

When the order of the day was called in the House of Commons on Monday the 17th, Sir Charles Topper called attention to London despatches which stated that the imperial government was about to impose additional stamp duties on colonial securities. Sir Charles pointed out that when he was high con missioner the government of that time proposed to class colonial with foreign securities for high stamp duties. He, with representatives of other colonies, waited upon the chancedor of the exthequer and induced the government to bandon the measure.






