THE ABYSSINIAN EXPEDITION.

The latest despatches from Abyssinia seem to point to a probability of a speedy interchange of warlike compliments between the British forces and the troops of the savage Theodore. The King who has for a long time been absent is returning by easy marches to his capital, while General Napier at the head of his army is reported to be only fifteen days' march distant from the same focus of interest. It is not improbable that should Theodore reach his stronghold, where the European captives groan in fetters, before the British troops can compass their safety the prisoners would be put to death with all that barbarous refinement of cruelty for which the king has become famous. There are hopes, however, that his progress towards Magdala may be arrested by one of the revolted Abyssinian chiefs, who, it is said, has advanced at the head of a formidable force to offer the monarch battle. Should this report be unfounded, should Theodore enter his capital and crush the bodies of his prisoners beneath the wheels of his ammunition wagons before the invading army could interpose for their deliverance, where will the expedition have been successful when the orders are issued for re-embarking? Magdala may be left a heap of ruins, and the best part of an army of 30,000 dusky Abyssinians may be stretched in their last sleep upon the plains, but all this would be mere, profitless revenge. Another Theodore might arise in after years, on whose mind the tradition of the retribution visited on his predecessor would have no effect, and adventurous Englishmen might again be loaded with fetters in his dungeons. What can compensate the British for the vast treasure expended upon the expedition, but the possession of the country in perpetuity, as a colony of the crown, or what could be better for Abyssinia itself, or for the world? Civilization spread in those lands over which the Roman eagle soared, and it follows inevitably in the path the British lion treads. Why should its progress be impeded, or why should a savage hold in darkness millions who wait for enlightenment, or tyrannize with the most barbarous cruelty over a land where christian rule can be easily established, and where there is now an opportunity of fixing it with permanency?

Brampton has been legislated into a town, but will not assume the dignity until January, 1869.

SABBATH SCHOOL ANNIVERSARY.—The annual anniversary of St. Andrew's Church Sabbath School will be held to-morrow [Friday] evening, in the church. Proceedings to commence at 6 p.m. The friends of Sabbath Schools and all others interested, are invited to attend.

A young man in Beverly, named Wm. Robinson, for a wager, chopped, piled, and brush piled four and a quarter cords of hard wood, in the incredibly short space of seven hours and thirty-five minutes. He undertook to cut four cords in twelve hours, winning the wager in four hours and twenty-five minutes. Several side bets were made, and a large number of the Beverlyites witnessed this important feat.

AMAZEMENT.—In Goderich township recently "the oldest inhabitant" went out to the woods to chop. He cut down a tree, and watched it until it fell and disappeared beneath the snow. He did not attempt an exploring expedition to discover where it had gone, but shouldered his axe and went home, declaring he had not seen the like for twenty years.

SPIRITED.—Last week Mr. John Bear, of Waterloo township was passing through his stable when a mare kicked at him—the blow barely missing his head. The gentleman did not relish such compliments; so he took her out, tied her up and proceeded to administer a thrashing to teach her to be civil in future. The animal to show her sense of the indignity threw herself and broke her neck. It is said she was a valuable beast.

AMERICANS OR CANADIANS.—The "New West" says: If we may trust the appearance of the political horizon to the East and South it seems to be at least certain that before this year closes we are to have a change, and the change will make us either Americans or Canadians. At about the time when Mr. McDougall is urging upon the Canadian House of Commons the necessity of its at once acquiring possession of this country, the Hon. Mr. Ramsey is seriously proposing to the Senate of the United States a scheme which, if carried out, may make us a flourishing territory of the great Federation. The curious fact in connection with the matter is that neither party say a word about our own feelings in the matter, and it may be that just at this juncture an expression of our wishes would carry with it a weight which would be felt as at no other time, and we would advise those who have fallen into the lethargy which fruitless hope brings, to again arouse, for the time of redemption seems to be at hand.

Eramosa Township Council.

The Council met on the 24th Feb., at the Centre Inn, pursuant to adjournment. All the members present: The Reeve in the chair. The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed. The Inspector of Licenses presented his report certifying that he visited the different Taverns in the Municipality and found them provided with the accommodations required by the Provincial Statutes and the By-laws of the Municipality. The report was received and ordered to be engrossed on the minutes. The Reeve and Clerk were authorized to grant certificates to the several Tavern keepers to obtain Licenses from the Collector of Inland Revenue. A By-Law was introduced by Mr. Rea, for appointing Township Officers for 1868, which after being considered in committee of the whole and the blanks filled up was read a second time and passed. A petition from Robert Pasmore and 49 others for aid for Mrs. Sullivan, an indigent person, was received, and ten dollars granted for her immediate relief. William Johnson presented a letter from Martin & Ferguson, Barristers, Hamilton, in reference to his claims for support by the Municipality, which on motion of Mr. Farrish, seconded by Mr. Dickieson, was laid on the table. Ten dollars were voted for the relief of Mrs. Forrester. The Auditors presented their report which was received and ordered to be engrossed on the minutes. The Clerk was instructed to have the back taxes on all Lots exempted by resolution of Council, together with all back taxes paid to the Township Collector, struck off the County Treasurer's books. Two dollars and fifty cents were voted towards paying the funeral expenses of the late James Jackson found dead on the road, and two dollars for a musical account for attending Rose Ellis's son. On motion the Council adjourned to meet at the Centre Inn as a Court of Revision, on Monday, the 4th day of May next.

The poll will be open on Thursday the 12th inst.

THE MILITARY BALL.—This entertainment was first announced for the 12th inst., but in consequence of the military concert coming off on the 10th it has been considered that Terpsichore may find more votaries round her altars on the latter night than on the former. Youth will be in the way of enjoying itself on the night of the 10th, which it scarcely will be two days afterwards. The military ball, then, will begin as soon as the military concert is ended, and those who may desire to make a full night of it can adjourn from the Drill Shed to the Town Hall.—See advt.
