

The Recent Appointments.

Our readers already know that the new Government, on entering office, discovered that their predecessors had made during the past few weeks, nearly one hundred appointments to office, keeping them secret from the public and Parliament to the last moment.

In the case of Mr. Tilley, and also of his late colleague, Mr. Hugh McDonald, appointed a Justice of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia, the case is aggravated by the fact that they were, at one and the same time, the Ministers who gave and the members who received these offices in a manner so indefensible.

As regards the public action of the new Government on these appointments, we are not as yet able to give any information. The tenure of office of Lieutenant-Governors and of Judges is different from that of inferior placemen, and all cannot be treated in the same way; but we do not think that the Ministry will seek to correct, by every means within their reach, the assumption of undue authority by their predecessors.—Globe.

Nearly 8,000 persons have been thrown out of employment in Brooklyn, N.Y. The workmen are to hold a mass meeting to demand the resumption of public works.
