THE ONTARIO GAME. On Tuesday last the Reporter received a letter from Geo. A. Dans, M.P.P., stating that despite the fact that the Ontario Game and Fish Commission had recommended the killing of deer in the water, and the earnest protest of a large number of M.P.'s, P.P.'s, backed up by strongly worded resolutions from game clubs and others.

The Hon. Mr. Gibson, Commissioner of Crown Lands, had introduced a bill in the Legislature on Friday last, which would allow the house on Saturday, leaving the law virtually as it stood last season.

No doubt the officials of the government will sit in their offices as of old and write up glowing reports of how the game is being protected and increased by the provisions of the act prohibiting the shooting of deer in the water.

For eighteen years the editor of the Reporter has spent from four to six weeks in the hunting regions of Ontario and Quebec, and claims to have been associated with some of the best hunters in Ontario, and the unanimous opinion of every man in the province is that shooting at deer on land is far more destructive than when driven to the water, especially since the enactment of the limit of two for each hunter has been in force.

From this time forth the Reporter, and we believe the majority of the hunting club to which we belong, will strenuously oppose any government or M.P.P. that persists and assists in the killing of the best horses for the races, and the best horses for the middle of September met with favor from the majority of those present.
