Rt. Hon. W. E. Gladstone:—"These ersons who possess large portions of the earth's space are not altogether in the same position as possessors of mere personality. Personality does not impose limitations on the action and industry of man and the wellbeing of the community as possession of land does, and therefore I freely own that compulsory expropriation is a thing which is admissable and even sound in principle."

The principle which these eminent men teach is that the privileges and claims, even the rights of the few, must give way to the needs of the many and the welfare of the whole.
