CAPE OF GOOD HOPE. Discoveries in South Africa-Progress of British Civilization.

The news from the interior show that there is considerable turbulence prevailing among the different native sovereigns or tribes, and this fact was causing injury to the settlement in various ways. One of the frontier papers states that about two hundred lives were lost last year by the collision of different savage tribes, and that similar results will follow in successive years if the impetuosity of the barbarous people be not stopped. This, we suppose, is intended as a hint for the annexation to British sway of the disturbed districts.

The Cape Town Mail gives an amusing account of the proceedings at a session of the "Boer's Raad," or Assembly. One of the members proceeded to argue against resistance to the English and Queen Victoria as impossible. He was interrupted by cries from the other members of— "He's mad, turn him out," and the unfortunate member was forthwith turned out

M., Cape Haterass light bearing North West, the hull of a steamer, apparently blown up All her top works were gone, and frag ments of the wreck, including a mahogany steering Wheel, Chairs, Tables and various other articles, which indicated that the ship was elegantly furnished. Capt. Rhodes says that the wreck was drifting in every direction about his vessel and he thinks the disaster could have occurred but a shtor time previous, as the fragments had the appearance of being in the water but a short time. He distinguished among other articles a board painted white with a Timepiece on it, surrounded by a line of gilded stars. He could see no one on board. The hull was sunk to the water's edge, and was going down very fast. We are unable to conjecture what vessel this may be, unless the steamer America, as before reported.

COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

The ninth Annual Meeting of this asso ciation was held in the British Hotel Tuesday last, Col Saunders the President, in the Chair, and was numerously attended. The Chairman stated that both the Parent and Branch Societies were in a flourishing condition. A saving of £11 had been effected last year in consequence of the Government grant having been paid in cash, instead of debentures as formerly, and a balance of £7 8s 6d remained in the hands of the Treasurer on the year's transactions.

He stated that the annual account of receipts and disbursements, having been directed to be published in the form of hand bills, would be in circulation in a few days. TEACHERS' CERTIFICATES.

To the Editor of the Guelph Herald. GUELPH, Feb. 4, 1851.

Sin :- As I find many Teachers and Trusteen are ignorant, from inattention, of the consequences which will fellow the neglect to apply for certificates to the Board of Public Instruction, I beg to call their attention, through your columns, to the 15th section of the School Act; which, as it is possible that many of them may not have it at hand, I will quote :

"And he it enacted, That no Teacher shall be deemed a qualified Teacher within the meaning of this Act, who shall not, at the time of his engaging with the Trustees, and applying for payment from the school fund, hold a certificate of qualification provided by this Act."

I trust that those Teachers who have to the resent, presumed on a license to loosely construe the School Act, will by availing themselves of the opportunity afforded by the coming meeting of the Board, on the first Wednesday in March, (see advertisement,) place themselves in an unequivocal legal position; and that Trustees will be careful how they involve themselves by assuming responsibilities to parties on whose behalf, however able Teachers they may be, they cannot claim a penny of the School fund.

Local Superintendents cannot reasonably be expected to assume responsibilities in direct violaion of the Law, in the distribution of the School fund in favor of parties who have by their own neglect created the difficulty, and who have far ore interest than the Superintendent can have in the consequences resulting from their compliance or non-compliance with its unquestionable

His dog, with hair erect, and exhibiting extreme fear, refused to enter, when Mr P., tying a rope around the dog's neck, entered himself dragging his dog after him. The panther was almost hid in the dense top, but catching a glimpse of him, he fired in quick succession two balls into his body. The panther had now placed himself with eye fixed on Mr P., in the attitude of springing, when Mr P. having quickly reloaded both barrels of his gnn, fired one into the back of his neck, and the other through his body; the fourth shot brought him to the ground The dog having now regained his courage, rushed in upon him, but one bite of the dying panther sent him back howling with pain, when springing to his feet the ferocious animal ran some 20 rods and fell dead,. Mr P., to make sure, put two additional balls into him and then ventured to approach him. Mr. P. intends to bring him down in a few days, and give our citizens a chance to see this rarely found animal, whose strength, agility, ferocity and tenacity of life, render him monarch of the forest, and the dreaded foe of the most intrepid hunter .- Potsdam (N.
