Constable John Phillips of the Northwest Mounted Police has recently been in Belleville, Ont., visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Norman Phillips. He has just returned from a two years' expedition to the Arctic Ocean, where the party visited Herschel Island and other northern points. They only saw one white resident during their sojourn in the north—a Scotchman named Firth who has been stationed at Fort McPherson for over 40 years as a Hudson Bay agent. Fort McPherson is 100 miles south of the Arctic Ocean and the most northerly Hudson Bay post. The agent, who is married to an Esquimaux woman, has an interesting family of 13 children.

The natives are Esquimaux, and what are called rat Indians—those who live on muskrats, many Indians being superstitious in the use of such a diet. These Indians are almost extinct through the ravages of consumption.

st. John's, Nfid., Nov. 2.—The Coloinal Government has decided to test the validity of the modus vivendi. It issued an official notice yesterday enforcing the Bait Act, which foibids Newfoundlanders to fish on board foreign vessels within colonial waters, and it intends to prosecute one or more colonial fishermen who have been shipped by Americans outside the three-mile limit, after these men have been paid off by American vessels on which they were serving.

Privy Council Will Say.

After this the Supreme Court or Privy Council will determine whether the modus vivendi overrides the colonial enactments. The Government furthermore, expects that threats of prosecution will deter the coionists from going beyond the marine boundary to join American vessels, and that the latter will therefore be unable to secure crews to catch herring.

As this would nullify the spirit of the modus vivenal, which agrees that nobody shall be penalized for joining American vessels, it is expected to result in trouble between the Cabinets at London and Washington.

Toronto, Nov. 2.—Hon. A. B. Morine, now of. Toronto, but formerly leader of the Opposition in the Parliament of Newfoundland and ex-Minister of Fisheries for the island colony, was the guest at the Empire Club lunchenn yesterday. He explained at some length the recent disturbance in Newfoundland respecting the fisheries and contended that the Imperial Government had shown to the colony every consideration. He more than intimated that the present outcry was largely a matter of local politics. He strongly favors the annexation of Newfoundland with Canada.



LIVELY DEBATE IN COMMONS

Act Of Omission Indicates The Plan Of Campaign

OHN REDMOND ROUSED

London, Nov. 2.—The resumption in the House of Commons yesterday of the debate of the trades' dispute bill, including the amendment of Oct. 20, to clause 4, placing union funds beyond the reach of attack, led to some lively scenes.

Members of the Opposition, in their speeches, twitted the Ministers with

Members of the Opposition, in their speeches, twitted the Ministers with surrendering to the Labor party. Herbert H. Asquith, Chancellor of the Exchequer, retorted that the question at issue was not one of principle, but of methods. He said he saw nothing dishonorable or unworthy in deferring to the feelings of those most interested in the matter, and he unhesitatingly supported the amended clause.

Conservative Defeat.

After other members of the Government had spoken in a similar strain, Samuel Roberts, Conservative, proposed to insert the original clause. This proposal was defeated by 372 votes to 79, amid loud ministerial and Labor cheers.

cheers.

There subsequently was further heated scenes on the motion, made by a member of the Opposition to omit Ireland from the operation of the act. In moving this motion, Viscount Castlereagh, Conservative, contended it would give absolute immunity to boycotting. Samuel Henry Butcher, Conservative, seconded this motion, on the same ground.

Redmond Roused.

John Redmond, the leader of the Irish party, said he could conceive no more unworthy or disgraceful scandal than to come into Parliament when Ireland was in a state of profound peace, and suggest that it was unsafe to give Ireland the same rights as England. This was evidently to be the plan of campaign, in view of next year's legislation for Ireland.

After further heated discussions, in which the Speaker Ignored appeals to call Mr. Redmond to order, Sir John Lawson Walton, Liberal, explained that the agricultural associations of Ireland did not come within the legal meaning of a trade union.

The motion was rejected by 282 to 35. The incident was then closed. There subsequently was further heat-

WILL WAR WITH THE LORDS. Education Bill Changes So Great That Ministry Will Fight.

London, Nov. 2.—The House of Lords solutions to make far-reaching changes in the education bill, and in Liberal circles the opinion is expressed

Liberal circles the opinion is expressed that if the Opposition continues in its present spirit the bill hardly will be recognizable when it returns to the House of Commons.

Clause 2 of the bill was completed Wednesday night after radical alterations, mostly by large Opposition majorities. There is a distinct atmosphere of tension in the upper House. It has apparently been determined that the Ministry will not tamely submit to the Lords.

This metamorphosis was indicated by President of the Board of Trade

This metamorphosis was indicated by President of the Board of Trade Lloyd George, who, speaking at Spalding, declared that the work of "rediting" the bill would terminate in a way probably far from agreeable to the House of Lords, a majority of whom were endeavoring to establish the principal of compulsory religion, to which the country would not submit.

ONTARIO BANK AFFAIRS.

Shareholders Have a Successful Pre-liminary Meeting On Thursday. Toronto, Nov. 2.—A preliminary meeting of the shareholders of the Ontario Bank, called by Cephas Goode, was held yesterday afternoon in Mr. Goode's office in the Gooderham Building, when an active effort was made to secure co-operation upon the part of the shareholders.

MILLIONS IN BONDS.


Secured By Charles Whitney Norton By Fraud, Chicago Police Say.
Chicago, Nov. 2.—Charles Whitney Norton, said by the police and postal authorities to be responsible for extensive swindling operations, is under arrest here and will be turned over to the federal officers by the local police, who took him into custody.

It is claimed that Norton has defrauded people in all parts of the United States out of bonds and securities amounting to \$3,000,000.

Their thought world had not yet been entered. Just beyond two young lovers were plighting their troth. They were walking for a little while in the cloudlands. They were sipping for a short time the sweet nectar from the flowers which bloom only for a day during the mating of the birds. But at the prow of the boat stood the strong man of the world, with his wife by his side. His eye had an eagle glance. His brow rested on his hand. He seemed to be looking into the dim future, at his home which was yet to be built in a foreign land, at the visionary fields which were yet to be tilled and at the fortune which he was yet to make. The picture was suggestive to my mind of that momentous journey which we call the voyage of life. Not all of us reach the stage typified by the grandparents. It is very uncertain, but it is well in our early years if we plan carefully for the future instead of spending the time in idle dreaming or in pleasure. The foundations of our career are laid earlier than some of us imagine, and, whether that career be long or short, those foundations should be laid well.




