# VICTORIÆ REGINÆ.

## CAP. I.

*An ACT for Granting to Her Majesty certain Duties on Goods, Wares and Merchandize, Imported into this Colony and its Dependencies.*

[Passed 28th April, 1846.]

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY—

**W**E, Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Commons of Newfoundland in General Assembly convened, towards raising the necessary Revenue to defray Your Majesty's Public Expenses in this Island, and to provide for the permanent improvement of the Colony, have freely and voluntarily resolved to give and grant unto Your Majesty the Duties hereinafter mentioned, and do therefore beseech Your Majesty that it may be enacted—

I.—*And be it therefore enacted, by the Governor, Council and Assembly, in Legislative Session convened,* That there be raised, levied, collected, and paid, unto Her Majesty, Her Heirs and Successors, upon all Wines, Spirits, Goods, Wares and Merchandize imported into this Colony and its Dependencies, the several Duties hereinafter respectively set forth in figures in the Table of Duties hereinafter contained, and denominated—

All which Duties shall be paid by the Importer or Importers of such Articles to the Collector or Sub-Collectors of Her Majesty's Customs, and shall be collected and secured by the means and under the regulations and penalties, and in the way and manner, hereinafter provided.

II.—*And be it further enacted*, That upon the entry of any Timber, Lumber or Shingles, subject to Duty by this Act, and which may hereafter be imported into this Island or its Dependencies, the Master or Commander of the Vessel in which such Timber, Lumber or Shingles may be imported, shall, before such vessel shall be cleared at the Customs, produce to the Collector or Sub-Collectors respectively, a Certificate from some one of the sworn Surveyors of Lumber appointed by Law, of the true measurement and contents of such Timber, Lumber, or Shingles, respectively.

Timber, Lumber &c. to be measured previous to Entry.

III.—*And be it further enacted*, That the said Duties shall be raised, levied and exacted on all such Goods, Wares and Merchandize, over and above and in addition to the Duty or Duties now raised, levied, or collected on the same articles, under and by virtue of an Act of the Imperial Parliament passed in the Eighth and Ninth Years of the Reign of Her present Majesty, entitled “An Act to regulate the Trade of the British Possessions abroad,” and over and above and in addition to any Duty or Duties now raised, levied, or collected, or which hereafter may be raised, levied, or collected on the same, under and by virtue of any other Act or Acts of the Imperial Parliament; and that nothing in this Act contained shall reduce or lessen or be construed to reduce or lessen the amount of any such Duty or Duties now received or receivable under the said Acts of the Imperial Parliament, or any of them.

Duties hereby imposed to be in addition to those previously imposed.

IV.—*And be it further enacted*, That all sums of Money granted or imposed by this Act, either as Duties, Penalties or Forfeitures, shall be deemed and are hereby declared to be Sterling Money of Great Britain, and shall be received and taken in Sterling Money of Great Britain, or in Foreign Coins at such rates as they are now received at in payment of Colonial Duties in this Colony, and that all such Duties shall be paid and received according to Imperial Weights and Measures now by Law established in this Island; and that in all cases where such Duties are imposed according to any specific quantity, or any specific value, the same shall be deemed to apply in the same proportion to any greater or less quantity or value.

Duties to be in Sterling, or in certain Foreign Coins, and according to Imperial weights and measures.

V.—*And be it further enacted*, That the produce of the Duties received by the means and powers of this Act, shall be accounted for and paid quarterly by the Collector or Sub-Collectors of Her Majesty's Customs into the hands of the Treasurer or Receiver-General of this Island, or other proper Officer authorized to receive the same, to be applied to such uses as shall be directed by the Legislature.

Duties to be paid to the Treasurer quarterly.

VI.—*And be it further enacted*, That all Ships and Vessels arriving at any Port, Harbour, Roadstead or Cove in this Island or its Dependencies, having on board any Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, and the Masters, Owners, Consignees and Importers of the same respectively, shall be under and subject and be liable to the same rules, regulations, forms and restrictions as are expressed and contained in an Act passed in the Imperial Parliament of the Eighth and Ninth Years of the Reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, entitled “An Act to regulate the Trade of the British Possessions abroad,” in respect to the Report and Entry of such Vessels and their Cargoes with the Collector of Her Majesty's Customs, or the Sub-Collector as aforesaid, both inwards and outwards, the Entry of Goods comprising any of the said articles to be laden or unladen, the payment of all Duties and Dues, the Entry inwards of such Goods by Bill of Sight, the regulations made and provided in case the Importer of any Goods subject to Duty under this Act should refuse to enter the same and pay the Duties thereon, the validity of any Entry made, the mode and manner of warehousing Goods without payment of Duty on the first Entry thereof, and the rules in reference thereto, the mode of giving Bonds on the Entry of Goods to be warehoused, the fines, penalties and forfeitures imposed or incurred on a breach of any and of all

Same forms of Entry, &c., to be observed as are directed by British Possessions Act.

such regulations, the mode and manner of prosecuting for and recovering any such penalties and forfeitures, and all enactments, rules, and regulations contained in the said Act of the Imperial Parliament; all which shall be in full force and operation, and shall be used and applied to fulfil the intents and purposes of this Act, so far as the same are applicable to this Island and its Dependencies, and not repugnant to the provisions of this Act, as fully and absolutely to all intents as if the same were fully detailed, contained and re-enacted herein. Provided nevertheless, that the said Imperial Act shall not extend to annul, restrain, or restrict, or be deemed to annul, restrain, or restrict, the operation and effect of any of the sections, clauses or provisions of this Act in reference to the Colonial Duties imposed, or the Drawbacks allowed, on any of the said Articles, the rules or regulations under which the same are prescribed to be collected or granted, or the Fines, Forfeitures, or Penalties herein imposed, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof notwithstanding.

Proviso.

Value of goods to be stated in the entry.

VII.—*And be it further enacted*, That in all cases of Goods entered either for Duty, or to be warehoused, and chargeable to pay Colonial Duty, according to the tale, guage, weight or measure thereof, such tale, guage, weight or measure shall be stated in the Entry, and if the Goods in such Entry be chargeable to pay Duty according to the value thereof, such value shall be stated in the Entry, and shall be affirmed by the declaration of the Importer or his known Agent, written upon the Entry and attested by his signature; and if any person shall make such declaration not being the Importer or Proprietor of such Goods, nor his Agent duly authorised by him, such person shall forfeit the sum of One Hundred Pounds; and such declaration shall be made in manner and form following, and shall be binding on the person by or on behalf of whom the same shall be made, that is to say—

Penalty on persons not duly authorised making entry

Importers may be examined on oath as to the true value of goods.

VIII.—*And be it further enacted*, That at the time of entering such Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, the Importer thereof, or his known Agent, shall, if required by the Collector or Sub-Collectors of Her Majesty's Customs respectively, produce the Invoice of such Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, and shall answer on Oath all such questions relating to the value thereof, as shall be put to him by such Collector or Sub-Collector of Her Majesty's Customs, who are hereby respectively authorized to administer such Oath; and in case of failure or refusal to produce such Invoice, (unless there be no such Invoice,) or to answer such questions, or to answer them truly, or if other than the true and real Invoice be produced, or if such true and real Invoice be altered by such Importer or his known Agent, then and in every such case, such Importer shall forfeit the sum of One Hundred Pounds. Provided always, that if such Articles be charged with Imperial Duties, and have been valued according to the provisions of the Imperial Act, such valuation shall be accepted as the true value for paying or securing the Colonial Duties thereon.

Proviso.

Goods undervalued may be detained and sold.

IX.—*And be it further enacted*, That if upon examination it shall appear to the Collector or Sub-Collector of Her Majesty's Customs, Landing Waiter, or Guager, that such articles are not valued according to the true value thereof, it shall be lawful for such Collector or other person to detain and secure such articles and within three days from the landing thereof to take such articles for the use of the Crown, and the

said Collector or other person shall thereupon, in any such case, cause the amount of such valuation, with an addition of Ten Pounds per Centum thereon and also the Duties paid upon such Entry, to be paid to the Importer or Proprietor of such Articles in full satisfaction for the same, and shall dispose of such articles for the benefit of the Crown; and if the produce of the sale shall exceed the sum so paid and all charges incurred by the Crown, one moiety of the overplus shall be given to the Officer or Officers who shall have detained or taken such Articles,—and the other moiety, detained for the benefit of the Crown, shall be paid to the Treasurer or Receiver General of this Island, or other proper Officer authorized to receive the same, to be applied to the public uses of the Colony as the Legislature shall direct.

X.—*And be it further enacted*, That in cases where the Duty imposed by this Act shall not amount to more than Twenty-five Pounds, the Collector or Sub-Collector of Her Majesty's Customs shall forthwith collect the same before granting his Warrant for the removal of the articles imported; and in case such Duty shall amount to more than Twenty-five Pounds, then such Collector or Sub-Collector shall be at liberty to secure the said Duties by taking Bond from the Importer, Owner, or Consignee, to Her Majesty, Her Heirs and Successors, with two sufficient Sureties for the payment of the Rates and Duties hereinbefore mentioned, in manner following, that is to say—for Wines and Spirits, and for all other Goods, Wares, and Merchandize whatsoever, in Four Months from the date or dates of such Bond respectively.

XI.—*And be it further enacted*, That there shall be allowed on the Exportation from this Island and its Dependencies to the United Kingdom, to any other British Possession, or to any Foreign Port or place, of any Goods, Wares or Merchandize, on which by virtue of this Act any Duties of the Customs chargeable and calculated by the tale, guage, weight or measure, on such Goods, Wares or Merchandize, shall have been paid on importation, a drawback of the full Duties which shall have been so paid as aforesaid. Provided, that on every such Exportation the Exporter of such Goods, Wares or Merchandize, shall, before the same shall be laden on board any Ship or Vessel, give notice in writing of such intended Export, and shall deliver to the Collector or Officer in charge of the Port or District, an account specifying the several Articles intended to be exported, their nature, quantity and quality, and shall annex to the said account an Affidavit that the full Colonial Duties on such Goods, Wares or Merchandize, were paid at the time of the Importation thereof, and setting forth the date of such Importation, the name of the Importing Vessel, of the Master thereof, and of the place whence such Goods, Wares or Merchandize, were Imported; which account shall, on the Clearance of such Goods, Wares or Merchandize, be signed by the said Collector or other Officer; and on the production of a Certificate under the hand of the Collector of Her Majesty's Customs at the port of Importation in the United Kingdom, or in such other British Possession, or under the hand and seal of the British Consul or Vice-Consul in such Foreign Port or Place, or if there be no Consul or Vice-Consul in such Foreign Port or Place, then under the hands and seals of two well known Merchants, of the actual and due Landing of the several Articles specified in such account aforesaid at such Port in the United Kingdom, or in such British Possession, or in such Foreign Port or Place, such Exporter shall be entitled to receive the Drawback herein granted. Provided always, that no Drawback shall be allowed on any such Goods, Wares or Merchandize, unless the same shall be Exported in Boats or Vessels exceeding in burthen Sixty Tons of Registered Tonnage, and unless such Drawback shall exceed the amount of Three Pounds on each Article so Exported, and be claimed within One Year from the day of shipment aforesaid. Provided nevertheless, that the aforesaid Collector, or other proper Officer, may allow a further time for the production of such Certificate on reasonable cause.

Certain goods may be warehoused in private warehouses in certain cases.

XII.—*And be it further enacted*, That in all cases where any Goods, Wares or Merchandize, not subject to Imperial Duties, may or may not now by Law be warehoused on the Importation thereof, it shall and may be lawful for the Importer of such Goods, Wares or Merchandize, to warehouse the same in the private Store or Warehouse of such Importer, in like manner as Goods, Wares or Merchandize, may now be warehoused in Warehouses appointed by the Collector of Her Majesty's Customs. Provided always, that every such private Store or Warehouse shall be subject to the like inspection and approval, and to the like regulations, as are now by law provided with respect to Warehouses appointed by the Collector as aforesaid, and shall be opened for the reception of warehoused Goods, Wares and Merchandize, other than those of the owner of such private Store or Warehouse. Provided also, that it shall and may be lawful for such Collector, from and out of such Colonial Duties as may from time to time be received by him, to pay and discharge all such Lockers' Salaries, Fees, and other necessary expenses, as may by such warehousing as aforesaid, be from time to time occasioned.

Proviso.

Goods reported for exportation

XIII.—*And be it further enacted*, That whenever and so often as any Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, subject to Duty by this Act, shall be reported for Importation at a Port or Place within this Colony or its Dependencies, other than the Port or Place at which the Importing Ship shall first arrive, or for Exportation, such Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, shall be subject, under, and liable, to all the rules, regulations, forms, and restrictions, that the like articles are subject and liable to, when Exported from the Warehouse.

Officers may mark goods, and seal and secure packages, &c.

XIV.—*And be it further enacted*, That it shall be lawful for the Tide-Surveyor, and other proper Officers, to board any such Ship, arriving at any Port or Place in this Colony or its Dependencies, and freely to stay on board until all the Goods laden therein shall have been duly delivered from the same; and such Officers shall have free access to every part of the Ship, with power to fasten down hatchways, and to mark any Goods before landing, and to lock up, seal, mark, or otherwise secure, any Goods on board such Ship; and if any place, or any box or chest, be locked, and the keys withheld, such Officers, if they be of a degree superior to Tidesmen or Boatmen, may open such place, box, or chest, in the best manner in their power, and if any Goods be found concealed on board of any such Ship, they shall be forfeited; and if the proper Officer shall place any lock, mark, or seal, upon any Goods on board any such Ship, and such lock, mark, or seal, be wilfully opened, altered, or broken, before due delivery of such Goods, or if any such Goods be secretly conveyed away, or if the hatchways after having been fastened down by such Officer be opened, the Master of such Ship shall forfeit a sum not exceeding One Hundred Pounds.

Penalty on breaking seals, &c.

Surplus stores in certain cases to be treated as imported by way of merchandize.

XV.—*And be it further enacted*, That the surplus Store or Stores remaining unconsumed on board of any Ship arriving from Ports beyond the seas in this Colony or its Dependencies, shall be subject to the same Duties, restrictions and regulations, as the like sort of Goods shall be subject to when Imported by way of Merchandise. Provided always, that if it shall appear to the Collector of Her Majesty's Customs or Officer in charge of the Port or District where such ship shall arrive, that the quantity or description of such Stores is not excessive or unsuitable under all the circumstances of the voyage, such Stores, if not landed, shall be duty free.

Proviso.

Duty may be remitted on damaged goods.

XVI.—*And be it further enacted*, That if any Goods, Wares or Merchandize, which are rated to pay Duty according to the tale, gauge, weight or measure thereof, shall receive damage during the voyage, an abatement of such Duties shall be allowed

in proportion to the damage so received; provided proof be made to the satisfaction Proviso. of the officer in charge of the Port or District in which the vessel importing such Goods, Wares or Merchandize shall have arrived, that such damage was received after such Goods, Wares or Merchandize were shipped, and before they were landed in this Island or its Dependencies, and that such abatement be claimed at the time of the first examination of such Goods, Wares or Merchandize.

XVII.—*And be it further enacted,* That upon such claim as aforesaid, the Officer Amount of duty to be remitted—how settled. appointed to superintend the landing of such Goods, Wares or Merchandize, shall examine the same with reference to such damage, and shall thereupon state the amount of damage received, and make a proportionate abatement of Duties accordingly. Provided, that if such officer be incompetent to estimate such damage, or if the importer of such Goods, Wares or Merchandize, be not satisfied with the abatement made by him, the said officer shall appoint two disinterested Merchants experienced in the nature and value of such Goods, Wares or Merchandize, to examine the same and to report in writing the amount of damage so received as aforesaid, and an abatement of Duties shall thereon be made in proportion to the amount of damage ascertained by such report.

XVIII.—*And be it further enacted,* That in case any Goods, Ships, Vessels or Boats, shall be seized as forfeited, or detained as undervalued, under this or any Colonial Law, it shall and may be lawful for the Governor or Administrator of the Governor may order goods, &c. seized to be restored. Government for the time being, by and with the advice and consent of Her Majesty's Council, to order the same to be restored in such manner and upon such terms and conditions as he shall think fit to direct; and if the proprietors of the same shall within Twenty Days accept the terms and conditions prescribed by the said Governor or Administrator of the Government, by and with the advice and consent aforesaid, they shall not have or maintain any Action for recompense or damage on account of such seizure or detention, and the person making such seizure shall not proceed in any manner for condemnation.

XIX.—*And be it further enacted,* That all Penalties and Forfeitures imposed by Penalties—how recovered. this Act shall and may be sued for, prosecuted and recovered, by Action of Debt, Bill, Plaint or Information, in any of Her Majesty's Courts of Record in this Island, in the name of the Collector for the Port of St. John's.

XX.—*And be it further enacted,* That it shall be lawful for the Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, to nominate one Member of Her Majesty's Council, sitting in the House of Assembly, and two elected Members of the Governor to appoint Board to audit the accounts of Collectors. said House of Assembly, who shall constitute a Board of Audit, and who shall have power to audit the Accounts of the receivers of the duties imposed by this Act, and finally to settle and close the Accounts of such receivers. Provided always, that such Accounts so audited, shall be laid before the Legislature in each Session within one month from the commencement thereof.

XXI.—*And be it further enacted,* That there shall be allowed and paid annually during the continuance of this Act to the undermentioned Officers of Her Majesty's Remuneration to Officers of Customs for collection of Duties. Customs, and to defray all expenses of remuneration for the collection of the Colonial Revenue, and of Charges incidental thereto, the sums following, that is to say—

To the Collector of Her Majesty's Customs at St. John's, Fifty Pounds.

To the Tide Surveyor at St. John's, Two Hundred Pounds.

To the Landing Waiter at St. John's, Two Hundred Pounds.

To the Clerk of the Collector at St. John's, One Hundred and Eighty Pounds.

To the Sub-Collector at Lamaline, One Hundred Pounds.  
 To the Sub-Collector at Fogo, One Hundred Pounds.  
 To the Sub-Collector at LaPoile, One Hundred Pounds.  
 To the Sub-Collector at Greenspond, One Hundred Pounds.  
 To the Preventive Officer at Bay Bulls, Fifty Pounds.  
 To Tide Waiters at St. John's, Two Hundred and Seven Pounds and Seventeen Shillings.  
 To Imperial Sub-Collectors, Two Hundred Pounds.

Provided that no one of such Imperial Sub-Collectors shall receive more than two and a half per cent. on the amount of Colonial Revenue by him collected.

For Stationery, Printed Forms, Postages, and other ordinary charges, Thirty Pounds.

XXII.—*And be it further enacted*, That there shall be granted to Her Majesty, her Heirs and Successors, the sum of One Hundred and Eighty-six Pounds Thirteen Shillings and Fourpence, out of such Duties as may be collected under this Act, for defraying the expense of a Preventive Boat and Crew, to be placed under the control and direction of the Collector at the Port of St. John's, for the better protection of the Colonial Revenue.

Appropriation of  
 Penalties and  
 Forfeitures.

XXIII.—*And be it further enacted*, That all Penalties and Forfeitures recovered under this Act shall be divided, paid and applied, as follows, that is to say: After deducting the charges of Prosecution and Sale from the produce thereof, one third part of the net produce shall be paid into the hands of the Treasurer of the Colony to be applied as the Legislature shall direct; one-third part to the person who shall inform for the same, and one third part to the Officer who shall seize and sue for the same.

XXIV.—*And be it further enacted*, That all Yachts sailing under Warrant of the Lords of the Admiralty, as belonging to the Royal Yacht Club, be exempted, on view of the said Warrant, from the payment of all Local Dues whatever; and that it shall and may be lawful for the said Vessels, or any of them, to enter the several Ports in this Colony, and depart therefrom, without obtaining an Entrance or Clearance from the Custom House.

Officers of Cus-  
 toms may take  
 samples of goods.

XXV.—*And be it further enacted*, That it shall and may be lawful for the Officers of Her Majesty's Customs to take such Samples of any Goods as shall be necessary for ascertaining the amount of any Duties payable on the same, and that all such samples, whether taken under the authority of this or of any former Act, shall be disposed of and accounted for in such manner as the Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, shall, with the advice of Her Majesty's Council, direct.

Duration of this  
 Act.

XXVI.—*And be it further enacted*, That this Act shall commence and have operation from and after the Fifth day of July in this present Year, and shall be in force for the period of Eighteen Calendar Months, and no longer.

### CAP. II.

#### *An ACT for Granting to Her Majesty a Sum of Money for the Construction and Repairs of Roads and Bridges.*

[Passed 28th April, 1846.]

**W**HEREAS it is expedient to provide for the internal improvement of the Colony by the opening and making of Roads therein : Preamble.

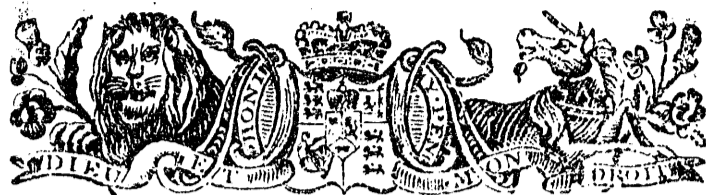

### CAP. III.

#### *AN ACT to Regulate the Culling of Cod-fish in this Colony.*

[Passed 28th April, 1846.]

**W**HEREAS it is expedient to regulate the Culling of Cod-fish in this Colony. Preamble.

*Be it therefore enacted, by the Governor, Council and Assembly, in Legislative Session convened,* That from and after the passing of this Act, it shall not be lawful for any person to Cull any quantity of Cod-fish within this Colony unless such person shall have previously taken and subscribed before a Stipendiary Justice of the Peace the Oath hereinafter mentioned: Provided always that it shall and may be lawful in all cases where the purchasers and sellers of Cod-fish may agree to employ an unsworn Culler. Cod-fish to be culled by sworn Cullers. Proviso.

#### SCHEDULE.

I, A. B., do swear that I will faithfully and without fear, favor, or affection, discharge the duties of a Fish Culler. Oath.

### CAP. IV.

#### *An ACT for the Establishment of a Lunatic Asylum in St. John's.*

[Passed 28th April, 1846.]

**W**HEREAS it is expedient that an Asylum for the reception and cure of persons of unsound mind should be established at St. John's : Preamble.

I.—*Be it therefore enacted, by the Governor, Council and Assembly, in Legislative Session convened,* That from and out of such Monies as may from time to time remain in the hands of the Colonial Treasurer, unappropriated, there be granted to Her Majesty, Her Heirs and Successors, the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Pounds, which said Sum shall be appropriated in manner hereinafter prescribed in the establishment at St. John's of a Lunatic Asylum. £1500 granted for establishment of Asylum.

II.—*And be it further enacted,* That the Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, by and with the advice and consent of the Council, shall have full power to expend the said Sum of Money so granted as aforesaid, in providing a suitable Building for carrying into effect the provisions of this Act, and to regulate the admission of Patients in the said Asylum, and to make all such Rules, Orders, and Regulations, as may be necessary for the efficient superintendence, management and control of the said Asylum. Grant of money how expended.

III.—*And be it further enacted,* That it shall be lawful for the Governor, or Administrator of the Government for the time being, by Warrant under his hand and seal, to nominate and appoint Seven fit and proper persons, of whom Three shall be a quorum, to be and act as a Board of Commissioners for the said Asylum, and that whenever a vacancy shall occur in the number of the said Board, by the death, resignation, or absence from the Colony for twelve months, of any Member thereof, it shall be lawful for the Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, to supply such vacancy by the appointment thereto, in manner aforesaid, of some other fit and proper person, and either temporarily or permanently, as may be deemed most expedient. Appointment of Commissioners.

IV.—*And be it further enacted,* That the Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, shall have power to appoint the Medical and other Superintendents, Keepers, and Servants, and to fix and regulate their Salaries. Appointment of Medical Officers, &c.

Authority of

V.—*And be it further enacted,* That the said Commissioners shall have full power and authority to carry into effect all such rules, orders, and regulations as shall be made and adopted by the Governor and Council, and generally to superintend the management of the said Asylum.

Monies how paid.

VI.—*And be it further enacted,* That the Money herein granted and hereby required for carrying into effect the provisions of this Act, shall be paid in discharge of such Warrants as may from time to time be issued by the Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, on the Colonial Treasurer, in favor of such persons as the said Governor or Administrator as aforesaid may appoint to receive the same, under the provisions aforesaid.

VII.—*And be it further enacted,* That the said Board of Commissioners shall, on or before the Tenth Day of January in each year, and at all times when required, transmit to the Office of the Colonial Secretary a full and detailed Report, Statement and Account of the Receipts, Disbursements, State, Progress, and Condition of the said Asylum, and of such other matters connected therewith as may be in that behalf directed.

### CAP. V.

*An ACT to enable Barristers and Advocates to practise as Attorneys, Solicitors and Proctors, in the several Courts of this Island.*

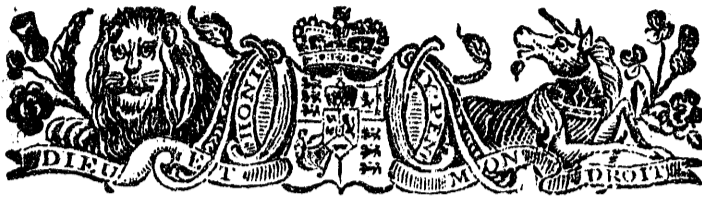
[Passed 28th April, 1846.]

**W**HEREAS it is expedient that persons called by the Law Society of Newfoundland to the Degree of Barristers of the said Society, should be permitted to practise as Attorneys, Solicitors, and Proctors, in the several Courts of Judicature in this Island : Preamble.

*Be it therefore enacted, by the Governor, Council, and Assembly, in Legislative Session convened,* That from and after the passing of this Act, it shall and may be lawful for every person who either now is or may be hereafter admitted to practise as a Barrister or Advocate in the said several Courts of this Island, to practise also as an Attorney, Solicitor, and Proctor, in all or any Court or Courts of Record, or places of Jurisdiction, within this Island, on taking the usual Oaths before one of Her Majesty's Judges of the Supreme Court : Provided always, that every such Person shall, previously to his being admitted to practise as an Attorney, Solicitor, or Proctor, as aforesaid, pay to the said Law Society all such Fees as would be payable by such person, were such person entered on the Books of the said Society as a Student-at-Law, in order to his admission as an Attorney of this Island under the Seventh Section of an Act passed in the Fourth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, entitled "An Act to Incorporate a Law Society in Newfoundland, and to regulate the admission of Barristers and Attorneys to practise in the Law in the several Courts in this Island." Barristers and Advocates of the Supreme Court admitted to practise as Attorneys

### CAP. VI.

*An ACT to authorise the raising by Loan a further Sum of Money for the Erection of a Colonial Building in St. John's, and for other purposes.*

[Passed 28th April, 1846.]

**W**HEREAS an Act was passed in the Sixth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty, Preamble. entitled "An Act to authorise the Erection of a Colonial House in the Town of St. John's, and the raising by loan of a sum of Money for that purpose," by the provisions whereof nine Commissioners to be thereunder appointed, or the major part in number of them, were authorized to raise by loan a sum of Money not exceeding in the whole the sum of Fifteen Thousand Pounds, to be appropriated towards carrying into effect the provisions of the said Act: And Whereas by an Act passed in the Seventh Year of the Reign of her present Majesty, entitled "An Act to amend an Act passed in the Sixth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty, entitled "An Act to authorize the Erection of a Colonial House in the Town of St. John's, and the raising by loan of a sum of Money for that purpose," the first recited Act was in some respects amended: And Whereas the said sum of Fifteen Thousand Pounds has been found insufficient for the purposes of the said Acts, and it is expedient that the Commissioners appointed under the same should be empowered to raise a further sum for the said purposes:

1.—*Be it therefore enacted, by the Governor, Council and Assembly in Legislative Session convened,* That it shall and may be lawful for the said Commissioners, or the major part of them in number, and they are hereby authorized and empowered, to raise by loan on public advertisement for tenders thereof, at the lowest rate of interest, such further sums of Money, not exceeding in the whole the sum of Seven Thousand Pounds, as may be found necessary for the purposes of the said Acts, and such Monies shall be raised in like manner, and appropriated to the like ends, and repaid after the like times, as are expressed and declared in the said recited Acts, with respect to the sum of Fifteen Thousand Pounds aforesaid; Commissioners authorised to raise a further sum for purposes of this Act. Provided that the said Commissioners shall not Proviso. be obliged to accept any tender for a loan on interest as aforesaid, at a fractional part of a Pound less than one half per Cent.

Site of Colonial  
Building may be  
altered.

And Whereas it has been represented that the site of the said intended Colonial Building on Church-hill, as mentioned and provided in and by the said first recited Act, is too circumscribed in its dimensions to admit of a Market-House being erected in connexion with the Colonial Building, and that it would be more advantageous to the public if the said Colonial Building were erected on some more eligible site, and the proposed site on Church-hill were reserved for a Market-House :

Proviso.

II.—*Be it further enacted*, That it shall and may be lawful for His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Council, if they shall deem it desirable, to select some other and more convenient site for the erection of the said Colonial Building ; Provided that such an arrangement can be made with the Contractor for the erection thereof, as in the change of site shall involve no additional expenditure beyond that already incurred in preparing the said intended site on Church-hill. Provided nevertheless, that the Commissioners appointed under the said recited Acts shall also proceed with all reasonable dispatch to erect a Market-house under the provisions of this and the said recited Act upon the site originally intended for the same.

### CAP. VII.

*An ACT to raise by Loan a sum of Money for the general purposes of the Colony.*

[Passed 28th April, 1846.]

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the Seventh Year of the Reign of Her present Majesty entitled "An Act for granting to Her Majesty a Sum of Money for Constructing and Repairing Roads, Streets, and Bridges, within this Colony and its Dependencies, and for other purposes," and by an Act passed in the Eighth Year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, entitled "An Act for granting to Her Majesty the Sum of Ten Thousand Five Hundred Pounds for the Making and Repairing of Roads, Streets and Bridges within this Colony," provision was made for the raising, by the issue of Treasury Notes, a Loan of Eighteen Thousand Five Hundred Pounds for the services in the said Act mentioned; And Whereas the necessity for the issuing of the said Notes, as contemplated by the said Acts, not having until this time arisen, no part of such Loan has been raised, but the same may now be required, and it is expedient that it should be raised in manner hereinafter declared, instead of by means of Treasury Notes, as provided by the said recited Acts—

I.—*Be it therefore enacted by the Governor, Council and Assembly, in Legislative Session convened,* that the Treasurer of the Colony shall be and is hereby authorized to raise by Loan from such parties as will advance the same, a sum not exceeding Eighteen Thousand and Five Hundred Pounds, to be applied to the general purposes of the Colony, which sum, with interest thereon, shall be chargeable upon and repaid out of the funds of the Colony, at the times following, that is to say;—the Sum of Nine Thousand Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds on the expiration of Five Years from the borrowing the same, and the Sum of Nine Thousand Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds on the expiration of Ten Years from the time of the borrowing thereof.

£18,500 may be raised by Treasurer for purposes of the colony.

II.—*And be it further enacted,* That the said Loan shall be raised by Public Advertisement for Tenders thereof, at the lowest rate of Interest, and the Interest on the Money loaned shall be paid half-yearly on the last days of June and December in each year; Provided nevertheless, that no Interest shall be payable for any part of such Loan beyond the period when the same is to be repaid under the provisions of this Act.

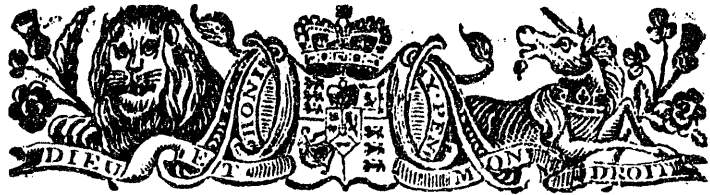

### CAP. VIII.

#### *An ACT for the Incorporation of the “ St. John’s Water Company.”*

[Passed 28th April, 1846.]

**W**HEREAS much inconvenience has heretofore been occasioned to the inhabitants of the Town of St. John’s by the scarcity of Water therein ; and the bringing into the said Town a sufficient supply of Fresh Water, would therefore be of great public utility. And whereas the several persons hereinafter named are desirous of being formed into a Company for the purpose of effecting such object, and to such end have prayed the assistance of the Legislature :

I.—*Be it therefore enacted, by the Governor, Council, and Assembly, in Legislative Session convened,* That William Thomas, Robert Job, John Kent, Walter Grieve, Edward M. Archibald, Charles Fox Bennett, George T. Brooking, Peter McBride, and Andrew Milroy, and all such other persons as may have associated with them for the purpose aforesaid, or may hereafter become Stockholders in the said Company, and their respective successors, executors, administrators, and assigns, shall be, and they are hereby, united into a Company for the purpose aforesaid ; and shall be a Body Corporate and Politic, in Law, in Fact, and in Name, by the style and title of “ The St. John’s Water Company ;” and by that name shall have perpetual succession and a common seal, with power to alter the same ; and shall and may be capable in Law to sue and be sued, implead and be impleaded, answer and be answered unto, in all Courts and places whatsoever ; and shall and may purchase, hold, receive, enjoy, assign, and convey, Lands, Tenements, Goods, and Chattels, and do and execute all such other things, in and about the same, as may in that behalf be necessary ; and also shall and may, from time to time and at all times, have full power and authority to ordain, make and establish all such rules and bye-laws, and to do and perform all such other acts, deeds, matters and things, whatsoever, as may be necessary to the good government and the conduct of the business of the said Corporation, and as to them as such Body Politic or Corporate shall appertain to do : Provided always, that the Lands and Tenements of the said Corporation, to be holden by them as aforesaid, shall not exceed in yearly value the sum of Two Thousand Pounds ; and, also, that such rules and bye-laws shall not be inconsistent with the true intent and meaning of this Act, nor repugnant to the Laws of this Colony ; and Provided further, that it shall be incumbent on the said Cor-

poration, as soon as conveniently may be after the commencement of their operations, to establish, in Water Street, Fire Plugs at no greater distance from each other than fifty yards, for the preservation of the said Town in case of Fire occurring therein, and at all times during the continuance of this Act, to keep the same in an effective state for the uses aforesaid.

II.—*And be it further enacted*, That the said Company may raise and contribute among themselves, as the Stock of the said Company, a sum not exceeding in the whole Six Thousand Pounds, in Six Hundred Shares of Ten Pounds each; and such sum shall be paid by the Stockholders respectively at such times and in such manner as the Directors of the said Company may from time to time appoint, and shall be appropriated to the purpose of constructing, completing and maintaining the Water-works of the said Company, and for carrying into effect the purposes of this Act. Provided, that whenever the business of the said Company shall be thought to require a further and additional amount of Capital Stock, it shall and may be lawful for the said Stockholders, at any general or special meeting to be called for that purpose, and of which due notice of not less than twenty days shall be first given in two of the Newspapers published in this Colony, of which the “Royal Gazette” shall be one, to increase the said Capital Stock by the further sum of Six Thousand Pounds, in shares of Ten Pounds each; and such additional Stock may be made and added, either in one gross amount and at one time, or at two or more distinct and separate times, and in such amounts as may be resolved and agreed upon at the said or at any subsequent meeting of Stockholders, to be called as aforesaid.

III.—*And be it further enacted*, That so soon as Five Hundred Shares shall be subscribed of the said Capital Stock, the first general meeting of the Stockholders shall be holden at such time and place as the majority of Stockholders may appoint, fourteen days’ notice of the time and place of such meeting being given in two of the public Newspapers, of which the “Royal Gazette” shall be one, and such meeting shall appoint seven persons, being each a proprietor of ten or more shares in the said Company, to be Directors thereof, and shall make, ordain and establish such Rules and Bye-laws for the good conduct and management of the affairs of the said Company, and the carrying into effect the purposes of this Act, as may be deemed necessary.

IV.—*And be it further enacted*, That the said Directors so to be appointed as aforesaid, shall commence the operations of the said Company and shall continue in office until the first Tuesday in May, A.D. 1847, and that on the said first Tuesday in May, and on the first Tuesday in May in each succeeding year, a general meeting of the Stockholders of the said Company shall, upon due notice as aforesaid, be holden; at which meeting the Directors for the past year shall exhibit a full and unreserved statement of the affairs of the said Corporation; and such meeting shall thereupon proceed to Audit the Accounts so exhibited, to declare a dividend thereon, to elect Directors for the then ensuing year, to amend, if necessary, or to annul, any Rule or Bye-law of the said Company, and to transact such other business as may then be brought before them.

V.—*And be it further enacted*, That of the said Board of Directors three shall be a quorum for the transaction of business; and that as soon after their election as may be, such Directors shall choose a President and Vice-President; and that in case any vacancy shall, previously to any such annual meeting as aforesaid, arise by the death, resignation, or absence from the Colony, of any member of the said Board, the remaining Directors shall be and they are hereby authorized to fill up such vacancy from among the Stockholders of the said Company; and the person appointed to such vacancy shall continue in office until the next annual meeting of Stockholders.

VI.—*And be it further enacted*, That the Directors for the time being shall have Appointment of Officers, &c. power to appoint such Officers, Clerks and Servants, as they shall think necessary for executing the business of the said Corporation, and shall allow them such compensation for their respective services as they may deem reasonable and proper ; all which, together with the expense of all other contingencies, shall be defrayed from the funds of the Corporation ; and the said Directors shall likewise exercise such other powers and authorities for the well regulating the affairs of the said Corporation, as shall be prescribed by the Bye-Laws and Regulations of the same.

VII.—*And be it further enacted*, That on every occasion when, in conformity with Voting, how regulated. the provisions of this Act, the votes of the Stockholders are to be given, each Stockholder shall be entitled to one vote for every share ; and that in any case where, upon any question being under the consideration of the Board of Directors, the number of votes for and against such question shall be equal, the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall have a casting vote ; Provided always, that no Stockholder of the said Corporation shall be entitled to more than twenty votes.

VIII.—*And be it further enacted*, That any Stockholder may, on any such occasion Proxies of Stockholders. as aforesaid, vote by Proxy ; Provided such Proxy be himself a Stockholder, and be constituted by some instrument in writing.

IX.—*And be it further enacted*, That all and every the shares in the Capital Stock Stock to be personal estate, &c. of the said Company, and all profits and advantages thereof, shall be deemed and be personal estate, and as such transmissible ; subject to such rules, nevertheless, as may be in that behalf established ; Provided always that no assignment or transfer of any Share shall be valid or effectual until the same shall be entered and registered in a book to be kept for that purpose ; and provided also that whenever any Stockholder shall have assigned or transferred all his stock or shares in the said Company, such Stockholder shall cease to be a member of the Corporation.

X.—*And be it further enacted*, That the shares in the Capital Stock of the said And subject to Attachment. Company shall be liable to Attachment or Execution in like manner as other personal property now is, and that the process or warrant in such cases respectively shall be served on the President or Vice-President of the Board of Directors ; and such service shall bind the shares of any Stockholder against whom any such process may have issued, to the extent of such Attachment or Execution, and that for the purpose of ascertaining the number of shares held by such Stockholder, the President, Vice-President, or any Director or Officer of the said Company, may be examined, in like manner as any third person, having in his or her possession any Monies, Goods, Debts or Effects of any Defendant, may now be examined ; and upon sale by the Sheriff of any such Shares in pursuance of or under any such Attachment or Execution, the Clerk of the said Company shall, upon production of a bill of sale from the Sheriff, transfer the number of Shares by him sold under such Attachment or Execution to the purchaser or purchasers thereof, and such transfer shall be valid and effectual, to all intents and purposes whatsoever ; Provided that when such Attachment shall have been made under a Writ of Execution, the sale by the Sheriff shall be made within thirty days after the Warrant shall have been left with the President or Vice-President ; And when the Attachment shall have been made under mesne process, the sale shall be made within thirty days after such time as the Plaintiff could have signed judgment in the cause in which such Attachment on mesne process shall have issued.

XI.—*And be it further enacted*, That the holders of Stock in the said Corporation shall be chargeable in their private and individual capacities for the payment of all debts Individual liability of Stockholders. due at any time from the said Corporation, in proportion to the Stock they respectively

hold ; Provided, however, that in no case shall any one Stockholder be liable to pay a sum exceeding the amount of Stock then actually held by him ; Provided, nevertheless, that nothing previously herein contained shall be construed to exempt the Joint Stock of the said Corporation from being liable for and chargeable with the Debts and Engagements of the same.

Proceedings on dissolution.

XII.—*And be it further enacted*, That on any dissolution of the said Corporation, immediate and effectual measures shall be taken by the Directors then in office, for closing all the concerns of the said Corporation, and for dividing the capital and profits thereof which may remain, after the discharge of all existing liabilities, among the Stockholders, in proportion to their respective interests ; Provided, that such Stockholders shall be chargeable, in their private and individual capacities, for the payment and discharge of all then existing debts and liabilities of the said Corporation, in proportion to the Stock they shall then respectively hold ; subject, however, to the Proviso mentioned in the preceding section of this Act ; Provided, however, that such liability shall continue only for two years from and after the time of such dissolution.

General Meeting may be called by Stock Holders.

XIII.—*And be it further enacted*, That any number of Stockholders not less than ten, who together shall be proprietors of one hundred shares, shall have power at any time to call a general meeting of Stockholders for purposes relating to the business of the said Corporation, giving at least ten days previous notice in two of the Newspapers published in the Colony, of which the “Royal Gazette” shall be one, and specifying in such notice the time and place of such meeting, and the objects thereof ; and the Board of Directors, or any four of them, shall have the like power at any time, upon observing the like formalities, to call a general meeting as aforesaid.

Powers of the Corporation.

XIV.—*And be it further enacted*, That it shall be lawful for the said Company, and they are hereby empowered from time to time to break up, dig and trench, so much and so many of the streets, squares and public places, of the said Town of St. John's, and of the roads leading thereto, as may be necessary for laying, taking up, or having access to, the mains and pipes for the conveyance of the water of the said Company, doing no unnecessary damage in the premises, and taking care, as far as may be, to preserve a free and uninterrupted passage through the said streets, roads, squares and public places, while such works are in progress ; placing guards or fences, with lamps during the night, and taking such other precautions as may be necessary for the prevention of accidents by any openings, and finishing and replacing the said streets, squares, roads and public places, in as good condition as before the commencement of the works, without any unnecessary delay ; and that in case of any neglect of any of the duties herein prescribed, the said Corporation shall be subject to pay a fine of Ten Pounds, over and above such damages as may be recovered against the said Corporation in any Civil Action.

Compensation to parties injured.

XV.—*And be it further enacted*, That it shall and may be lawful for the said Company, upon payment or tender of a reasonable compensation to any party whose interests may be affected in this behalf, to enter upon, take possession of, and occupy, for the construction of reservoirs or other works, or the laying of pipes or mains, any lands the property of any private person or persons, situated between the said Town and the sources whence the water of the said Company may be derived ; and that from and after such payment or tender, as aforesaid, the land so taken possession of or occupied, shall become the property of the said Corporation.

Procedure for recovery of further Compensation.

XVI.—*And be it further enacted*, That if any person or persons to whom any such payment or tender of compensation may have been made, as aforesaid, shall deem the amount thereof insufficient, it shall and may be lawful for such person or persons to prefer and prosecute, within the period of Three Years from the time of such entry,

possession, or occupation, aforesaid, but not afterwards, an Action of Trespass or on the Case against the said Corporation or its servants ; in which action evidence may be given of the value of the land taken possession of, and of the sum so paid or tendered, as aforesaid, and the Jury empannelled for the trial of the same shall thereupon give such verdict as the merits of the case may require.

XVII.—*And be it further enacted*, That in any action that may be brought against the said Corporation, or any of its servants, for anything done in pursuance of this Act, it shall be lawful for the defendant or defendants therein to pay into Court such sum of money as he or they may deem fit, and that thereupon the like proceedings shall be had in such action as in other cases wherein money may now by law be paid into Court. Corporation may pay money into Court.

XVIII.—*And be it further enacted*, That where there are buildings within the said Town, different parts whereof shall belong to different proprietors, or shall be in possession of different tenants, or lessees, the said Corporation shall have power to carry pipes to any part of any building so situated, passing over or through the property of one or more proprietors or in possession of one or more tenants, to convey the water to that of another or in possession of another, and also to break up and uplift all passages which may be a common way to neighbouring proprietors or tenants, and to dig or cut trenches therein for the purpose of laying down pipes or taking up and repairing the same ; the said Corporation doing as little damage as may be in the execution of the powers granted by this Act, and making satisfaction to the owners or proprietors of buildings or other property, or to the public, for all the damage to be by them sustained, in or by the execution of all or any of the said powers. Power of the Corporation in other respects.

XIX.—*And be it further enacted*, That if any person or persons shall lay or cause to be laid any pipe or main to communicate with any pipe or main belonging to the said Corporation, or in any way obtain or use its water without the consent of the Board of Directors or their Officers appointed to grant such consent, or shall increase the supply of water agreed for with the said Corporation, or shall wrongfully waste the same, every such person shall forfeit and pay to the said Corporation the sum of Ten Pounds for every such offence, over and above the value of the water which may have been so wrongfully used, consumed or wasted ; and the same, together with costs of suite in that behalf incurred, may be recovered in any civil action to be brought by the said Corporation in any of Her Majesty's Courts of Record. Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to restrain the use of such water on the occasion of any fire occurring in the said town of St. John's, by means of any fire plugs to be established as aforesaid. Penalties on persons defrauding the Company.

XX.—*And be it further enacted*, That if any person or persons shall wilfully or maliciously break up, injure, put out of order, damage or destroy, any of the works, or any pipe, main, or other apparatus or appurtenance of the said Corporation, or any material used or provided for the same ; or shall in any wise wilfully do any other injury or damage, for the purpose of obstructing, hindering, or embarrassing, the construction, completion, maintaining, or repairing of the said works, or of the apparatus or appurtenances thereof; every such person or persons shall, on conviction therefor, to be had in a summary manner before two or more Justices of the Peace, forfeit, for every such offence, any sum not exceeding Five Pounds, together with costs of suit, and shall also make full satisfaction for the damage so by him, her, or them, occasioned ; and it shall be lawful for any person or persons who shall see the offence committed, to apprehend (without warrant,) and for any other person to assist in apprehending, the offender or offenders, and to convey him, her, or them, to any Constable, who is to keep him, her, or them, in safe custody, and with all reasonable despatch to convey Penalties for malicious injuries to works, &c.

him, her, or them, before any Justice of the Peace, in order to his, her, or their conviction for such offence; and in case any such offender or offenders shall not, on conviction, pay the said forfeiture, satisfaction and costs, such two or more Justices are hereby required to commit such offender or offenders to the Common Gaol, for any period not exceeding three Calendar months, unless such forfeiture, satisfaction, and costs, shall be sooner paid.

Recovery of Penalties, &c.

XXI.—*And be it further enacted*, That all penalties imposed by this Act, for recovery of which no method is hereinbefore prescribed, may be sued for and recovered, together with costs of suit, by an Action of Debt, to be brought in any of Her Majesty's Courts of Record, or in a summary manner before any two or more of Her Majesty's Justices of Peace, and by distress and sale of the offender's Goods and Chattels; and no conviction which may be had under this Act shall be quashed for want of form, provided sufficient appear on the face thereof to warrant such conviction.

Dividend limited to ten per cent.

XXII.—*And be it further enacted*, That it shall not be lawful for the said Company to divide more than Ten Pounds per Cent. per Annum, as a net profit on the paid-up Capital of the said Company, but that all net profits over and above such dividend shall be appropriated, under the management and direction of the said Company, towards establishing additional Fire-Plugs, and towards providing Water, free of charge, for the poorer classes of the inhabitants of St. John's.

Company to expend monies granted by Legislature free of charge, &c.

XXIII.—*And be it further enacted*, That it shall be incumbent on the said Company to expend, without any charge for superintendence, all such sums of Money as may hereafter be granted by the Legislature towards the establishment, for the use of such inhabitants as aforesaid, of Pumps and Fountains to be connected with the Mains and Pipes of the Company, and to afford a constant supply of Water to the same gratis. Provided always, that such supply shall not reduce the net profits of the said Company below the Dividend of Ten per Cent. aforesaid; And provided also, that all works which may be erected in connection with the works of the said Company, shall be under its exclusive control and management.

And to report annually to the Governor.

XXIV.—*And be it further enacted*, That the said Company shall annually transmit to His Excellency the Governor, to be laid before the Legislature, a detailed statement of the affairs and state of Accounts of the said Company.

Act to be deemed a Public Act.

XXV.—*And be it further enacted*, That this Act shall be deemed and taken to be a Public Act, and shall be judicially taken notice of and have the effect of a Public Act without being specially pleaded.

## CAP. IX.

*An ACT to amend an Act passed in the Third Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entitled "An Act for the more speedy abatement of Nuisances."*

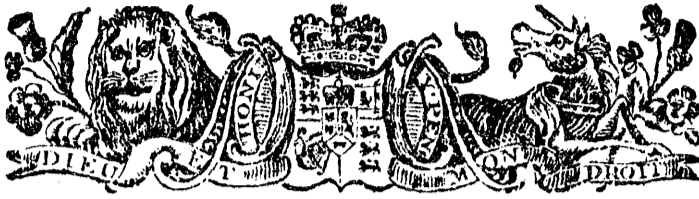
[Passed 28th April, 1846.]

**W**HEREAS an Act was passed in the third Year of the Reign of His Late Majesty, entitled "An Act for the more speedy abatement of Nuisances," and it is expedient that the said Act should be in some respects amended :

I.—*Be it therefore enacted by the Governor, Council, and Assembly, in Legislative Session convened,* That all such parts of the Third Section of the said Act as provide that notice shall be given to any party claiming, or who may have deposited any Filth, Rubbish, or other offensive matter, on any Street, Lane, Cove, or Place; and all such parts of the Fourth section of the said Act as limit the obligation of the Occupier or Occupiers of any House, Building, or other Premises, on the side of any Street, Lane, Cove, or Place, to remove all Filth, Rubbish, or other offensive matter, from the said Street, Lane, Cove, or Place, to cases where such Filth, Rubbish, or other offensive matter, shall have been placed or deposited thereon by such Occupier or Occupiers; and also all such parts of the Ninth Section as permit Dogs having Collars on their Necks to go at large without Logs; and also, the Tenth Section of the said Act; shall be, and the same are, hereby repealed.

II.—*And be it further enacted,* That in all cases where any Dog shall be allowed to run or go at large, contrary to the provisions of this and the said Act, it shall and may be lawful for any one of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace to cause such Dog to be destroyed; and it shall be lawful for any person whomsoever to take and seize all Swine or Goats going at large, contrary to the provisions of this and the said Act; and upon proof thereof, upon the Oath of one credible Witness, before any one of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, such Swine or Goats respectively shall be forfeited and sold, unless the Owner or Owners thereof shall, within Forty-eight Hours after such seizure, redeem the same by payment of such Fine, not exceeding Five Shillings, as such Justice shall impose, together with all costs and expenses: Provided that where any Swine or Goat not having been redeemed as aforesaid, shall, in consequence thereof, be sold, one-half the proceeds thereof shall be paid to the party seizing such Swine or Goat, and the other half to the Treasurer for the uses of the Colony.

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## CAP. X.

*An ACT to repeal in part an Act passed in the Sixth Year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, entitled "An Act for the Encouragement of Education in this Colony."*

[Passed 25th April, 1846.]

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the Sixth Year of the Reign of her present Majesty, entitled "An Act for the encouragement of Education in this Colony," it was, among other matters therein contained, enacted, "that after the Schools established under the provisions of the said Act should have been in operation twelve months, it should be lawful for the Governor, or Administrator of the Government for the time being, to appoint, from time to time, a fit and proper person to be an Inspector of Schools established or supported by the said Act." And Whereas it is expedient that all such parts of the said Act as relate to the appointment of such Inspector as aforesaid should be repealed :

*An ACT for granting to Her Majesty a sum of Money for defraying the expenses of the Civil Government of the Colony for the year ending the Thirtieth day of June, in the year of Our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-seven, and for other purposes.*

[Passed 28th April, 1846.]

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY :—

**WE**, Your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Commons of Newfoundland, having freely and voluntarily resolved to give and grant unto Your Majesty a supply to defray certain charges for the support of the Civil Government, for the administration of Justice, and for the general improvement of the Colony, do humbly beseech your Majesty that it may be enacted, and—

Ferries.	The sum of Thirty Pounds, to be at the disposal of His Excellency the Governor, towards establishing Ferry Boats at John's Pond, North Harbor, and Salmonier.
Packet Boat.	The sum of One Hundred Pounds towards the establishment and support of a Packet communication between Bonavista, Trinity, and the South side of Trinity Bay. The said sum to be paid to such person or persons as shall put into and continue in operation for the period of one year after the passing of this Act, a good and sufficient Boat, for the conveyance of Passengers and Letters, subject to the approval of and also subject to such regulations as may be made by the Governor and Council.
Ditto.	The sum of One Hundred Pounds towards the establishment and support of a Packet communication between Burin and Great Placentia, to touch at Isle of Valen and



Oderin. The said sum to be paid to such person or persons as shall put into and continue in-operation for the period of one year after the passing of this Act, a good and sufficient Boat for the conveyance of Passengers and Letters, subject to the approval of and also subject to such regulations as may be made by the Governor and Council.

II.—*And be it further enacted*, That the said several Sums of Money shall be paid <sup>Monies—how</sup> by the Colonial Treasurer in discharge of such Warrants as may from time to time be paid. issued by the Governor for such purpose ; and that it shall not be lawful for the Treasurer to pay any Monies out of the Colonial Treasury other than such as are granted in this or some other Act of the Legislature.
