BUYS CANADIAN MONEY

in Northen Ohio Who Make

All through that part of the country (Northern Ohio) there is a discount of 20 cents on every Canadian dollar. Of course Canadian money is not as much in circulation as is the legal tender of the United States, but there is enough for his purpose, says The Buffalo Express. A man advertised in all surrounding country towns that he would redeem Canadian money for 90 cents on the dollar. It was some time before he had any results from this advertising. It was like the man who stood on London bridge at midnight and, offered to give away sovereigns. People laughed at him. The farmers were shy. They thought it was a swindling game of some kind and left him severely alone. One day a man came in with 310 Canadian money. It was of all shapes and sizes from the 5-cent piece that looks like a dime to a dollar bill drawn on the Bank of Montreal. If he had spent it he could have secured \$8 worth of goods for it. My man gave him nine big silver dollars in United States money for it. Before the week was out he had exchanged United States dollars for \$250 worth of Canadian money. This would give him a profit of \$25 wherever Canadian money is as good as our own.

From that time on the business gradually increased, until to-day he averages about \$150 a week, Instead of having the farmers come to him, he goes to them and buys their accumulated sayings of Canada coin. They are all his customers and know him well in the five years they have done business together.

Are We to Follow the London Style?

Follies repeat themselves, says The St. James' Gazette. It was Edward IV. who decreed that a shoemaker making peaked toes more than two inches long should be fined twenty shillings. Now, untrammelled by such laws, one of our most fashionable bootmakers has introduced long-pointed toes, which have to be filled in with cork at the tips, and are mostly carried out in the finest patent leather with small buckles on the instep, illustrating the utmost perfection of workmanship. Being so, it would be wiser to relegate them to our cabinets of curiosities. In the Tudor and Stuart time women desirous of rising in the world borrowed inordinately high heels from Italy, and these went by the name of 'choppines'—Evelyn in his "Diary" calls them "scaffolds'—and the ladies who wore them to walk abroad had to have a servant on either side for support. This unpractical fashion is not likely to have any great following; but some beautifully made shoes, with heels varying from three to seven inches in height, are to be seen at a modern shoemaker's rendered in the most costly stuffs, such as floral brocaded velvet on cream satin, and gold and silver brocades in troduced on the high heel as well as on the upper part of the shoes. 

An important departure in the construction of medical appliances is made by the invention of the stethophone by Rev. D. B. Marsh, Blackheath, Ont. The. medical uses of the stethophone reversible to the counts in the chest can be heard in a most accurate manner. The normal and abnormal sounds of the lungs are conveyed to the ear, and very full information can be obtained as to their condition. In the examination of the heart, the clearest expression possible of what is taking place in that organ is conveyed to the listener's ears. By means of the flexible tubes the lungs and heart can be examined while the patient is in any position, and the instrument can be passed under the latent's cicking and a most accurate examination made The whole instrument is small and light, and can be convenient'y carried in an ordinary pocket. It is of the utmost value to physicians whose hearing has become impaired. Fy its use there are no buzzing or metallic sounds what is conveyed to the ear is the exact reproduction of what is taking place in the organ to which it is applied.

By means of a special arrangement two physicians may examine the same instrument, thus lessening to a very considerable extent the possibility of a difference of opinion. There is

After his ordination he took charge of the First Presbyterian Church at Eramosa, Ont., and after two years in that charge he was called to Blackheath, near Hamilton, Ont., where he is now in charge of the Presbyterian church. In the quiet life of his village home Mr. Marsh found time to pursue his favorite studies in the theories of light, heat and sound, and before his stethophone was invented he constructed a "takking machine." which is capable of repeating sounds with many times the force of the machines used at entertainments. The stethophone was suggested to Mr. Marsh one day by his calling to his little girl through a window; and conceiving of the windowpane as a diaphragm, he immediately set to work on experiments that resulted in the invention, which must completely supersed the stethoscope in medical examinations.




