CANADA AS A COUNTRY TO LIVE IN.

ALTHOUGH in some sections of Canada business in the winter season is dull yet this country as a whole is unquestionably one of the best countries in the world for the man who has to depend upon his daily toil for his daily bread. Nowhere else are wages more generous in proportion to the cost of living. One of the various reasons why this should be so has been but little considered. In Germany more than 5,000,000 females and mechanics are employed; in England there are over 4,000,000; in Austria and Italy there are 3,000,000, and in France more than 2,000,000. More than half of these are engaged in branches of labor for which they are unfitted, such as blacksmiths, machinists, boot-makers, wood-carvers, and farm hands.

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FAIRMATTERS.

FOWLS WITH SCABBY LEGS.—The thick scabs, or scallies, on fowls' legs, are caused by a small mite which burrows under the skin. To get rid of these small pests—the legs may be washed in warm water, and then well greased with a mixture of lard and kerosene oil, rubbing the grease well into the scales with a stiff brush. If the roots are kept greased in this way the fowls will be free from all kinds of vermin.

FARROW COWS PATERNITY.—It is very difficult to feed a farrow cow so that she will give a large mass of milk without fattening her. Cows fed by milkmen grow too fat for milking after a few months, and have to be turned out to the butchers, usually at a heavy discount on their price, when in full bloom of milk. Allowing the cow to breed avoids this difficulty, and though she may go dry a few weeks, this is more than offset by the larger amount of milk the cow will give when she has dropped her calf.

COOKS.—If the season is reasonably good next spring an immense breadth will be planted in corn. It costs less for seed than any other crop, and this in large sections of the country is sufficient to decide whether corn shall be planted rather than potatoes, oats, beans or peas, all of which cost much more for seed. Corn is also the crop that requires less expensive machinery in cultivating and harvesting, as most of the work can be done by hand, or with a horse and the simplest tools.

THE USE OF TOMATOES.—It is comparatively recently that the tomato has been used for food. Men little past middle age remember when they were only a garden ornament called "love apple," and not a thing to be eaten. People generally had a heavy acquire a taste for them. Now a large proportion of young people are born with this taste inherited, and in amounts are put up by canning factories every year, and last season the demand for tomatoes as an available substitute for other sauce.

DEGENERACY OF POULTRY.—The introduction of new breeds of fowls is only a temporary benefit, unless care is taken to breed with purity, or to cross only with design for a specific purpose, and then killing all these crosses as soon as their purpose is accomplished. A great majority of complaints that hens do not lay or produce those who years ago used crosses and have continued to breed from them. Their progeny are poor layers, subject to diseases and generally worthless. Returning to pure blooded fowls is the only resource of those whose flocks have got in this condition.

WARMING WATER FOR COWS.—Whether it would pay to warm water or other stock may be questionable, but it certainly pays to warm it for fowls. They are encouraged to drink more. Their food, being thoroughly moistened, digests better, and their stomachs are not chilled so as to arrest digestion, as they are sure to be if cold water is given. It is possible that warming the water may encourage the cow to give so much milk as to reduce her own flesh. But that is an evil that no daring man would really understand his business need fear. It is the cow's business to give all she is capable of giving, and if he can supply her with whatever is needed to keep her in good condition and supply all the material for the milk she produces.

WHY WHEAT-FLY STOCK EAT STRAW.—Surprising as it may seem, the fact that the feeding of the highly concentrated and nutritious foods results with cows, horses and sheep in a great deal more gain or less being eaten. Animals are wiser in this respect than men and women, who will continue to eat concentrated foods without desire for strong until they are literally starved. When food is given to stock instead of being divided it and made it more digestible, by adding a large amount of straw. This straw is not so nutritious as to keep an animal in good condition becomes the necessary adjunct to the highest feeding.

AN ATROCIOSITY.—California papers describe the horrible treatment which Captain J. M. Greenwood, formerly of Cherokee county, N. B., and his wife received at the hands of two ruffians, Mr. Greenwood, who was alone at the time, was chopping wood in the yard of his home near Napa, Cal. When two strangers approached him and asked for work. After some conversation they draw revolvers and marched him into the house, where they tied his hands and feet and compelled him at the point of their weapons to drink a liquid which proved to be a drug to take his senses. They then began to ransack the house, and while they were doing this Mrs. Greenwood returned home. She found her husband bound and gagged. The fellows forced her to swallow a dose of the drug. They ransacked the house in their search for gold, but they found only \$2. They then took the horse which Mrs. Greenwood had left standing in front of the house and drove away. Mr. Greenwood succeeded in getting his feet free, and crawled to where his wife lay, but he was unable to rouse her, and sank down beside the bed nearly unconscious. After some hours the men returned. They bound him securely again, and placing a pistol close to his left cheek, fired twice. The heads evidently thought he was dead and left him. They then shot and killed Mrs. Greenwood, and left the house. Mr. Greenwood again got his feet loose, and at daylight struggled to the road, some 200 yards from the house, and there lay for some time before he found assistance. His suffering was terrible. It is thought that with good care he will recover.

A countryman waiting for a train saw Officer Stevens' chair occupied and he immediately piled his weary bones on the soft cushion. He sat there a few minutes, musing over the benevolence of the R. "Don't know," replied the man with out lifting his head or moving from the chair. The lady looked surprised, and said nothing. Just then a man came up and asked him how long he would have to wait for the C. P. R. train. "Don't know," again replied the occupant of the chair. The man swore a little under his breath, and remarked to Officer Collins, who was standing by all the time an interested spectator, that it was a "damned queer thing" that the government employed men who "didn't know."—St. John Globe.
