Fruit Co. Holds Banquet

The strawberry banquet given by the Wolfville Fruit Co. at their warehouse, on Saturday evening was a most enjoyable event. There were ninety guests present including General Manager A. E. McMahon, Professor Blair, of Kentville, Rev. Dr. Bennett, of Gaspereau, and the managers of the Port Williams, New Minas, Grand Pre and Hortonville companies. C. S. Fitch, president of the Wolfville Fruit Co., presided. Mr. MacMahon gave an interesting address, surveying the history and growth of the company from the numerous other fruit companies which originally separated the interests of the fruit-growers until the amalgamation of all. George Starr, president of the Port Williams Fruit Company; Ernest Johnson, of the New Minas Company, and the Rev. Dr. Bennett, also spoke. Professor Blair gave an interesting talk on the value of social gatherings as a feature of the co-operative movement. F. C. Dennison, president of the Hortonville Company, and J. W. Duncanson briefly addressed the gathering. The proceedings concluded with the singing of the National Anthem.

Death of Noted Journalist

Hon. William Dennis, member of the Canadian Senate and publisher of the Halifax Herald and Evening Mail, died at the Massachusetts General Hospital, Boston, on Sunday afternoon. After prorogation of parliament at Ottawa, Senator Dennis proceeded to Boston, where on the advice of specialists he underwent an operation which on Saturday was reported successful. However on Sunday morning complications developed which resulted in his death.

By the death of Senator Dennis there has been removed from journalistic and political life of Eastern Canada a remarkable and with all strenuous and enterprising character. Although born in Cornwall, England, he can be said to be a self-made product of Nova Scotia, as he came to this country when yet a boy of seventeen years of age. His career closed in his sixty-fifth year, the owner of two daily newspapers, a member of the National Senate, and a figure widely known throughout the Dominion.

Two years after his arrival in Nova Scotia he joined the editorial staff of the Halifax Herald, when the paper was first published. By his capacity for hard work and his ability he soon became news editor and one of the most alert newspaper men in Eastern Canada. Mr. Dennis rose step by step until having acquired control of the Herald, he then became its owner. He was a man of extraordinary vigor of purpose and determination. Suffering from physical infirmities for many years did not seem to weaken his power for work, or his optimism. His application to his wide and varied interests was maintained to within the time he left the Canadian Capital for his last journey to Boston.

Farewell to Popular Pastor

On the evening of July 1st the members of the Quarterly Board of the Grand Pre Methodist church met at the parsonage and presented the Rev. W. M. Ryan, M. A., with an address and envelope containing one hundred and forty dollars. The address was read by Mr. F. G. Curry, the senior member of the Board, a gentleman over eighty years of age, who still takes an active interest in all matters concerning the welfare of the community. Expression was given to the very high esteem in which Mr. Ryan and his family are held in the congregation, and the general regret that they are leaving in a few days for Sackville, N. B. An invitation was extended to Mr. Ryan to remain for a fourth year, but it has never been his custom to remain beyond the three years originally set as the term of a pastorate; and although disappointed his people in this church recognized that he was following what he believed to be Divine guidance in going elsewhere. Grand Pre's loss is Sackville's gain, as Mr. Ryan is a preacher and a pastor of much more than average merit, and any congregation is highly favored to be under his charge.

The Ladies Aid Society, which Mrs. Ryan re-organized last August, met at the home of Mrs. A. McN. Patterson at its last session, and after the usual sewing was laid aside, Mrs. G. P. Fuller, the secretary, read an address, expressive of the affectionate regard that is felt throughout the community for Mrs. Ryan, thanking her for all she had done in spite of physical indisposition much of the time, for the church interests she had indeed been an ideal pastor's help-meet. A purse was presented on behalf of the ladies by Mrs. W. A. Woodman, containing fifty dollars, which Mrs. Ryan was asked to accept as a slight token of esteem and gratitude for all she had been and done.

To both these addresses Mr. and Mrs. Ryan replied in very appreciative terms. They felt that their people had been too good to them, but their people recognizing their worth, felt otherwise. Mr. Ryan's pastorate has been very successful in every way. Unfortunately he has failed, as all his predecessors have, in getting many out to church who are never seen there, but this has been no fault of himself or his preaching. To the large number who do attend his sermons have been inspiring and helpful. The past year has been most successful financially, four thousand dollars having been contributed for church purposes.

Mr. Ryan and family are followed by the good wishes of the community to their new home. His successor, the Rev. G. F. Whitman, arrives this week and will be cordially welcomed.

Hospitals and Asylums Show Remarkable Improvement

Prohibition has had a very remarkable effect on local hospitals and asylums, as well as on prisons, says the Toronto Star Weekly.

Fewer cases of pneumonia from drunken exposure, fewer delirium tremens, fewer "emergency ward" cases from drunken brawls and accidents, less hospital "poor relief", are the notable effects of prohibition in Toronto hospitals.

And the hospital for the insane, 999 Queen west, which has been acting as the city's reception hospital for the past year, reports only one case of "D.T's."

The broken arms, cracked skulls, gashed heads etc., that used to provide most of the entertainment in the "emergency wards" of our hospitals in the bad old days of the bar, especially on Saturday nights, are fast disappearing.

But there are still a few "alcoholic" accidents.

"We run about five a week," said the accident ward doctor of the Toronto General Hospital. "Such samples as a drunk falling into the fire, a drunk smashing his head in a door, a drunk cutting his head on the sidewalk."

The effect of prohibition on the white plague, tuberculosis, is not yet apparent, but as is well known, all doctors predict that it will have a great effect in reducing the dread disease.

The foundation of this belief was put in lay language for us by a doctor.

"Doctors believe," said he, "that more than 80 per cent. of the race have the germ of tuberculosis in some degree in their lungs. This belief is arrived at by the examination of bodies and the discovery of the scars of tuberculosis germs, large or small, on the lung tissues."

Now, it is believed that the period of infection is during childhood, between the age of five and nine. But good health does not permit the disease to flourish.

Then if a young man or woman injures health by an excess, the disease, which has a small hold, begins to flourish. Many young men, by alcoholic excess, have given tuberculosis just that opportunity it needed.

The effect of prohibition on t.b. will not likely be noticeable for a few years.

The physicians of the Hospital for the Insane, Queen Street, say that the effects of prohibition on insanity will not be apparent for a few years either. The mental disease created by alcoholism is "alcoholic paranoia", which takes years to develop. But the agency of liquor in all degrees of insanity has been considerable, not only in the drinking generation but through heredity.

Change in Canning Business

G. W. Parker has sold his harness business at Canning to D. N. Slack & Son, who have taken charge and will continue along the same line and at the same store.

Mr. Parker started the business in 1884 and it is the oldest business in Canning and one of the largest of the kind in the Province, and we wish all success to his successor.

The business will be under the management of Capt. L. W. Slack, who has had several years experience in the Harness and Carriage Business. Mr. Slack spent four years in the army during the war and was 30 months in France. He was severely wounded twice and was awarded the Military Cross. Since returning from overseas he has resided in Windsor where he was president of the G. W. V. A. and the Rifle Association.

The Democratic Candidate

James M. Cox, governor of Ohio, was nominated as candidate for the presidency of the United States in the Democratic National convention at San Francisco, on Tuesday, July 6, after forty-four ballots had been taken.

James Middleton Cox was three times governor of Ohio—an honor enjoyed by only one other Ohioan, Rutherford B. Hayes.

Born on a farm, educated in the public schools, a printer's devil, a school teacher, a newspaper reporter, a private secretary to a congressman, owner, manager and proprietor of two newspapers, member of Congress for three years and three times governor of his state is his record to date.

Governor Cox's career has been much like that of Senator Harding, the Republican candidate for the U. S. Presidency. Senator Harding is also a native of Ohio. Like Cox he began his career in the mechanical department of a newspaper and, like Cox, he still owns a newspaper. The Presidential campaign promises to create great excitement in Ohio.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, of New York, Assistant Secretary of the Navy, was nominated for Vice President by the Democratic Convention. He is a cousin of the late Theodore Roosevelt.

An Interesting Wedding

A wedding of interest to many in the province was solemnized at the home of the bride, "Glenkeen," Truro, at three o'clock Wednesday afternoon, June 30, when Miss Mary Upham Jamieson, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Jamieson, became the bride of Enos Drew Ford, of Musquodoboit, formerly of Milton, Queens county, manager of some of the W. K. McKeen Lumber interests in Nova Scotia. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Bruce D. Knott, pastor of Immanuel Baptist church.

Promptly at the appointed hour the bride, looking very charming and attractive, entered the drawing room on the arm of her brother-in-law, R. W. Ford, principal of Wolfville schools. She wore a beautiful wedding gown of white charmeuse with overdress of white silk net, trimmed with old point lace embroidered in pearls. Her veil was of finest net caught with orange blossoms into cape effect and falling to the edge of her gown. She carried a shower bouquet of bridal roses.



MOTORS AND MOTORING: A Page Full of Interest to the Owner or Prospective Owner of an Automobile.

Keep Car in Shape

LIST SHOULD HANG IN HOME GARAGE OF EVERY CAR OWNER

One of the big rubber companies attaches to every shipment of brake lining a card containing some suggestions which are worthy of general circulation:

1. Storage battery inspected every two weeks
2. Grease cups up every 1,000 miles.
3. Springs oiled every week.
4. Oil and gasoline connections inspected every week.
5. Crankcase drained and washed out with kerosene every 500 miles.
6. Universal joints packed with grease every 1,000 miles.
7. Differential and transmission packed with grease or oil every 1,000 miles.
8. Spark plugs cleaned every 1,000 miles.
9. Carbon removed from cylinders twice a year.
10. Valves ground each 5,000 miles.
11. New piston rings every 18 months.
12. See that wheels are in line once a month.
13. See that the water is circulating every time the car is started.
14. Bearings on wheels inspected once a month.
15. Gasoline pipe and carburetor thoroughly cleaned every month.
16. Self-starter inspected every month.
17. Steering wheel and steering knuckles inspected once a month.
18. Test brakes and equalize once a month.

Removing front wheel hub washer—To remove the split steel washer that snaps into a groove in the hub of a front wheel and holds the thick felt washer in place over the inside bearing, the most effective method is to make the simple tool. Obtain a pair of round-jawed pliers about five or six inches long. File a notch on the inside of each jaw near the end and then reduce the diameter of the jaws until they will just slip into the holes in the split washer. Having done this, it is a simple matter to remove the washer. Hook the ends of the pliers into the holes, close the pliers to contract the washer to draw it out of the groove, and then by running a screwdriver around under the edge of it, it is easily slipped out. I have used one of these tools for several years and find it most effective.

Crazy Driving

Charged with driving an automobile at a speed of 45 miles per hour, a Vancouver Chinaman created some merriment in court by his defense.

The officer who effected the arrest informed the court that the accused looked back several times, and seeing he was followed, put on more speed.

"Why did you speed up like that?" queried the court.

"Well, judge, I look back, see man, he come fast, toot horn. I think he hit me with his car, so I hurry. I look again, he toot some more and come faster. I think he crazy, and I hurry some more yet. Then he hurry some more and toot-toot his horn, and I think sure he crazy so I go like h—ll. Then he stop me."

Tips to Motorists

Brakes should always be carefully applied, especially if the road surfaces are wet.

Throwing the ignition switch to "off" place does not insure your car from theft. Take the keys with you.

A magneto not only repays the small additional first cost, but in gasoline costs saved, it pays continual dividends.

One should never attempt to drive cars at high speed unless the tire casings are in perfect condition and the road surface good.

Always drive your car slowly and cautiously until you are thoroughly familiar with its control mechanism and the methods of stopping it.

You can cut down repair bills by occasionally examining the mechanical units in your car. It takes little mechanical knowledge to tighten a bolt here and there.

A good short cut to low operating expenses is careful driving, watching faithfully the performance of the engine, and giving it immediate attention if anything does go wrong.

When two of the wires of the lighting or starting systems are producing a short circuit, an inevitable accompaniment of the condition is heat. By feeling carefully along the line the operator can usually detect the presence of a short by the heat that is being generated.

Gasoline lines sometimes leak because of chaffing against the edge of frame channels or other parts. An easy way to remedy this is by wrapping soft wire tightly about the tubing, winding it for a small distance each side of the leak and then going over the wire with solder.

If driving on clay or muddy roads, or on wet asphalt, care must be taken in turning corners, and the car should always be driven cautiously to avoid dangerous side slipping or skidding. When driving on unfavorable highway surfaces always keep one side of the car on firm ground if possible.

Air leaks are a common cause of misfiring, though they are often overlooked. A worn valve guide allows enough air to be sucked into the cylinders to cause misfiring, and it also permits oil to leak out. If oil is discovered leaking out it is fair to assume that excess air is being injected into the fuel charges.

When the starting motor lacks power to turn over the crankshaft it may be strengthened by coupling on another storage battery, connecting it in multiple so as not to increase the voltage. If the conducting wires are of sufficient size from the battery to the motor, there will be a considerable gain in power output.

Air Valve Leaks

When a tire gradually softens it is reasonable to suspect an air valve leak. In this case, turn the wheel so that the stem points downward, remove the cover but allow the cap to remain on. Hold a tumbler of water against the rim so that the valve stem is immersed in water. If there is a slow leak at the valve, bubbles will show. Next remove the cap and try the same experiment.

A new invention for motorist is an attachment to the gasoline tank which whistles when the supply is getting low.

Auto Vendors Guarantee Parts in Saskatchewan

Agitation was begun some time ago in Regina, Sask., by an owner of a one-time popular brand of car whose manufacturers had stopped production on it to build another type. This owner claimed he could not obtain spare parts anywhere in the province and that the company was not interested in giving service on old cars.

This led to a new law for automobile vendors in Saskatchewan. They are compelled to give the purchasers of cars guarantees that all the necessary parts except those which can be made by a carpenter or blacksmith will be kept at a specified place in the province for a period of ten years from the date of the sale of the car. They are obliged to file with the provincial secretary a list of repairs showing prices on February 1 of each year.

Tighten Engine Bolts

In some cars loosening of the engine bolts which hold the latter in place, may cause misalignment of the engine, with serious consequences. If there is even slight looseness of the bolts it may permit the engine support to hammer and pound and in time the supporting arm may actually break off.

Use Graphite on Rims

Rusted rims often cause the sticking of tubes, and such trouble can be averted by painting the rims with graphite mixed to a creamy paste with gasoline. The theory of this is that the gasoline evaporates, leaving the formation of any rust.

Many Batteries Used

Statistics just compiled indicate that there are 5,000,000 automobiles with starting and lighting systems now in use in the United States. The average life of each automobile storage battery is less than 23 months. This means that within the next two years there will be a demand for 5,000,000 replacement batteries besides the thousands added every day in new cars now being produced.

Loose Clips Cause Spring Breakage at Centre Bolt Holes

If any proof be required of the necessity of keeping spring clips tight at all times it may be found in the fact that neither dealers nor manufacturers will replace a spring that is broken through the centre bolt hole—the place where most springs give way, observes a contributor to American Motorist, who goes on to say:

"Breakage of this nature is taken as evidence that the spring clips were not kept tight. The spring clips are subject to bending in two directions, with the result that excessive strains are imposed at the weakest point, which in this case is at the bolt hole. The spring clips should be treated perfectly tight by drawing the nuts up as close as possible with a wrench of such size that there is no question of their being tight. It is well also to bear in mind that even a nut secured by a lock washer will ultimately work loose—hence the necessity for looking over your spring clips now and then.

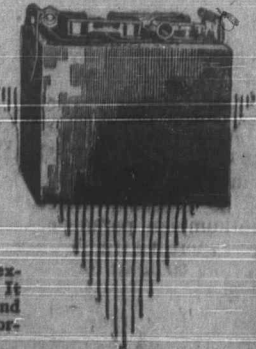

The temple was built in honor of Buddha and what do you think is the sacred relic it contains? A tooth, the last tooth of the great Buddha himself! Under the high altar is a silver casket; inside the silver casket is a gold casket; inside the gold a jade casket; inside the jade an amethyst casket; inside the amethyst a ruby; inside the ruby an emerald, carved out; and in the emerald, the tooth. A tooth in Kandy for five thousand years and not decayed yet!

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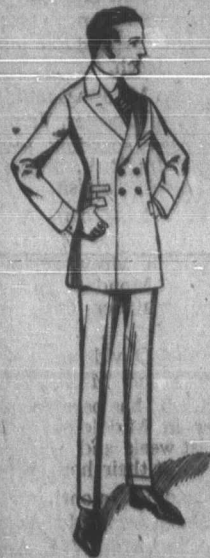
