escaped from Cronje's larger brought in the fatal news. Thes tolid-looking fighting men broke down and wept like boys. Great rugged, bearded men dashed their rifles on the ground and spurned them with their beats, while down their with their boots, while down their sun and wind tanned faces the tears poured steadily. Others stood leaning upon their rifles, with hands hard gripped, until one would think the tightened muscles would leave the impress of the straining fingers upon the cold steel. Others again crowing to-gether and looked dumbly from face to face, like cattle foregathering to the nambies. If Cronje had loved his untry half as well as his country loved him he would have marched right on to the point of a British bayonet on that morning so disastrous to the Boers' arms, and have yielded up his life in order that the memory of his name might have remained as a watchword on the line mained as a watchword on the lips and in the hearts of his gallant yeoand in the hearts of his gallant yeo-manry soldiery. Cronje had been to the Boers as a God fashioned out of marble. They found him at last to be only a man made out of mud; and when he feil the Cape Dutch cause and the Orange Free State fell with him. When he laid down his arms he launched a thunderbolt into the Boer camp, which wrecked it forever."

Glover Writes that they Wanted to Get to the Front

The following letter from Trooper Glover has just been received by his father. Since the letter was written Trooper Glover's corps has reached the front and under General Hutton they were continuously in touch with the Boers from Brandfort to Kroon-stadt. They suffered a number of casualities but all the Chatham boys with the C. M. R. escaped safely. The letter is as

Stellanbothe, April 6th, 1900. Dear father, -1 received your most wel come letter yesterday.
We came from Cape Town to the day before yesterday. We marche the way. It is about 40 miles. We marched al

We got orders late last night to go t Roemfontein to-merrow (Sunday.) I am i the best of health and have had a good time so far in South Africa. The people here think that the Canadians are just the stuff and Uncle Paul is so anxious to get us that he has offered a bounty of \$50 a head for us dead or alive. When we were in Cape Town we were camped about a half a mile from where the Boer prisoners were They were all out taking a good look at u when we were coming into camp. There were five of them shot in the act of trying to escape while we were there. Some of them, about 1,500, were taken to St. Helena, so we were the escort for them down to the boat. There are a few thousand of them left here yet. They are a dirty looking

The troop that I am in made the The troop that I am in made the best score in shooting of any other in the squadron. Stonor made 27 points out of a possible 28, Corp'l Ocolal 26, Crown 21, and myself 27. With the revolver I made 15 out of a possible 20, Sronor 10, Corp'l Ocolal 10, Orown 8. I think if our troop gets a shot at Uncie Paui that the Transvaal Boers will have to elect another presi-Boers will have to elect another presi-dent. All of the boys are anxious to get a chance to show what we are made of. When we got word that we made of. When we got word that we had to go to the front to-morrow they almost went wild. We were afraid that the thing would be all over before we get there. By the time you get this you will have heard off the C. M. R. in some big fight. So look outfor a squall. I will have to close. I got two chatham Planets yesterday from Goodwin, Toronto. There was a lot of Baldoon news in them. I send a lot of Baldoon news in them. I send my love to all. Be sure and tell them to write. It was decided to adopt this course to compete successfully and undersell the London bread. Although it had been decided not to sell at 31-2a till to-morrow, a number of bakers took the initiative this morning, and, as a result, are selling 2-lb. loaves to-day for 31-2 cents to the grocers and 4c retail.

SOME STATISTICS

Which Favorably Compare the C.C I. With Similar Institutes

in Other Cities-The Maximum of Re sults for the Micimum of Expenditure.

From the report of the minister of ducation for the year, 1899, with the statistics of 1898, we glean the follow ing :- The city grants to the followng Collegiate Institutes and number of pupils enrolled respectively, for the year 1898, were as follows:

Brantford, \$9,000; 336 pupils. Peterboro, \$7,300; 276 pupils. Brockville, \$6,300; 331 pupils. Brockville, \$6,300; 351 pupils. Windsor, \$5,701; 294 pupils. Stratford, \$5,500; 292 pupils. Guelph, \$5,382; 263 pupils. St. Thomas, \$5,271; 394 pupils. Chatham, \$5,025; 347 pupils.

The average city grant for the sever The average city grant for the seven Collegiate Institutes above, not counting Chatham, is \$6,350; Chatham's grant was \$5,025, i. e., \$1,325 less than the average. The average number of pupils enrolled for these schools is 310; Chatham had 349, pupils, i. e., 39 more pupils than the average. The more pupils than the average. The examination record is the second best province. In the Chatham C. I. pupils won 15 first class honors at the University Matriculation examination—a record surpassing that of all the other schools in the province but London C. I., which has 17 to its credit. The first class honors were, three in English, three in mathewere, three in English, three in mathematics, two in classics, four in history, two in French, and one in German. Besides, Chatham had 22 successful candidates at the Junior Leaving ing, or second-class teachers' exams. ranking fourth in this respect among the 37 collegiate institutes of the province. This result may fairly be called "a maximum of results and, a minimum of expenditure," and re-flects credit upon the staff of our Collegiate Institute.
