

# The Dominion Rifle Association Matches, 1892.

The great event of the year to Canadian riflemen, the matches of the Dominion Rifle Association, opened at nine o'clock a.m., on Monday, 20th August, closing on the following Friday afternoon. The weather was all that could be desired, the first three days being bright and hot, the last two rather cool and dull: no rain whatever fell during the week-a marked contrast in this respect to the weather which attended the P.Q.R.A. meeting.

The number of entries was slightly less than at last year's matches, due, in part, to the fact that the Ontario Provincial Matches were not held as usual on the week preceeding the D. R. A. meeting. Major Hodgins, G.G. F. G. was executive officer, and throughout the week, the shooting was well kept up to time. The range arrangements were, as a whole, well systematized and properly carried out, although some miner details would have stood improvement; camping facilities were excellent, but the commissariat gave rise to much grumbling. The energetic secretary, Lieut.-Col. Bacon, was always on hand, and much of the success of the meeting is due to his arrangements. A range committee consisting of Lieut.-Col. Gibson, 13th, Major Hughes, 45th, Major Blaiklock, 5th, and Capt. Hartt, R.L., with the executive officer, supervised the details of the shooting.

Only two representatives of the Imperial Service attended the meeting both naval men, from H.M.S. "Blake." It is much to be regretted that not a single man of the Halifax garrison was present, although last year a team of H. M. 17th "Leicestershire," fired through the meeting. All parts of Canada were represented but the contingent from British Columbia was woefully small, owing, it is said, to the fact that the Canadian Pacific Railway advanced their rates this year, thus increasing the already very considerable expense of the trans-continental trip.





#### THE COMPETITORS MEETING.

According to time-honored custom, the annual meeting of competitors for the ventilation of grievances, real and supposed, was held in the large council tent on the ranges on Tuesday evening. The chairman of the Executive Committee, Lieut.-Col. White, presided, and Lieut.-Col. Bacon acted as secretary. There was a large attendance of shooting men, the tent being completely filled. The chairman opened the proceedings by inviting suggestions from those present.

Capt. Rogers, 43rd Battalion, expressed a hope that more wind-flags would be placed on both sides of the range to indicate the power of the wind.

The chairman said the suggestion was a good one, and would be attended to without delay. He quite agreed that on no range in the world did the wind blow from so many quarters at once as it did on the Rideau ranges. (Laughter.)

Lieut. Pringle, 10th R. G., brought up the old question of the quality of the ammunition. He thought it hardly fair that when riflemen had been practising with 63 ammunition all summer they should have 62 ammunition all served out to them at these matches.

The chairman said he was assured

by Col. Panet, Deputy Minister of Militia, that the same powder was used in the 92 ammunition as in 91.

Staff-Sergt. Dent, Royal Grenadiers, said he and other competitors had examined the ammunition and it was noticed that the grains of powder were not even in color, some brown grains being noticeable, although the regulation color is black.

Lieut.-Col. Panet, Deputy Minister of Militia, assured the competitors that the powder was the same as used last year. It was English powder, carefully tested in England, and again at the cartridge factory. He suggested the formation of a Board to hear all complaints of this kind and examine the quality of the ammunition before the matches. He would, however, call the attention of the superintendent of the factory to the fact alluded to by Sergt. Dent and Lieut. Pringle. This year's ammunition (1892 brand) was served out because it was asked for.

Capt. Rogers remarked that the markers had been heard to say that in many cases the bullets had entered the targets sideways, proving something to be wrong with the bullet.

Lieut.-Col. Pennington Macpherson said that as one of those who scored badly this year, he could assure the meeting that to clean his rifle he was obliged to use methylated spirits, so badly was it fouled.

Staff-Sergt. McVittie, an old shot, had experienced the same thing.

Major Clarke advised the use of the newest and best powder obtainable, and would have it tested before the D.R.A. meeting by a competent committee.

Lieut.-Col. Wright throught there was something wrong with the rifle itself. When you go beyound 500 yards, he said, you are outside the competent range of the Snider. It is time anyway to do away with the Snider and use the Martini-Henry exclusively.

Lieut.-Col Hood corroborated the reports as to bad powder. One sighting shot fouled his rifle so that two succeeding shots at 600 yards fell two hundred yards short of the target, and it took the armourer an hour to clean the barrel. He deprecated the continued use of the Snider rifle, and hoped this would be the last meeting at which it would be used.

Major Hughes, M.P., Lindsay, stated that Canadian riflemen going to Bisley were seriously handicapped from the fact that nearly all the home matches were shot with the Snider. He favored the adoption of the Martini-Henry.

After remarks from Major Clark, Major Mason, Staff-Sergt. Henderson, Major Hartt and others, Pte. Burns, 62nd, St. John, N.B., moved, seconded by Staff-Sergt. Dent, "that the council of the D.R.A. take proper measures to ascertain the quality of the ammunition before adopting it for use at the annual matches."

The resolution was carried unanimously.

Lieut. T. Mitchell, 12th Battalion, moved: "That in the opinion of the meeting, Martini-Henry rifles should hereafter be used entirely at the annual meetings of the D.R.A." In making

the motion, Lieut. Mitchell said that it was a farce to select men for Bisley from those who stood high in the Snider aggregate, many of whom were indifferent shots with the Martini. (Hear, hear.)

Major Hartt said the riflemen of New Brunswick had unanimously passed a resolution urging the D.R.A. to adopt the Martini exclusively in the Ottawa matches.

The resolution was carried unanimously.

Capt. Hartt, St. John, wanted to know about the system of inspecting the markers in the butts.

Lieut.-Col. White replied that the markers were superintended by the Assistant-Commissioner of the Dominion Police, who was aided by two non-commissioned officers, and most faithfully discharged the duties of inspection. This was the general opinion of the meeting.

Capt. Rogers said he thought the rule requiring Canadian representative to Bisley to be properly uniformed before leaving Canada should be rigidly enforced. He thought the inspecting officer at Montreal should have the power to rule any man off the team who had not his proper dress. Some men had gone to England with outfits which no pawnbroker would buy for a shilling. (Laughter.)

Major Macdonald, 48th, said some Bisley competitors had only been gazetted as officers a week or two before the departure of the team, and consequently could not procure their uniforms in time, but immediately on arriving in England they did so, and in all the competitions they appeared properly uniformed. (Applause.) noticed an improvement at Bisley, and that was that sighting and blow-off shots were included on the one ticket. He moved, seconded by Captain Rogers, "That sighting-shot and blow-off tickets be dispensed with, and the cost of sighting-shots and blow-off shots be included in the entrance moneys, one sighting-shot to be taken at each range, the blow-off shot to be opti-

The motion was adopted.

Then there was some complaint about the squadding. Some marksmen said they had been squadded with the same men all through.

Lieut. Mitchell, 12th: "Well, I was squadded with my brother all day, but as he's from Winnipeg and I from Toronto it's no proof of improper squadding." (Laughter).

Lieut.-Col. White "Of course nobody can keep the run of shooting families that scatter all over Canada." (More laughter.)

It was decided to count all shots through the target upon their merit, irrespective of indications of ricochet other than the throwing of dust into the butts. Also to start the Rideau match on the following afternoon early enough to allow competitors ticketed for 6.10 p.m. to fire at 4.10 p.m.

On the suggestion of Major MacDonald it was decided to have the secretary, Lieut.-Col Bacon, petition the Council of the National Rifle Association to have the extra series at Bisley shot during the first week of the meeting, which would give competitors the benefit of practice at long range before the Kolapore match came oft. The meeting then adjurned.

#### NOTES.

An unfortunate accident happened on the afternoon of the first day. Capt. Stevens, of the 66th, was cocking his 38 calibre Smith and Wesson, preparatory to taking his first shot in the revolver match, when the hammer slipped and the weapon discharged. The 25yard stake to his left was scarred by the bullet, which, glancing off, struck Major Weston, of the same battalion, who was standing near by, in the calf of the left leg. The bullet ploughed downwards alongside the bone, and all but came through the skin six or eight inches below the point of entry, and near the ankle joint in front. Major sat down, grasped his leg to staunch the flow of blood, and took the matter as coolly as possible while Surgeon March, 8th Cavalry, who was on the range as a competitor, was sent for in haste, and examined and bandaged up the wound. The word soon went round that Major Weston had been shot and scores of friends came running to the spot, for the Major is one of the most popular officers in the service. "Where did the bullet strike," asked an anxious officer of Lieutenant Mc-Lean, who was in charge of the revolver range? "Just here," replied Major Weston, who had overheard the enquiry, and coolly drawing up the other leg he pointed to the corresponding spot on the uninjured member and traced the course of the bullet down to the ankle. Dr. Hurdman suggested cutting the leg of the Major's nether garment. "Well, do so"; said the stoical soldier from the seaside "but, rip from the inside of the seam, and save the trousers, old fellow." They obeyed his directions, the Major himself seemingly the least concerned of the crowd, and chatting with his brother officers all the while. Then the wound was bandaged and Major Weston was taken away in a cab to the Protestant Hospital, where the bullet was extracted. He remained there for several days, under the professional care of Sir James Grant, M.D., returning to Halifax when sufficiently recovered to travel.

When Petty Officers Isaacs and Sullivan, of H. M. S., Blake, left for Quebec to rejoin their ship, they were accompanied to the station by a number of riflemen and others in the city with whom they have become firm friends. Isaacs and Sullivan are typical tars, and by their gentlemanly bearing delighted everybody in town who came in contact with them. If they return to Ottawa next year they may be sure of a hearty welcome. In the match they were handicapped by having to use the Snider, a weapon with which they are unfamiliar, and if unfortunately the old gun figures in the

competitions next year, in order to give the Regulars a chance, Sniders should be served out to them a few weeks before the Ottawa meet. Despite the fact that the Snider was a new rifle to both men, Isaacs managed to " get there " in the Nursery match in gallant style, capturing first prize. He expressed a wish that instead of the money, \$20, being given to him it should be extended to obtain a prize in kind. Accordingly Col. Bacon, secretary of the D. R. A., assisted them to procure a handsome plated cup and had it suitably inscribed with the name of the winner.

In mentioning their arrival, the faux pas of the Ottawa Free Press in its issue of 29th August will not be soon forgotten. A reporter who will publish such galling inaccuracies deserves the strongest censure.

Three or four competitors at the 200 yards range of the Dominion of Canada, in which kneeling was permissible, adopted the device of carrying the rifle sling under the thigh, which gave them a tremendous grip on their weapons. The practice may be a legitimate one, but is not one that could be readily adopted on active service, and should therefore be disallowed. An authoritative judgement should be given on this point and also on that as to whether a competitor (in uniform) be permitted to fire with the butt of his rifle inside his tunic, in a match in which uniform is not obligatory.

One of the chief attractions of the meeting was the "at Home" given by Mrs. Kirkpatrick, wife of Lieut.-Governor Kirkpatrick; it was a brilliant success, being attended by upwards of four hundred of the Capital's leading citizens. The scenes around the tented field were very animated and beautiful to look at. The visiting riflemen in their varied uniforms flitted around through the immense crowd of visitors which assembled near the president's marquee, and the band of the Governor-General's Foot Guards discoursed choice selections while the great social event was in progress. At the close of the reception the Lieutenant-Governor delivered a short speech in which he complimented the D. R. A. for the immense success of this year's matches. The prize-winners were paraded by Major Sims, V. R. C., and were then formally presented with their prizes.

It is to be regretted that the Executive thought it unnecessary to appoint a surgeon for duty during the matches, and their action in this matter was severely commented on. It appears that a medical officer has been for many years in attendance, but that not a single accident took place during that time, so that latterly the appointment was dropped. Had the accident to Major Weston been of a more serious nature, and no surgeon happened to the on the range, the results might have been most deplorable. After the first day, however, Assistant-Surgeon Grant, G. G. F. G., was appointed, and was on duty until the end of the meeting.

# The Ganadian Military Rifle League.

The third annual general meeting of the Canadian Military Rifle League was held in the large dining half of the Russel House, Ottawa, on Tuesday evening, 31st August. The half was well filled by shooting men and those interested in the subject, and much enthusiasm was shown. The president, Lieut.-Col. Gibson, M. P. P., occupied the chair, and among those present were Col. Powell, A. G., Col. Panet, Sir Adolphe Caron, Lieut.-Col's White, Macpherson, Anderson, Hood, Starke, and many other officers prominent in military and shooting circles.

The proceedings were opened by a stirring address from the president. He referred to the encouragement lent by the attendance of so many members, the presence of the late Minister of Militia, the Adjutant-General and the Deputy Minister of Militia. The matches this year, he said, had on the whole been satisfactory. In the very nature of the League competition the teams which had the best shooting reputation did not always come out first. This was due to the difference in the ranges. He spoke of the advantage of having competitions going on simultaneously throughout the whole Dominion at the same time; and paid a handsome compliment to Sir Adolphe Caron who, he said, had done a great deal for the League, especially in providing free ammunition. He expressed regret at the absence of the Minister of Militia and the Major-General commanding, both of whom in their letters expressed the greatest interest in the League and showed that they heartily sympathized with its objects. Then there was Lt.-Col. Kirkpatrick, Lieut.-Governor of Ontario, who was also prevented from being in attendance, but who would be with them later on. His name was a household word among riflemen. The letter which Mr. Kirkpatrick forwarded him was in language which showed he still felt a deep interest in all that appertained to the success of the league, and intended to keep up the lively interest in the future which he maintained in it in the past.

Lieut. Pringle, R. G., having been specially mentioned in the president's address as the originator of the League, was called before the meeting, and was received with great cheering. He responded briefly and retired.

Major Delamere, of the Queen's Own, secretary of the League, read his annual report as follows:

To the President and members of the Canadian Military League:

Gentlemen,—I take much pleasure in presenting this, the third annual report of the Canadian Military Rifle League, and in doing so have to congratulate the League on its continued success and bright prospects for the future. The entry list in 1800 showed 54 teams. In 1801, 104 teams, and in 1892, 132 teams, showing the increasing popularity of this institution. This popularity is mainly due to the foster-

ing care of the late Minister of Militia Sir Adolphe Caron, who procured free ammunition for the matches. To the deep interest taken by the present Minister, Lieut.-Col. Mackenzie Bowell, who has followed his predecessor in office by the continued ssue of ammunition, and who has also donated a valuable prize to be competed for at the D.R.A. meeting; Major-General Herbert, commanding the militia of Canada, who has considered League badges worthy of being worn by militiamen in uniform; the Department of Militia, which has given every assistance in its power, and last, but not least, the untiring efforts and zeal of the president, Lieut.-Col. J. M. Gibson, in having the competition carried out in that honest, straightforward way, so necessary for the life of the league, and also in again offering for competition an exceedingly handsome and valuable president's prize. The amount received in entrance fees from the teams competing was \$1,015, and the actual expense, not including an allowance to the secretary for assistance, etc., is \$107, the balance being spent for prizes. The shooting on the whole has not been as high as last year, but this may be accounted for partly by the fact that no iron targets were allowed, and also by the fact that the rules and regulations were more strictly adhered There has not been a single complaint about ammunition, except from one team in the North-West Territories, which had to fire with the ammunition left up there in 1885. In conclusion, I think the League has every right to congratulate itself on the way the matches have been carried out, and also on the great benefit the Canadian Military Rifle League has been to the riflemen of the Dominion.

Sir A. P. Caron was then invited to address the meeting. The postmastergeneral expressed his great appreciation at receiving the invitation to be present, as he desired to testify that he still retained a lively interest in rifle shooting and in the militia force of Canada. (Applause.) He hoped the league would prosper, and believed that nothing was more calculated to weld the different provinces together than an association such as theirs. He referred to the good work done by Lieut. Pringle, whom the president had designated the father or mother or wet nurse of the league, and hoped the association would insist upon it that Col. Gibson retain the presidency for

another year. (Applause.)
Lieut.-Col. W. P. Anderson said the meeting ought to consider Sir Adolphe's suggestion as a motion, and he had great pleasure in seconding the reelection of Col. Gibson as president.

Lieut.-Col. Gibson said that while he was opposed to another term of office yet the persuasion which was extended to him during the past two days made him accept. He asked that the secretary be again elected. During his speech he said that scores made in some instances were marvellous, but nevertheless he was certain that they were won fairly. (Cheers.)

Major Delamere, Q. O. R., was reelected secretary unanimously. Lieut. Crooks, Q. O. R., was elected trea-

Lieut. - Col. Anderson, 43rd, and Major Hartt, 62nd, were elected vicepresidents.

The old council was re-elected for Ontario, Quebec and Prince Edward Island. For Nova Scotia there were two changes, that of Major Bishop for Lieut.-Col. Murray and Major Weston for Lieut.-Col. Walsh. For New Brunswick, Manitoba, Northwest and British Columbia there were no changes.

It had been expected that a strong team would be present from Nanaimo, where the shooting interest has of late been strong and general disappointment was expressed when it was found that that place, as well as Vancouver city, was quite unrepresented on the range.

The officers of the association on duty were Capt. Fletcher, the secretary, who exercised a general supervision; Capt. Dorman, treasurer, who attended to the issue of the firing tickets and compiled the lists of winners; and Capt. Smallfield, who was range officer, and gave general satisfaction in that rather trying position. The president, Lieut.-Col. Prior, M.P., not only gave the encouragement of his presence, but was also a formidable competitor in the various events, and rendered material assistance in the supervision of the marking. #### NOTES.

At the competitors meeting held at Goldstream hotel to discuss the general affairs of the association, the president, Lieut.-Col. Wolfenden, presided. Mr. J. C. #### The D. R. A. Matches.

The Dominion Rifle Association meeting for 1892 is now a thing of the past and the events which made up its history can now be fairly discussed. That it was, on the whole, a success, no one will deny, although the falling off in the number of entries was disappointing. Such a check is only a temporary one, and the event is each year assuming more importance in Canadian military circles. Were it for no other reason, the meeting of 1892 has been most valuable to the entire force for the glaring exhibition of the inferiority of the Snider as a modern military weapon, and for the unanimity and vehemence with which the whole body of shooting men present denounced the rifle, and demanded the substitution of the Martini at the next and subsequent meetings of the D. R. A., until that rifle, in turn, can be replaced by the Lec-Metford. The Association cannot possibly ignore such a call, and it seems safe to prophesy that at the 1893 meeting, competitors will not be obliged to include two different rifles in their shooting luggage. Had the Government but few Martini's on hand, considerable difficulty might be expected from that quarter; but with a stock of at least ten thousand ready for immediate use, it cannot be supposed that the powers that rule at Ottawa, will continue to withhold the improved rifle from general use. While the number now in store will not arm the entire force, or even the yearly quota permitted to drill, it will go a long way in that direction, and a fair and equitable method of division can easily be devised; and all hope and expect that one of the first measures of the new Minister will be to urge, and urge with determination, the inclusion in next estimates of a sum sufficient to equip the whole force with Martinis. Such a measure is to-day the most pressing demand of the Canadian Far better would it be that the entire sum to be allotted next year to camps of instruction be diverted to the purchase of a fairly efficient weapon, if such pettifogging economy were thought necessary; but we cannot think that any Cabinet would be so flagrantly unpatriotic as to propose such an alternative.

#### The Military Rifle League.

The League has now been fairly tested, and has proved itself a most valuable aid to the military strength of the country. Apart entirely from the enthusiasm and interest shown in the organization at the recent annual meeting, by the picked shooting men of all Canada, the fact that over a thousand men devoted five Saturday afternoons to a simultaneous rifle match speaks volumes for the interest awakened in the subject and the immense benefit that must necessarily result in the shooting efficiency of our various corps. The

competitions have brought out many men who otherwise would probably have never devoted any attention to rifle-shooting; the proof of this will, no doubt, be evident next year or so soon as the double rifle nuisance—which is at present the great impediment to shooting here—is done away with, by the general issue of Martinis.

It is to be regretted that no programme or even outline of next season's work of the League was brought up at the meeting. It is good to hear that this year's work has been a brilliant success but it would also have been well to have elicited from the new Executive an expression of their determination to make the League matches of 1893 a still greater success than those of former years, and to have heard suggestions on the subject from the competitors present. We trust that Lieut.-Col. Gibson and the committee will, before very long, send out a sketch-plan of their proposals for 1893. One thing is of vital importance—that is to abolish the Snider in toto at all future matches.

#### Dalhousie Gate, Quebec.

We have been informed that the engraving of Dalhousie Gate which appeared on first page of our issue of 1st inst. was from a photograph taken by Capt. Imlah R. C. A., Quebec. While the subject is under mention, it may possibly be of interest to quote the description of Dalhousie Gate as given by Alfred Hawkins in his "Picture of Quebec," published in 1834, a few years after the fortifications were completed:

"The approach to the Citadel, which is nearly two hundred feet higher than the ground on which the Upper Town is situated, is by a winding road made through the acclivity of the Glacis, from St. Lewis-Gate, and commanded everywhere by the guns of the different bastions. This leads into the outward ditch of the ravelin, and thence into the principal ditch of the work, built upon both sides with walls of solid masonry, and extending along the whole circumference of the Citadel on the land and City sides. main entrance is through a massive gate of admirable construction, called "Dalhousie-Gate," a view of which is given on the other page. Within the arch of the gate are the Main-Guard rooms, for a detachment and an officer, who are relieved every day; and in front of it is a spacious area, used as a parade ground, or rather an enlargement of the ditch formed by the retiring angles and face of the Bastion. This is a splendid work, presenting a most august appearance, and combining strength and symmetry with all the modern improvements in the art of fortification. It is named Dalhousie-Gate and Bastion, in honour of a distinguished nobleman and gallant officer, Lieutenant General the Earl of Dalhousie, G.C.B.; who succeeded the Duke of Richmond, as Governor-in-Chief of these Provinces, in 1820. In the face of this Bastion are loop holes for the fire of musquetry from within; on the top are embrasures for the cannon. The loop-holes serve also for the admission of air and light into the casemated barracks within for the troops composing the garrison. They are commodious and well adapted both for comfort and safety, being ventilated, and proof against fire and missiles of every description. These barracks are at present occupied by the Thirty-Second Regiment of the line, commanded by Lieutenant-Colonel the Honourable John Maitland, third son of the Earl of Lauderdale. On the top of Dalhousie Bastion is an extensive covered way, or broad gravel walk, with embrasures for mounting cannon, commanding every part of the ditch and glacis, and every avenue of approach to the Citadel. From this elevated spot is obtained a delightful view of the surrounding scenery and the harbor, the whole forming a panorama that has been pronounced by competent judges not inferior in beauty to the celebrated Bay of Naples."
