LONDON, To-day. "I am a broken-hearted man." This, according to Father Bernard Vaughan, who was a close friend of Redmond, was one of the last utterances which fell from the lips of the Irish Nationalist leader.

REDMOND'S DEATH A DISASTER.

LONDON, To-day. The death of John Redmond at the moment when the Convention which is to settle the future of Ireland is having its most momentous sessions. is considered in political circles to be almost a disaster. Thoughts Upon the Times. (By PATRIOT.)

In the passing of John Redmond the great Irish Statesman, the Imperial Parliament of Great Britain loses one of its most influential members and Ireland its greatest friend. He was Ireland's most faithful servant, and in this her darkest hour, will be sorely missed.

What a pity it is that we allow that good old word "servant" to be regarded with reproach. Originally it neant the subject of a King, or one who yielded obedience to another. The world is fast losing sight of the word "service" and is substituting for it its very opposite-"selfishness." But when the selfish man passes off the stage of life he is never missed, but the honest, upright servant always is.
