





Turks Present Ultimatum

Demand Possession of Thrace --- Near East Situation Extremely Critical --- Italy Joins France in Support of Kemalists --- British Navy Concentrating at Ismid.

SITUATION GRAVER.

LONDON, Oct. 7. Despatches received here tonight give an even graver aspect to the Near East situation than that earlier in the day. The Kemalists are insisting on the right to the immediate occupation of Eastern Thrace and have given the Allies a time limit expiring this evening for reply on the question. The Turks have refused to accept the proposal for Allied occupation of Thrace or any Allied control and are apparently supported by the French and Italian Governments. Everything now seems to depend on the British cabinet's reply to the report of General Harrington which was said to be anxiously awaited in Constantinople this evening. It was expected that General Harrington would ask the Turks for an extension of their time limit for the occupation of Thrace until tomorrow morning.

A TURK ULTIMATUM.

PARIS, Oct. 7. According to information from a British source the Ankara Government has notified the Allied Generals in Constantinople that unless it is given formal assurance that Thrace will be handed over to the Turks in a month after the evacuation of Greek troops Turkish troops will resume operations against the Greek forces.

THE TURKS' DEMANDS.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 6. Replies from the respective Allied Governments to the latest Kemalist note not having arrived, the Allied representatives to the Mudania Conference have requested the Ankara Representatives to postpone the re-assembling of the meeting until late this evening. The Kemalists have demanded that their troops be allowed to enter Eastern Thrace, that a Turkish administration be established and Allied control withdrawn, that is within one month. This was officially given to-day as the explanation of the return of the Allied Generals to Istanbul. Jamet Pasha, Turkish representative, definitely rejected this afternoon the Allied protocol for the occupation of Thrace by one thousand Allied troops. He also declined the establishment of Allied control

GIANTS WIN AGAIN.

NEW YORK, Oct. 6. The Giants plastered their ancient enemies the Yankees, with a coating of whitewash this afternoon, and won their second victory over the American League champions by a score of three to nothing. Deacon John Scott, resuscitated, after all Major League clubs had regarded his pitching arm as ruined, stood out on the hurling hill and made the Yankees look foolish with speed and accuracy. Hoyt pitched a loose game for the Yankees.

Our Dumb Animals.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF AGENT FOR WEEK ENDING Oct. 6TH.

Attended to the landing of 65 head of cattle, two horses and some sheep and pigs, from the Canadian Sapper. Also two carloads of cattle at the Reid Newfoundland Company, all properly cared for and in good condition. Called out Sunday afternoon to Mr. Berrigan's, Theatre Hill, about a dog which had been run over by a motor car; the animal was suffering keenly, and I put it to sleep. Another dog was reported from Duckworth Street with its leg broken. The lady would not have the dog destroyed, and she had the broken limb set. Also destroyed a dog for a lady on Barter's Hill, at the owners request. Attended two sales of cattle at Neale's wharf. Sent in three horses for treatment. Received reports of an expressman driving hard late on Saturday night; saw some of the men who claim they have to drive hard to get around with the parcels. It is a great pity that people don't try and make their purchases earlier and give the men a chance to do up their horses early. I have spoken of this several times for the sake of the dumb animals which are yoked up at nine o'clock in the morning and in some cases not taken out of harness until twelve or one o'clock Sunday morning, and now that the cold nights are upon us, I think all this could be avoided by early purchasing. I was also called to humane-ly destroy a horse for a West End farmer; the animal was suffering from an incurable leg. Also shot a horse owned by Mr. Geo. Neville, that had its leg broken and was severely out

across the breast in a motor accident on Cornwall Avenue on Thursday night. Immediately after receiving the message, I shot the horse and relieved it from its misery. Several complaints about men riding on loads of coal going against the grade will have to be brought before court in order to stop the practice. All animals in pasture must be stabled every night from date.

SCREEDS O' TARTAN.
Differing from the Lowland Scotch in personal appearance, in language, in style of dress, and in other respects, the Highlander's humour also presents characteristics which are distinctly local. Though often rich, for example, it is never boisterous, never sparkling—is rarely spontaneous—but is nearly always slow, sly, severe, and insinuating. For slow in muscular action, Duncan is slow in mental action also. He has to be stimulated or induced to physical ac-

tivity, and naturally of a serious cast of mind, his humour in its richest ore comes out nearly always as the result of provocation. But rouse his Highland blood by insult—and a word will do it sometimes or awaken his drowsy wits by banter, then get out of reach of both his arms and his tongue instantly, for his hand is heavy, his eye is sure, and his speech is a hurricane. Much of what passes for Highland humour, as everybody knows, arises from the difference which exists between the Gaelic and the English and the Scottish idiom: and from the efforts of the semi-educated or non-educated Gaelic-speaking Highlander to express himself in English, or in the colloquial

tongue of the Lowland Scot. Synonyms equally vex the spirit of the Scottish Highlander. Thus Donald Roy McKean, when interrogated in regard to the quality of his potato crop, provided amusement to the Lowlanders around him by replying: "They are just ferry good, indeed, but ferry seldom whatever."
There are some choice specimens of Donald's English extant, and, before passing on to the richer ore of his natural humour, it will be worth while to glance at a few. First, there is the famous Inveraray proclamation. It is a unique production, but is said to have actually been delivered at the Market Cross of Inveraray towards the close of the last century. Here it is: "Ta-hoy!—a tither ta-hoy!—three times ta-hoy!—and ta-hoy! Wheesh!!" By Command of Her Majesty King George and Her Grace the Duke O' Argyll! Any persons found fishing about ta loch or below ta loch, afore ta loch or abent ta loch, in ta loch, roun ta loch or abent ta loch, will be persecuted with three persecutions—First she'll be troon'd, and syne she'll be hang'd, and ten she'll be prunt; and if she'll come back any more she'll be persecuted with a far worse persecution tan all that. Got save the King and Her Grace the Duke O' Argyll. If we admit the above to be bona fide, we can

And, moreover, likewise, send us floods of water, tat tere may be grass for plenty to man and beast, and some to spare to ta poor of ta parish. Send us guns and pistols as moré as ta sea and ta sand-shore, and swords, too, likewise, to kill all ta giants and ta Macphersons for evermore. Bless ta wee strick, and mak' him a big Coe, before Martinmas. Bless ta wee Soo, too, and mak' him a big bear likewise. Oh, yes, put the strength of Samson into Donald's arms, and send us parley, kill and corn prodigious. Bless all ta palms—Duncan and Rory and Flora, and you, Donald, and you Lachie, and you Peter—and glorious Yours for evermore."

I do not ask anyone to swallow the above, inasmuch as the proverbial "grain of salt." I like to take it that way myself. And yet there are well-authenticated instances and occasions revealing deliverances quite as ludicrous and absurd. Witness the following fragments of a pulpit homily which appears in Hugh Boyd's admittedly veracious Reminiscences of Fifty Years, and which the recorder appears to have heard himself, or received on highly credible authority:—"Ah, my friends," exclaimed the preacher, "what causes have we for gratitude! Oh, yes! for the deepest gratitude. Look at the place of our habitation. How grateful should we be that we do not live in the far North. Oh, no! amid the frost and the snow, and the cauld and the west. Oh, no! that we do not gang shivering about in shins. Oh, no! snookin' among the snow like mowdiewarts. Oh, no, no! and how grateful should we be that we do not live in the far South, beneath the equator, and the sun aye burnin', burnin', where the sky's het, ah, yes, and the earth's het, and the water's het, and ye're burnt black as a smiddy. Ah, yes! where there's turgurs. Oh, yes! and lions. Oh, yes! and crocodiles. Oh, yes, and fearsome beasts growlin' and girnin', at ye among the woods. Where the very air is a fever, like the burnin' breath o' a fiery dragon; that we do not live in these places—Oh, no, no, no, no. But that we levee in this blessed island of ours, call't Great Britain. Oh, yes, yes! and in that part of it 'neel Scotland, that looks up at Ben Nevis. 

ON AN OLD TACK.

With the wind taken out of its sails, and after having been in the "doldrums" for a time over the refutation of its manufactured charges that Canadian paper interests had conspired to prevent an Imperial guarantee on Humber Project Bonds, the Advocate manages to get away on an old tack and with the breezes of inaccuracy filling its sails, shapes a course toward instilling into the minds of the fishermen that their only enemies in Newfoundland to-day are the News and Telegram, and that these papers are doing all they can not only to keep down the price of Labrador Fish (not a word about the price of Shore, it may be remarked) but to kill "Coaker's policy" whatever that may be. We have asked the Advocate repeatedly if the "price of fish is what Coaker makes it?" but our erstwhile vehement contemporary on this statement has not a word to say in reply. Characteristically it gets away back to issues that never existed, save in its imagination, and its chief mission now is to stir up a feeling of hostility amongst the fishermen against all and sundry who do not agree with the sentiments expressed by the numerous writers of that journal. The latest attempt of the "Suum Cuique" expressionist is to deny the conditions existing re lack of sale and low price of Labrador fish, but is not "the price of fish what Coaker makes it?" There is no "vile abuse of Mr. Coaker" in propounding this question daily or weekly or monthly as the case may be. Such a declaration was made by the Advocate, iterated and reiterated, until many people were credulous enough to believe that it was so. Is it, we repeat an abuse of Mr. Coaker to ask, time and again, the question is not the price of fish what Coaker makes it? One could add without abusing the Prime Minister that the present price of Sugar is just what he and the last Sugar Board made it. There would be no postulation of a falsehood in such a declaration. It is true, and a great deal more nearer the parrot-like repetitions of the Advocate in the days of good prices for fish that these were what Coaker made them. Why then not make them today? The same power is in the possession of the Honorable the Minister of Marine and Fisheries. Labrador fish can scarcely be sold in St. John's to-day, and such parcels as holders are fortunate enough to dispose of fetch but unprofitable returns. Let Mr. Coaker come to the rescue. It is only for him to declare a price, according to the boastings of former days, and presto! the thing is done. Far better indeed for him to step into the breach and help relieve the situation by fixing a price (locally of course) which all must pay, and which he is prepared to pay himself. Better we say for him to do this than have his mouthpieces running amok through the English language in an endeavour to verbally slay all those who refuse to believe in the omnipotence of the dictator.

Open Letter to House of Assembly.

MR. WALSH, M.H.A., MAKES APPEAL FOR UNITED ACTION—ASKS FOR POLITICAL ARMISTICE TO DEAL WITH PRESENT SITUATION.

Members of the House of Assembly. Gentlemen:—During the past month I have been making a careful study of conditions, as they actually exist in the district of Placentia and St. Mary's; and now, that I am positively convinced that immediate action is essential, if a calamity is to be averted. I make this public appeal for united action by every member of the House of Assembly irrespective of Party Affiliation before it is too late. It does not improve the situation to say "the fishery regulations were the cause of our troubles," nor does it alter our position, any more to blame the merchants, the Opposition, or the war for the depression which is rampant throughout the land. In my opinion, several agencies assisted in bringing about our commercial collapse, and no good would be achieved if I were in any way to discuss these agencies here. What I am interested in now is a remedy, and a speedy remedy too, one such as R.R.R. is for a champ or a colic, and party politics must be, for the time being, eliminated if the people are to be saved from disaster. I am not a believer in Coalition Government, nor do I have any attempt to suggest any such action; but I would strongly and honestly support a United House of Assembly to deal with the present grave situation facing the country.

MARKETING FISH. Fish, our staple industry, is to-day if not altogether unsaleable, certainly not saleable at a profit either to the fisherman or the merchant. In my honest opinion the time has arrived when the fisheries of Newfoundland—as at present conducted—can no longer (even with the auxiliaries) support our population, and though I was, am still, and will always remain an opponent of any form of state control of a country's trade, I am convinced that a drastic change must take place in the marketing of our fish, or the industry will, in a very short time cease to exist. I am also convinced that this change must be brought about by the trade, and not by parliament. So much for the fishery.

OTHER CONDITIONS DISCUSSED. The mines at Bell Island are, instead of increasing their output, curtailing operations. Sydney, which gave work to a large number of our men is filled to the utmost capacity; and late messages advise that it would be useless for more men to go there. The Humber Valley Proposition (so called) is still in the distance, and in all probability will give no employment this autumn, and though the A.N.D. Co., the A.E. Reid Co., Mr. M. E. Martin and other smaller lumbering and Pit Prop contractors may be prepared to take on a goodly number of men later for woods work, a great many of our people especially from the South and West will not be able to engage at this employment.

AS TO PLACENTIA AND ST. MARY'S. I do not know what conditions are like in any section of the country outside of Placentia and St. Mary's district, but I am fully conversant with the conditions in every settlement between Rushoon on the west side of Placentia Bay to Cape Race on the east side of Trepassay Bay, and it is with this section of the country that I am most concerned. You gentlemen, I feel certain are fully alive to the needs of your respective sections. Placentia Bay, from Rushoon, around to Point Verde is just closing the worst fishery in twenty years. Cape Shore, from Point Verde to Branch was far short of an average voyage, and handicaps and hardships which the fishermen of this section must suffer because of their being located on a wild shore, seriously hampered their operations.

St. Mary's Bay, from Branch to Peter's River secured just about enough fish to pay for current account, which leaves the fishermen and their families, in a great many cases unprovided for, for the winter. Trepassay Bay had a very good trap fishery, but the dory men did very badly. So, on the whole, the fishery in the district falls far short of an average catch; and now with the low prices prevailing, help must come from some quarter, or we are going to be faced with a very serious situation.

MR. WALSH'S SOLUTION. Now gentlemen, this serious situation can be avoided if we, the elected representatives of the people will do the right thing at the right time, and the right time is now before winter is upon us. How many public wharves, all over the country need repair. The same question may be asked of our miles of breakwaters with the possible exception of St. John's East and West, and a part of the district of Harbour Main, our public roads are disgraceful and, in many cases quite unsafe for vehicle traffic. I do not blame any government or M.H.A. for these conditions, as insufficient money is the cause. Wharves, bridges, roads, breakwaters, etc. all over the country are valuable assets to our people and public utilities which cannot be done without. So, gentlemen, let us immediately get together and proclaim a political Armistice, even if it is only "a calm before a storm." If we are faithful to our trust, we can, during that calm provide sufficient means to effect substantial repairs to our roads, bridges, etc., which will prove an everlasting benefit to our people, and at the same time give them a chance to earn an honest dollar, to provide for their families and avoid being later on, stigmatized as paupers, and we are well aware, gentlemen, that pauper relief is abhorred by every son of Newfoundland. Then after the Armistice, if fight we must, we can go forth to the fray armed with the feeling that we have, one and all, done something worthy of the trust placed in us, something to induce our confidence.

Think it over M.H.A.'s, don't wait till the ground is white and frozen; don't wait till the water is turned to ice; don't wait till the Prime Minister returns. Let us get together as an assembly of honest Newfoundlanders, and forgetting politics for the time being, cable Sir Richard our demands. He, I feel sure, will meet the request of a unanimous house. The people are asking for bread, do not hand them a stone.

Big Gold Strike.

BIG BROOK, LABRADOR, ANOTHER KLONDYKE.

Should the reports brought back from Labrador by parties who arrived in the city prove true, Big Brook River in Makovik Bay rivals the far famed Yukon River for pay dirt. During the past summer a party of Americans have been prospecting on the Labrador for gold, which was reported to be found in the bottom of the Makovik Bay. It is stated that the party received their information of the gold finds from a man doing a trading business at Aliik, some miles north of Makovik. Amongst those interested are a number of Canadians, including Capt. Jefferies, of Cobalt; Messrs. Ross & Scott of Montreal. The party organized an expedition, using Makovik as a base, and after much difficulty, guided by Indians, made the mouth of Big Brook River, some twenty miles up the Bay. The party was away six days. The expedition exceeded their most sanguine expectations, and a large number of claims were staked off. On returning to St. John's by the Melgie, the parties took out claims, over thirty of which have been granted. Samples of gravel have been brought along, and the indications are that a big strike has been made.

AT GENERAL METHODIST CONFERENCE.

The Toronto Star Weekly in a write-up of prominent Methodists now assembled for General Conference at the Queen City, has the following to say of Pres. W. J. Morris of the Nfld. Conference:—"A picture of real, sacrificing service is presented in even a mere outline of the biography of Rev. W. J. Morris, of the Newfoundland Conference, who by the way was elected while some 'out-of-the-ordinary' sessions were held at the end of June on a fog-bound steamer. The Conference was due to meet at Grand Bank and more than half the members trusted to a small coaster for transportation. They were held up for three or four days en route, and since Methodist regulations call for the gathering to be held in the month it was necessary to provide for sessions to be held there and then to get within the time limit. President Morris taught school in the colony for eight years under the peculiar system still in vogue in which the schools are under church control. Since then he has gone through work and experiences that would make Dr. Grenfell put on another sweater coat. Three years were spent on coastal missions on the Belle Isle side of the island and practically all his years since in mission work at other coastal points. Down there the preachers think nothing of holding four or five services a Sunday with twenty or thirty miles of rowing or sixty or seventy in a fisherman's motor-dory in all weathers thrown in for good measure.

C.C.C. Band Promenade Concert.

During the week the C.C.C. Band gave three Promenade Band Concerts in the Prince's Park on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, and they have proved a wonderful success, the total attendance amounting to 2,300 people. We understand that the secret of the success of these Promenade Concerts, is that they are conducted in a very orderly manner. To begin with, no person intoxicated is admitted to the Park, and the floor arrangements are perfect, and we are told by quite a number of people attending these Concerts, that better order could not prevail at any concert in any of the first class concert halls. The concert begins at 8.30 and is over at 10.30 in order that people attending are home at a respectable hour. Great credit is due the Police Sergeant and his three officers in charge, as they allow no rowdiness of any kind and children are not admitted, and thru their efforts perfect order is maintained throughout the evening. The music last night was splendid, the Band having their full team. The next concert takes place on Monday night at 8.30; the admission is only 20c, and you get a programme worth \$1.50. MEN GET INCREASE.

The 2,000 men now working on Bell Island have been given an increase of three cents an hour on the wage of 21 cents for which they formerly worked. The Bell Island mines are now booming as they never did before, and the average number of men at work each day is 1800. Ore will be shipped to Germany until January, and steamers take from the island every second day taking from 7000 to 11000 tons of ore each. The total quantity to be shipped to Germany is 100,000 tons. This ore is being mined, as the ore in the stock piles is not sufficiently high grade to satisfy the German markets.

Terrible Railroad Smash

Head-on Collision Staged for the Movies—Some Cost Thousands of Dollars For Few Feet of Film.

Some people say that the movies are purely mechanical and that they get few thrills out of big scenes shown in pictures. Those folks have something coming when they see the terrific head-on smash between two giant locomotives that takes place in the fall delivery scene in "Where is My Wandering Boy Tonight?" which comes to the Nickel Theatre on Monday. The scene calls for a huge locomotive running wild and on which a prison warden is fighting with several escaped convicts. The director, knowing that such a scene would not make anything extraordinary, resolved to stage a real smash-up.

Forthwith two big locomotives were purchased and a track built on the city limit freight yards. The track was about a half mile long. The engines were placed at either end, and, with a full head of steam, were set loose with throttles open. With the roar of the escaping steam, and the exhausts puffing like mad, these two leviathans dashed headlong at each other like a couple of mad bulldozers. They met in about the centre of the span of tracks and crashed together with a deafening roar and an explosion that rent them into a thousand pieces.

Thrilling doesn't describe the scene. It must be witnessed on the screen to be fully appreciated. It is unquestionably one of the greatest head-on collisions ever staged in pictures and cost upwards of \$12,000 for this one shot alone.

And the ships are nothing but floating old tanks, with lots of powder aboard and no fire-preventive apparatus that's worth a hoot. If one ever caught fire—good night!

The ships are usually under-reefed, often with defective machinery and boilers. Staunch though they be, they cannot always cope with the cruel might of the north, especially as no effective regulations govern their loading. The idea is to grab all the fat possible and trust in God to reach St. John's. Sometimes the result is a shocking disaster—witness the Southern Cross.
