### St. John's Municipal Council. PUBLIC NOTICE.

WHEREAS it has been made appear hat the rule adopted by the Council on May 26th, and published in the "Royal Gazette" governing the driving of cattle through the streets of the City, will bear harshly upon certain citizens and especially those engaged in procuring the meat supply of the City, thereby causing unnecessary loss, expense and inconvenience to them in their trade and business and a less stringent measure will fully protect the rights and ensure the safety and convenience of all citizens in this respect.

RESOLVED,-That the said rule be amended and read as follows, to take effect and become law from and after the 15th inst.:

(1) Horned cattle, sheep or swine shall not be driven through Water Street at any time or under any circumstances except for the purpose of crossing said street, when going to or coming from a waterside premises, then the shortest possible distance

(2) Horned cattle shall not be driven through the other streets of St. John's in numbers or herds of more than 10, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 7 p.m., from the first day of April until the first day of October in any year, and from the first day of October until the first day of April, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. During those hours herds of 6 to 10 must be in charge of four competent drovers. Herds of 2 to 5 in charge of three competent drovers. Single heads in charge of owner or one competent







OF CANADA BY GERMANY.

Cambridge, Mass., Nov. 26.-Writmg in the Harvard Crimson, Prof. Barrett Wendell, of Harvard's Department of English, declares that if ermany succeeded in crippling the British Navy, an attempt would probably be made to invade Canada by way of New York or Boston. The Professor's article says:

"Should the naval power of Grea Britain collapse, a most unlikely event, the British Empire would verywhere be exposed to German attack. Among the parts of the Empire thus exposed would be Canada. Indeed, if I am not in error, the news papers have lately attributed to the German Ambassador at Washington ertain conjectures as to how the Ionroe Doctrine should be interpre ted if an attack on Canada should oc-

"Canada is evidently assailable not only through her own ports, but through ours. The accident of Amrican neutrality need no more interfere with German plans than the accident of Belgium did. That a Ger nan military exposition against Canada by way of Boston or New York might probably be disastrous is no ason why it should not be attemptd. That America would permit it is inthinkable. Such indemnities a night consequently be demanded from Boston and New York would be nightly desirable in the present state of German national expenses."


