We wish everyone of our readers a Merry Christmas and trust the season may bring something of gladness to dispel the sadness of the terrible war. May the Prince of Peace again be enthroned and the terrors and ravages of war be speedily brought to an end, and our brave soldier lads be brought safely home again.

Another week and the end of 1916 will bring an end to our offer of One Dollar a year for subscription price to Advertiser. A great many are yet unpaid and if those desire to save fifty cents a year the subscription must be paid to us before Dec. 31st. All accounts unpaid Dec. 31st will be collected at the rate of \$1.50 per year in Canada and \$2.00 per year in the United States. We have given everyone fair warning. NOTES FROM THE SANITORIUM

A number of men are now at work at the Sanatorium, and digging sewers, excavating for the new buildings which are shortly to be erected. The work is being done by Mr. C. H. Wright of Wolfville, includes excavations and the construction of the concrete walls.

Extensive alterations are being made to the main building of a large addition to the dining room. As a result of the work being performed the patients, with a few exceptions, will all go home for Christmas and remain away for two or three weeks.

Tenders for the new buildings closed on the 12th inst., and the successful tenderer will be announced in a few days.

When the work is completed there will be accommodation for one hundred and forty-six patients, the present limit being forty-six.

There is now at the sanatorium five military patients, four of whom are Nova Scotians and one an Imperial man.

FEW TROOPS TO BE KEPT IN CANADA

The number of troops for overseas duty to be kept in Canada this winter will be comparatively small. The number will not exceed fifty thousand according to military authorities at Ottawa.

This is the minimum number which it has always been stated would be kept on this side of the Atlantic, at least until the final stage of the war has been reached. It is expected that there will be a practically continuous movement of drafts towards the front throughout the winter months, and recruiting, it is believed, will steadily improve. Germany's peace offers do not arouse any great expectation that the end of the war is near. Germany's offer is a diplomatic move, and nothing more.

STATEMENT OF SIR THOMAS WHITE

Toronto, Dec. 18—Sir Thomas White, minister of finance, who is in the city for the Massey Hall meeting this evening handed the following statement to the press today:



"The charges made in this morning's Liberal press that I have been engaged in a conspiracy against the honored leadership of Sir Robert Borden, from whom I hold my portfolio and to whom I am bound by ties of the closest personal friendship, are odious beyond contempt and unworthy even of contradiction. Speaking for myself and myself only, I do not regard a coalition government as either necessary or practicable at this time and I appreciate more than I can say the unwarranted use of my name in this connection. The Prime Minister of Canada has my admiration, confidence and full support in the arduous and trying duties to which he is so earnestly and patriotically and unreservedly devoting his strength and abilities.

GASOLINE AT SIX CENTS PER GALLON

Manufacture of radium worth more than \$1,000,000, a saving of more than \$20,000,000 worth of natural gas in the Blackwell field of Oklahoma, manufacture of gasoline at a cost of six cents a gallon, development of an electrical furnace which promises to wipe out losses of \$10,000,000 a year in the melting of brass; and the saving of many lives through the promotion of scientific mining methods, are among the achievements of the United States Federal Bureau of Mines outlined in the annual report of the director, Van H. Manning.

The International Film Company's moving pictures have been barred from Canada. These pictures are controlled by the Hearst interest, and the banning of them from Canada is an outcome of the recent action of the Government in prohibiting the entrance of all Hearst publications into Canada.



An inventory of the man power of Canada is to be taken the first week in January. From the statistics it is hoped to be able to estimate the number of eligible men in each district, so that to estimate the number of eligibles can be particularly directed to them. If the required men do not come, undoubtedly conscription will be next in order. A similar census will show what men are available for work in munition plants.

Opposed to Government Liquor Stores

Six out of seven cities in Saskatchewan from which returns had been received this morning gave a majority of twelve thousand against the continuance of the government liquor stores which quit business Dec. 31st next.

MAKE PLANS TO SALVAGE LUSITANIA

London—Secret plans are being made both in England and the United States to recover the treasure which went down in the Lusitania. It is believed that the money, jewellery and other valuable are worth at least £1,000,000 and apparently all this vast treasure is free to anyone who can raise it. Even the possibility of saving the Lusitania herself is being considered, but no definite plans for the bold enterprise can be made until divers have examined her condition, probably next spring. Even as scrap her value would be very large. The position of the ship, 8 miles off the Old Head of Kinsale, has been charted with great exactitude, and she lies 270 feet down.

The United States submarine F-4, which sank outside Honolulu Harbor on March 25, 1915, was refloated and towed into harbor on August 29 the same year. She lay on the slope of the ocean bed, her bow 288 feet, below the surface and her stern 306 feet. Yet the divers worked in fair comfort at these depths, and thereby established a world's record.

GREAT GAINS FOR FRENCH

Four Divisions Win Victory Over 5 Divisions of Germans
Pepper Hill, Verdun Front, Friday, December 15—A short, sharp battle brought to the French today their third smashing victory within a period of two months in the vicinity of Verdun. Every objective point of the French commanders was obtained with chronometric accuracy.

Although the Germans offered a desperate defence the were like soft clay in the hands of the French troops, who squeezed them into any shape they liked, and only ceased to handle them when their own time came. Thousands of German prisoners poured into the French lines during the day including 200 officers, and large groups are still arriving. The total count already is 7,500 (the latest French official statement says the number of prisoners exceeds 9,000.) One division alone captured over 12,000 Germans within an hour. More than eighty large and small German cannon were captured or destroyed, and many others are known to be buried.

The villages of Vacherauville, Louvebont and Bezonvaux and Hardaumont wood are now in French hands.

The front over which the offensive was executed was ten kilometres long. When the fighting ceased, owing to the darkness, the French advance had exceeded an average of 3 kilometres along the whole front, at various points rushing further out and threatening the German batteries whose retreat was hindered by the bad condition of the ground.

GREAT ZEPPELIN DESTROYED

The Zeppelin lately brought down near London proved to be one of the largest and latest in the German service. It carried six suspended cars, or gondolas, each carrying an engine of two hundred and forty horse-power. There were five propellers, and it is estimated that the ship carried two thousand gallons of petrol in her various tanks. There are no less than sixty bomb droppers, showing the deadly character of her offensive armament. The total length of the gigantic craft was six hundred and eighty feet, and her estimated weight, including the crew of twenty-two officers and men, was fifty tons. She carried seven guns, of which five were Maxims. It is evident that these machines are rapidly becoming more formidable, but yet their progress in this regard does not seem to be as rapid as the means of meeting their attacks, for the destruction caused by them is much less than formerly, while more of the craft are being brought to the ground at each attack.

The pinch is felt as much in Canada as the United States. Famine conditions have been established gradually for a number of years, and now they are suddenly developed to the embarrassment of the newspaper publishers who, according to American papers, find the increased cost of paper more than three times their former profit.
