



"You must know that your pudding and the icing of your wedding-cake are incomplete unless flavoured with bitter almonds. I am not sure how many bitter almonds it takes to kill a man, but they contain a good deal of the prussic acid that you object to.

"Oxalic seld, with which foolish people so often commit suicide, is the salt which gives rhubarb and sorrel their pelesant flavour. It is a violently irritant and dreadfully painful poison. "Need I tell you that caffein, the exhibarating principle of ceffee and tea, is a poison?

"In nearly all our condiments we eat roison. The oils of nutmen, cloves, black perper, cinnamon, propermint, carraway, horse radish, theme, etc., are all poisonous in large doses.




