Holmesville, May 30th, 1885. Council met today as court of revision. Members all present, these having qualified the appeals were proceeded with. It had never been contemplated that the commissioners of the Dominion Government would pursue a course which would nullify the loudly expressed wishes of the people. While the law provided that one license should be issued to every 4,000 inhabitants, in the village of Dunnannon, with only 200 population, two licenses had been issued, and both were obtained by tavern-keepers. In Goderich, Clinton and Exeter, the same course of issuing licenses to tavern-keepers had been followed. He thought the Government should at once take steps to put an end to this system of things, and inform their officials that they must conform to the spirit and intention of the law.

Sir Richard Cartwright corroborated the statements of Mr. Cameron, stating that he had received great deal of correspondence on the subject, complaining of the action of the Dominion officials. He thought the Government should lose no time in inquiring into the circumstances. Sir John Macdonald said that reports that such was the case had reached him.
