True, it would mean the finality of Russia and the strengthening of Ger-man communications with the easi-but if it were effectively countered at the same time by an advance in force ail along the Macedonian front by the Allies, it would be robbed of much of its effect or even possibly turned to the enemy's disadvantage. The bottle-neck would still be there and still be narrowed, and the narrowing from that direction would mean the imperi-ling of the Constantinople communica-tions, worth several Roumanias. Or to use the other figure that is so pop-ular, the millistones would still grind, with most of the work done by the lower instead of the upper one. How far this may be correct, and how far either optimistic or pessimistic antici-pation are justified, will be apparent at once in the events of the very near future.







Corporal Hennebury Writes

Corporal Ewen S. Hennebury, of Ours," writing to his father, G. McF. ebury, of this staff, by last mail, ays in part:-

"I was wounded on the 12th of Ocober, getting hit in the big push. We went over the top at 2.05 p.m. and I was knocked out about 2.45 p.m. nanaged to get into a shell-hole and nained there until late that night when I was picked up by one of our boys and brought in. I had my left leg broken. I don't think that we suffered as much as on July 1st, but on the contrary gained what we went after and that was the German first line of trenches. The boys who got in the erman trench held it and did the work of another Regiment which was on our left. I think now that I will be in Hospital for some months, but I also think that they will save my leg and when I do get better I must try to get home for a few months before going to the front again. I only know of one of our boys missing in the July drive, that was taken prisoner, and he has been since reported to have died of wounds. I was speaking to Alex. (his ounger brother) the night before the charge and he was O.K. I'll never forget his words when I wished him good-bye. He said: 'Never mind, boy, if you've got to die, die with a good heart and go right to it.' It's hard when we are together and one doesn't know when the other falls, but never mind, we'll be all home some day, please God."

Corporal Hennebury concludes by asking to be remembered to all his friends and says he is as well as can be expected after coming through three campaigns.

The general public have but a faint dea of the vast volume of business that is being daily transacted at the G. P. O., at this period of the year. Hundreds of thousands of letters, papers and parcels are received and depatched, in a very satisfactory manner, considering the many difficulties under which the officials have to work. While the Post Office, like any other business, is liable to make mistakes, it has been proven that out of every ten complaints made re the nonelivery of letters, parcels, etc., eight are accounted for in the following nanner: insufficiently addressed, wrongly addressed, no address, short of postage, overweight, and various other reasons. An instance of the first-mentioned complaint was brought to our notice on Saturday afternoon when a package was received through the mail, intended for a Sapper with
